State Comptroller Bob Bullock, in a news release received last week, asknowledged the inequities of the valuations placed on real property over the state. His words concerning the proposed constitution were: "The backers of the constitution keep telling us that taxing on a basis of true market value is a good thing - and it is - but property owners have a right to know what this means in plain English. What would this re-evaluation mean to the average property owner? It means that on a statewide average, their houses and lots could increase more than 60 per cent on the tax rolls. It would then be up to local taxing authorities, such as our cities, counties, and school districts, to reduce their tax rates and/ or assessment ratios or property taxes would go skyhigh." He concludes the news release with: "I think most homeowners believe that all real property should be taxed in an equal and uniform manner. However, it's been my experience that they are referring to the "other fella's" property because they believe theirs is already over valued and over

We would agree with practically all of what Mr. Bullock says, except his logic that a reevaluation up to the market value on all property would run taxes skyhigh. His inference is just that in voicing opposition to the new constitution (another opinion shared by us), but the true picture is that with any re-evaluation, there is the ever-present possibility that the rate, and/or tax asessment ratio would be adjusted to fit the financial needs of the taxing organization.

taxed."

What people should be worried and concerned about is the inequalities in valuations and rendered property, rather than total valuations.

If I am supposed to render all my business property, inventory, equipment, etc., then is it unfair to think that everyone else should do the same? And use the same basis for their valuations? This has been, is, and will be my only argument -- inequality is unfair!

It seems so foolish to quibble - or have to - about organizations and individuals in places of responsibility and example condoning raffles. If they are illegal, then our churches, civic clubs, veterans' organizations that support law and order, schools, etc., and the members thereof, should say "no". We cannot say by our example that we will violate those laws with which we do not agree and justify our actions.

And we cannot convince the young people that our actions in law violation are justifi-

The Eagles played their last home game of the season on Friday night against the Grandfalls-Royalty Cowboys. The Cowboys won the game 33-18. Sanderson's scoring was as

In the second period, Billings kicked a field goal with the ball snapped from the 5-yard line to gain another three points, a total of 10 at the half buzzer. Another field goal was attempted in the second per-

iod, but it was no good.

In the third period, both of the teams were scoreless.

Sanderson's final tally was a 32-yard run by Frankie Flores and a pass from Marvin Davis, the quarterback, to Clay Mitchell, end, was good for two extra points.

When the final Eagle touch-down was made, Grandfalls had only 26 points on the board and there were more than five minutes left in the final frame, but a fumble by the Eagles gave the ball to Grandfalls deep in home territory and they were able to capitalize on the turnover.

The final Cowboy TD was a 29-yard run by the quarterback, Santiago, and another successful conversion by place kick of the extra

point to bring the total to 33.

Fans enjoyed the competition displayed on the gridiron throughout all of the game, and particularly through the third period, but the strength of the Cowboys prevailed in the waning minutes of the

Extensive and numerous penalties occurred against both of the teams, with illegal shift or motion and backfield in motion being the most common infraction, but there were some 15-yard assessments against both of the teams.

The Eagles will play in Imperial Friday night and will go to Dell City on November 14 for their final scheduled game of district play.

The two teams played an even ball game that was also reflected in the statistics. Sanderson had 25 first downs to 27 for Grandfalls, but trailed in total yards 301 to 393. Sanderson had 301 yards rushing and zero passing, while Grandfalls had 358 yards rushing and 35 vards in the air. Sanderson had a pass intercepted which proved costly by setting up a touchdown drive by the Cowboys. Both teams lost a fumble. The Cowboys were penalized 10 times for 80 yards, and the Eagles miscued seven times for 32 yards.



It was stated that the vehicle appeared to have continued in a straight line on a slight curve, overturned at least two times, and caught fire. The body was in the back of the interior of the vehicle and burned beyond recognition.

The accident occurred about 18 miles north of Dryden.

The body was returned to San Antonio for burial.

NEW CONSERVATIONIST FOR TEXAS NAMED NOV. 2

George C. Marks will succeed Edward E. Thomas as state conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service effective November 2.

Marks, a native of Heidenheimer, is currently state conservationist for Arizona. He began his career with SCS at Rusk in 1950 as a soil scientist and later worked as a soil conservationist and district conservationist at Sulphur Springs, Winnsboro, Jefferson, New Boston, and Corsicana.

From 1964 to 1968, Marks was area sonservationist at Temple. He then moved to Arkansas as an assistant state conservationist. In 1972, he was appointed state conservationist for Arizona. He received awards for outstanding work in 1967 and 1975.

#### Oil and Gas Well West of Sheffield

Resources Investment Corp., Denver, Colo., No. 2 Slaughter, in 64-A2-TCRP, one location west-northwest of Ellenburger oil and 5/8 mile east of the Pennsylvanian detrital gas opener and lone producer from that pay, which was completed as a Strawn oil producer, 11 miles west of Sheffield, flowed gas at the rate of 220,000 cubic feet daily and 32 gravity oil at the rate of 30 barrels per hour on a drill-stem test in the Pennsylvanian detrital.

Gas surfaced in 13 minutes flowing at the above rate on a 1/4-inch choke on the two-hour test taken at 8,715-766 feet, which reversed out was 49-1/2 barrels of oil. Sample chamber recovery was 6.8 cubic feet of gas and 500 cubic centimeters of oil. One-hour initial and four-hour final shut-in pressures were 3,339 pounds each.

Drilling continued below 9,-199 feet on an 11,400-foot contract.

It recovered 756 feet of oiland gas-cut drilling fluid on a drillstem test in the Pennsylvanian at 8,156-300 feet; and recovered 400 feet of oil and 32 feet of salt water on a drillstem test at 8,380-525 feet.

The detrital opener, Skelly Oil Co. No. 1-66 Slaughter, was finaled March 29, 1973, for a calculated absolute open flow of 3,567 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gasliquid ratio of 16,927-1, through perforations of 8,796-816 feet. It was recompleted September 10 to pump 60 barrels of oil, plus 85 barrels of water, through perforations at 8,157-594 feet.

Hytech Energy Corp., Midland, continued to test at two confirmers in the four-well Barbasal (Queen gas) field, 13 miles southwest of Bakersfield.

The No. 2-B J.L. Nutt, Est., in 15-125-T&StL, 3/4 mile south, flowed six hours, making gas at the rate of 1,422,-000 cubic feet daily.

Flow was through a 26-64 inch choke and perforations at 2,655-691 feet.

The No. 1-C J.L. Nutt, Est., in 16-125-T&StL, 2,310 feet west and slightly south, flowed 24 hours, making 88 barrels of fluid, two-thirds of which was water, plus gas at the rate of 223,000 cubic feet daily.

Flow was through a 14-64inch choke and perforations at 2,372-420 feet.

Oscar Marquez is the commander of the local Fierro-Garza Post 8912 and Mrs. Eleno Marquez is the Auxiliary president.



I was one of only 18 voting against this bill, and several of my friends in Congress jokingly asked me, "What's the matter, Bob, don't you care about hungry children?" And they knew, of course I did. But sometimes, even when one knows a bill

will pass overwhelmingly, he should call attention to what the bill really does.

If the bill had made money available only to children from families with genuine financial need, I would have strongly supported it. But it does not. It gives government subsidies for meals to children from families who earn as much as \$10,000.00 Most people who earn that much are able to afford to feed their own children.

The people whom I represent still hold to that notion that Lincoln expressed so wells that government should not do for people what they can do better for themselves Government lunches do not taste as good as the lunches that mothers prepare. And they cost more. Most Americans are willing to support programs providing food for those in need. But they know that it costs more to pay taxes to the government and then, after a good deal of paperwork has been done, and employees have been paid, to get the government subsidy for food. They would rather have bought the food for their children in

the first place, if they could afford it; and to leave the subsidies to those who genuinely

need it.

Most people want less government, not more, and they want their money to be directed where there is genuine need, not where there is simply an opportunity to spend the money. The school lunch program which the Congress passed had a number of good features that I would readily have supported, including food for needy children and for expectant mothers who run the risk of undernourishment. Had the funds been directed to these sources, they would have been well spent, and well within the existing budget rather than exceeding them by one quarter billion dollars as this bill did.

A principal in one of the small rural schools in our district pointed out that his program requires his school to offer breakfasts as well as lunches. This means, he continued, that instead of getting a good country breakfast at home, many students have to catch the school bus for as long as 1-1/2 hours before they can have breakfast. And the breakfast they then receive tastes worse than what they would have had at home, two hours earlier.

My philosophy professor used to remind us, "The road to hell is paved with good intentions". I suppose the road to some pretty bad breakfasts is well paved with good Congressional intentions as well.


