describes the scene:


"She grasped the forked stick in both hands, palms up. The butt of the stick stood out from her hands horizontal to the ground,

"She appeared intensely absorbed in the work as she started forward, one slow step after another. She stared straight ahead, much as if she was daydreaming.

"Suddenly, the stick swung down - so violently that the butt end slapped her skirt.

"There's a water vein right here,' she announced, 'A strong one. I can't even force the stick back up.' She appeared to be fighting the forked stick. The muscles in both hands strained to pull the stick from its downward position, while some unseen force - like a pair of invisible hands - pulled it down...





'Plant now. Today, you plant the seeds symbolic of a rich and bountiful heritage to reap the bright new blossoms of tomorrow's future.'

The big trouble is that bluebonnets just plain won't grow in this area, according to all of the green thumb experts. In fact, they do not respond very well even in flower boxes -- and our cold weather eliminates them annually. Despite this situation, the bluebonnet remains Texas' state flower; a symbol of Texas unity. Dandelions, on the other hand, seem to flourish all over our part of the country.

If we do not choose to organize our own West Texas, with the dandelion as the state flower and the English sparrow as the state bird, we should at least send sample of our own flora and fuana to Gov. Connally with a request that Texas consider altering its present state symbols to fit the second largest state's entire territory.

MULESHOE ...

Richard Goodrow, former newspaper man here who turned pillow-top promoter and thereby got in bad with U.S. postal authorities, landed in an Alexandra, La. federal jail Friday morning. He had been the object of a nationwide postal search that had led from Muleshoe to Chicago and then to Louisiana for more than a year after his pillow-top promotion here put him in bad with the authorities.

Goodrow was working for a newspaper in Alexandra under the name of Charles R. Steele and was operating a similar promotion there, postal authorities told Muleshoe Postmaster Spencer Beavers Friday.

His wife Betty was found in a coffee shop in Alexandra.

Goodrow -- or Steele -- denied that he had ever gone under the name of Goodrow, and said he had never been in Muleshoe. He insisted that his name is Charles R. Steele. A postal inspector in Fort Worth who has been working on the case for more than a year, flew to Alexandra and identified Goodrow as the same man wanted here for allegedly using the mails for his pillow-top promotion. He had resigned his newspaper job here a

On The Farm In Parmer County By JOE VANZANDT County Agent

This year's cotton crop is getting off to a slow start due to this cool, damp weather we have had. I was checking one of our cotton fungicide demonstrations for control of seedling disease at Charles Hough's farm last Friday and he had cotton still coming up three weeks after planting.

Cotton producers need to be ready to start spraying for trips as they can further slow down and hold back this young cotton,

Begin thrip control measures as soon as damage is apparent on young seedling cotton. Damage is characterized by wilted, wrinkled, blackened leaves and terminal growth silvering of the lower leaf surface is also common. Apply sprays at 7-day intervals if infestation persists. Heavy thrips infestations on young cotton may delay plan: maturity a few days to a few weeks.

LOWER COTTON EXPENSE

PROPAZINE AND AT RAZINE CLE ARANCE

There has been some confusion from Washington about the the clearance for Propazine and Atrazine for use on sorghums. We were advised on May 12 that as of that date it had been cleared for pre-emergence and early postemergence use on both grain and forage sorghums at a rate of application not to exceed three (3) pounds per acre actual meterial.

The rates of application for Propazine here in Parmer County vary from 1 to 2 pound per treated acre. them disobey any of those rules. ALSO STRESS THESE THINGS:

1. Never take rides from persons you do not know.

2. Never take money, candy or toys from a stranger or let him touch you.

3. Never go with strangers when they ask for directions. 4. Never go with strangers when they offer you a job. 5. Never play around alleys. empty buildings, public rest rooms or secluded places.

6. Take a pal along when you go to movies, playgrounds, stores, etc. 7. Unless told otherwise by

your parents, go straight to and from school, and preferably with other children.

8. And finally and most important to the apprehension of would-be molesters: GET THE LICENSE NUMBER OF THE CAR and a description of the person, if possible, scratch the license number on the sidewalk or in the dirt.

These rules should be impressed on your children. In at least one community the instructions paid off in saving a girl from a degenrate. She repelled his advances and wrote down his license number as he drove away. He was later arrested and convicted.
