We did not pretend or desire to make a prediction about an outbreak of rabies so accurately or one so severe as the one which has occurred in Terrell County. We just figured that sooner or later there would be some dog bitten by a rabid varmint and with the number of stray dogs around, there would be some kind of a problem that would arise.

The rabies outbreak is serious and this makes the stray dog situation much more serious.

And with the implanting of poison and traps that we expect by the Parks and Wildlife Commission men in cooperation with the ranchmen, there may be resulting of both serious situations at the same time.

Certainly, anyone who has a dog that they want protected from possible poisoning should take care to see that their dog is kept up and not allowed to run free.

Anyone who cares for their dog should do this in the first place, and if they don't care much for the dog, they should care a little bit about the protection of the livestock that is the property of the ranchmen.

And this brings up another subject that should be brought to the attention of local people and their consideration, we are sure, would be appreciated by the ranchmen.

With the warming days, it is a natural inclination for young and old alike to want to get out in the country and wander around over the hills. But a circumstance that many do not think about or realize is the fact that there are several things that usually are damaged by such actions, and again the ranchman, like the newspaper man or anyone else, has a right to have property free from damage or molestation by the public.

In the first place, climbing over a fence does not do the fence any good, staples are loosened or pulled out, wire is stretched, etc.

In the second place, during lambing season, lambs are often separated from their mothers causing the loss of a lamb and consequently about \$25.00 - we all hope!

In the third place, some of the ranchmen already have poison or baits out for predators and there is always the danger of a person tripping a set bait, which is very dangerous, or a child or a pet getting some poison, which is also dangerous.

We have no more right to trespass on a ranchman's property than does he have the privilege to interfere in any way with my property or livelihood.

Usually, if a person wants to climb a hill, look for a rock, or just get out and tramp over the hills and vales, if they will make it a point to seek permission from the rancher, it will help keep good relationships all the way around.

And it's nothing but right to do unto others....

Teletype Service To Be Tried Here In Sheriff's Office

At a special meeting of the Terrell County Commissioners Court Monday, that group approved the installation of a teletype service for the sheriff's office on a trial basis. The cost of the service to the county will be approximately \$76.00 per month which is 40% of the total cost, the balance of which is borne by a grant from the state.

Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey said that the service would give his office immediate access to vital information concerning law enforcement, particularly of interest, was reports on stolen vehicles and whether or not a person or person were wanted in Texas or any state on felony charges. Also available were reports of any other crimes that are committed within the area which should alert local officers for any reason, reports of severe weather, etc. The local teletype, Cooksey stated, would be connected to a Permian Basin Loop, which would be, in turn, connected with the Department of Public Safety headquarters in Austin, which also has access to a national hookup for information about crimes and criminals.

Cooksey stated that he was very appreciative of the facility in his office and stated that he felt it would be an asset to him in his efforts to enforce the law in Terrell County. The speedy accessibility of information concerning crimes and criminals in the

Rabies Control Efforts Are Planned

A large crowd of ranchmen was on hand at the courthouse Monday afternoon to hear details of the efforts to poison varmints or carnivorous animals that might be carriers of rabies. Several officials from the Texas Department of Health and the Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission were here for the meeting and will be supervising and working at the task of distributing the poison and baits on the ranches of the area.

The meeting was the result of effort by Terrell County Health Officer Dr. A. N. Clanton, following the outbreak of rabies on several of the ranches in the county.

Two people last week completed the series of inoculations against rabies after a

calf was discovered to have the disease on a ranch north of Dryden.

Other suspected outbreaks were on ranches much closer to Sanderson.

The meeting Monday was for the visiting officials to explain to ranchmen the details of the poison and bait distribution and to seek their cooperation in an effort to control the disease by this method. Complete cooperation was pledged by all of the ranchmen present and it was thought there would be greater cooperation, but some of the ranchmen were prevented from being there by work.

Several local individuals and organizations are also involved in an effort to curb a further spread of the disease.

Paul Weyerts, D.V.M. of Alpine, who comes to Sanderson frequently for the practice of veterinary medicine was of veterinary medicine, was contacted and he agreed to have a "pet clinic" here on Saturday to inoculate any and all pets brought to him. The inoculations against rabies will be made at a greatly-reduced rate, according to an announcement by Dr. Weyerts, in an effort to help the people prevent the spread of the disease and to protect the pets of area residents.

A concerted effort is to be made to encourage all owners of pets to take advantage of the clinic Saturday and also to urge the control of stray dogs and cats in town. Persons are asked to do everything they can to control the "stray" animal situation and to get all owned or claimed pets inoculated for their protection and for the protection of the people of the town.

Each qualified voter will receive two ballots, each one for the two distinct board officers, and voting will be in all four precincts on April 3.
