We had two telephone calls last week - before the paper came out - asking us to say something again about a local situation. It's difficult to know what to do in some cases, and in all the others we wonder if we do the right thing!

We feel that there is something good comes from complaining at times, and we feel that something good comes from complimenting at times. We are sure that constantly complaining or constantly complimenting seems to be monotonous and deceitful. We like to do something like the right amount of both. And this is where we sometimes get into trouble, knowing how much is the right amount to be as effective a voice as we would like to be.

One thing that some have tried to prompt us into being, and something that we are not going to be, is the spokesman for all of the people in all of their gripes!

In other words, we appreciate anything you have to say and we are glad to listen, whether in agreement or disagreement. We appreciate knowing at times that there is someone that agrees with us, and we know that when we take up some controversial issue that there are going to be some who disagree with us. We have enough of those disagreeable chores of our own without taking up the griping of everybody else.

If you have something to say about how something is being done, say it to the person who is responsible for doing it or not doing it. It means a lot more when a bunch of pigs are squealing than when just one is. Only one pig doing all of the squealing, may be thought to be only a squealing pig.

We feel strongly that there are many important issues in our everyday lives that need attention. But we have found that what is important to me, is of no consequence to most other people in many instances. And some of the things that need attention are not called to the attention of the people at times and they seem to take the "status quo" for granted and are willing to let them all rock along -- with an attitude that if you don't muddy the waters, the waters will run cool and calm.

Re-Entry Slated In County Hole

HNG Oil Co., Midland, will re-enter and clean out to 6,993 feet, the old total depth, at its No. 1-53 Korn in Terrell County, wild-cat failure, 22 miles southwest of Sheffiend, 5 1/2 miles southwest of the one-well K-M (Ellen burger gas) field and 6 3/4 miles southeast of the one-well Little Canyon (Strawn gas) field and 5 3/4 miles west of 6,221-foot Wolfcamp gas production in a northwest area of the Brown-Basett multipay field.

The project was plugged and abandoned May 10. No tests were taken. It topped the Wolfcamp at 4,776 feet on ground elevation of 2,417 feet.

Location is 730 feet from the north and 900 feet from the east lines of 53-1 TCRR.

It is also a northwest twin to a 7,000-foot failure, Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 Annie Spencer, abandoned Jan. 9, 1961, after un successful tests of the Wolfcamp through perforations at 6,471-51 feet. It flowed gas at the maximum rate of 588,000 cubic feet daily and recovered 93 feet of gas-cut mud on a drillstem test at 6,473-525 feet. A subsequent test at 6,579-618 feet recovered only mud.

Trash Hauling Fee Hike Is Explained By Revenue and Expenses in Report

The Terrell County Commissioners' Court asked The Times to give the following facts to the residents of Sanderson concerning the trash hauling in an effort to explain the necessity of raising the price of the service from \$1.00 per month for residences to \$2.50, and \$1.00 per trip to businesses. The

raise in rates was voted by the court following repeated review of the cost of operating the service and comparing the revenue.

Figures turned in to The Times showed that for the three-months period just prior to the report, the cost for repair to the vehicles amounted to \$316.92; gasoline \$315.26; labor \$2,430.00; collecting and reporting revenue \$60.00.

YPCC Reveals July 4th Plans

A Mexican supper will be served from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. at the St. James Hall, and there will be two dances that night, both from 9:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. at the St. James Hall and at the V.F.W. Hall.

Receipts for hauling trash amounted to \$1,437.00 for the three-months period, amounting to a net loss of \$1,625.18.

County Commissioner of Precinct 1 W.W. Sudduth stated that one of the employees on the trash truck makes \$300 a month and that half of his salary was included in the expense figure as he works in other jobs much of the time. Sudduth added that the county employees that work full time on the trash truck make \$220 per month.

Sudduth reported that approximately 75% of the water meter holders pay the amount billed them for the sanitation service and that about 25% do not pay, and the total revenue during the quarter just ended amount to \$1,437.00 and that this figure was about the same as had been collected during previous quarters.

It is from this figure and the figures given above on the cost of maintaining the trucks, collecting the trash, etc., that the net loss figure of \$1,625.18 was obtained and the justification for the increase in the trash collecting fee from \$1 to \$2.50 per month per residence and to \$1.00 per trip for businesses.

whatever damage or good they are doing. They don't change until some person decides they need changing.

We could mention a bunch of examples to verify this statement. And in each case, there was a "trouble-maker" that got busy and started getting the waters muddied and something done. And now that it is accomplished, most people are glad that the waters were stirred up.

Legislation is now pending or has been considered on legalizing marihuana or changing the punishment under certain conditions, also legalizing abortion, also legalizing lotteries, and some more things. And it is numbers of "squealing pigs" that will determine which way the legislation goes. The same thing is true in upholding the laws we have; the same thing is true in securing the services we are now entitled to, are paying for, are and should expect, and all other phases of our everyday life.

There is no way that we can justify the cost of government directly with the benefits or returns in services. For example, we cannot individually pay for the cost of educating our children, and the cost cannot be measured against the benefits to the community, state, or nation, or to the individual.

Maybe, just maybe, it all depends on how you look at it!

We got so wound up in the above problems, that we came near forgetting one of the most important things we could say this week. Our congratulations are sincere and genuine to the students who have achieved whatever level of education that is behind them, and hope for them a constant and continuing quest for knowledge, whether it is gained in formal institutions or through a self-disciplined application of time and effort. How true the thought of the high school graduating class's song: "We've Only Just Begun".

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

Grants In Area Made by PBRPC

Directors of the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission gave their approval last week to a variety of grant applications for federal and state monies totalling more than \$2-million at the group's regular monthly session at Terminal.

Among the grants approved were \$20,120.00 for remodeling the Dawson County jail. This was from the Texas Criminal Justice Council, as was a grant of \$39,020 for partial funding of the operation of the Permian Basin Criminal Justice Planning effort.

Largest of the grant proposals was \$738,642.00 for equipment to convert the Permian Basin Police Radio Communications Network from low to high frequency channels; Martin County adult and juvenile probation project totaling \$24,261 for partial funding for the first year of operation of an original 2-year probation project; \$474,000 to Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative Inc., which plans to construct new power lines to service irrigation wells, oilwells, livestock water wells, telephone boosters, and related facilities in West Texas; a similar application in the amount of \$608,000.00 for Lyntegar Electric Cooperative also in West Texas; City of Lamesa received a grant of \$42,247.82 from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for developing its city parks; Odessa received approval on a grant application totalling \$93,022.00 for a Manpower Development and Training Act grant through the Texas Employment Commission, to be conducted at Odessa College, would offer training for 15 trainees in meat processing and packaging; and body and fender repair.
