YOU can make a bower of a city apartment as well as a country cottage by using paint and stencils. The most unpromising assortment of junk furniture and shabby odds and ends may blossom with roses. Here, an old rocker of no particular period was painted blue and then stenciled in the Boston rocker manner. The streaked old window shade and an old tin tray were also painted blue and then stenciled with pink roses.

A vine design of pink rambler roses was stenciled on the cream colored walls around the windows. The lamp base shown in the sketch was made from an old milk can.

Household Hints

To avoid shine on much-worn trousers and skirt seats brush the garments after each wearing.

Stretching is fine for the figure, likewise the budget, but don't stretch table linen when ironing it. Iron while damp and press until dry to preserve its stiffness.

When a ladder is used to trim trees or pick fruit, a small, strong chain should be substituted for the top rung as it grips trees or poles more securely.

Here's a hint for the busy mother whose baby is at that "high-chair-tipping" age. A screen door hook fastened on the back of the chair, and a corresponding screw-eye in the woodwork at a convenient place in each room will safeguard baby from tipping while mother works.

Cotton blankets should be washed singly in lukewarm water and enough mild soap to make a two-inch standing suds. Rinse in several lukewarm waters. Dry in shade.

Narrow windows can be made to appear wider by hanging draperies in such a way that they do not cover the glass but have their inside edges even with the window frames. Fasten two small blocks of wood on the side of the window frame to hold the curtain fixtures.

Hang a full-length mirror in the kitchen and small children can see for themselves whether they have clean faces and combed hair. It also serves as a daily reminder of one's own appearance.

WFA Sees Ample Civilian Food Supply During Coming Year; Production Up; Allied Forces Battle Japs in India; Congress Votes Role in World Relief

AGRICULTURE:
Food Supply

Civilian food supplies during 1944 should be the same as last year with farmers continuing record-breaking performances, War Food Administrator Marvin Jones said, but stocks of milk, cheese and fats may be slightly less.

At the end of 1943, the U. S. had the largest livestock inventory in history, Jones said, with 19 per cent more hogs and 3 per cent more cattle, although sheep and lamb numbers were down 4 per cent.

With farmers urged to cultivate 16,000,000 more acres than last year, they still face manpower problems, Jones related. The outlook for production of farm machinery and fertilizer have improved, he added.

Revealing \$350,000,000 was spent for supporting farm prices in 1943, Jones said they served the double purpose of offering incentive for production and holding down consumer costs.

Postwar Outlook

Addressing the National Association of Mutual Insurance companies in Chicago, Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard declared postwar America's exportable surplus of farm commodities would be 15 per cent of production.

Asserting the figure resulted after estimating increased domestic demand for consumption and industry, Wickard said: "Again we are either going to have to extend credit or give agricultural products to other nations, or we are going to have to accept goods and services in exchange."

Advances in agricultural production will pose a major problem in postwar America, Wickard said, remarking that with only moderate demand and usual educational methods, yields will jump up 40 per cent in six years.

WAGES:

Peg Sticks

Testifying before the senate banking committee considering extension of price control after June 30, War Labor Board Chairman William H. Davis declared that the WLB intended to stand by its "Little Steel formula" limiting wage increases to 15 per cent over January 1941, levels, but only if living costs remain relatively stabilized.

To assure such stabilization, Davis recommended continuance of consumer subsidies. Prohibition of subsidies would result in appreciable rises in basic commodities and make present wages inadequate, Davis said.

Davis opposed suggestions that wages be limited, declaring such action would work against promotions and upgrades, and discourage shifts to industry.

WORLD RELIEF:
Authorize UNRRA

By overwhelming vote, congress put itself on record for participating in world relief by authorizing expenditures of \$1,350,000,000 for the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation administration to help the people of occupied countries get back on their feet following their liberation.

Although UNRRA will feed, clothe and restore essential services in the stricken countries, it will do so only for the purpose of getting the people started in rebuilding their agricultural and industrial economy.

Matching the U. S. contribution, 43 other United Nations will put about \$650,000,000.

HIGHLIGHTS . . . in the week's news

GOLF BALLS: About 400 tons of balata, the tough gum used to cover golf balls, has been released by the War Production board. It is showing signs of deterioration and is unsuitable for war purposes. Manufacturers of golf balls say that they do not have materials for centers on hand and not much for windings, so the balata does not mean any new balls in the immediate future.

PACIFIC:
Japs Invade India

While Adm. Louis Mountbatten's Southeast Asia command coped with a strong Jap drive into eastern Burma, Gen. Douglas MacArthur's staff concentrated on weakening the enemy's hold on New Guinea with heavy aerial attacks against shipping and gun positions.

Springing unnoticed from the jungle, a Jap force pressing far inland into India pointed at Imphal, key to the communications line feeding Lieut. Gen. Joseph Stilwell's Chinese-American troops opening a new supply route to China in northeastern Burma. While the Allies maneuvered to weather this charge, two other Jap columns aimed at Imphal farther to the north.

In New Guinea, Allied planes ripped the northeastern coastal shipping route while Aussie and U. S. doughboys advanced northward toward the big base of Madang over craggy foothills.

EUROPE:

Take Over Balkans

Germany made her final preparations for an anticipated double-barreled attack against the continent by the Allies by integrating Hungary, Rumania and Bulgaria into the Nazi war machine to provide a common pool of men and resources.

The Nazis' incorporation of the Balkans came as the Russ drew closer to the Hungarian border by stabbing deeper into prowar Poland and surged onward to the Rumanian boundary by chewing off Germany's last grip in the Ukraine.

As Germany moved to utilize the Hungarian, Rumanian and Bulgarian armies of over a half million men and draw upon the agricultural and industrial resources of these countries, Nazi troops streamed eastward to take up the fight along the newly organized battlefront.

Jerry Tough

While the Germans moved quickly to mend their fences in the Balkans they more than had their hands full in Italy and the west.

Around Cassino Jerry clung stubbornly to his ground to block the broad highway to Rome, fighting

desperately in the hilly country to dominate the heights from which he could pour his deadly artillery fire upon Allied troops maneuvering below.

In the west, the Allies sent fleets of bombers against France and Germany to rip defenses and railways over which troops and supplies could be shuttled and blast factories turning out Axis armament.

Sanita Fe Announces \$2,000 Victory Garden Contest for Employees

Another \$2,000 Sanita Fe Victory Garden contest has been announced by J. Engel, president of the railroad, and hundreds of the company's Gulf Lines employees and members of their families have started spring planting in their back yards and on company donated land in preparation for the 1944 competition. This year's Victory garden contest is expected to be bigger and better than the 1943 event which attracted nation-wide attention and won for the Sanita Fe the coveted Victory garden plaque, highest award of the National Victory Garden Institute.

Twenty-three prizes totaling \$450 in War Bonds and Stamps will be awarded in the Texas-Louisiana-Oklahoma territory covered by the Gulf Lines, with the top winner receiving a \$100 War Bond. Similar awards will be given on each of the company's three other major divisions. First prize winners of the four divisions will compete for a grand award of \$200 in War Bonds.

Nationally known judges again will select winners, Engel said. Victor Schoffelmayer, agricultural editor of the Dallas News, represented this section as a judge last year when a number of Gulf Lines employees were nominated to the prize list.

Victory gardens in 1944 may serve to offset somewhat a 43 per cent reduction in canned fruits and a 19 per cent cut in canned vegetables which the War Food Administration recently declared is facing civilians this year, Engel announced.

Sale of Public School Lands to be Made in May

Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office, has announced the sale for May 2, 1944, of 225,000 acres of State School Land located in more than 75 Counties throughout the State. Com'r Giles points out that the diversified soil and locations of this land should, in a large measure, meet the present unusual interest in and heavy demand for land purchases.

One of the purposes of the sale is to convert property, now in the hands of the State, which, in some instances, produces small revenue, into private ownership for development so that it will be rendered for taxes which will be beneficial to Schools and Counties as well as the State.

The terms for sale of Public Free School Lands are most attractive. An initial payment of one-fifth is required, and the remainder may be carried over a period of 40 years in an on-or-before note. The State retains a free royalty of one-eighth of the gross production of sulphur, and one-sixteenth of oil, gas and other minerals.

"Interest in the purchase of land is exceedingly high at this time due to the security of land investments which are comparable to the purchase of War Bonds, and in addition thereto have the element of speculation which makes the purchase of land even more intriguing," Commissioner Giles said.

Gain of 3 per cent in Sales Registered For Month of February

Austin, April 4—The 3 per cent gain registered in sales during February by Texas independent retailers, compared with January of this year and February of 1943, was a minor one, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported recently.

Covering 891 stores, exclusive of department stores, the report was issued in cooperation with the U. S. Bureau of Census.

February sales for 61 department stores, also included in the report, tallied with the February, 1943, report, but was 11 per cent above January, 1944.

Feed the Insects-Poison
By Mrs. Nettie B. Messick

Early measures should be taken to destroy insects which take an estimated toll of 20 percent of the possible yield of home gardens yearly.

Some of the most injurious insects in the garden do not chew and swallow parts of the plant but live entirely by sucking juices from the plants. There is no poison that can be applied to the vegetables that would be absorbed into the juices, without either injuring the plant or being unsafe for human food.

Therefore, in order to kill these so-called sucking insects the poison must be directed to hit the bugs.

In this group of sap-sucking bugs are the plant lice (aphids), tomato suck fly, cabbage bug, stink bug, and squash bug. Of this group, the lice is probably the most common and destructive. They attack most vegetables, especially turnips, radishes, mustard, cabbage and similar plants and control measures should begin as soon as they appear—if you hope to win. As much as 5 pounds of 5 percent rotenone dust will be available to every Victory gardener this year for controlling these pests. Except for plant

lice 5 percent rotenone dust is not a very effective control for the adult bugs but will kill the young ones. However, it is not likely that any other poison will be better than the rotenone as far as control of the adult bug is concerned.

All sap-sucking insects feed principally on the lower surface of the leaves and can also be found on the underside of the foliage when not feeding, so shoot at these pests by dusting or spraying the underside of the leaves thoroughly. And remember that only those bugs hit with the poison are killed and that a few bugs are much easier to control than large numbers, so start early.

Repeated applications at 7 day intervals will be necessary as long as damage occurs, as the poison does not kill the eggs and some of the bugs will be missed—such as lice that live on the ground.

For cabbage worms, cut worms, tomato fruit worms, potato beetles, other chewing insects, stomach poisons such as cryolite and arsenic are very effective. These poisons are unsafe to man and should not be used on the parts of the plant to be eaten unless the poisons can be removed by washing. Of course, there is no danger in using these poisons on potato foliage for controlling potato beetles. They may also be used to control cabbage-worms on cabbage until the heads begin to form. They are safe on tomatoes up until four weeks before the tomatoes begin to ripen. The principal damage to tomatoes occurs early anyway.

Cryolite dusts will be on the market mixed and ready to dust on the plants, but in case straight cryolite is purchased it may be diluted 1 part cryolite to 1 part sulfur, except when vine crops are to be dusted, then use 1 part cryolite

and 1 part cheap flour or talc. (Never use lime to dilute cryolite.)

Either lead or calcium arsenate can be used undiluted, or 1 part of arsenate and 1 part of lime of sulfur. In general dust poisons are more satisfactory than spray poisons. However, cryolite or lead and calcium arsenate can be used as a spray at the rate of 3 tablespoons per gal. of water.
