Eagles One Game Away From Title After Imperial Win

The Sanderson Eagles won over the Imperial Longhorns on a sloppy, wet, and cold gridiron here Friday night and moved one step closer to a district championship in their first year back in Class B football. The Eagles will face Dell City here Friday night for the title game.

Imperial and Grandfalls each have one loss in district competition and they will meet Friday night in their battle for a second-place title or a tie for first place, depending on the outcome of the Sanderson-Dell City game.

Neither the Eagles nor the Longhorns were able to unleash their best offense or defense Friday night due to the miserable conditions under which they were playing.

Sanderson made all of their points in the first half and the Longhorns hit the scoreboard in the second half, but with only one touchdown.

Kendall Billings ran 23 yards for the first score by the Eagle squad, then he kicked the extra point.

In the second period, Frankie Flores went over from the 2yard mark and Billings again kicked the extra point. During the same period, Marvin Davis threw a pass to Ricky Marquez who completed a 65-yard touchdown run. The try for the extra point was not successful.

2 More Weeks To Deer Season Deer season west of the Pe-

cos River is only two weeks away.

The season is from November 30 through December 15. The bag limit is four deer, including not more than two mule deer, one mule deer buck, two white-tailed deer, and three antlerless deer.

The javelina season opened October 1 and runs through January 1. Limit is two javelinas per season.

Quail season starts November 16 and will end February 2. Bag limits are 12 a day and 36 in possession.

The seasons and bag limits apply to Terrell, Brewster, Reeves, Culberson, Jeff Davis, Pecos, and Presidio Counties.

There will be a special whitetail season from December 16 through December 22

in Terrell and Pecos Counties. Hunting is expected to be difficult in Terrell County with the rains of this fall ruining many roads and making vehicular travel difficult,

plus the wet conditions causing off-road travel to be difficult, but also not good for the pasturelands.

Varying reports are coming in about the condition of the buck deer seen in various parts of the county. Most reports agree that the deer are in good shape, but most horns of the smaller size and few trophy racks.







Terrell Co. Leads Screwworm Cases In This Area

Terrell County has the dubious distinction of leading other counties in the Big Bend area in screwworm cases in the month of October and also during 1974. The figures were released by Dr. M.E. Meadows, director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture Screwworm Eradication Program. He reports 157 cases of this

parasite were confirmed in Big Bend area counties during October: Brewster 18, El Paso 2; Jeff Davis 9, Pecos 27, Presidio 16, Reeves 5, and Terrell 80. Cattle were the host for 53 cases and sheep for 75 cases.

The Screwworm Eradication Program, administered by the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, releases sterile but sexually active flies to mate with fertile wild flies. The sterile flies are released in the area of known screwworm infestations. A female fly mates only once in her lifetime, and if she mates with a sterile male, eggs she produces will not hatch, stopping the cycle.

For the first 10 months of 1974, the counties and cases were: Brewster 78, El Paso 14, Jeff Davis, 17, Pecos 111, Presidio 29, Reeves 6, Terrell 243, Culberson 2, and Hudspeth 1.

Midland, No. 1-B-18 Allison, seven miles south of Sheffield, for a calculated absolute open flow of 1,450,-000 cubic feet of gas per day. Production was through perforations at 9,095-2-1 feet,





82 Graduate From BP Academy

Light-two new Border Patrol Agents were graduated from the Immigration and Naturalization Service Border Patrol Academy last week and immediately assigned to the Southwest Border to further bolster efforts to reduce the flow of illegal aliens crossing into the United States.

The new agents join 452 other veteran Border Patrolmen who are being reassigned to "Line Watch" activities along the Mexican Border. The stepped-up activity at the border reflects a great. er concentration of effort by INS to deter illegal entry of aliens at the border before they can find employment in the United States.

The latest Border Patrol class is the third to graduate this year. A total of 183 new agents have graduated from the Academy in calendar 1974, bringing the on-duty Border Patrol force to 1,610. All of the new agents have been assigned to the Southwest Region. A fourth class will be started in November and is expected to number about 150 new agents.

The present class is the 105th to graduate from the Academy which was formally opened in 1940. A total of 7,243 agents have been graduated. The Border Patrol celebrated the 50th Anniversary of its founding on May 24 of this year.

The Academy program includes 14 weeks of classroom activity and two weeks of field training. Classroom emphasis is on Immigration Law, Court Procedure, use of firearms and knowledge of the Spanish language. Profic+ iency in Spanish is a requirement for duty in the Border Patrol, and trainees who do not acquire such proficiency within 10 months after entering on duty are released from the force.

Leonard F. Chapman Jr., commissioner of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, addressed the graduating class and warned the graduates that the nation is on the verge of a national crisis in dealing with illegal aliens. He said INS appr hended nearly 800,000 illegals in the last fiscal year, with the Border Patrol accounting for 635,000 of that number. Despite this, only about one of every three or four who entered illegally

Lawyer Referral Set Up By Bar

The State Bar of Texas' new statewide lawyer referral service apparently is helping fill a need, the Bar reported last week.

In the first two months, some 380 callers, whose problems were determined to involve a legal matter had immediate appointments made for them with lawyers in their own areas. The fee is only \$10 for up to onehalf an hour of legal consultation.

Some callers whose problems turned out not to be in the legal area were referred to other agencies for possible help.

"The good initial response to our new public service is most gratifying," commented Bar president Lloyd Lochridge of Austin, "because that tell us the service has been needed."

The toll-free WATS-line calls (the number is 800-292-9690) from anywhere in the state end up in the State Bar's Lawyer Referral Service Office where a staff member determines whether the callers' problems are legal in nature; if they are, immediate appointments with attorneys are made.

The Lawyer Referral Service was established by the Bar to make legal services easily and inexpenisvely available to persons who do not know a lawyer.

Aerosol Hair Spray May Be Going

Aerosol hair sprays may be on the way out, according to one authority.

"Reports of malfunctions and health hazards with aerosol sprays have caused the industry to turn to pump-style bottles for hair spray. Mrs. Janice Carberry, family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, noted.

She said that for years pump bottles were used for dispensing hair conditioners and setting lotions, but now they will be used for hair spray, too.

"Hair sprays will have to be reformulated before they can be put into non-aerosol packages. Only 50 to 70 per cent of the spray is active ingredients -- the rest is propellents. Ingredients in the pump-style bottles can be totally active."

The cost of pump-style sprays may be comparable to aerosols, but they will be more effective at holding the hair. That's because each pumping action will release more liquid and pure hair spray, she said.
