## It Depends



We had several people ask about "the secret" mentioned last week. We were not kidding about not knowing more about it, other than who said it.

Certainly, the person who told us might be a clue to at least the subject or nature of "the secret", but not necessarily.

And, too, a person's evaluation of "big" news might differ entirely from our own, or from yours. That, too, depends on how you look at it!

We do not yet know any more than we did last week.

Every now and then someone comes up with questions about predictions on football scores, and we read about other newspapers who seem to place a lot of emphasis in predictions.

Some people are vitally interested in how certain sports-casters (?) predict the outcome of certain games as though the players are going to read those things to find out how hard or easy they are supposed to play.

And some people take a prediction as a "wish" or "desire" of the prognosticator. And there are those, even, who think that the game is almost "destined" to come out the way some people predict.

Football is a peculiar game! Last Friday night's game here against Rankin is a case in point. Few people we talked to expected the score to be in the 40-14 neighborhood - and that's a large neighborhood! And it could have been a lot different - either way!

In our humble opinion, the Sanderson Eagles played their best game yet of this season. They tackled and blocked more earnestly, and their ball carrying and passing efforts were with seemingly greater determination.

There is no reason to suggest that every second half should be like the first, but an extension of the power demonstrated by the Devils during the first half projected into the second half, would have put the score at 80-16. And by the same token, had the Rankin coaches began their substituting earlier, things might have been thrown out of balance for the Red Devils' offense, and the score could have been closer. The football is not round, and it can bounce in any direction!

The Rankin Red Devils were in Sanderson Friday night for a non-conference game with the Sanderson Eagles and won 40-14. Rankin is in Class A football and Sanderson in Class B.

All of Rankin's scoring was in the first half. In the first quarter, Fitzhugh, the quarterback went over from the 12-yard line and Schmitz kicked the extra point. Later, Cole took the ball over from about 1-foot away and the try for the extra point failed.

In the second period, Fitzhugh threw a pass to Plagens good for 17 yards and a touchdown. Black intercepted a pass and ran about 90 yards for the touchdown. Ja Chriesman was unable to catch the ball carrier because of the bad angle of pursuit, but the crowd enjoyed the foot race.

Black added another TD on a 64-yard run. The final score for Rankin was a 3-yard run by Cole.

The Rankin coaching staff shifted their offense during the second half to give experience to some reservists in important slots of their offense. Their defense was also liberally substituted during the second half.

Sanderson's first score was in the second period when Sanderson received the kick-off following the 90-yard pass interception run by Black of Rankin. Representatives from the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. will be in Sanderson the week of October 21 to meet with local clubs, to be in local businesses, and will show a film at the high school auditorium to familiarize local people in the process.

The film will be shown to high school and junior high school students, and all interested residents on Thursday, October 24, at a general assembly in the high school auditorium. The representatives of the phone company who are here will be glad to answer questions about the new DDD system so that the students may carry the information home to their parents.

## Border Patrol Reassigns Men To Stem Entries

The Sanderson complement of Border Patrolmen of the Department of Justice Immigration and Naturalization Service has a new patrolman this week and another is expected in a short time.

Jerry McCain joined the local team of Border Patrolmen Monday. He is a native of Mississippi and transferred here from California. His wife and three children plan to join him here in the near future and they will occupy the Ben Lockhart home after the Lockharts leave for Big Spring.

Reports from INS are that 452 reassignments will be made to increase the possibility of stemming the tide of illegal aliens from Mexico.

The report came from Leonard F. Chapman Jr., commissioner.

The action took effect September 30, the commissioner said.

The reassignment of 452 Border Patrol agents to "line watch" at the border is intended to act as a deterrent to attempts to cross the border illegally.

In addition, 100 immigration inspector positions will be transferred from northern border ports of entry to southwest border ports to inspect

aliens attempting to enter, with the objective of reducing the number who gain entry illegally through the southwest ports.

A total of 261 border patrol agents are being brought in from other parts of the country, and 161 additional patrolmen are being hired under the new INS budget.

Later this month, 120 patrolmen will be graduated from the Border Patrol Academy in Los Fresnos and all will be assigned to the border with Mexico, according to a news story.

In addition to increased manpower, INS is also being bolstered by new regulations.

The new regulations will not allow the extension of visitors' visas for more than six months; and another regulation ends the practice of granting extensions of time given deportable aliens under the voluntary deportation procedure. Instead of considering extensions of time for deportation, a specific time for voluntary deportation will be set and very rarely will this be extended, according to the news release.

Another method of bolstering the INS action will be the House Bill 982, which provides for punishment of employers who hire illegal aliens. The bill has already passed the House and is now waiting action in the Senate.

The scope of the problem of illegal entries from Mexico is provided in statistics from the INS for the past year.

According to these statistics

of the 600,000 illegal aliens apprehended in the U.S. last year, 85% were Mexican nationals. It was also stated that estimates were that five to seven million aliens are presently in the U.S.

Immigration records show that 71,929 deportable aliens were apprehended on the Mexican border during the period of August 5 to September 3 of this year, according to the news story.

During the same period of this year, Immigration officers seized marijuana and narcotics valued at more than \$2 million, arrested 464 smugglers of aliens, and 2,396 smuggled aliens, and discovered 1,576 counterfeit or altered immigration documents.

Also, 1,447 persons attempted entry by falsely claiming to be U.S. citizens.

Prior to the crack-down, only one out of five illegal

aliens was being intercepted at the U.S.-Mexico border because "of the limited INS force", the story continued.

The object of the new plan is to apprehend the illegal aliens as soon as possible after they cross the border and return them to Mexico immediately.

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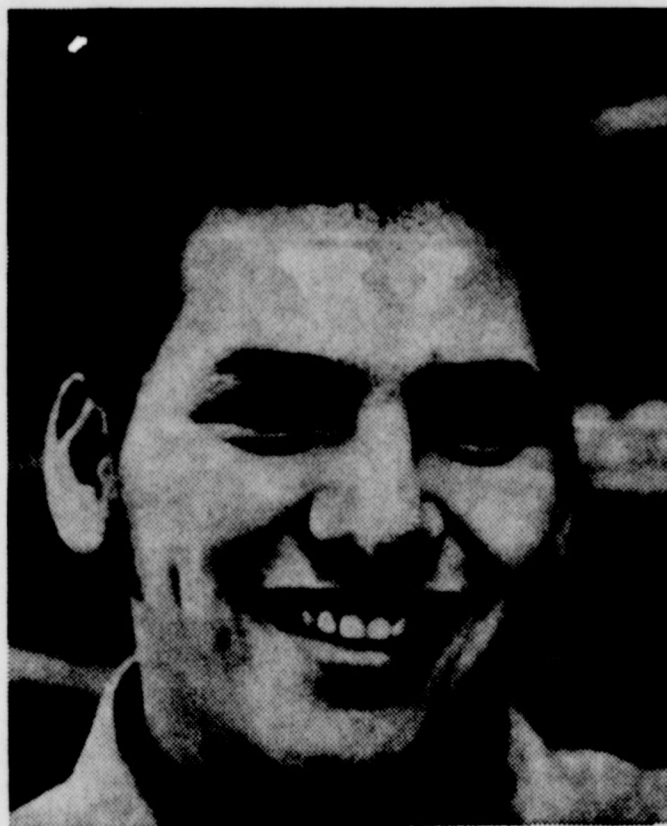

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## No-Stamp Letters Not Forwarded After November 17

Stampless letters will be returned to the sender or forwarded to the "dead letter" office, the U.S. Postal Service announced last week. No more postage-due mail will be forwarded, the agency said.

Authorities cited severe financial loss for the Postal Service, utility companies, banks, department stores, and other businesses as a result of postage-due mail. They also cited an increase in postage-due mail.

The new policy goes into effect November 17, according to the news release.

All unpaid mail after that date will be returned to the sender, or, should the envelope not bear a return address, it will go to the dead-letter office.

Now, unpaid mail generally is delivered to the addressee marked "Postage-due" and the addressee must pay the charge or refuse the mail.

The change also short-circuits a protest technique used some time ago in California primarily. Several groups there urged that utility bills be mailed without stamps in order to "strike back" at the utility companies.

Unaffected by the switch are business reply letters, federal mail, free mail delivery to the blind, armed forces mail, and keys and identification devices returned to owners.

Postal Service spokesmen pointed out that willfully depositing unpaid mail in a mailbox with intent to avoid payment of postage is an offense subject to a fine up to \$300.00.

## Southern Pacific Gets Contract For Truck Research

The Federal Railroad Administration has announced the award of a first-phase contract to Southern Pacific Transportation Company for a comprehensive research program on railroad freight car trucks, to be known as the Freight Car Truck Design Optimization Project, John W. Ingram, Federal Railroad Administrator, said the total three-phase program will take about 4-1/2 years and will cost approximately \$6 million.

"We're undertaking this program because we need new approaches to freight car truck design in the light of anticipated increases in rail traffic, improving freight car utilization, providing more efficient transportation service and improving safety," he added.

The study, he stated, will also analyze cost factors involved in freight car trucks that could aid the railroad industry in making investment decisions when replacing existing equipment or obtaining new rolling stock. Other anticipated benefits include the ability to provide truck manufacturers with guidelines to assist them in their design efforts.

"It has been over 20 years since fundamental changes have been made in truck design, and there has never been an economic basis for selecting new and improved freight car truck design," said William M. Jaekle, Southern Pacific's vice-president of engineer and research, who will oversee the project.

"With the opportunity the railroads now have for in-

creasing traffic and improving service, it is vitally important that improved gear be adopted by the rail industry".

Paul V. Garin, SP's assistant vice-president in charge of research, will provide general policy supervision for the research. He said the project will interact with the railroad industry, FRA, freight car truck and freight car builders and designers, universities, research institutes, and others to lend consultation to the project.

The project will include a variety of laboratory, simulator, and field tests under railroad operating conditions, as well as analytical and computerized model studies.

Initial testing of new and improved trucks will be conducted on Southern Pacific lines. Additional testing is planned at the Federal Railroad Administration's High Speed Ground Test Center facilities, now under construction at Pueblo, Colo. Included here will be checkouts in the department's \$25 million Vehicle Dynamics Laboratory and on the Train Dynamics Track, expected to be the basic testing facilities for railroad freight equipment in the future.

The \$887,000 first phase of the program which has been contracted will take about 10 months, and will cover technical and economical descriptions of existing trucks, as well as preliminary performance and testing standards. A longer second phase will cover final specifications for conventional trucks, characterize the performance and economics of special-service trucks, and create preliminary specifications on performance and testing requirements for the special service trucks. The final phase will deal with research on unconventional carbody support systems, and the preparation

of final specifications for special-service trucks.

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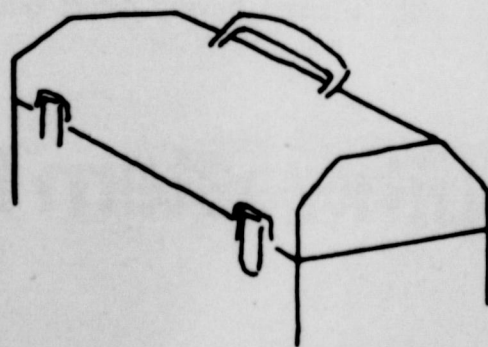

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**Medicare Costs Upped This Month**

Medicare premiums increased July 1, according to Erven L. Fisher Jr., social security manager in Odessa. In accordance with legal regulations, premiums for Medicare must be raised each year that medical and hospital costs increase. Supplementary medical insurance (doctor bill) premiums will go from \$6.30 monthly to \$6.70 monthly this July, Fisher explained. The monthly cost of the hospital insurance part of Medicare for those not qualified because of insufficient work in employment covered by social security will go from \$33 to \$36, he added. "Impact of the increased premiums will be negligible to most social security bene-
