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Flood Waters Hit

High water swept down Downie St. in Sanderson on two occasions Monday night causing extensive damage to property along the street and to the street itself.

There were no lives lost or personal injuries that were reported.

Brush jammed the openings of the bridge carrying the railroad tracks over Sanderson Canyon just west of town causing the water to leave the creekbed and flow down Downie St. similar to the cause of the flood June 11, 1965, that took 27 lives and did such severe damage to local and ranch property.

It was reported that up to six inches of rainfall was received on ranches to the west of Sanderson. The fall was reported to have been in a very short period, resulting in the extreme run-off that caused the damage locally. There were no heavy rains reported on Three-Mile Draw as occurred previously.

The rainfall was considered to be general, with reports up to 1-1/2 inches to the north of Sanderson and also to the east and south, but no amount reported at this writing.

The water flowing down the creekbed lapped the top of the bridge on U.S. 90 at the crossing just east of Fifth St. in Sanderson, but did not go over the roadbed of the bridge.

It was reported that high water came down Downie St. at about 11:00 p.m. and again at about 2:30 a.m. on Monday night.

Residents in the low areas of town were warned to evacuate at about 9:00 p.m. and people who had come to San-



derson Monday with a carnival all moved what they could to high ground. The carnival was set up near the American Legion Hall.

Water service was interrupted to part of the town east of the bridge because the water crosses the creek.

Some of the damage noted in time for this writing included: the east approach to the railroad bridge west of town had severe washing damage, heavy brush and debris piled under freight cars in the west end of the yard; water damage in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jay Schuler, fence washed away from back yard and horses loosed; loss of some pets by Mr. and Mrs. Phil Baker, and possible damage to boat and/or trailer; water damage inside post-office; water damage inside depot - about 14" deep in west end; much damage to automobiles and pick-ups parked by depot; trailers dam-

aged that were parked on west side of Kerr Mercantile on Downie St.; damage to fence and all merchandise in back lot of Kerr Mercantile Co.; water damage in some houses on and near Downie St. east of Memorial Park, which was cluttered with debris; severe damage to street particularly on east end of Downie, the topping on east side of post office, fence on back of post office property, damage to topping of all the streets where they run into Downie St.; high water in the school tax office building.

Wolfcamp Gas In Mitchell Well

C & K Petroleum Inc., Midland, took five-point gauges and has shut in to calculate absolute open flow potential at its No. 1 Keith Mitchell, in section 12, Block 1, in the CCSDERGNG Survey, Wolfcamp discovery 1 2-mile west of the one-well KM (Ellenburger gas) field and one mile south and slightly east of the one-well Little Canyon (10,000 Strawn gas) field, 22 miles southwest of Sheffield.

The following gauges were reported through perforation at 9,185-668 feet; 4.4 million cubic feet of gas daily plus 28 barrels of fluid, in one hour on a 4-64-inch choke, with tubing pressure of 7,555 pounds; 4.5 million cubic feet daily, plus 12 barrels of fluid in one hour on a 32-64-inch choke, with tubing pressure of 8,095 pounds; 3.9 million cubic feet of gas daily plus 12 barrels of fluid in three hours on a 20-64th choke, with tubing pressure of 1,444 pounds; 1.9 million cubic feet of gas daily, plus eight barrels of fluid in eight hours, on a 12-64-inch choke with tubing pressure of 2,910 pounds; and 1.1 million cubic feet of gas daily, plus three barrels of fluid, in three hours on an 8-64-inch choke, with tubing pressure of 3,690 pounds.

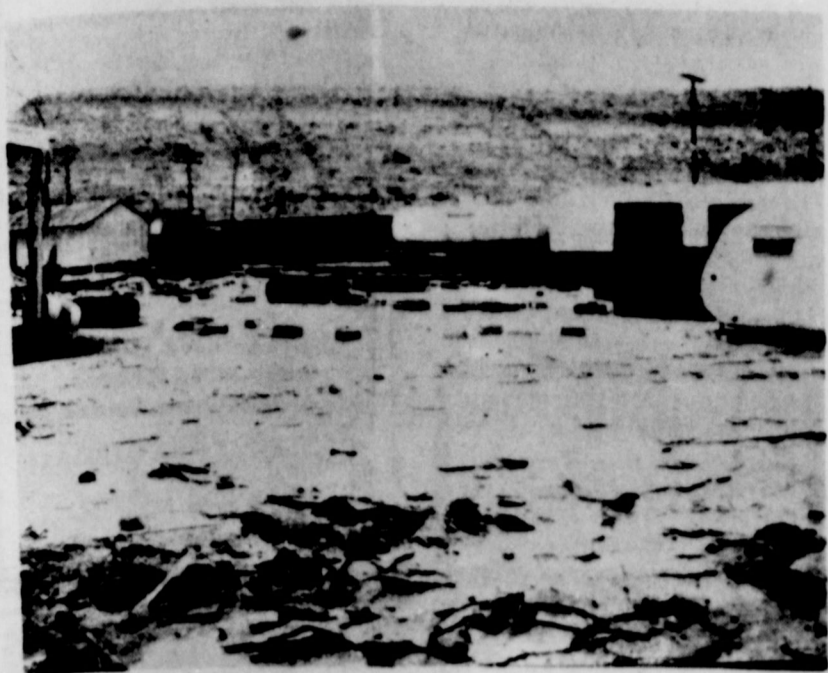

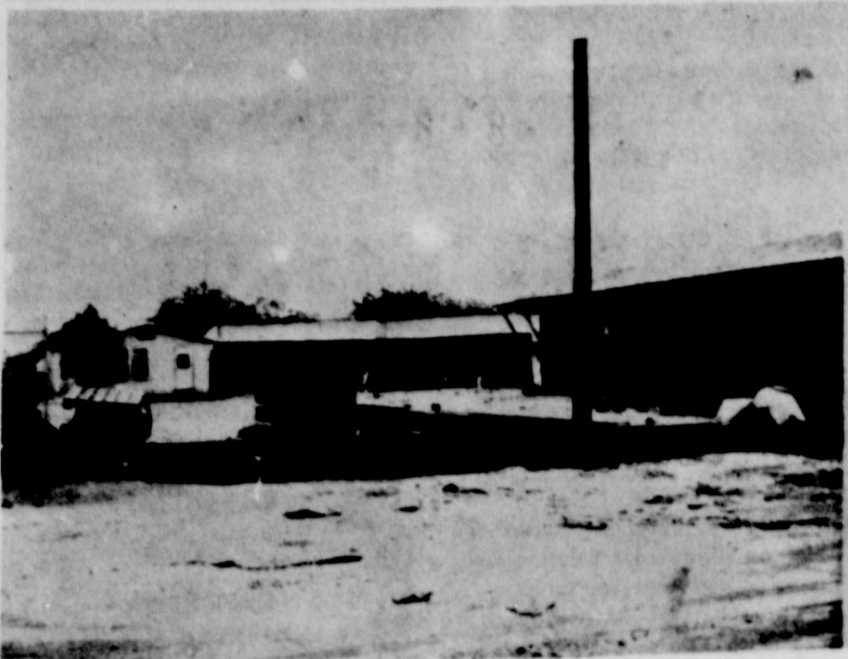

Increase Noted in Alien Arrests

W. Gilman, Southwest Regional Immigration Commissioner, said this week that illegal entry and smuggling activities are still on the increase all along the Southwest border. During a recent 23-period ending April 2, 1974, some 68,000 deportable aliens were located and narcotics with a street value of \$278,586 were seized by Border Patrol Agents. During March 1974, 951 smugglers and 4,565 smuggled aliens were arrested.

Activity in the Marfa Border Patrol Sector is proving no exception," Chief Patrol Agent Oscar D. Stevens commented. During a three-day period following the Easter holiday, 25 smuggled aliens and five smugglers were arrested. Presidio Border Patrol officers detected an illegal alien, Jose Rodriguez-Martin, driving an old station wagon and attempting to smuggle 12 other illegal aliens to Odessa for \$80 each. Rodriguez pleaded guilty in the U.S. Magistrate's Court in Pecos to illegal entry and was sentenced to 179 days to serve in prison.

Alpine Border Patrol Agents encountered a driver hauling three illegal aliens at their checkpoint in the early morning of April 17, 1974. The driver, Alfredo Saucedo-Callejon, attempted to claim U.S. citizenship and presented a fraudulent Texas birth certificate to support his claim, but later admitted that he was a Mexican illegally in the United States. Saucedo pleaded guilty to illegal entry before the U.S. magistrate in Pecos and was sentenced to six months imprisonment.

During the early morning of April 6, 1974, Marfa agents encountered a smuggler and six illegal aliens. Border Patrol records substantiated the aliens' claim to have not been arrested before, and since all had families in Mexico, were allowed to depart the United States. During the early morning of April 12, 1974, the same six were again arrested with another smuggler. On this occasion the aliens as well as the smuggler were prosecuted for illegal entry.

An Anti-Smuggling Agent from Marfa assisted by a Deputy United States Marshal from Pecos, armed with an arrest warrant, on April 16, 1974, took into custody Ignacio Chavez, a U.S. citizen from Pecos. Chavez was taken before the U.S. Magistrate in Pecos and charged with seven felony counts of knowingly transporting illegal aliens. Bond was set at \$15,000. Each felony count carries a maxi-

mum of five years' imprisonment and/or a \$2,000 fine upon conviction.

In preparation of their Golden Anniversary on May 28, 1974, Border Patrol Agents around the nation began adding a new shoulder patch to their uniform. Worn immediately below the regular emblem on the left sleeve, the new patch announces the 50th anniversary, 1924-1974. Plans are also being made to have a commemorative postal stamp issued in the Patrol's honor though no issue date has been announced, and each Border Patrol Sector Headquarters is preparing for open house on May 28, 1974, during which the public will be invited to visit.

Bishop Stephen A. Leven of the Catholic Diocese is enroute to Europe where he will visit Rome.

Each five years United States bishops are requested to make their "ad Limina Apostolorum" (to the threshold of the Apostles).

Enroute, Bishop Leven will ordain the deacons of his alma mater, the American College at Louvain, Belgium. On his return from Rome, he hopes to make a pilgrimage to the Shrine of the Sacred Heart at Paray-le-monial in France. This pilgrimage is in keeping with the Vigil of the Holy Year proclaimed by the

Holy Father for 1975. The Year of Vigil includes preparation by Catholics throughout the world with themes of penance and reconciliation.

He also intends to visit the Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes and the Shrine of the Miraculous Medal in Paris.

Help For Sick Retired People Is Explained

The Internal Revenue Service has announced that taxpayers retired on disability before reaching mandatory retirement age can apply the sick pay exclusion to their disability payments. IRS says it will follow this rule in settling refund claims pending the issuance of revised regulations.

Generally speaking, the exclusion allows employees who are absent from work because of personal injuries or sickness to omit sick pay from gross income, up to \$100 a week.

Previously, income tax regulations were interpreted to stop the sick pay exclusion when disability retirees reached the earliest retirement age provided in their pension or annuity plan. Recent court cases have held that interpretation to be invalid. The result is that the sick pay exclusion can now be applied until the retiree reaches mandatory retirement age.

Taxpayers can file amended tax returns on Form 1040X, or claims for refund on Form 843, claiming the sick pay exclusion. The forms generally must be filed within three years from the due date of the return for the year in which a refund of taxes is claimed.

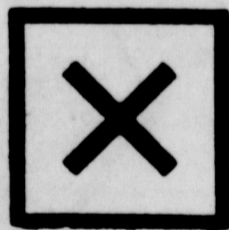
