We had a challenge issued to us last week which we are not going to accept, even though the temptation is extremely great.

Summer weather (in the daytime) has lingered far beyond our early expectations, and the nights have been very cool or cold. There were some reports of frost early last week in parts of this immediate area, but we have not seen any frost yet at our house and the tomato plants right outside the back door still have very green tomatoes and lots of life.

This information goes along with the news of the approaching deer season and the fact that already bucks have been seen running with the does, which has some sort of significance to some people concerning the chances of getting good deer meat. One thing that it probably means for sure, is that the fawn crop next spring is going to be good.

The increased week for whitetail hunting in the special part of Terrell County that was authorized by the Parks and Wildlife Commission signifies that they feel that there is an abundance of deer in that area and the extra harvest is needed this year to bring the deer population down to where it needs to be.

We also read an article this week by a game management expert (?) saying that at least 25% of the deer crop should be eliminated each year to keep the balance where it needs to be. We have no way of guessing the balance of bucks and does, but we feel sure that when the season opens there are going to be enough hunters to make the proper balance if they have

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## Sanderson Eagles Tie Braves 8-8; To Host Balmorhea Friday Night

The Sanderson Eagles came out with an 8-8 tie against the Iraan Braves in their meeting in Iraan Friday night of last week. Coach Willie Myers stated that a 40-yard pass play by Sanderson in the second period that was called back, might have resulted in the winning margin for the Eagles, but that the coaches,

team, and fans had to consider the fact that some of the breaks all seem to go against one team on given nights and sometimes the Eagles were on the good side of the breaks and sometimes they were not. He also noted that the final whistle was after a play from the 2-yard line and only 11 seconds remained on the clock.

Iraan's score was in the second frame and on an 89-yard run by Rudy Galindo with Carl Baker running over the extra two points.

Sanderson's scoring drive was in the third period and was culminated by a plunge from the 1-yard mark by Jim Cash. Chago Flores threw to Floyd Watson for the two-point conversion and the tying score.

Coach Myers stated that he wanted to take credit for the loss of the game as he should have sent in instructions for a field goal try by the Eagles, but he was also reminded that this, too, might have been unsuccessful.

In noting the statistics of the game, Sanderson led in first downs 15-5; trailed in net yards 105-160. The Eagles completed 4 of 14 passes for 65 yards; Iraan completed 1 of 3 tries for 5 yards. Each team lost 2 fumbles. Sanderson had 6 penalties for 26 1/2 yards and Iraan had 7 penalties for 60 yards.

The Eagles will host the Balmorhea Bears Friday night in their final home game of the current season and will go to Wink for the season's finale Friday week.

## Surveying Done For Dam Project

Surveys needed for the completion of certain easements in connection with the Sanderson Canyon Watershed project are in the process of being completed. The firm of Max Schumann Jr. of Midland has been employed for the local work.

Among the sites surveyed in preparation for further work is the one for the restructuring of the railroad bridge and channelization work just west

of the west end of Downie Street. There are other sites that needed surveying to tie together the ends of certain legal descriptions of metes and bounds so that the easements that were drawn up would be geographically and descriptively correct.

The work of securing easements is proceeding, according to Jerry Wenmohs, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service.

## Special Whitetail Season Nov. 18-25

An extra week of hunting for whitetail deer in a designated area of the Trans-Pecos has been set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission in an effort to check a whitetail overpopulation of the area, formerly an exclusive habitat of blacktail deer.

The added week will open on November 18 in an area bounded by the Pecos River on the east, on the south by U.S. 90, on the west by U.S. 285 between Sanderson and Fort Stockton, and on the north by U.S. 290 between Fort Stockton and the Pecos River.

A total of four deer may be killed legally in the area, so long as one is an antlerless deer, and one is a blacktail buck. Two whitetail bucks are the maximum allowed of that species. Only one blacktail buck may be taken.

The entire Trans-Pecos area including the specially-bounded area, will open for the annual blacktail season on November 25 and the season will run through December 10.

Quail season also will be

longer this year, reports the game department, with the season running from December 1 through February 15. The late dove season is from January 5 through January 21 in the northern zone.

Open season on javelina is from September 1 through January 31, with a limit of two, either sex, for the season. There is no open season for wild turkeys.

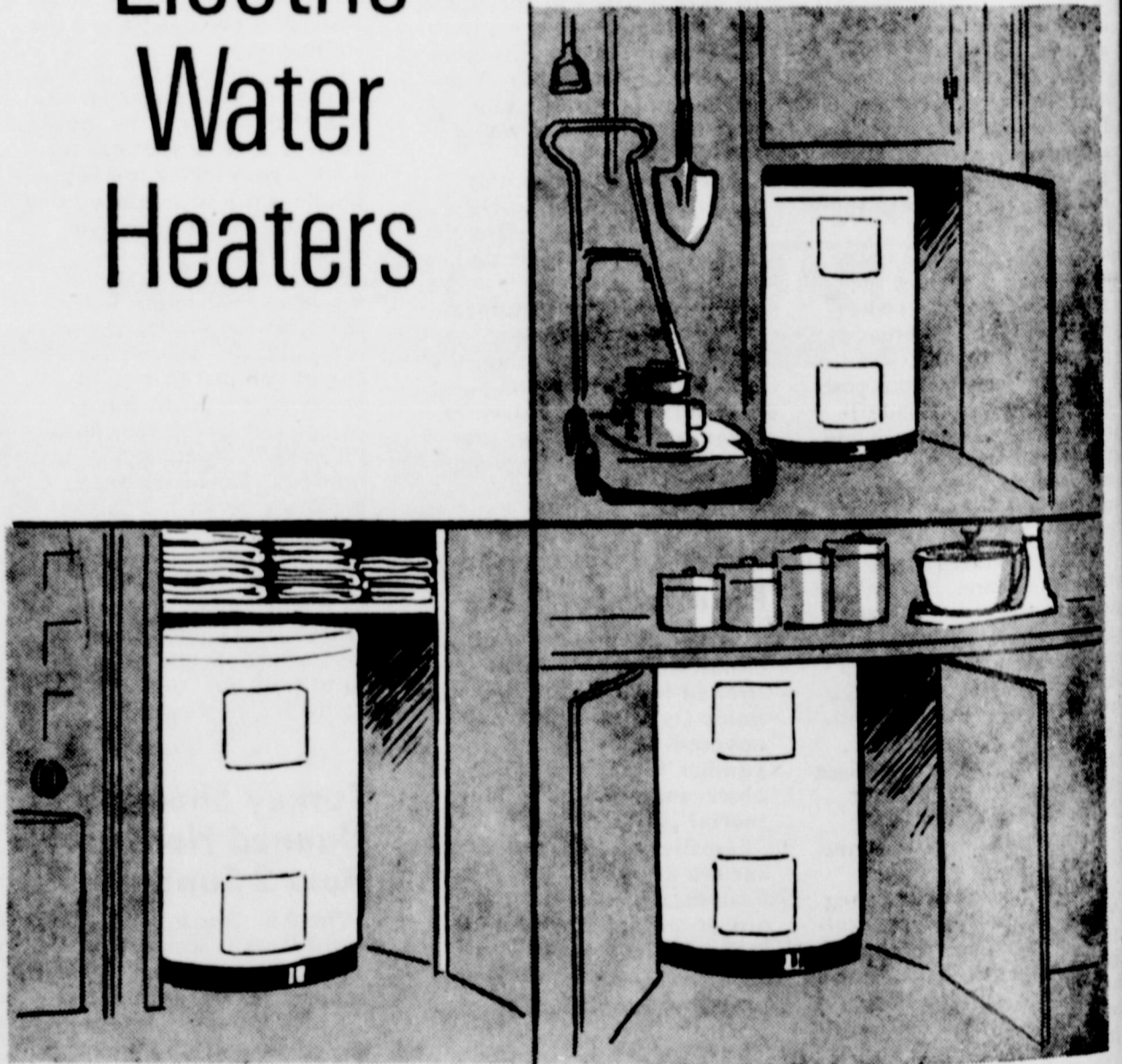
**GIRL SCOUTS JOIN DRIVE FOR CLEANING LOCALLY**

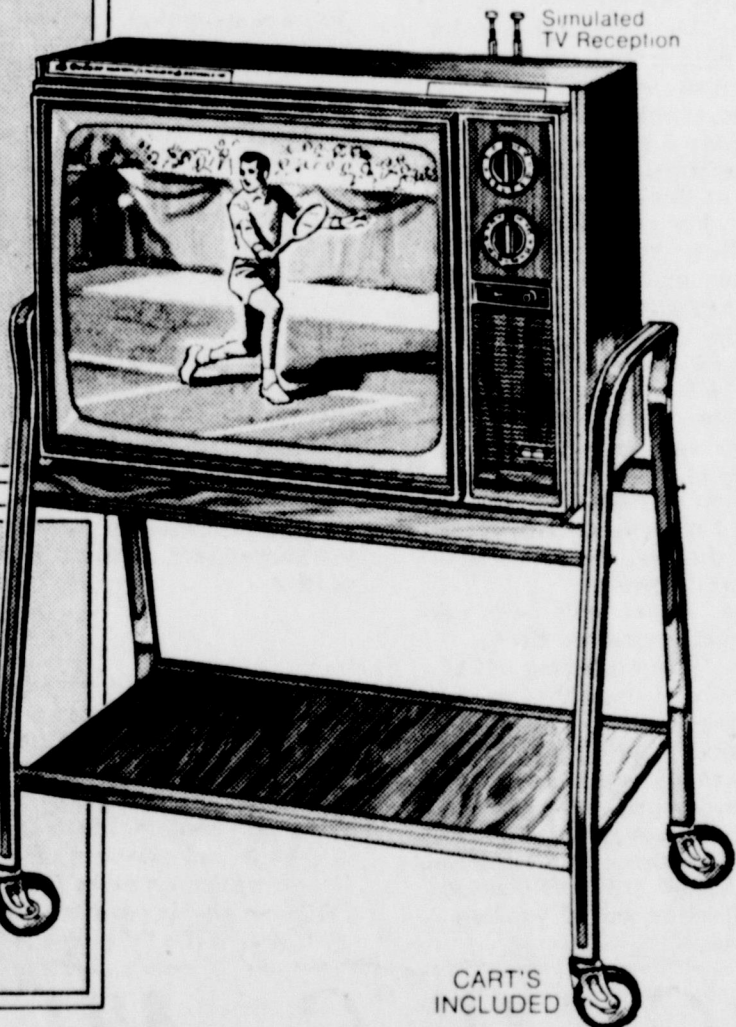

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### Keyes Return From European Tour

Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Keyes arrived in Stuttgart, Germany, on September 19 to visit Lt. Col. and Mrs. Wm. M. Dinkins. Using their quarters as home base, their VW camper as transportation, and Mrs. Dinkin as their guide, they were able to see parts of Germany, Holland, Belgium, England, Scotland, Switzerland, and Italy. Col. Dinkins and daughter, Cathy, were with them part of the time.

In Germany they ate real German food, toured castles Neuschwanstein and Hohen-schwangau, plus the old medi-aeval city of Rathenburg; visited Hummel, candle and porcelain factories; explored small colorful villages and saw wood carvers at work; rode cog train and cable car in the Bavarian Alps to Zugspitze, and enjoyed the colorful woods and fields; the fields had no dividing fences and looked like planned patch-work quilts.

In Holland they visited The Hague, Delft, and Amsterdam. Here were real working windmills, canals, and friendly helpful people. There seemed to be more bicycles than cars, with all ages riding at great speed; the men wore hats or caps and coats and ties when fishing and doing outside work. They toured Amsterdam by canal boat, visited Rembrandt's house, and saw his "Nightwatch" on display in the Rijesmuseum.

In Belgium they became lost in Brussels and ran out of gas during the National strike! A real experience.

In England they did the usual tourist tours: Tower of London, St. Paul's Cathedral, Thames, 10 Downing St., Changing of Horse Guard, Buckingham Palace, Old Curiosity Shop, Hyde Park, and speakers' corner, plus the silver vaults and antique shops. The people were over-polite and very friendly; the country-side was beautiful.

In Scotland, they enjoyed the city of Edinburg, toured the Edinburg Castle, shopped; enjoyed the accents; also different, but beautiful country.

In Switzerland, the Keyes toured the Alps through three passes, saw the Rhone Glacier, and rode a cog train to the Matterhorn, and saw the graveyard of those who tried to climb her and failed.

In Italy, more beautiful scenery and mile after mile of vineyards and olive orchards. In Vicenza they shopped and took a gondola ride in Venice where they also shopped and were awed by the age, art, and beauty of St. Mark's, the Basilica of Gold; in Florence more churches and museums. From Florence they returned to Stuttgart and home.

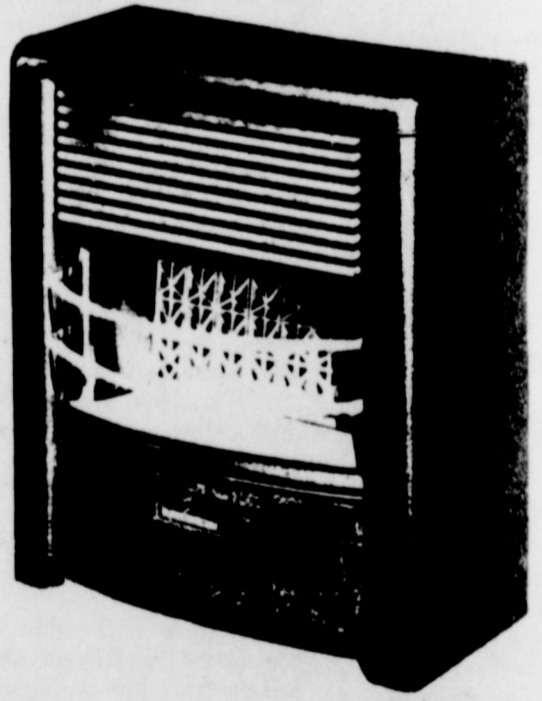
