At the election of the water board members last week, which had only 31 voters, we -BW and I - both forgot to vote!

There has not been an election during the past 24 years in Sanderson that we have not wged, pleaded, isisted, and otherwise tried to get all of the qualified voters to step out for the few minutes necessary to cast their ballot and give a vote of confidence to the candidate of their choice, even if unopposed. We have also intimated rather strongly the lack of civic responsibility in those who fail to vote in every election.

And Tuesday of last week found us guilty of doing what we have fussed at others about for so long!

It is nothing but right that we point out our own guilt and fuss at ourselves.

We read an editorial one time about an editor who was guilty of a similar, but in our opinion, worse action. He had fussed about drunk drivers and wound up with a charge of the same violation, to which he pleaded guilty in his column as well as in court and took the consequences. We have not read of a second accusation and hope that his own public revelation of his offense caused him to not be guilty of a second offense of this nature.

we also hope that our admission of our guilt at not voting will help us to remember our civic responsibilities at the

next and all future elections. The directors of the water district who control the operation of our utility are doing a fine job in our opinion and their action warrants our support, even when they are unopposed. We apologize to Edward Kerr and Weldon Cox for neglecting to support them and assure them that we do appreciate what they are doing and have done!
