## If 65 , Enroll for Medicare Medical Insurance

People who are 65 and haven't already signed up for Medicare medical insurance March 31 at any chrough rity office, according to social security officials here.
Medicare medical Medicare medical insurperson may first enroll in the program within the 3 month before or the 3 months after the month he reaches 65 . He the month he reaches 65 . He eral enrollment period-Jan uary, February, and March -within 3 years following the end of his first sign-up period.
"Almost anyone 65 or over o the United States is eli gible for Medicare medical
insurance," a social security spokesman said. "More than 9 out of 10 in that age group are enrolled.
Medical insurance is funded by individual voluntary matched by the Federal Government.
If a person enrolls after his first sign-up period, he pays a premium that is 10 percent higher for each full year that elapses after that first sign-up period, the spokesman said.
"If you enroll and then cancel your Medicare medical insurance, you're eligible to

## W HEART ATTACX, WMCTION ANID NWDECISION CAN RE FATAL

Ideally, following a heart attack, you will be within minutes in a coronary

Essentially, the coronary care unit is a hospital installation where trained personnel are on hand within seconds if there is any change in heart rhythm o rate
These crises usually take place within 72 hours following the attack and most often invoive an rreguiarly beating heart. Once he alarm is sounded, steps can be taken in a few seconds to correct whalever is wrong .. intravenous nedication, electrical methods of re-starting or repacing the heart,
mouth-to-mouth breathing, chest mouth-to-mouth breath

muscle damage but may be
due to a reversible electrical derangement of heart mythm occurring as a resu/t of a
relatively minor heart muscle injury. It is in promptly derangements that coronary
care service scores its greatest
gains.
About $90 \%$ of all hospitalized coronary patients experience an irregular beating of the hear called arrhythmia. This condition bears close scrutiny but is not necessarily dangerous.
Very often these arrhythmias can be prevented through the administration of antiarrhythmic agents when the first signs rouble present themselves.
Only a few years ago the cessation of the heart beat wa considered to be an absolute ndicator ol death. This is no onger true. Many thousands of riefly have been restarted and estored to normal function
In the normalsunction.
o a hospital in Hartford Connecticut, for example there were 78 instances of cardiac arrest over a period of three years. Of these, 17 were revived and experienced long-term survival It should be emphasized that coronary care unit diminishes with each minute's delay in getting into the hospital. One group of investigators, for illustration, found that ventricular fibrillation (an often fatal arrhythmia) is about 25 times more likely to occur during the first four hours from the start of heart attack than during the ensuing twenty-four hours.
This means, for example, that the individual fortunate enough to receive high-quality coronary care within an hour is far mor likely to survive than one with an attack of comparable severity not obtaining such specialized car until after 12, 24 or 36 hours. Among the prime factor inhibiting earliest possible admission of a heart attack victim to coronary care is his own indecision and inaction.
In a study involving 160 consecutive coronary patient admitted to two hoespitals, it wa found that the average "decision time" was three hours one
minute; in other words, the average patient (or relative) delayed about three hours before lifting the phone off the hook.
