It seems as though we are destined to live in a world in which there is always a war! Now India and Pakistan are at war and East Pakistan and West Pakistan are divided on whatever the issue is. It is our opinion that if a person were to be able to actually get to the very bottom of the issues involved in these disputes, that they could be settled probably with the flip of a coin.

And the battle continues between the Catholics and Protestants in Ireland — probably the most ridiculously-motivated of all battles of all times!

And the United Nations members continue to engage in seemingly senseless and useless debate!

There are many things that we don't understand!

And there was a change of venue to Abilene on the case in which Gus Mutscher is accused of improprieties — to say the least. The prosecution has joined the defense in alleging that the case could not be tried in Austin due to the power held by the defendant, possibly, over such a wide spectrum of the citizenry of Austin due to the defendant's position as speaker of the House of Representatives of the State of Texas, an office which he refuses to relinquish.

In our humble opinion, since the prosecution has joined the defense in the plea for a change of venue and joined them in the reasons for the plea, this in no way could be chalked up as anything except right — unless the prosecution were joining the defense in an effort to delay, confuse, or otherwise aid in getting the whole thing thrown out or forgotten in the confusion of legalities. And we do not support this belief to any degree, so this makes us accept the fact that maybe the defendant does have as much power as is alleged!

That brings us to this conclusion: If the defendant has so much power that he cannot be tried fairly for a crime as serious as the one alleged, then he should be divested of this power for the trial and no man should be given this much power in the future, so that he can stand behind his official position and remain free of condemnation because of the position he holds — whatever it is!

If it takes a special session of the legislature to divest him of that authority, then let's have a special session. It could cost the taxpayers a lot of money, but there have been other huge expenditures, and some that accomplished seemingly much less!

It may be that Mr. Mutscher is as innocent of the accusation as you and I are innocent of that particular wrong, but his innocence should be proven by fact — or the lack of it — rather than by the lack of pre-

## Football Statistics For Eagles Told

Athletic Director Willie Myers has compiled the statistics for the football season just past and given them to The Times for publication for the information of the fans.

During the year, Sanderson made 171 first downs to 108 for opposition; made 1,784 yards rushing to 1,430 for the opponents; passed for 1,377 yards to 413; for a total of 3,161 yards for the Eagles and 1,843 yards for opponents. The Eagles tried 181 passes and completed 92 and had 16 interceptions while their opponents tried 123 passes, completed 37, and had 14 interceptions. The Eagles made a total of 313 points and allowed 123 by the opposition for averages of 31.3 and 12.3.

Chago Flores was the leading ground gainer for the year, making 624 yards on 154 carries for an average of 4.05 yards per carry. James Druse carried 394 yards in 106 carries, for an average of 3.71. Jim Cash carried 89 times for 323 yards and 2.3 average; Kendrick Harrell 99 times for 214 yards and 2.16 average; Juan Saenz, 21 carries for 155 yards and 7.38 average; Randy Louwien 9 times for 34 yards and 3.77 average; Raul Ybarra carried 7 times for 27 yards and 3.85 average; Floyd Watson 2 times for 8 yards and 4-yard average; Steve Litton 1 carry for 2 yards and 2-yard average.

The two quarterbacks, Druse and Flores had passing averages as follows: Druse tried 173 for 89 completions and 1,328 yards - 59% and 132.8 yards per game. Flores tried 7, completing 3 for 49 yards for a 43% and 4.9 yards average per game. Flores saw limited action as a quarterback during the season.

Passes caught and tackles averages will be given next week.

## Innoculation Clinic To Be December 15

There will be an immunization clinic in Sanderson on Wednesday, December 15, at the elementary school for all local students and pre-school students.

There will be no charge for the immunizations, but a contribution to the emergency squad will be accepted if offered.

Dr. Bart Pate of Alpine will be here for the clinic and immunizations for polio, DTP/Td, Rubella, and Measles will be offered.

The stress is being placed on the urgency of bringing children to the clinic since the law requires that these immunizations be started before January 1 and completed as soon as is physically and medicinally possible and attendance at the clinic will possibly save the time and expense of taking a child out of town for the immunizations.

Parents are also urged not to bring an ill child to the clinic for examination by the doctor during his visit here.

The clinic will begin at 1:30 p.m.

The Christmas band concert by the Sanderson High School and Junior High School units will be Thursday evening this week in the high school auditorium, beginning at 8:00 p.m.

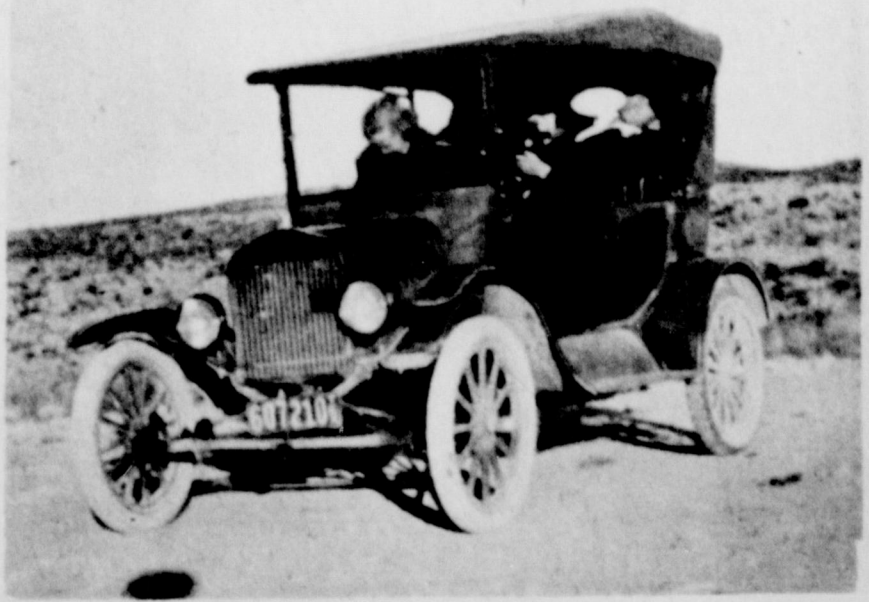
Band Director Joe Blatchford stated that there would be some popular music at the beginning of the program and Christmas music for the latter part of the program.
