LISTEN TO LUKE

Sorry that the old car did not show in the old picture last week. The car was under the trees for shade and there just wasn't enough contrast in the reproduction to show it. Anyway, the rear window on those old jobs were oval-shaped, about 10 to 12 inches long and only 6 to 8 inches wide, and that's measuring the widest parts of the oval. You really get a good view out the back through them.

It just happened last week that we were forced (almost) to make a comparison of some prices on some merchandise with a mail-order house, and the results were interesting. Our letter-size file folders, heavy weight (11 points) sell for \$4.50 a box of 100. They can be ordered from a certain mail order house for \$2.75 per 100. This looks good, but postage on them is \$1.35 and they are only medium weight - which is 9-1/2 points, and with the ordering stamp and the postage back on the goods, we are 32¢ higher -- but that's comparing the two weights of cardboard, which isn't the same. Another comparison was package sealing tape, 1-1/2 inches wide and 400 inches long for 74¢ out of the catalogue, and it does not have a brand name. Our Scotch package sealing tape, the same dimensions, we sell for 79¢.

Those are the only two items we were forced (?) to compare. It we compared some others, it might be different the other way. But we found out we had some real bargains!

We expect to see the local dog crop continue to increase and the consequential sudden death of a bunch of local dogs occur. It is inevitable!

There seems to be no real or imagined local interest in curbing the dog population. They have been seen running in packs recently, usually behind a female, and the roamings and barking at night seems to be on the increase. Ranchmen who are near Sanderson continue to report increases also in death loss due to dogs, and with their reported losses realized graphically now that they are working their stock, there is going to be some kind of reaction by them to protect their stock.

With the price of lambs in the neighborhood of 37¢ per pound and a lamb weighing in the neighborhood of 60 pounds, every lamb lost to dogs is a loss of \$22.20. You can compute heavier or lighter lambs yourself. But it doesn't take much figuring, or many lambs to run up a loss of \$100, and it doesn't take a dog long to kill or cripple \$100 worth of lambs. And every ewe lamb or adult that is killed or wounded is worth much more than a mutt.

It just isn't right that they should have to sustain that loss at the expense of the selfishness of people who want to say that they "own" a dog, but don't want the responsibility of that ownership.

Eagles Win 48-0 Over Grandfalls; To Play McCamey Friday

The Sanderson Eagles ran over the Grandfalls-Royalty Cowboys here Friday night of last week by a lop-sided score of 48-0. Sanderson scored 14 points in the first quarter, 14 in the second quarter, 7 in the third period, and 13 in the fourth period.

Grandfalls is a Class B team. Rain began falling during second quarter and helped to contain the game possibly, although Sanderson had a minimum of turn-overs against them, even with a wet ball.

Fans thinned out from the stands as soon as the blowing rain began and most of those who stayed after the half, sat in their cars.

Kendall Billings ran the ball over the goal line from inside the 1-yard line for the first score and Bill Mott kicked the first point-after-touchdown.

Kevin Phillips scored the second TD, also from inside the 1-yard mark, and Mott again tacked on the extra point with a place kick.

In the second period, the Eagles scored on an 8-yard pass from Robert Kline to Ricky Marquez - quarterback to end - and Mott's place-kick try was blocked. Kline, on an option play, went in for a score from 8 yards out for the second TD of the second quarter and threw a pass to Jake Murrah for the extra points, and bringing the half-time score to 28-0 in favor of the home team.

The only touchdown in the third period was by Carlos Munoz, who went in from the 4-yard line, and Mott booted the ball between the uprights for the extra point.

The longest touchdown play

of the game was in the final quarter and a 23 yard pass by Kline to Murrah. Mott's place-kick was good again for the PAT. The final score was a 7-yard run by Munoz and Billings tried an extra point kick which was wide.

The lop-sided statistics followed the trend of the lop-sided score. Sanderson led in 1st downs 15-5; yards rushing 219-57; yards passing 42-15, completing 3 of 7 while Grandfalls completed 2-14 and losing 2 to interception. Sanderson lost 2 fumbles and Grandfalls lost 3. Sanderson's penalties were 6 for 50 yards and Grandfalls had 6 for 56 yards.

Friday night, the Eagles will go to McCamey to meet the Class AA Bulldogs. It will be the strongest prospective competition for the Eagles in their pre-conference tilts.

Rain Last Friday Aids Ranchers

Up to two inches of rainfall was reported in some areas of the county after Friday night's precipitation.

The rain began falling during the second period of the football game in Sanderson and varying amounts were reported locally, but generally about .20-inch was reported in gauges here.

The heaviest reports of the rainfall came from the central part of the county or to the north of Sanderson and to the east from Sanderson.

Forty-eight cars of a freight train on the Southern Pacific Railroad were derailed Thursday of last week eight miles east of Alpine. There were no injuries to employees of the rail company.

Train service through Sanderson was delayed for several hours while crews cleared an area for the laying of a "shoofly" around the wreckage and service was resumed at 8:10 a.m. Friday.

A similar derailment occurred at the same place in January, according to reports, and "track failure" was said to have been the cause of the derailment.

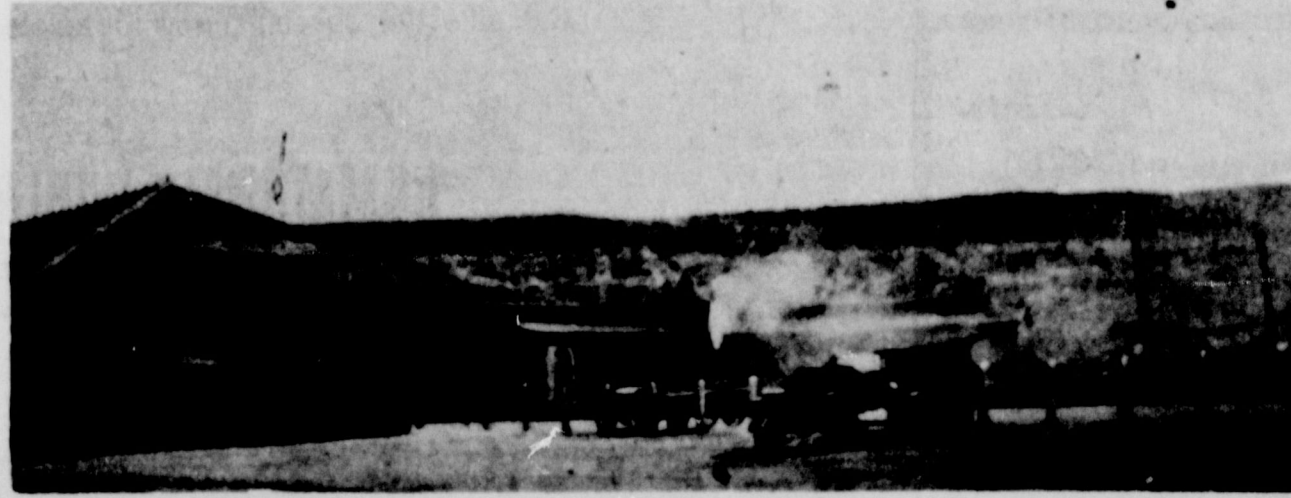

In keeping with our remarks last week about gratitude and appreciation expressed The Times by an individual, we want to begin this week in trying to express our gratitude for some people's efforts to boost the town and county or help in some meaningful ways. The local unit of the Cancer Society has worked hard year after year in raising funds for research to try to stop that dread disease, and they get support, but we are going to say "thank you" to them, for ourselves and for everyone who reads this and says to themselves "me, too!". And if you say it so they can hear you or read it, I'm sure they will appreciate it. They work for the benefit of all people directly and indirectly, and we appreciate it.

News from Austin is that a House education committee recommendation for the state to assume \$600 million in added school costs over a six-year period went to Speaker Price Daniel Jr. and Governor Dolph Briscoe last week. The committee chairman said that they are trying to relieve the local taxpayers and shift the burden to the state, because the local districts are at about their taxing limit. He went on to say that overhauling the school finance formulas can be accomplished without any immediate new taxes, because \$109 million in unexpended funds rests in the state treasury.

Wow! This is food for columns from now on!
What is being said above that the relief the local taxpayers will get is the taxes will be collected by the state and not by the school districts. And former information we had was that a raise in taxes for the operation of the state was imminent, and now we have word of \$109 million un-dedicated funds!

And another thing, possibly, is that local districts will be taken off the hook in assessing taxes and placing valuations and this will be done on the state level. We would predict that there will be some consideration given to the "fair market value" of much of the property within the state - and no one could be sure what basis will be used for determining the "fair market value".

Even if the school district's tax levying and collecting powers are cancelled, the county's tax levying and collecting will be left to the local authorities - at least for a while.

It may be that it will be looked at and seen differently!
