#### ISTEN TO LUKE

By Albert: ---

Since there are more than usual candidates in the race for commissioner of precinct 1 this year we have heard more rumors than usual about why there are so many candidates.

There is much more to being a county commissioner than seeing to the hauling of trash, which is one of the questionable duties, and the upkeep of the streets and drainage ditches, much more!

Some people in the county don't want to think about having to pay any more taxes, and there are those who feel that if there are any progressive developments there will have to be increased taxes.

The idea of redistriciting the county's precincts into the "one man, one vote" ratio is a distrubing thought to some residents and others feel that it would be a move that would be more beneficial to more

Some people feel that there should be a more purposeful and speedier plan for the completion of the flood control project, not only to try to get protection for lives and property locally, but also to give the economic shot in the arm to the community which would result from the beginning of the \$5-million dollar project.

The commissioners' court, being the only governing body for the county, is also responsible for the passage of laws -all laws -- which would govern and control the actions of people within the county and would not be in conflict with or covered by existing state or national laws; for example, the local dog licensing and controll, the authorization of placement of "yield" signs on local streets and the designation of placement was by the county commissioners; and there are many others.

Because of all of these potential involvements and because there are more than usual candidates, we have written a letter to each of the candidates and offered them free space so that they might individually explain their position as candidates to the potential voters of the precinct. We feel that this would be in the public interest and helpful for the voters in this precinct in making up their minds about which candidate to support. The letters were mailed Saturday and are to be returned to us Monday coming up and they will all be published at the same time so there can be no rebuttal advantages by one person over the others. If any or all of the candidates do not wish to make a statement for our free publication to the potential voters, that will be his privilege. And the lack of any statement from any candidate in the issue of The Times on February 24 will be because that candidate did not want to make a statement for that purpose.

And speaking of interest in a race, there is also some growing interest in the race for school board posts. That, too, is no meaningless position. There is plenty of responsibili-

#### **Gas Well Finaled** In Terrell County



No. 1-4 Oasis Ranch, in 4-Doc Turk in CCSD &RGNG, Terrell County wildcat, 35 miles northeast of Dryden, 1-1/4 miles southeast of the depleted one-well Brown-Bassett, North (Fusselman) field and six miles north of the. Brown-Gassett (Ellenburger, Fusselman, Pennsylvanian and Wolfcamp) field, flowed gas at the rate of 3 million cubic feet daily, decreasing to 500,-000 cubic feet daily after three hours when drilling reached 11,220 feet.

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

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
