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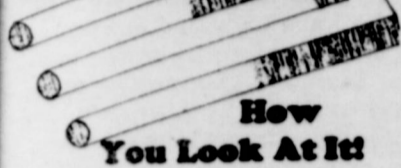

It seems only appropriate that the column heading should be changed. Since May 1947 the heading has been "Listen to Luke", and in about 1960 dad was forced to quit writing the column except only occasionally, and in 1965 he was forced to quit completely, and the line "By Albert:---" was added underneath since that time.

There is no disconnection with the person, the influence, or the respect. It's just a matter of fact, according to the way we look at it, that the name of the column should be changed. And we could think of no more appropriate time, or designation.

It seems that there is a lot of justification of actions during some of the weeks past by quoting laws or rules, etc. And there may be some who would say that such a group or individual is getting "technical as all get-out!"

Personally, the way we look at obeying rules and laws, we can see nothing wrong with this practice - going by the book. We can see no justification whatsoever in willful, deliberate, knowing violation of the law under the pretext of convenience, expedience, economy, or any other excuse one might think of. And if anyone knowingly violates a law - or acts contrary to the rules governing - then he is a law violator or rule breaker.

There has been some talk about the possibility of a need for a tax increase by the school district. This talk possibly originated as a result of a story in The Times which came after a talk with one of the school officials. There is a strong possibility that an increase in taxable property in the school district will offset an increase needs, according to word received early this week.

Whether or not we need a tax increase or rate increase, it seems that it would be nothing but fair that everyone pay on the value of everything that should be on the tax rolls, like bank accounts, savings accounts, deer leases, and everything else that is supposed to be on the rolls, and at its true market value.

When it is left up to individuals to decide what is to be rendered or assessed, then inequalities sneak in. A person may earn a jillion dollars and put it all in savings accounts and not pay any tax to that amount to the school, while another person, earning the same amount, puts it in real estate, and is taxed accordingly. It doesn't seem to be fair, especially if it is not legal!

Polling Places Set for Primary

Polling places for the Democratic Primary were set by the Terrell County Democratic Executive Committee at their meeting Wednesday of last week. Edward Kerr, chairman, presided at the meeting and Pinky Carruthers, Vic Littleton, Mrs. H.E. Ezelle, and Mrs. Manuel Parada Sr., members from each of the four precincts, were present for the meeting.

The committee voted to name the following as polling places for each of the respective precincts: 1 - the courthouse; 2 - the building on the northeast corner of the intersection of Fifth and Pine Streets (the former Baptist Mission, now leased by the school for storage of desks); 3 - elementary school; 4 - band hall.

It was pointed out that the executive committee acted after reading the law governing polling places in precincts, and The Times was asked to print the law for the information of the readers and voters.

"Art. 2.02. (h). "All election precincts, by whatever authority established, shall be described by natural or artificial boundaries or survey lines, and shall be designated by name or number. There shall be one polling place, and no more, for each election precinct, and the notice of the election shall state the location of the polling place in each precinct."

Kerr stated that following requests for polling places other than in Sanderson in some precincts, that he and Vic Littleton and Pinky Carruthers, committeemen of the Democratic Party in precincts 1 and 2, called Mr. Murdock in the election division of the Secretary of State's office and were told emphatically that a second polling place in any precinct could not be named.

Registration Of New Pupils Asked

The school district needs an accurate census of all children who will be five years of age on or before September 1, 1974, in order to plan for the 1974-75 school year, according to Superintendent C.B. Card.

If you have a child who will meet the above requirements, you are asked to bring the child's immunization records and birth certificate to the elementary school on Wednesday, March 27, 1974, at 2:00 p.m. All immunization records must be up to date before starting to school next fall. At this meeting, the school nurse will review your records and let you know what immunizations are needed, Supt. Card concluded.

Children will be permitted to visit the kindergarten class one day between March 27 and the end of school and a drawing will be held to determine which day each child is to visit the class.

Money Needs Up For '74 School Year By LFA Formula

The Terrell County Independent School District will have to come up with \$1,711 more to meet the Local Fund Assignment for support of public schools, according to information released last week by the State School Board.

The figure is a formula based on the economic index figures for each county in Texas, which is based on the number of scholastics and the wealth of the district.

Supt. C.B. Card stated that if the scholastics and all other factors besides the wealth of the district were to remain the same, the local fund assignment would go up with the decrease in wealth and would go down with the increase in wealth.

The increase of \$1,711 will come from local tax money, according to Mr. Card.

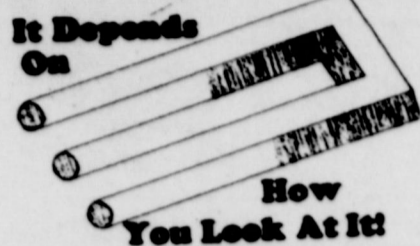

Up to 5-Inches Rain to South, 1 1/2-Inch Here

Sanderson received about an inch and a half of rain in two showers last week.

About an inch of rain fell on Wednesday night and a half-inch fell Thursday night.

Southeast of Sanderson reported up to four and a half inches of rain. H.E. Gatlin stated that his rain gauge ran over from the first rainfall, the first time that he can recall that much rain in one downpour there. His ranch is southeast of Sanderson.

Lighter amounts of moisture were reported north of Sanderson and the eastern part of the county received none of the rain.

Light showers were reported again Monday afternoon to the north and northwest of Sanderson.

SSI Program Gives More Aid To Needy Folk

Beginning in January 1974, the federal government instituted the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program, a monthly cash payment to people in financial need who are 65 or older, or blind, or disabled. In an effort to locate and inform eligible persons, a short-term outreach project called SSI-Alert has been initiated under the auspices of the Governor's Committee on Aging.

No fee is charged for enrollment in the income program, explains Darrell Carr, state coordinator of SSI-Alert. Eligibility is determined according to Federal guidelines by the Social Security Administration.

In general, these benefits can be paid to people whose income is below \$160 for a single person or \$230 for a couple, if this income comes from Social Security, retirement or other pensions; or below \$365 for a single person or \$505 for a couple, if this income is from wages, salaries, or self-employment income.

This means that even persons who already receive Social Security can receive Supplemental Security Income, as SSI is not paid out of Social Security tax money. In addition, those who qualify for SSI are automatically eli-

gible to receive Medicaid payments for medical care. The first SSI payments were made in January 1974. These are the new gold-colored checks. Application should be made immediately in order to begin receiving payments as soon as possible. Under no circumstances should a person wishing to apply for SSI benefits pay a fee to anyone for this service. If any person attempts to charge a fee, the applicant should refuse to pay it and should report the incident to the local SSI-Alert office immediately. In Terrell County, Judge R.S. Wilkinson can provide information about the program.

'DISTINGUISHED STUDENT'

Miss Marsha Monroe has earned a "distinguished student" ranking at Texas A&M University. The undergraduate honor is awarded students who have excelled academically. Recipients must earn at least a 3.25 grade point ratio (out of a possible 4.0) during the most recent grading period.

"Distinguished student" ranking is limited to 10% of TAMU's undergraduate enrollment.

Miss Monroe, who will take her degree in May, is doing her practice teaching in the Bryan High School where she teaches sophomore world history. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Reg Monroe.

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SHS Track Team 2nd At Sul Ross

The Sanderson High School track team competed at the Sul Ross invitational meet on Saturday and placed 2nd, behind Rankin, garnering 100 points to 168 for the winner. Iraan had 96 points, Balmorea 56, Marfa 43, and Wink 17.

Robert Kline tied for 2nd in the pole vault with 10'6".

Bill Mott placed 4th in the broad jump with 17'10-1/2", and Danny Montalvo was also entered.

Easter Seal Fund Services Listed

The Texas Easter Seal Society which has begun its traditional annual Easter Seal Appeal, can provide the following services for handicapped persons who cannot afford to pay all of the costs involved, and who are not eligible for help from any other source - public or private.

Assistance in paying for physical, occupational, and speech therapy when it is prescribed by a medical doctor;

Pay for specific diagnostic evaluation (such as orthopedic, audiological, language, and psychological);

Purchase orthopedic equipment such as wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, braces, etc., when prescribed by a medical doctor;

Help to defray transportation costs for treatment or evaluation when the family is unable to meet these costs. This is determined by paying 30¢ per gallon - based on 10 miles per gallon, figured on a round trip basis - or by purchasing round trip bus tickets;

Assist families and individuals to reach the right person or agency to obtain help the Easter Seal Society of Texas cannot provide. People are often eligible for services from public or private agencies but do not know the person, eligibility requirements, or place to obtain the services needed. Perhaps the Easter Seal Society does.

A limit of \$150 per client per year for therapy and \$150 for transportation has been set except in unusual cases requiring special attention. This limit can be exceeded only with the permission of the Treatment and Service

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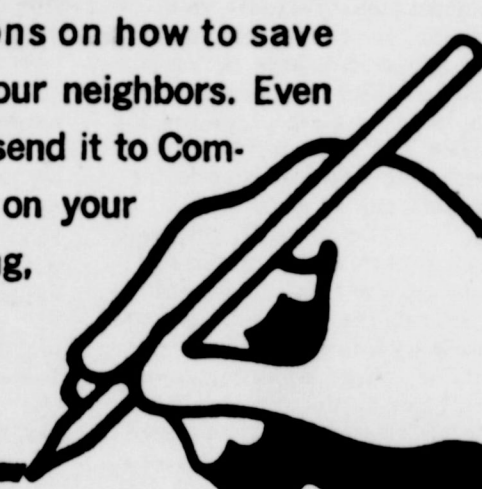

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Candidates Issue Info Offered

The issue of ineligibility of a candidate to hold office is revived again this week by a reader pointing out specifically another article in the book of Texas Election Laws.

The Times previously printed the article on "residence requirements" from the Texas Election Law book for the information of readers. This article is printed for the same purpose: so that readers may know what the law says and make up their minds or get an interpretation from someone more qualified.

"Article 1.05. Ineligibility.

"No person shall be eligible to be a candidate for, or to be elected or appointed to, any public office in this state unless he is a citizen of the United States eligible to hold such office under the Constitution and laws of this state and is under none of the disabilities for voting which are stated in Article VI, Section 1 of the Constitution of Texas on the date of his appointment or of the election at which he is elected, and unless he will have resided in this state for a period of twelve months next preceding the applicable date specified below, and for any public office which is less than statewide, shall have resided for six months next preceding such date in the district, county, precinct, municipality or other political subdivision for which the office is to be filled:

"(1) For a candidate whose name is printed on the ballot for a general (first) primary election, the applicable date is the last day on which any candidate for the office involved could file his application to have his name printed on the ballot for that primary election.

"(2) For an independent or nonpartisan candidate in a general or special election, the applicable date is the last day on which the candidate's application for a place on the ballot could be delivered to the appropriate officer for receiving the application.

Sub-paragraphs (3), (4), and (5) concern write-in candidates, party nominees, and appointees; then the article proceeds as follows:

"The foregoing requirements shall not apply to any office for which the Constitution or statutes of the United States or of this state prescribe qualifications in conflict herewith, and in case of conflict the provisions of such other laws shall control.

"Except as provided in Art. 8.22 of this Code, no ineligible candidate shall ever have his name placed upon the ballot at any primary, general or special election. No ineligible candidate shall ever be voted upon nor have votes counted for him at any such primary, general or special election for the purpose of nominating or electing him, but votes cast for an ineligible candidate shall be taken into account in determining whether any other candidate received the necessary vote for nomination or election. No person who advocates the overthrow by force or violence or change by unconstitutional means of the present constitutional form of government of the United States or of this State, shall be eligible to have his name printed on any official ballot in any general, special or primary election in this State. (1967)"

The Texas Election Law book goes a little further with ineligibility in Art. 1.06. Ineligibility bars.

"Neither the Secretary of State nor any county judge of this State, nor any other authority authorized to issue certificates, shall issue any certificate of election or appointment to any person elected or appointed to any office

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Taho, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots

must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced, slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.
