We have occasion to talk to one of our suppliers in Houston from time to time and the shortage of water in that city is affecting everyone. We also know of some shortages of water by some cities in our area, too. And the water table is being lowered by farmers irrigating their crops without the underground supply being recharged.

We are not saying it to make anyone feel badly, nor are we bragging about anything, but Sanderson is blessed with an ample supply of water for our foreseeable needs, and our water rates have been lowered recently for the summer consumption, another good sign regarding our water.

We just don't know what would be the result if we had a sudden influx of population far beyond what we have ever had, nor do we know if in a gradual, but steady increase in population there would be additional water sources available for us, but for right now, we feel that there is no need for a concern — about water, at least!

We are, or should be thankful that we have this blessing, and in being aware of it, take heed that we make the best of the situation and try not to waste it.

The young people who represented Sanderson at the state finals in their various events did a stellar job and the town and the school, the parents, and the friends are all proud of them. Their success in attaining the ultimate goal of high school competition — the chance to compete at the state level — is a credit to them and to their training as athletes and scholars and also as citizens.

No Ballots Cast By Absentee Voters

No absentee ballots had been cast on Monday in Terrell County in the May 18 election on four proposed constitutional amendments, according to Ruel Adams, county clerk.

Absentee balloting is possible in the court house or by mail after receiving a ballot from Mr. Adams.

The amendments include one to create a state ethics commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, state officers, and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the lieutenant governor and recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process. Also, the amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment of the constitution at any session of the Legislature.

Another amendment is for removing the limitation on the total state appropriations for assistance grants for the needy blind and setting a limitation on total state appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

The fourth amendment to be voted on May 18 is to authorize the issuance of \$100,000,000 (one hundred million dollars) in bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6%.

Terrell County In Area Eligible For FHA Ranch Loans

Congressman Richard C. White has announced that all 12 counties of the 16th Congressional District have been made eligible for emergency loans to ranchers and farmers from the Farmers Home Administration.

James V. Smith, FHA Administrator advised Congressman White that 235 of the 254 counties in Texas are eligible for the emergency loans, due to the prolonged drought in Texas. Farmers or ranchers wishing information about these emergency loans should get in touch with their local County Supervisors of the Farmers Home Administration.

Tower Supports Local Dam Project

Senator John G. Tower, Republican of Texas, last week expressed support for Congressional authorizations for Sanderson Canyon watershed project in Texas. He delivered his remarks to the Senate Public Works Committee's subcommittee on flood control, rivers, and harbors, which has the three projects under consideration.

Sen. Tower's remarks follow: "Mr. Chairman, I am pleased to recommend to you and to the Subcommittee on Flood Control, Rivers and Harbors the watershed projects submitted to you by the Soil Conservation Service and the Corps of Engineers for the Sanderson Canyon Watershed in the State of Texas.

"These projects are important to the areas involved for protection against floods and against soil erosion. In addition, the recreational uses of the water impoundment area will provide a most welcome fringe benefit from the authorization and construction of these projects.

"The Sanderson Canyon watershed Project involves three large West Texas counties: Terrell, Pecos, and Brewster. The erosion problem would be substantially improved by accelerated conservation land treatment of 84,000 acres, and the substantial flooding problem would be taken care of to a large degree by 11 floodwater retarding structures that are planned. The project is endorsed by the Rio Grande-Pecos River, the Big Bend, and the Trans-Pecos Soil and Water Conservation Districts, as well as by the Commissioners Courts of Terrell, Pecos, and Brewster counties."

Hodgkins also stated that all westbound mail should be put in the slot in the postoffice before times specified so that it will leave on the mail truck the same day.

The outside box is for mailings going to San Antonio after the postoffice is closed for regular business hours.

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or had no business there in the first place, that these people who are prisoners were or were not doing the right thing being fighting, that the trip to Paris would or would not do any good, and a multitude of other questions that could be argued about the trip to Paris.

But let me ask one question, and you answer it for yourself!

If you were a prisoner there or if a prisoner there was your son, brother, husband, or father, wouldn't you appreciate any effort on anyone's part to try to gain his release?

We feel that this question is like a lot of other questions - we don't know the clear-cut answers to a lot of things, but we do all that we can to try to bring about what we think is the proper end result. This fact is true in our family, financial, business, political, and religious lives.

Many times we find ourselves in a situation and it is difficult to see our way out. Whether we blame ourselves or someone else for our predicament, the fact remains that we have to do something about it - either get out or stay there. With the prisoners of war in North Vietnam, it is not their decision, but ours to try to get them out or else leave them there.

A trip to Paris may be like whistling in a tornado, but it might help. We would not be willing to say for sure one way or the other. The responsibility is too great to be forgotten!

Monday a faithful reader and friend came in and said that she had read with interest our remarks about local people trading at home, and she had always agreed and had also always tried to do so, but she added:

"How about telling the merchants to try to keep good merchandise for the people to buy!"

And her story was about a perishable item that already had prior to her purchase!

It's a two-sided coin, that's for sure, and it takes cooperation from many people to assure everyone's satisfaction!

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MURDER CHARGE DROPPED AGAINST MONTE GOODE III

Murder charges against Monte Hardin Goode III, originally of Sanderson, were dismissed in district court in Del Rio Monday. Insufficient evidence was the reason given as grounds for dismissal of the charges by the state.

Goode was arrested December 13, 1969, at his home in Lomitos, Calif., on a warrant charging him with the murder of James Reynolds, whose body was discovered in Kinney County. Reynolds' wife was convicted of the slaying by a jury in Brackettville in August of 1970 and remains in Val Verde County jail awaiting an appeal on her conviction.

Goode and his wife and five children have been living in Temple where he is an iron worker.

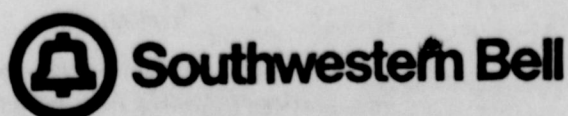

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New Mail Rates

Postmaster J. R. Hodgkins said that increases in most postage rates will take effect May 16 as the new United States Postal Service begins its task of achieving self sufficiency as required by the Postal Reorganization Act.

Mr. Hodgkins explained that the new increases - authorized on a temporary basis until the newly-created Postal Rate Commission can make recommendations to the Governors of the Postal Service on permanent changes - will raise 1st class letter rates to 8¢ an ounce, airmail letter rates to 11¢ an ounce. Post cards will go from 5 to 6¢ each and airmail post cards to 9¢ each.

There will also be increases in second and third class rates.





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
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
