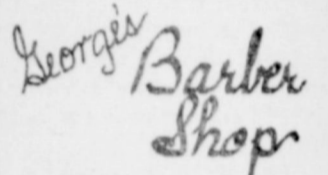

Both are graduates of the Cuero High School Miss Cochran is an elementary education major at

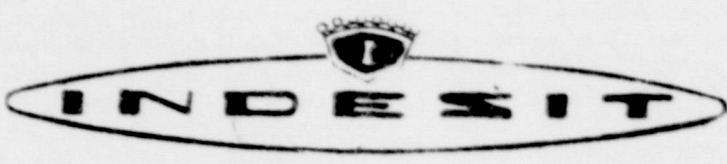

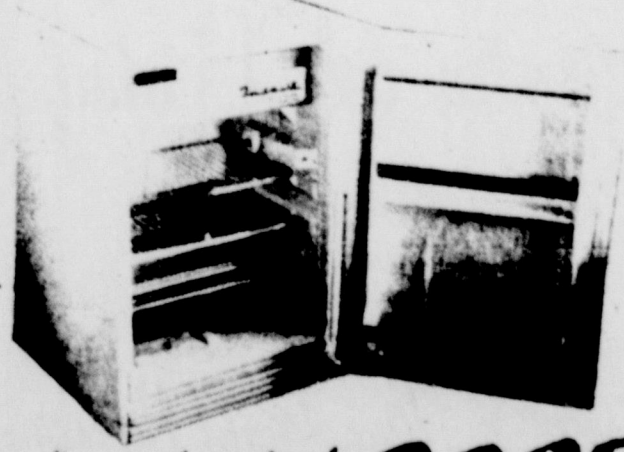

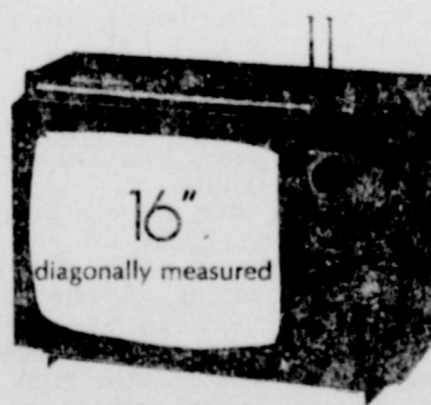
