Yes, that is a lot of money put into circulation, and a lot of people benefitted from it, and certainly there were some accomplishments derived by some people other than the re-elected candidates. There were some people who had employment in campaigns that would not have had such gainful employment otherwise, or maybe any employment otherwise, etc., etc., etc.

But one of the concerns of ours is the fact that how are these financial obligations paid off? Let's not be too naive: is the best man for the job the one who makes the biggest "loan" to the campaign? Are favors ever given to a segment or industry in return for a large campaign contribution?

Bribes and pay-offs take on the appearance of other things at times, and this is a disturbing thing in the fact that people can rationalize an immoral act, or an act of violating common decency or common courtesy with the silliest of reasons!

The work of local organizations in things of interest and improvement for the town are to be commended in every way possible. The only trouble is that there are so many things done that we do not seem to know about until they are past history at times.

We sincerely appreciate the opportunity of giving credit where credit is due, and sincerely appreciate it when these things are called to our attention.

Things like the Culture Club's boosting the clean-up campaign, the Alpha Theta Alpha's efforts toward helping people get tested for tuberculosis, and some of these kinds of activities capture the attention of most local citizens -- partially due to the publicity they are given in so many ways.

But the things that we do not know about we cannot help to publicize. And if they are beneficial to the community this is what we want to do.

We are utterly amazed at the intellectual growth of some people! It amazes us how they can become experts on so many subjects.

What's the best breed of cattle? -- Ask the local cafe operator -- he serves beef in many forms! That makes about as much sense as some of the criteria of accurate authority as some

Funeral services were held in St. James Catholic Church Wednesday afternoon for Oscar Escamilla Villarreal, 21, with Rev. Alvin Wilde, pastor of the St. Agnes Catholic Church of Fort Stockton, officiating. Burial was in Santa Rita Cemetery.

He was killed while working as a Southern Pacific switchman in the yards in El Paso early Monday morning. His body was brought on the train to Alpine Tuesday and then to Sanderson by the Geeslin Funeral Home which was in charge of the arrangements.

He was born in Sanderson on March 23, 1951, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Luis Villarreal. After graduating from Sanderson High School in 1969, he attended Sul Ross College and then worked at the Double-T Grocery before going to work for the railroad and moving to El Paso.

On September 7, 1969, he was married to Miss Aurelia Arredondo. They have one daughter, Becky, two years old.

He is also survived by a brother, Jose Luis Villarreal; two sisters, Mrs. Oscar Villegas and Miss Sandra Villarreal, all of Sanderson.

Mrs. Ray Clifford remains in serious condition in an Odessa hospital after receiving injuries in a head-on collision Tuesday, Nov. 21, on the highway between Ozona and Sheffield. She was in her pick-up returning from a visit with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Flagg, in Kerrville when an on-coming car suddenly veered into her lane of the highway, according to reports.

The couple in the car, a bride and groom of two days from Montana, according to reports, were killed instantly. Mrs. Clifford appeared to not be injured seriously when being taken to a Fort Stockton hospital by ambulance but is reported to have lost consciousness en route. She was taken immediately from Fort Stockton to Odessa on account of head injuries. She has paralysis on one side and has rallied at times from an unconscious state.

Her husband and daughter, Mrs. Ernest Partin of Beaumont, and her parents have been in Odessa to be near her since Tuesday evening.

Luciano V. Trevino Jr., 52, died on the evening of Thursday, November 16, in the VA hospital in Big Spring where he had been a patient for several weeks.

He was born in Del Rio and had worked in this area as a sheep shearer. He was a World War II veteran.

Eagles Named To All-District Teams

Sanderson High School athletic director Willie Myers announced the members of the Eagle football team that earned a spot on the all-district team in the season just ended. The decisions were made by the coaches of the respective district teams.

On the defensive unit, Roger Sanchez was named to all-district honors as a down-line man, Santiago Flores Jr., as a line-backer, and Robert Kline as a half-back.

Offensively, honorable-mention honors were given to Floyd Watson, end; Roger Sanchez, tackle; and Bob Spence, guard.

Allen's Conviction Upheld in Appeal

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals Wednesday affirmed the murder with malice conviction of Marvin Allen of Sanderson.

Allen was convicted of killing his wife in March of 1970.

At the time of the trial, he claimed that the shot which killed her was accidentally fired, when a shotgun he was carrying discharged after becoming "hung up" in a screen door.

In ruling on his appeal, the Supreme Court threw out arguments by Allen that the state murder with malice law is unconstitutional.

In addition, the court agreed with the judge of the 63rd District Court of Terrell County that the trial should be moved to Val Verde County.

Allen had said he wanted to be tried in Terrell County.

The Appeals Court noted the "widespread notoriety" of the case and that a "substantial segment" of the small population (of Terrell County) eligible for jury service apparently had expressed an opinion on the guilt or innocence" of Allen.

Allen was convicted in 63rd District Court of Val Verde County and the jury assessed him a punishment of 10 years in the state penitentiary.

Allen was convicted by a jury on Dec. 21, 1970, for the shooting murder of his wife Eddie Allen in Sanderson on March 16, 1970.

He was convicted of murder with malice aforethought and sentenced to serve not less than two nor more than 10 years in prison for the murder and subsequently appealed the case.

Allen is currently free on \$7,500 bond and living in Sanderson.

Mrs. Charles "Doc" (Effie B) Turk, 94, died in Baptist Memorial Hospital in San Angelo Monday. She had been in a nursing home in that city for several months.

Mrs. Turk was born February 27, 1878, in Texas. She was married to Charles J. "Doc" Turk in Uvalde. They had resided on the ranch north of Dryden since 1909. He preceded her in death.

Survivors include a son, Charlie Turk, of Dryden, a grandson, and two great-grandsons.

Deer Season Now In Full Swing

With a specified portion of Terrell County under the special early season for whitetail deer, hunters coming into this area for the opening of the blacktail season Saturday of last week, have been less numerous than in previous years. The exodus of the sportsmen coming through Sanderson has been about as thick and numerous as ever before, but the equipment is become more and more sophisticated each year, it seems.

Whitetail deer season has been open in the eastern and northern portion of Terrell County since November 18. This special season was due to an abundance of the animals this year, according to biologists of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission, who are responsible for the setting of the special season in an effort to control the deer population, it was stated.

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The regular West of the Pecos blacktail season opened Saturday of last week and will run through Sunday, Dec. 10.

Bag limits are as follows: Four deer; no more than two mule deer; no more than one mule deer buck; no more than two whitetail deer bucks; no more than three antlerless deer. Special permits must be obtained from land owners for the antlerless deer.

Counties in the Trans-Pecos area are Brewster, Jeff Davis, Presidio, Terrell, Pecos, Culbertson, El Paso, and Hudspeth.

Scaled quail season also opened in the Trans-Pecos area on Saturday, Nov. 18, and will close January 31. Game officials have stated that the scaled quail population in the Trans-Pecos Regulatory District is at an all-time high.

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Highway Signs Permits Needed

Owners of advertising signs along Interstate, US and major State-numbered highways have until December 31 to apply for permits required under the Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The act controls all outdoor advertising signs from the largest signboard to the smallest sign hanging from a fence along the right of way line.

The Texas Highway Commission established the deadline under the legislation which became effective on June 29. The act requires that no person may erect or maintain a sign within 660 feet of an Interstate or federal-aid primary highway in Texas without a license to engage in outdoor advertising.

In addition to the license, the sign owner must have a permit for each sign he has now or which he plans to erect. On-premise signs - those advertising activities conducted on the premises and those offering the property for sale - are exempt.

The act will be implemented in stages. The first stage requires the owner of the sign to obtain a State license and post a bond. The license fee is \$25 and the license is valid for an indefinite period.

The license application must be accompanied by a bond in the amount of \$2,500 for each county in which signs are located, or a maximum of \$10,000 for owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond form applications may be obtained by writing the Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department, P.O. Box 5075, Austin, Texas 78763.

After obtaining a license, the owner is required to obtain a separate permit for each existing and new off-premise sign on the affected highways. Sign permit application forms can be obtained from the Right of Way Sections of the Highway Department district offices.

For each sign permit required, the owner should submit an application accompanied by a check or money order for \$5 to the Highway Department district office for the county in which the sign is located. If the permit application is for an existing sign, the Highway Department will check to see if the sign conforms with the Beautification Act.

Permits now will be issued for signs in place prior to June 29 even if they do not conform to the law. They will be permitted to stay in place until programmed for acquisition or removal.

Permits for new signs will not be issued unless they conform to the law.

Anyone planning to put up a new sign on the controlled highways should check with the Highway Department district office in his area before doing anything, to determine if the proposed sign location conforms to the law.

The Highway Department also has begun removal of abandoned and illegal signs on controlled highways. An abandoned sign is one in which the owner no longer claims any interest. An illegal sign is one which is located on private property without permission of the property owner. Property owners on the affected highways with such illegal signs should contact the Highway Department

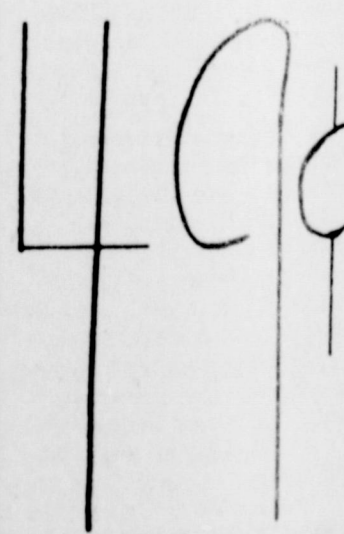

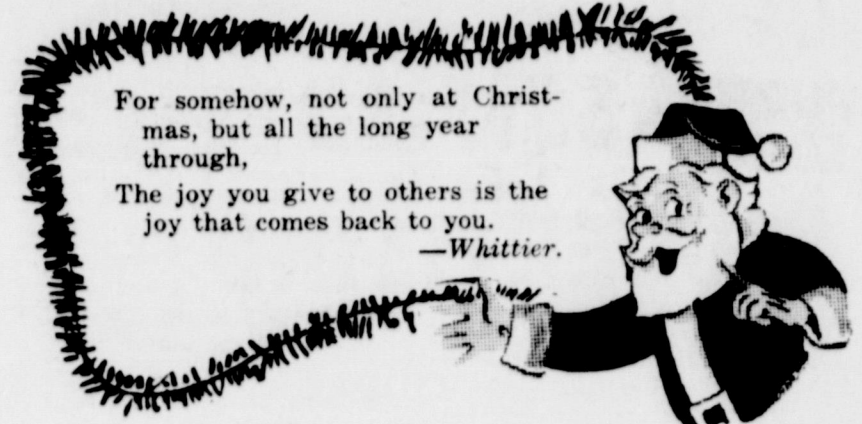

18-Year-Olds Need To Register

Col. Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, has again reminded young men of their obligation to register with Selective Service within 30 days of their 18th birthday.

Glantz stressed that the requirement to register will continue in full effect whether the all-voluntary military force becomes a reality or not. Every native born and resident-alien young man is required to present himself for registration from 30 days before to 30 days after his 18th birthday. If, for any reason, a young man has failed to register he should do so immediately to escape the penalty of federal law.

Failure to register may result in a fine, imprisonment, or both, under provisions of the Military Selective Service Act.

Young men may register at the office of the local board near their home of place of residence, or may be registered by volunteer registrars who are located in most high schools or other similarly convenient locations. Registrar for Terrell County is Mrs. Margaret K. Farley, High School, Sanderson, Texas.
