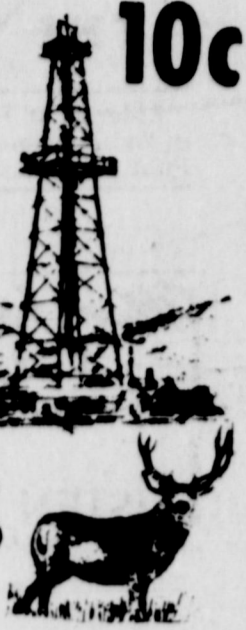

We went to Buchanan Dam by way of Sonora, Fort McKavett, Menard, and returned by way of Junction and Sonora and the Caverns there, and in order to see different parts of the country.

Through the Fort McKavett route the bluebonnets, Indian paint brush, Indian blanket and the greenery could not have been prettier. 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Roping Saturday Is First of Season

The Sanderson Rodeo Club is sponsoring the first of their series of five roping events of the summer season on Saturday this week. Events will get under way at 2:00 p.m.

There will be steer roping, calf roping, ribbon roping, flag races, barrel races, and breakaway roping for boys 15 and under.

A large crowd of contestants from this area of the state are expected to be here competing for the gold and silver trophy buckles that will be given to the best season average in the various events and for all-around winner.

Wool Incentive Checks Received

Terrell County wool producers were paid wool incentives last week. They payment rate for shorn wool was 105.7% of net proceeds received in 1972. Sellers of unshorn lambs received \$1.48 per cwt. for lambs sold during 1972. The Brewster-Terrell County ASCS office administers the program locally under the authority of the National Wool Act of 1954, as amended.

Sixty-four wool growers filed sales documents covering 931,053 pounds of varying grades of shorn wool. The Terrell County applicants had received an average of 59.1 per pound in the market place in contrast to the national average of 35¢, the price from which the rate was computed. The desired level is 72¢.

Fifty-five sellers of unshorn lambs filed documents covering in excess of four and a quarter million pounds of lambs. These producers contributed \$3,176.80 to the promotion fund at the rate of 7-1/2¢ per cwt., which was deducted from payments. The deduction is used to finance advertising, sales promotion, and related market-development activities and is administered by the American Sheep Producers Council. The deduction from shorn wool payments, at the rate of 1-1/2¢ per pound, netted the fund \$14,975.80.

The national average price for mohair, 81.4¢ per pound exceeded the support level of 80.2¢; therefore, no mohair incentive payments will be made on the 1972 marketings.

The total amount of incentive payments received by Terrell County ranchers was not available to The Times.

Clint Owens II Dies Early Monday At Circle Dot Ranch

Clint Ellis Owens II, 70, of Sheffield, died at the Circle Dot ranch Monday morning at about 7:00 o'clock, apparently from a heart attack, according to reports. He was at the ranch and prepared to begin a day's work of riding when he was stricken, according to reports.

Funeral services were Tuesday afternoon at the Sheffield Church of Christ and burial in the Sheffield Cemetery under the direction of a Crane funeral home.

Mr. Owens had lived at Sheffield about 40 years and had ranch holdings in Terrell and Pecos Counties. He was a former Pecos County law enforcement officer. He was born in Ozona December 22, 1902.

He is survived by his wife; a son, Ellis Owens of Iraan; three sisters; three brothers; four grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

Two Eaglette track team members qualified for regional competition by winning their respective events at the district meet in Iraan Wednesday, April 11. They are Delma Montalvo, who won the 880 with a time of 2:40.9, and Peggy Louwien, who won the 220 with a time of 26.3 and also won the 100-yard dash with a time of 11.2.

Delma also placed 4th in the 60-yard dash with a time of 7.7. The 440-yard relay placed 5th with 58.6 and was composed of Bryanann Stavley, Yolanda Rodriguez, Belle Siemer, and Paula Kilpatrick. Yolanda Rodriguez placed 7th in the 440-yard dash. Paula and Bryanann were in the broad jump and triple jump competition and Bryanann was 7th in the triple jump, and also ran in the 220-yard and 60-yard dashes. Corpse Found East of Town

The body of Lawrence Gooden of Shreveport, La., was found Sunday morning about 11 o'clock below the steel railroad bridge east of the highway near the overpass east of town. The bridge crosses Sanderson Canyon on the Harrell ranch.

Deputy Sheriff Don Turk reported to The Times that the body had been there approximately eight days probably since he had seen the man last at that time and he was leaving town. The body was in the canyon bed and about the center of the bridge. Turk stated that it was not dismembered or mutilated as though hit by a train and he guessed that he either fell from or jumped from the bridge or train on the bridge.

The body was taken to Ozona by the Janes Funeral Home and a sister notified, according to Deputy Turk.

The only way we got through Sonora Friday was a solemn promise -- no more than that, more like an oath sealed in blood -- to take SW Zee through the cavern there on the way home. And it takes something like that to get me to go through a cavern. We suffer from intense claustrophobia! But we made it and are glad to have that over with. The force and persistent effects of water are almost inconceivably visible there, and honestly, my only objection to the trip was -- it was too hurried to suit me. We recommended it without reservation.

The trip from Ozona home we had made at least once before since we moved to this country in 1931, so we considered it rather uneventful.

Teaching Methods Evaluation Bill Started by Snelson

Legislation introduced by Senator W.E. (Pete) Snelson of Midland which will provide a basis for evaluating the type effectiveness of our teaching methods and materials use in our Texas public schools has received the approval of the Senate Education Committee.

"It is often difficult to evaluate just how good a job we are doing in educating our school children," advised Senator Snelson. "This bill requires the Central Education Agency to develop methods to measure our education programs."

Senate Bill 801 embodies one of the three main legislative goals that the State Board of Education determined to be of greatest significance to education in Texas. The bill is slated to be brought up soon on the floor of the Senate for final approval by that body.

Workshop For Librarians Held

"Adult Needs and Building an Adult Collection of Books" were the subjects discussed at the library workshop in Rankin last Tuesday and attended by Mmes. Irvin Robbins, C.R. Wirsig, and Ernest Harkins. Ernest Lassater of Lubbock, field consultant to area libraries, conducted the workshop. Texas ranks 43rd in the nation in library support, spending \$5,000 per capita for grades one through 12 and then \$102.50 for the remainder of a person's life.
