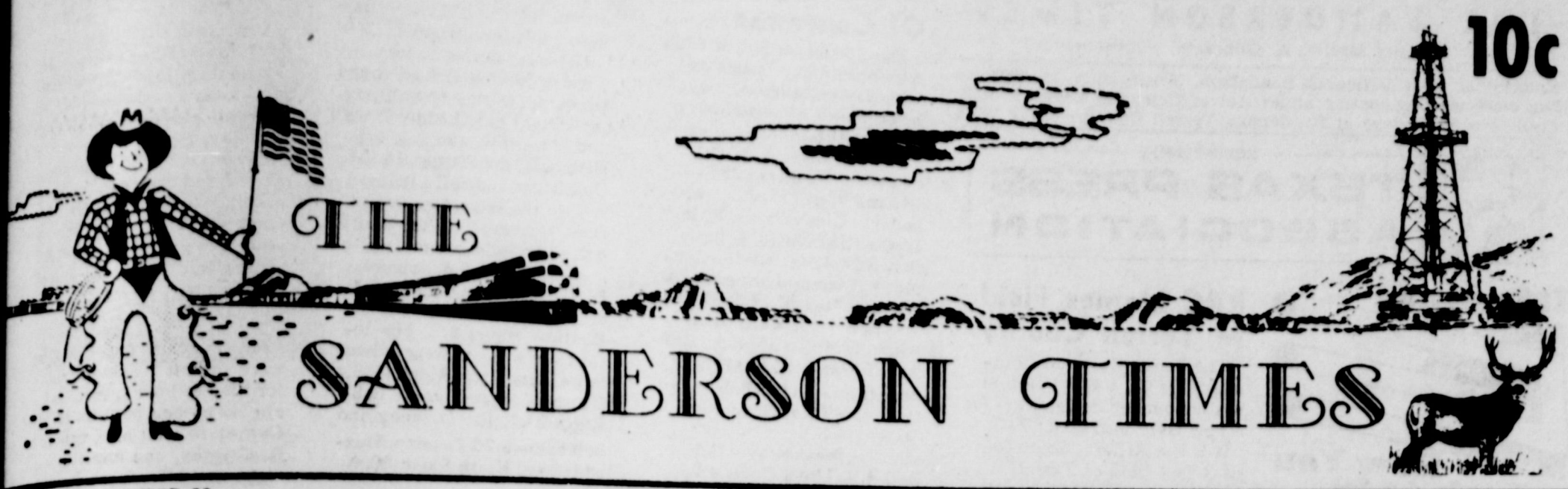

Last week we used the word "past-time" in reference to diversion or time-killing activity. We were wrong and were told so! It should have been "pastime".

We gained one bit of convenient news some time ago about how to tell a male turtle from a female. And if you wonder why anything besides another turtle would be interested in that fact - consider your own plight in case you wanted to buy or secure a pair of turtles!

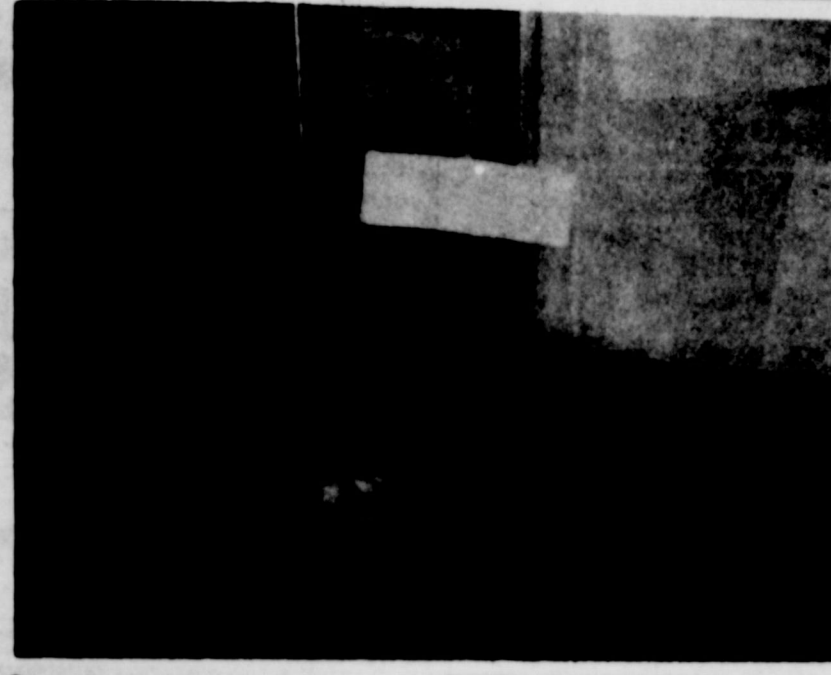
And in case you are wanting a pair of turtles, those with red eyes are males, or so we were told by a person who claimed some knowledge of turtles beyond "they're slow!"

Pecos County Gas Producer Nearer Terrell County

A Pennsylvania gas production has been opened 23 miles southeast of Fort Stockton to bring a lucrative producer nearer Terrell County. The well is the Hanson Corp., Midland, No. 1-A Chester Parke and is 1/2-mile north of the one-well BMH (Devonian) gas area of Pecos County. It is 2,835 feet from the south and 1,516 feet from the west lines of section 2, Block 306, Mary Simmons Grantee.

The well gauged a calculated absolute open flow of 12.-427-million cubic feet of gas per day with a gas-distillate ratio of 29,940-1. Gravity of the distillate is 61.5 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 7,816-7,820 feet, which had been washed with 500 gallons of mud acid.

The project was staked as an offset to the Devonian discovery, and drilled to 8,500 feet. It is plugged back to 7,936 feet where 4-1/2-inch casing is seated. Ground elevation is 3,124 feet.

Busy Aenda For Meeting Monday By Commissioners

The agenda for the meeting of the Terrell County Commissioners Court for Monday indicates a very interesting and busy session.

Items which have received quite a bit of interest by residents and included on the agenda for this meeting are:

- Considering park and swimming pool plans;
- Draw voting precinct lines for Dryden and El Paso Natural Gas Plant area;
- Order on condemning land for flood water retarding structure No. 7 and related works on Sanderson Canyon Watershed.

Other agenda items include the routine reading of minutes and paying bills; old business and new business; also naming the election judges for the coming year, enter order from the court requesting return of lateral road funds, fill out "Actual Use Report" on last year's revenue sharing fund.

The court will convene at 9:00 a.m. in the county court room at the courthouse.

Judge Stavley To Present Plan For Pool Financing

Terrell County Judge Charles Stavley will present a proposal for consideration by the Commissioners Court Monday for a swimming pool and park on the property east of the Church of Christ. The property was offered for sale by Mrs. Ed Robbins for use by the county as a park and swimming pool and includes all of the north half of the block east of the Church of Christ.

An old swimming pool, about 30 pecan trees, and a water well are all on the property.

The proposition to be presented by Judge Stavley will be to ask the Commissioners Court to seek a federal grant for improving the facility to make it into an approved and useable swimming pool and park area for recreation purposes.

Persons interested in hearing more about the proposal are urged to be at the commissioners Court meeting on Monday at 9:00 a.m.

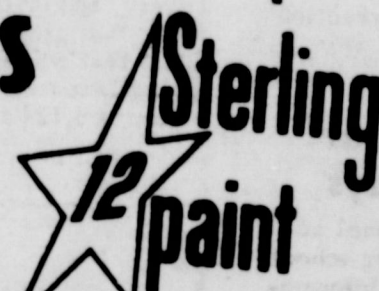
