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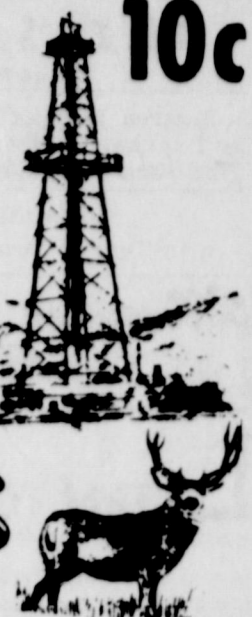

LISTEN TO LUKE

Everywhere we look now, we are seeing cautions about watching for spring bugs, insects, screwworms, etc., that are plaguing people, trees, shrubs, animals, etc. We wonder about things every once in a while, and when we see so many items like this, we wonder even more.

There seems to be the tendency to cut down on the use of so many pesticides, etc., and there are just certain things that are effective against many of our pests. Of course, we can always go back to the hammer of fly swatter, but it gets old. And the curbing of these pesticides causes even more of the growth of the pests and a greater loss to mankind of some of the many things that are desirable and needed.

For example, we are told that plants are breathing things, that they breathe in carbon dioxide and breathe out oxygen, and that this opposite action helps humans and animals to maintain life as they breathe in oxygen and breathe out carbon dioxide.

Or maybe its humans and animals that support the plants. Either way, with the shortage of plant life, there is going to be a resultant shortage of oxygen-producers, and with the increase in bugs there is an increase in oxygen users. From here on we are going to let the ecologists take over and figure out which we need the most and what is going to be sacrificed, or what it will take to balance out nature again.

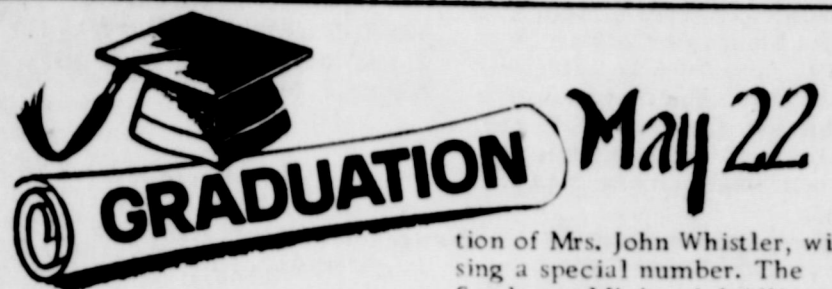
Another thing of it is, that with the curtailing of the use of pesticides, or without them, there is still the eternal problem of me trying to keep my pecan and mulberry trees out of the interest of some of the pests when there are many pecan and mulberry trees in town that never even get any exposure to any kind of pesticides, hammer, fly-swatter, or anything else.

We have been seen out watching the birds, and picking out different birds that inhabit or pass through our area, and we think that this is an interesting, even though useless pastime! (But so is golf, bowling, most tv watching, girl watching, and many other past-times if you consider only the superficial or apparent value.) And now that we have properly defended our time-wasting past-time, we can go on to the original story.

Since we like (to a very slight degree) birds, we also have to say that we like such things as insects, etc., so our bird-friends can have something to eat. Now this brings into focus again the deal about balance of ecology. This puts me against pesticides, then, and favoring the webworm, etc., etc.

Sometimes a decision of for and against is not easily made, or sometimes such a decision is too hastily made without thinking through some of the resultant consequences.

Rainfall Totals Up After Four Days Of Moisture

About one and one-half inches of moisture was reported just north of Sanderson on Friday night of last week. It was the first moisture in the immediate area of Sanderson since the onset of spring.

A very brilliant and noisy electrical storm was visible and audible locally, but only a trace of moisture fell locally during the night. There was another light shower on Saturday morning and heavy moisture-laden clouds hung in the air during most of the day, with the sun shining only for short periods of time.

There was no damage locally from the high winds that blew, except to small twigs and leaves that were blown from the trees.

Bill Goldwire reported over an inch of rain at his ranch and considerable damage from the electrical storm which knocked out and damaged motors, pumps, appliances in their house, TV sets, etc.

Peggy Louwien 2nd In 220 Dash At State Meet

Peggy Louwien, Sanderson High School junior, finished second in the 220-yard dash at the state track meet for girls in Austin. Her time was 25.1, the best race she had run all season. She was clocked only one-tenth of a second behind the winner, a girl from Garden City, who ran the race in 25.0. She is the daughter of Mrs. Eddie Mae Louwien and the late H.B. Louwien.

Mrs. Tommy Arthur, girls' track coach, took her to Austin last weekend for the state meet.

Miss Louwien, Mrs. Arthur, and Delma Montalvo were in San Angelo for a practice meet several days previously and Peggy finished second in the 220-yard dash there, losing to the same girl. The first and second times in that race were 25.6 and 25.8. Delma won the 880-yard run there with a time of 2.31.0, her best time of the season, and also her last race as a high school student. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Onesimo Montalvo.

Commissioners Hike Trash Hauling Fee; Talk Redistricting and Flood Dams

Dam easements, local trash hauling, and authority to purchase a loader for precinct 4 took up the major portion of the meeting of the county commissioners Monday morning at the courthouse. All four commissioners were present.

The group approved payment of \$76.50 additional for the county's share of the cost of probation service in this judicial district. The cost is divided over the entire district with Del Rio, Val Verde County, and Maverick County paying the greatest portion of the cost.

A resolution was passed supporting the special investigator for the district and his work was recognized as being beneficial.

After the reading of the list of the bills owed by the various sub-divisions of the county, the commissioners voted to allow the bills.

During the discussion of the status of the easements for the construction of flood control dams on Sanderson Canyon, it was noted that approval should be given for granting access road to certain areas on Sites 8 and 9, both on 3-mile watershed, and approval of these additions was given by the commissioners. It was also reported that no new easements had been received and the commissioners pledged a concerted effort to try to coordinate the work of securing the easements as they recognized that the

time was rapidly passing toward the deadline for getting something done and they asked for the cooperation of all individuals, organizations, and agencies in getting the job done.

There was also a lengthy discussion about the hauling of trash in Sanderson and the commissioners agreed to set a price of \$2.50 per month for residences and \$1.00 per trip for business houses, with contacts to be made to the businesses to determine their estimated needs for adequate disposition of trash.

A representative of an area machinery company was on hand and offered the commissioners a lease-purchase deal on a 2-yard bucket loader for precinct 4. Following his presentation, the commissioners decided to advertise for bids on a piece of equipment similar to the one hawked by the sales representative.

There was some discussion again about the possible re-districting lines in the county but no agreement was reached by the commissioners, pending the location of all roads and ranch houses on the county map being used to draw up the proposed lines.

many who early said: "I wish they'd hurry up and get this silly little Watergate thing settled. It was no more than some childish political spying that others have done and it amounts to nothing." Well, the further it goes, the worse it gets, and the lower down it gets, the higher up it goes. Probably it has already exceeded the expectations of 99% of the public, and we don't know yet where it will wind up. There are those citizens who are tired of reading and hearing about it, and want it to be shut off now permanently from the news, and there are those who want to keep digging.

We have no idea of the propriety of all of the aspects of publicity that this story has been given, but we know that had it not been for the consistency and persistence of a few newspaper men, the story would have not reached the proportions that it has and there are many who had an alleged knowledge of or connection with the incident that would not have been called to face their just court proceedings. There are those close to the administration who yet condemn "the press" for printing innuendos, rumors, etc., when that was all the information they had and were unable to penetrate the sanctity of those who were "protecting" the White House from the harassment of the press.

And following all the denials of association, guilt, and knowledge of all facets of the case, it was still the persistence of the press that brought about the uncovering of all the associated items that have been found to date.

None of us is perfect, and no one is all bad!

But that, too, depends on how you look at it.

Historical Group Meets Monday

The Terrell County Historical Survey Committee had their regular meeting Monday evening at the court house. Members present were Mmes. Jack Deaton, A.H. Zuberbueller, E. E. Harkins, W.H. Grigsby; and County Judge R.S. Wilkinson.

The commissioners court has appropriated \$300.00 for the year's work, and an account has been opened at the bank. The committee will purchase a tape recorder, tapes, film for slides, and filing material as needed. Also to be purchased is a scrapbook to be kept by the recorder.

The chairman, Mrs. Grigsby, has written for and received Federal Register (national register of historical places), National Register in Texas, Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers, list of committee chairmen in our region and those in nearby areas.

Suggested markers discussed by the group included graves, sites of historical events, school and cemetery sites, canyons, caves, Indian trails, railroad buildings, springs, ranches, mercantile establishments, and roads.
