Seems like the next thing on the agenda might be a Society for the Preservation of Rattlesnakes! Regardless of what group it is that is trying to protect something - even their own property - and in so doing takes the life of some animal, there is someone else who will rise up in defense of the animal being slain.

We wonder if those who are all out for the protection of predators, seals, etc., ever swat flies or mosquitoes? And we wonder, too, what they would do about weavils and body lice? Would those who oppose the clubbing of seals and jackrabbits raise up against the slaughter of fowl, pigs, cattle, sheep, etc., in slaughter houses? There is a lot of blood spilled in those places, too, regardless of the method of killing.

Isn't it odd, too, that no one is carrying on such a fight to try to end slaughter of people on the highways?

And along those lines, the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association has gone on record in support of the term "mutton" to identify goat meat on markings and labels of federally inspected meat and meat products.

We think we understand the problems involved very well, but we don't understand why there is a problem. We know people who love goat meat, but don't want to know what it is. And we, too, wonder why, if goat meat and goat meat products have to be so labeled, why do not all other meat products have to be so labelled as to the type of meat content.

Dr. A. N. Clanton, Terrell County Health Officer, stated that he found a cow on a ranch near Sanderson that had died of rabies.

Dr. Clanton also reported that ranchmen of the county had reported excellent kills of varmints from the poison that had been put out on many of the ranches of the county and that efforts were continuing to control the rabies outbreak and prevent a further spread of the disease if possible.

Everyone is asked to be extremely cautious of strange-acting animals and to particularly of wild animals that come into town, and report any incidents of suspected rabies to the doctor.

By checking the information on the bulb jackets, you can select the bulb that will best serve your lighting requirements. Information included shows the brightness (or lumens) the bulb will deliver . . . how many hours the bulb may be expected to burn . . . and wattage, or the amount of electricity the bulb uses. In areas where less light is needed or where changing bulbs is more difficult, you may want the "longer-life" bulbs which last longer but usually deliver less brightness. For study or work areas you should choose bulbs that deliver more brightness.
