Seal Coating Starts SCS Crew Here For New Survey

Crews of Jones Bros. Construction Co. of Odessa arrived in Sanderson this week and began working on the seal-coating and surfacing of certain Sanderson streets on Tuesday morning.

Some of the streets in the Lomita Terrace Addition of Sanderson will have a black-top surface, as will the east extension of Downie St. and one block of a street east of Fifth St. that was formerly an alley, and other short areas of streets that had the surfacing washed off by high water.

There will also be a seal-coat applied to all of the presently surfaced streets in town.

The work of repairing holes in the surface, repairing the shoulders of the black-top, etc., has been going on for several weeks by county employees in preparation for the surfacing and seal-coating.

All seal-coating costs are being borne by the county and half of the cost of the newly-surfaced streets is also borne by the county with the property owner paying for the other half. Property owners who wanted a black-top applied to areas of their property were required to pay for all of that cost.

SCS Crew Here For New Survey

Four members of the Watershed Planning Staff of the Soil Conservation Service state office in San Marcos were in Sanderson last week. The crew included Allan Colwick, Doug Bartoush, Buel Peevey, and Larry Goertz.

The men were sent to Sanderson to review the possible re-location of a proposed dam site planned on the W. G. Downie ranch on the 3-Mile Watershed north of Sanderson.

The group met with the officers and directors of the Rio Grande - Pecos River Soil Conservation District, Terrell County Commissioners Court members, and Larry Seymore, local SCS district conservationist.

The group explained to the commissioners and soil and water conservation district directors - co-sponsors of the flood control project - that they were going to make an "eyeball survey" of possibilities of a new location for the controversial damsite - Site 7 - on the Downie ranch and that Mr. Goertz and a survey party from the Soil Conservation Service would be in Sanderson Monday to begin work Tuesday on making new surveys for possible re-location sites. The SCS men also stated that they were going to meet with Mr. and Mrs. Downie last week, which they did to talk with them about the presently proposed Site 7 and possible new sites.

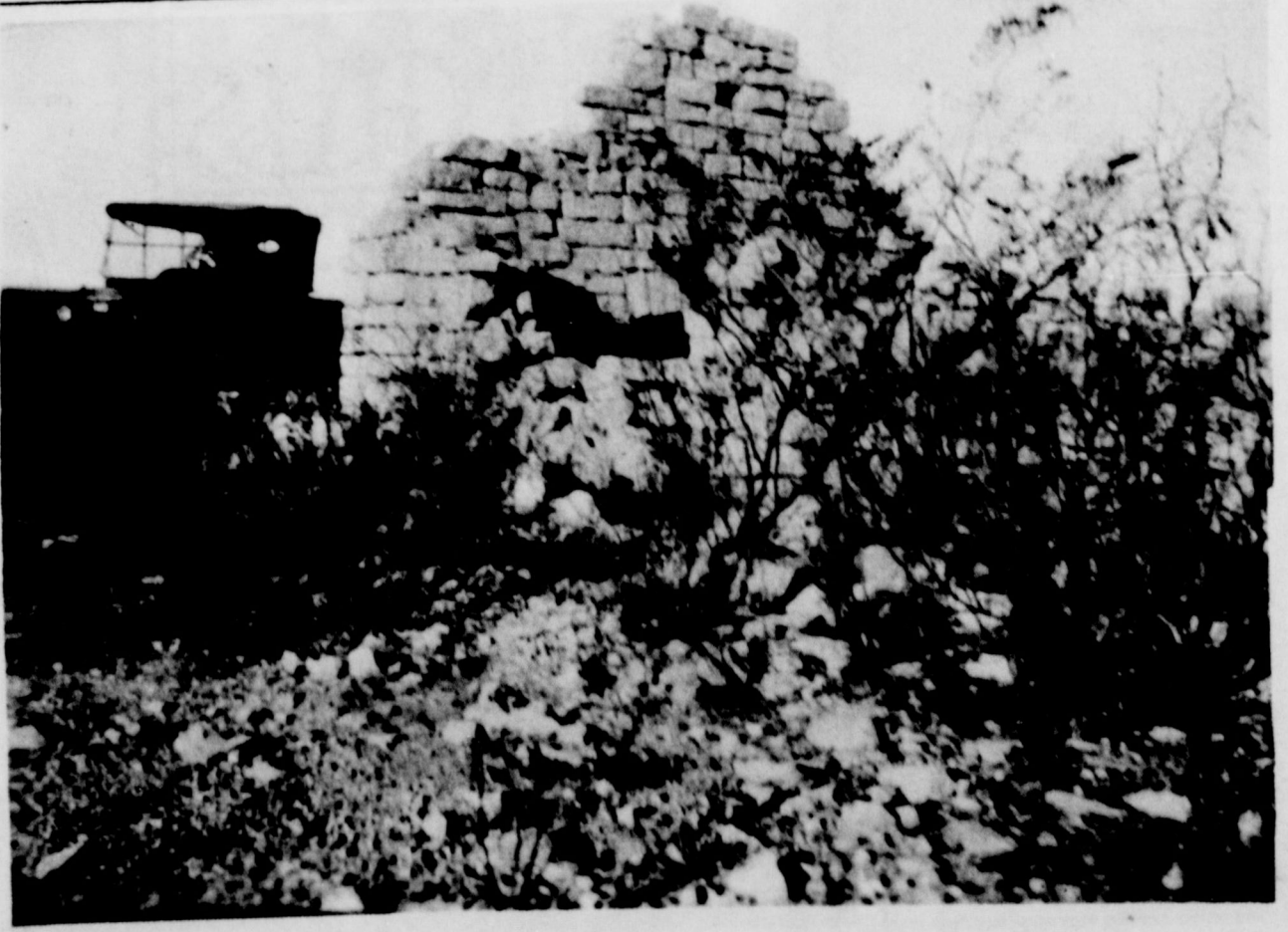
The San Marcos Watershed Planning Staff members made two locations for possible sites to be surveyed by the crew this week.

Re-Entry Planned In County Hole

Cabot Corp., Pampa, will re-enter and plug back to 9,000 feet for wildcat tests at the former The Ohio Co. No. 1-TA Ohio-Pure-University, Terrell County, 14,024-foot failure, 16 miles southwest of Sheffield, three miles south of the depleted Schuler, South (Leonard) field and nine miles north of the Little Canyon (10,000 Strawn) field.

It was plugged and abandoned May 8, 1959. The following tops were picked on elevation of 2,468 feet; Strawn lime 10,575 feet; Woodford 11,028 feet; Devonian 11,208 feet; Connell 13,204 feet; Joins, 13,270 feet; and Ellenburger 13,345 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the north and 1,650 feet from the east lines of 13-37-University.

It was pointed out that following the work of the survey crew this week, they would return to San Marcos to compile the information determined by the survey to make suggestions of feasibility, practicability, costs, involvements, etc., of the two new proposed sites. Following the determination of all the information necessary and possible by the survey, the detailed report would be made to the Terrell County Commissioners and they would proceed with one of the sites - either the present Site 7, or a new site - for completion of the easement-securing and other details for turning over all easements for dam construction and channelization work to the SCS. The final decision for a location of a dam in the Site 7 area would be the responsibility of the Terrell County Commissioners.

The survey crew here this week also had some other minor work to perform in order to clarify some details of another proposed watershed flood control site.

There was no date set for possible revelation of details of the work of the survey crew that was here this week.

Absentee Voting Now Possible

If you qualify for voting absentee in the general election on November 5 you may do so at the office of County Clerk Ruel Adams or request a ballot by mail for that purpose prior to the deadline for voting absentee.

The privilege of voting absentee is for those who will not be able to vote in the general election for certain reasons, and the person must sign an affidavit that he will qualify for voting absentee for one or more of the reasons.

There is an urgency being placed on all qualified voters casting their ballots at this election in order to protect their franchise at citizens. It has been said that the quickest way to lose the privilege of voting is to not exercise the obligation of voting absentee, with Friday, November 1, as the last day.

The ballot will have columns for the following parties: Democrat, Republican, American, Raza Unitda, Socialist Workers, and Write-in. A person who wants to vote a straight party ticket may mark the box at the head of the column with an X and need not mark each individual office or candidate below. Split-ticket voting necessitates marking the box beside the name of each candidate for whom a voter wishes to vote.

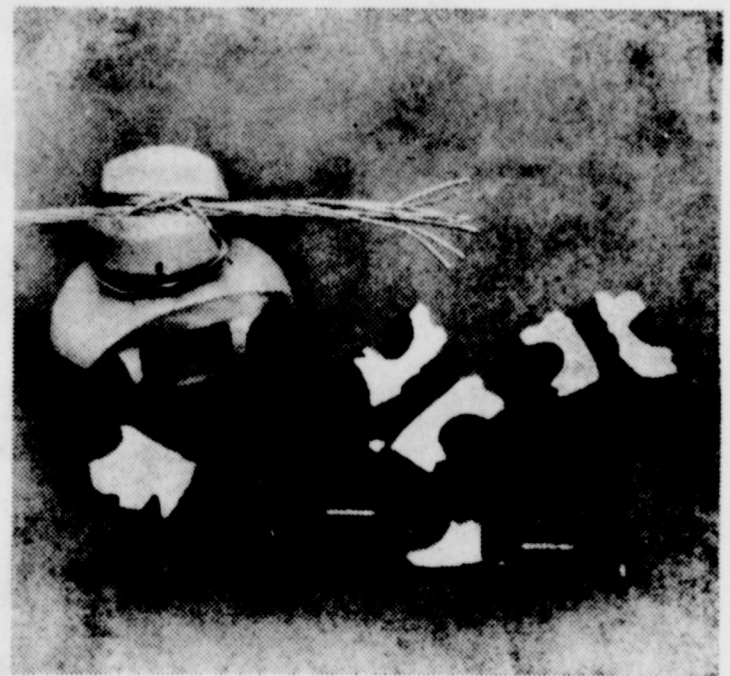

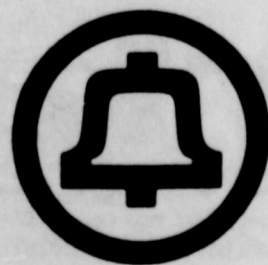

Blood Pressure Check Good Life Insurance

There will be a free blood pressure clinic at the Halloween carnival Thursday, October 31, and all local residents are urged to have their blood pressure taken. A nurse will be on duty to record the blood pressure of each person taking advantage of the clinic and each person is asked to give only a minimum bit of information so that reference may be made in case of question or necessity by the nurse.

A periodic blood pressure check for every member of the family can help avoid serious health problems and save lives.

If the check reveals high blood pressure, it can be treated and controlled by following a doctor's directions, usually including medication.

But uncontrolled, high blood pressure can kill. It often leads to stroke, heart failure and kidney failure. In all, high blood pressure will help kill about 250,000 Americans this year, and cripple hundreds of thousands more. It's one of the biggest causes of death in the country. Voc. Rehab. Helps Save SS Funds

The Social Security Administration has saved \$189 million from 1966 to 1974 through vocational rehabilitation. Erven L. Fisher Jr., district manager of the Odessa Social Security Office, announced today that during this 8-year period over 56,000 beneficiaries have been provided rehabilitation services.

As a result, in excess of 14,000 beneficiaries have been rehabilitated, and their social security checks stopped. This means that 1 out of every 4 disabled individuals who are provided services are able to return to gainful work.

The Social Security Administration, by law, is required to refer disability beneficiaries for vocational rehabilitation so that as many as possible can be restored to useful productive lives. Because of the effectiveness of this program, the Administration saves about \$2.50 in benefit payments for every trust fund dollar spent for vocational rehabilitation, noted Fisher.

Obviously, not all people benefit from vocational rehabilitation. For this reason, only disability beneficiaries who appear to have potential for rehabilitation are referred to the Texas Vocational Rehabilitation Agency for their services.

1-Plus Dialing To Start Tuesday

One-Plus Dialing (Direct Dialing) is scheduled for introduction in Sanderson on October 29.

"Southwestern Bell is pleased to provide this service improvement for Sanderson telephone customers," said Don Lincoln, manager for the company.

Testing of equipment for the One-Plus conversion is virtually complete, according to Lincoln.

With One-Plus, telephone customers may dial their own station-to-station long distance calls.

A maximum of 11 digits will be dialed on a One-Plus call. Customers will dial "1" for access to the direct dial network, then three-digit Area Code, and the seven-digit number being called.

For calls to other telephones in the 915 area, Sanderson residents will dial only eight digits -- "1", and then the seven-digit number. The 915 Area Code will not be required.

One-Plus calls will be billed automatically, Lincoln pointed out. The equipment currently being installed will identify the calling number, the called number, the time the call number answered and the time the call ended.

All this information is punched into paper tape. The tape in turn is put through a computer which compiles all information on the calls for billing purposes.
