For about 11 days now 18year-olds have been officially and legally adults. And frankly, we don't think there is much difference in the individ nal activities of the young adults here. Probably those in that age group looked forward eagerly to some of the advantages (?) of adulthood, but probably very few of them looked forward to all the responsibilities of being 'grown'. There was a time when young people that age had some kind of a cushion for some things because they were not adults, but no longer.

This "maturity" that was granted by law, if there are distinct advantages, carries with them the obligations that are also the responsibilities of all other mature persons, and they, too, will soon learn, if they haven't already, that there is no privilege that does not have obligations. And what person that has been "grown" for several years would not attest to the fact that "coming of age" is not some kind of Utopian existence.

The Texas Constitutional Revision Commission is making some important decisions some we would agree with, and some we would not! But this in only normal.

There are those whose opinions we respect and who are ina position to know more about it than we do, who say that the Constitutional needs revi ing, so we will go along with

What we think is ridiculous, is that the planners have voted to spend \$33,938.00 on new chairs and desks to place in the House of Representatives during the convention. Chairs, costing \$165.00 A PIECE, will be replicas of those used by the delegates to the 1876 constitutional convention. The desks, considerably more economical. will be made by state prison system inmates at a cost of \$22.50 each, which is not part of the gripe, unless there is some kind of servitude involved!

Andthere will be 181 legislators who will be delegates to the convention and sit in the \$165.00 chairs.

This is another of their possible efforts to save the state money - besides the possible asking for an increase to some. thing near \$15,000.00 per year

Isn't this quite expensive traditional fol-der-ol? Or are we the only ones who look at it that way?

Somewhere down the line there is going to have to be omeone who takes the bull by the horns and does something to the tax rolls, if what we continue to hear from time to time is true.

## Gulf Oil Co. **Reports Producer**

Gulf Oil Corp. reported a dual potential from the detrital for its No. 1 Annie Garner, scheduled 5/8 mile northwest outpost to the Allison (detrital gas) field of Terrell County,

six miles south of Sheffield. It was finaled from the upper detrital for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 8,759-776 feet, which had been acidized with

2,000 gallons. It was finaled from the lower detrital for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.4 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 8,855-878 feet, which had been aci-

dized with 3,000 gallons. It was drilled to 9.822 feet on a rescheduled 11,500-foot contract, with 7-inch casing ser at that depth, and plugged back to 9,775 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 2,110 feet from the west lines of 16-B21CCSD&RG-NG.

The discovery, Seco Production Co., Midland, No. 1 Allison, was finaled April 25 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 14 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquidratio of 24,507-1, through perforations at 9,172-206 feet. The firm reported dual potential as an upper Pennsylvanian gas strike of 1.34 million cubic feet of gas daily through perforations at 9,054-060 feet; however, it was never officially filed with the Railroad Commission.

Now, immediately, we are in the area of opinions! There are those who professionally claim to be experts in these fields, and there is disagreement even among the "professional experts". So your opinion, like mine, depends on how you look at it, and that is the same basis that is used by the experts!

There are many items on the tax rolls of the county that have a valuation that matches or comes close to the actual market value of the property, and this fact causes one to wonder if it would not be right to have some of the many thousands of acres of ranch land that have sold recently on the tax rolls at a figure that compares with the fair market value of other property. While you and I might disagree on what the "fair market value" of certain things is, there are at least two people who agreed on the " fair market value" of the ranch land that was purchased -- and that was the buyer and the seller. And it would seem rather odd to us that the buyer would try to contradict "the fair market value" figure if it were the same figure that was the purchase price, whatever that figure was!

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

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
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
