We are in the process of adjusting all of the expirations of our subscribers so that they will all be June 1 each year. This is being done by billing for that proportionate part of a year to bring the expirations to that date. For example, the subscription notices sent to subscribers whose expirations will be July 1st, will be for 11 months; those in August, for 10 months, etc., etc. We hope that the notices and this are sufficiently explanatory and everyone will know that there is no chicanery -- just an effort to get the subscriptions all expiring in June. Why? Well, June happened to be the month we picked, and we can, in the future, notify all subscribers easily - thus saving much expense - that subscriptions are due and payable.

Many subscribers have already gotten notices of expiration on June 1 and some have been mailed notices for July 1 expiration. We will not mail a second notice and postal laws require that all subscriptions be paid in advance. PLEASE help us by sending your check prior to the expiration. In case you have misplaced the notice, if you live in the county, the amount to send is \$2.29, and out of the county is \$2.75 for 11 months.

If your subscription is not paid, we will have to quit sending the paper, and we

Roping Events Here Referendum On Wool Promotion To Be June 7-18

Sixty teams of steer ropers competed here last Saturday night in roping, steer roping, and matched roping kept the contestants and spectators at the arena until a late hour Sunday morning.

Arturo Garcia won the matched roping over Dan Riggs. Total times for four calves were 61.6 for Garcia and 88.4 for Riggs.

In calf roping, Kinney McMullen won the first go-round with 11.2 and tied for second in the second go-round with Johnny McMullen with 14.1, winning the average with 25.3. Bud Smith was second, fourth, and second; Johnny McMullen was third, tied for second, and third; Walter Culliff was 4th in the first go-round, and Gary McNew was fourth in the average.

In ribbon roping, Mark Tilman was 1st, followed by George Cox, Francisco Villa, and Jack Riggs and Johnny McMullen split 4th.

In barrel races for 9 and under, Dan Henry Riggs, Kade Kothmann, Charlie Brown, and Cody Carruthers were the first four places; for 10-14, Jo Lea Shaddox, Lee Ann McMullen, David Pool, and Gib Bell were the first four places; and for 15-and-up, Jackie Bob Riggs, Lorelee McMullen, Sergio Galvan, and Jo Lea Shaddox were the first four winners.

In team tying, the first go-round was won by the following four teams: Jack Riggs, Bud Smith; Robert Calzada, Karlos Kothman; Bob Childress, Charles Stegall; Bob Lowe, Walter Shewmake. The next roping events will be at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, July 3, at the local arena.

Sheep producers and lamb feeders throughout the country are scheduled to make a major decision June 7-18 when the Secretary of Agriculture calls for votes in a nationwide mail referendum to determine if sheep owners want to continue their own 16-year-old promotion program for both lamb and wool.

Such a vote is called by the Secretary after each passage of the National Wool Act in Congress. The Wool Act was passed last winter as a part of national farm legislation.

The vote is to determine if producers want to continue to have deductions made from their incentive payments which are in turn used to finance lamb and wool advertising, sales promotion, education and sheep industry development program as carried on by the American Sheep Producers Council (ASPC), headquartered in Denver, Colo.

The ASPC was set up in 1955 by sheeplemen through a "self-help provision" of the National Wool Act that allowed for deductions from incentive payments to finance lamb and wool promotion to the nation's consumers. At present, deductions amount to 1 1/2 cents for each pound of shorn wool and 7 1/2 cents for each 100 pounds of unshorn lamb sold.

The referendum vote is to be conducted through county ASC offices. All sheep producers and feeders are eligible to vote who have owned sheep or lambs, six months of age or older, for any one period of at least 30 days since January 1, 1971. Ballots will be mailed to producers and feeders by June 7 and must be returned to county ASCS offices not later than June 18. Approval of two-thirds of the total number of producers voting, or of producers having two-thirds of the total volume of production represented in the referendum is required to keep the promotion program in effect.
