We are tempted to make an offer to kiss all the young people in town for their excellent behavior on Halloween night, except that there are some pretty big young men who fit into that category that would probably not stand still for the kiss. And on account of the beauty of all the young ladies and little girls, there are probably some who would also not stand still. But the lack of vandalism and destruction by pranksters is worthy of more than just a mention. Congratulations and thanks for showing the town what you really are!

We have thought about beginning a crusade to abolish Halloween over the nation. We don't think it will get off the ground, but it might do some good. And we feel that our cause is just -- we think so much of the youngsters.

In the first place, the occasion is rooted in paganism. In the second place the holiday is being the source of some tragedies in many cities of our state and nation and there is not much point in continuing something that has such deep tragedy attached to it.

We thought that the depths of depravity, insanity, or ignorance had been reached when we read about apples containing razor blades, popcorn balls containing needles, candy being doctored with laxatives and given on unsuspecting and innocent children. But this Halloween, we read about a little boy who died of cyanide poisoning, the cyanide having been mixed with the gelatine-like crystals in the long hollow tube. Eagles Move To Capture Crown Of Grid District

The Sanderson Eagles moved closer to a district title by defeating the Grandfalls Cowboys 17-12 there Friday night of last week. The game was thought by some to be the contest between the two strongest teams in the district.

The first score in the game was a field goal by Kendall Billings from 22-yards out. The Cowboys later got on the scoreboard with a five-yard run by Dennis Andrews to give them a 6-3 lead at the half-time buzzer.

The third period was also scoreless. In the fourth frame, Grandfalls put another six points on the board with a 12-yard touchdown run. The extra-point try failed. It was the last score for the hosts.

The Eagles got six points on a pass from Marvin Davis to Danny Montalvo, with Billings adding the extra point. With only one minute remaining on the clock, Carlos Munoz ran 65 yards to give the lead to the Eagles with the score, and another point was added by Billings' kick.

Grandfalls led Sanderson 15-12 in first downs, Sanderson had 214 yards rushing and 90 yards passing to lead in total yards of 304. Grandfalls had 180 yards rushing and 42 passing for a total of 222. The Eagles passing game was three complete of seven tried, while the Cowboys had three complete of 13 tried, also losing the ball twice to interceptions. Sanderson had 1 fumble lost. The Eagles were penalized five times for 45 yards and the Cowboys received 6 penalties for 50 yards.

Sanderson had fewer turnovers from punts, only 2, and the Cowboys had four turnovers by punting.

School To Build Track at Eagle Field

The revelation of the plans of the school to build a track came last week with the submission of a "notice for bids" by the Terrell County Independent School District. School Superintendent C.B. Card stated Monday morning that the school board had voted at a previous meeting to spend as much as \$10,000 for the construction of a track. The notice for bids is to secure the cinders, bonding materials, curbing, etc. to contain the cinders, and the Eagle Boosters will furnish labor for the project, according to Mr. Card.

The bid calls for 465 tons of cinders of a certain specification and 3,000 feet of pre-cast curb tile to be delivered in the local rail yard.

Mr. Card stated that a county maintainer had been used to level the area for the track, which is north of the football field and a trench will be dug for the curbing.

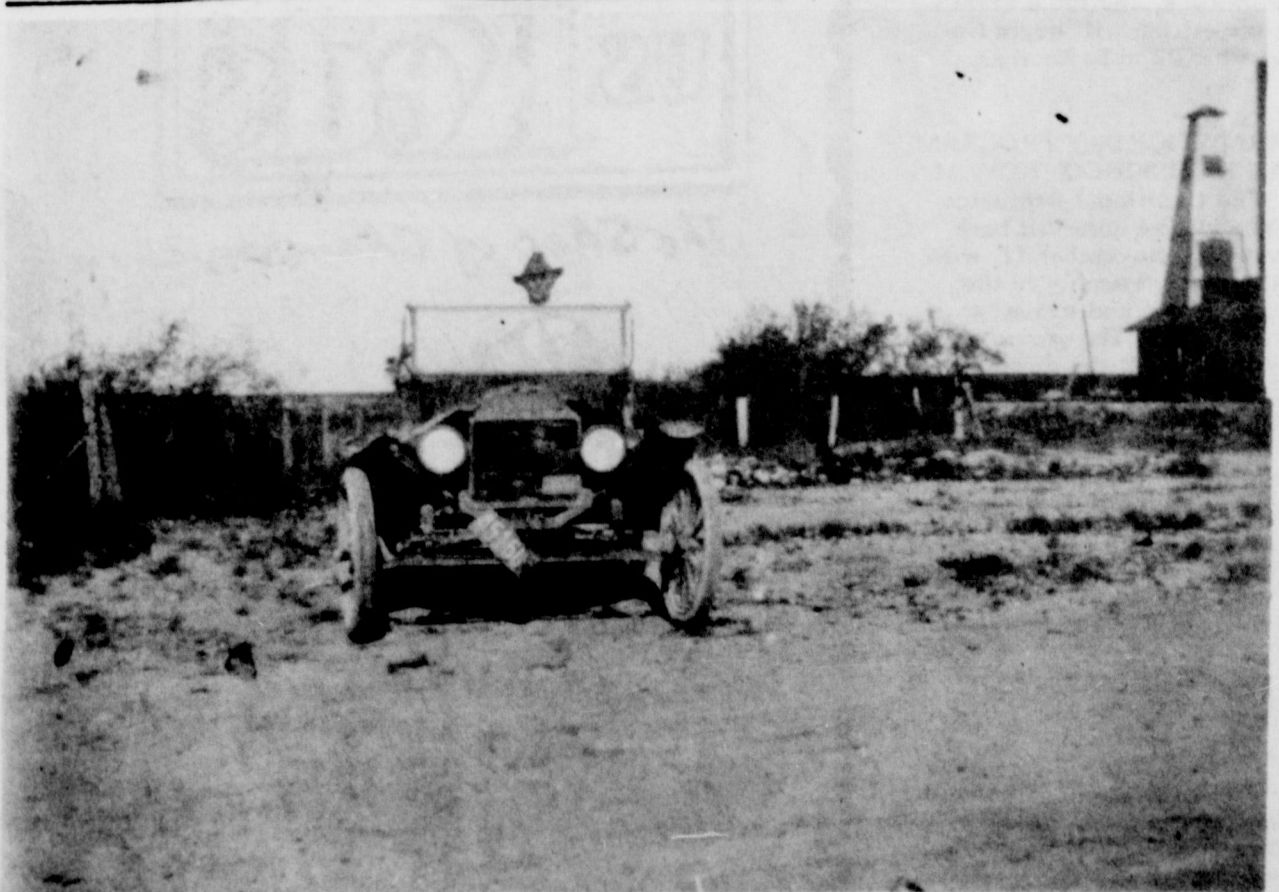
Plans are to install the curbing and cinders as soon as possible following their arrival, according to Mr. Card.

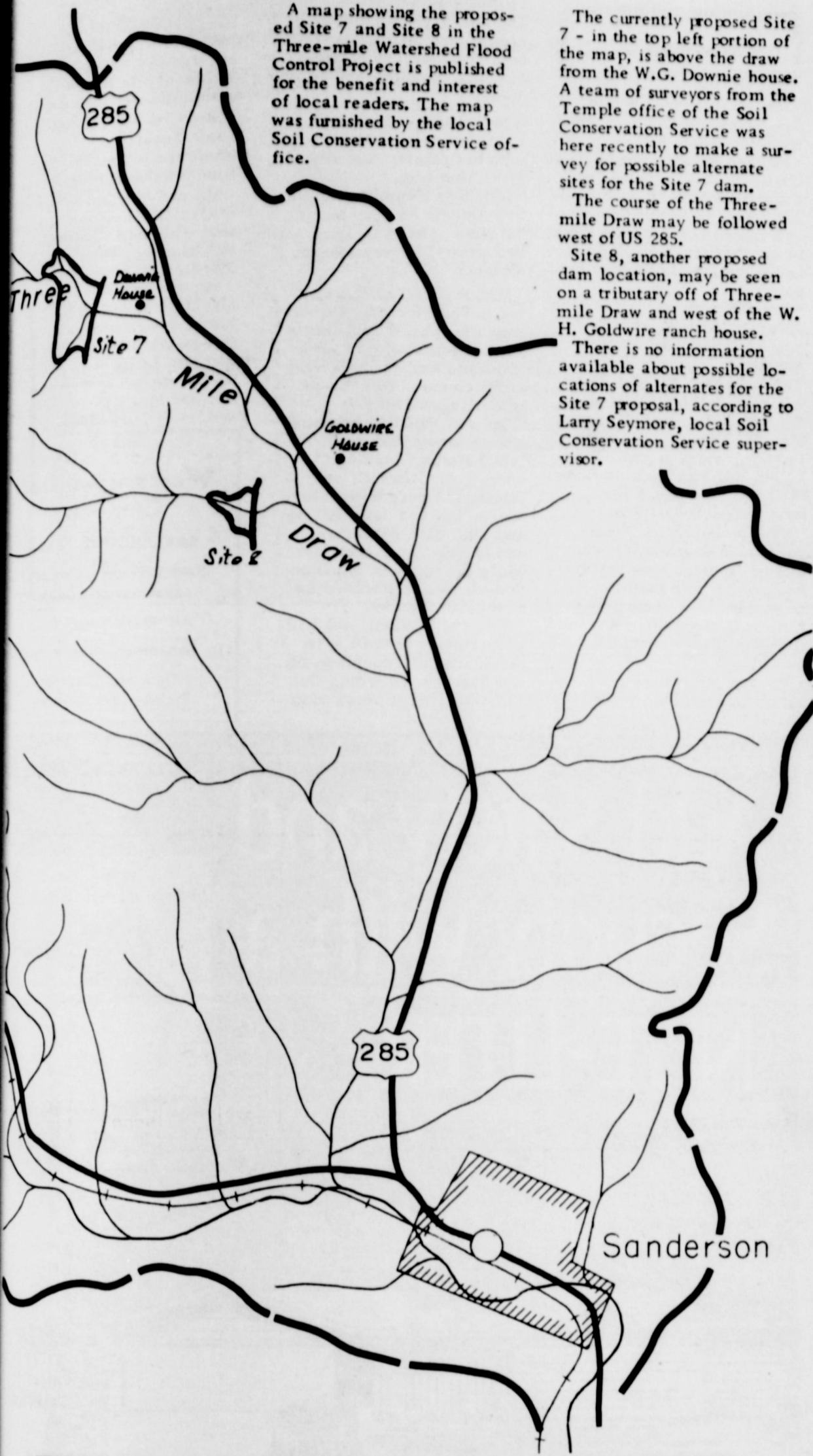

A map showing the proposed Site 7 and Site 8 in the Three-mile Watershed Flood Control Project is published for the benefit and interest of local readers. The map was furnished by the local Soil Conservation Service office.



The currently proposed Site 7 - in the top left portion of the map, is above the draw from the W.G. Downie house. A team of surveyors from the Temple office of the Soil Conservation Service was here recently to make a survey for possible alternate sites for the Site 7 dam.

The course of the Three-mile Draw may be followed west of US 285.

Site 8, another proposed dam location, may be seen on a tributary off of Three-mile Draw and west of the W. H. Goldwire ranch house.

There is no information available about possible locations of alternates for the Site 7 proposal, according to Larry Seymore, local Soil Conservation Service supervisor.

Terrell Students Lead In Polio Protection Figures

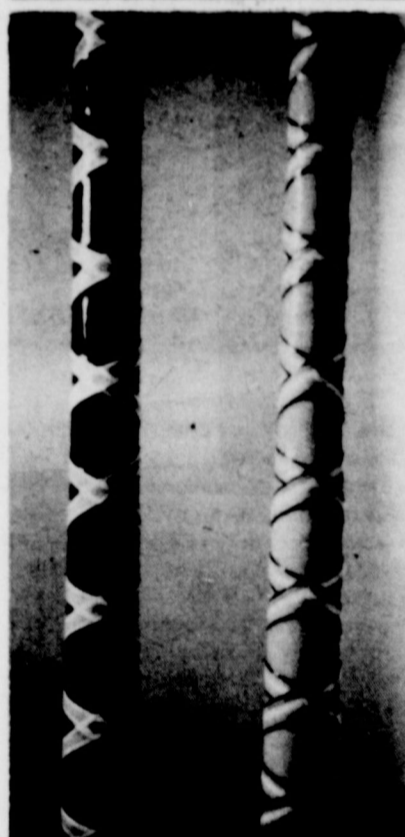
Students in Terrell County led those of other Rio Grande border counties in percentage figures of protection against poliomyelitis, according to figures released by the Texas State Department of Health last week. The survey was made of students under 19 years of age in 14 counties along the Rio Grande.

The story released by the Texas State Department of Health stated that El Paso County had the largest amount protected with 97% and Val Verde the least amount protected with 82%, but the figures in the story show that Terrell County had 98% of the students protected - 404 of 412 students. Brewster County has 96% and Presidio County 93%.

Only counties bordering the Rio Grande were surveyed.

Fishing as a hobby led to the business of selling custom-made fishing rods for T.O. "Buddy" Moore Jr. He also makes plastic worms and other items for fishermen.

Moore, who is a conductor on the Southern Pacific Railroad, uses his spare time in butte-wrapping fishing rods with fancy designs, using the colors, design, and type of rod that the customer selects.

Shown in the picture above are the double-diamond wrap he made with light-colored threads on the black rod, and the chevron design made with three colors of thread

on the light-colored rod. The design is "built up" by wrapping an individual thread the length of the butte of the rod using the colors and wrap to build the pattern desired. The rod is then varnished. The guides on the rod are wrapped in colors to match the butte wrapping and then personalized, if it is the wish of the owner or donor.

Blank rods are available in several lengths, colors, and styles to suit the fisherman.

Moore explained that the butte wrapping on the rod not only strengthened the rod, but also gave an individually decorative and attractive appearance to the fishing rod. He added that the custom-wrapping costs from \$35.00 up, depending on the size of the rod, quality of the rod, and design and extent of the wrapping.

A study of the chevron design and an effort to understand how the pattern is built with the individual threads being continuously wrapped around the length of the butte end of the rod indicates the tediousness involved in the intricate work in the hobby.

Moore stated that he enjoys his wrapping hobby, but likes to have some time to try out a rod now and then with a fishing trip. He concentrates on bass fishing, and fishing pictures and samples of his success verify an accomplished ability due either to his pretty rods, knowledge of fishing, or a lot of luck not usually found by other fishermen.

Wool Incentive Expected This Year

"Sheep producers may get incentive payments for wool under the Wool Act for 1974 marketing," said Monty Harkins, chairman of Terrell County ASC Committee. "Prices for this year's wool are expected to average between 60 and 65 cents per pound. That's below the 72-cent incentive price."

The 1974 price drop reflects a decline in wool demand. Mill use of raw wool has declined sharply because of increased competition from manmade fibers and because of a general downturn in mill activity. Mill use of apparel wool may decline to 80-85 million million pounds, scoured basis, this year. Manmade fibers also made sharp inroads into carpet wool last year.

Referendum Vote By Ranchers For Promoting Wool

Ballots have been mailed to all known wool and lamb producers in Terrell County to enable them to vote in a national referendum on a proposed new agreement for the advertising and promotion of wool, according to Monty Harkins, chairman of the Terrell County ASC Committee.

The mail referendum being held November 4 through 15 will enable producers to vote their approval or disapproval of a new agreement between USDA and the American Sheep Producers Council which provides for the USDA to withhold a part of any wool payments that might be made to producers to finance advertising and sales promotion by ASPC for wool and lamb. The withheld funds would also be used by ASPC to develop and disseminate information on product quality, production management and marketing improvement for wool and sheep.

Wool and lamb producers also were mailed an explanatory statement about the proposed new agreement along with the ballot. The new agreement is similar to one approved by producers in 1971. If approval is voted, payment deductions of up to 1-1/2¢ a pound on shorn wool and 7-1/2¢ a hundred-weight on unshorn lambs would be made, the same as the maximum deduction rate for the 1966-72 period. Since no wool payments were made for the 1973 marketings, there were no deductions for that year.

Harkins emphasized the neutrality of the U.S. Department of Agriculture on the proposal being submitted to wool and lamb producers. "Our sole interest is in conducting a fair and impartial referendum," he said.

Anyone may vote who has owned sheep 6 months old or older for at least 30 consecutive days during 1973. Votes may be cast by individuals, corporations, or partnerships.

Any producer who is not already known to the county ASCS office is urged by the Terrell County ASC Committee to contact the ASCS office to receive a ballot and explanatory material. The Terrell County ASCS office is located at Alpine at 211 West Holland. The telephone number is 837-2325, and the post office box number is 397 in Alpine, 79830. Office hours in Sanderson are each Wednesday from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Soil Conservation Service office.

Any eligible producer may vote in the referendum.

SCHOOL HOLIDAY FRIDAY

There will be no classes for pupils of the Sanderson schools Friday. Teachers will go to Midland for a district TSTA meeting. The meeting will be an in-service training day for teachers and a holiday for the students.

The next scheduled holiday for teachers and pupils is November 28-29, when classes will be dismissed for Thanksgiving.

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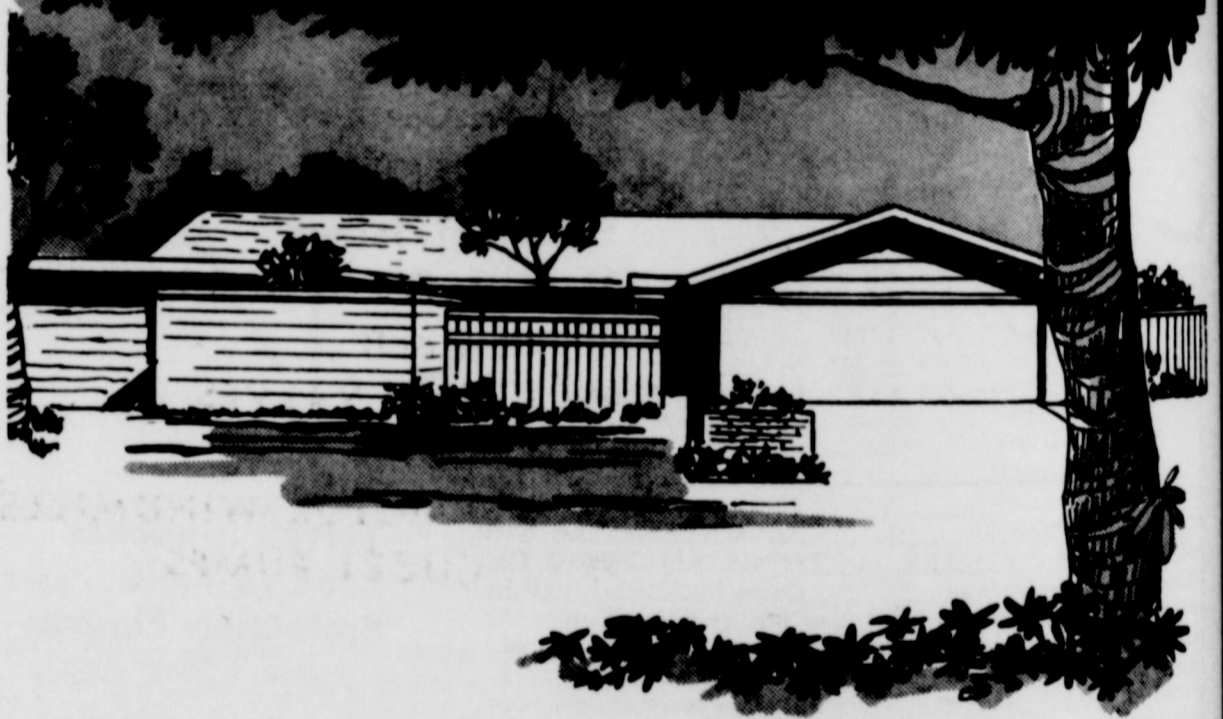
