

Friena High School's vocational agriculture department will be out to add to its fabulous record this weekend at Sam Houston State College in Huntsville, at the annual state FFA leadership contests.

The local chapter undoubtedly has a record unmatched by any other in the state in the past 15 years. In that length of time, leadership teams from Friena FFA have advanced to the state finals 12 times.

In the past 11 trips, chapter teams have brought home 12 banners, including six in the past three years. This, we would venture to guess, is as impressive a record in that department as any school in the state, regardless of size, can boast.

When you stop to think what an achievement it is to win a state banner, the record is even more impressive. Unlike interscholastic sports, the FFA teams are up against the best of schools of all sizes, large or small -- all thrown in together.

To win district, Friena usually competes with up to 16 teams, compared to four or five as is the case in the athletic setup. Then the teams have to compete with district winners from nine other districts at the area meet, compared to three in a regional basketball meet.

At state, the 10 area winners converge, and by this time the competition is getting pretty salty.

David T. McVey, who will accompany the boys to Huntsville once again, has been to the state meet 10 of the last 11 years either as an advisor or to help judge the meet. Before coming to Friena, he had some similar successes at Anton.

"However, I remember it was a long, long time before a team of mine ever won a banner at the state contests. And, it just so happened that the first one was a first place," McVey says.

Aiding McVey with the current Vo-Ag program is Benny Pryor, who is in his third year at FHS. Pryor had experience in winning contest banners at Colorado City before coming to Friena. McVey is in his fifth year at Friena.

Actually, the success story of Friena High School's Vo-Ag leadership teams is divided into two "eras."

Guiding the efforts of the first era was J. T. Gee, the present elementary principal, who served as vocational agriculture instructor at Friena for 24 years. Gee took seven teams to the state meet from 1950 through 1958.

It is interesting to note that the "farm skills" teams are the ones which have always progressed to the state finals. Gee's boys won first-place banners in their first two tries, in 1949-1950 and 1950-1951. He also brought home a first in 1956-57. Other teams won second and third-place banners in those years, and those aren't to be sneezed at.

Gee recalls that it was around 1949-1950 (the first time a team of boys went to the state finals and won) that the local chapter first started taking an interest in the leadership contests.

Earlier than that, in the 1940's, the chapter used to hold "demonstration nights" at the show barn, with the dads of Ag students invited to attend. The boys would put on five or six demonstrations which they learned in class.

"I suppose that these demonstration programs were the forerunner of our later success in the farm skills demonstrations," Gee comments.

The former Ag instructor says he doesn't know whether any other school in the state can boast of more awards than Friena has won in the past 14 years, but admits that Friena is recognized all over the state for its FFA achievements.

There was a time when Gee and McVey were on opposite sides at the area contests. When McVey was at Anton, it wasn't uncommon for teams coached by the two men to hook up in the area contests. (Anton and Friena were in different districts -- so met in the "second step" of the state eliminations.)

"I would beat him (McVey) in the senior division, and he would beat me in the juniors," Gee recalls.

**CARR SPEAKS**

**Top Citizens Are Honored At Dinner**

Texas has a wonderful future, and the only thing that will rob us of having a part of that wonderful future will be our failure to prepare for it adequately, attorney-general Waggoner Carr told a Friena audience Tuesday.

Speaking at the annual meeting of the Friena Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, Carr reflected on Texas' heritage, and the great potential that lay out in the future.

Carr stated that the future of Texas would be "wild, compared to the past."

The Texas Attorney-General, at the request of fellow lawyer Bill Sheehan, spent much of his talk dealing with his part in the Texas investigation of the Kennedy assassination. Carr attempted to bring out some of the lesser-known facts surrounding the assassination.

A feature of the banquet was the naming of Friena's outstanding citizens.

Honored as "Man of the Year" was Frank A. Spring, president of Friena State Bank. Mrs. H. K. Kendrick was named "Woman of the Year," Mrs. R. L. Bates was chosen "Teacher of the Year," and Stanley Bengé was named "most courteous employee."

Spring, who is known as having the first birth certificate issued in Parmer County, is past president and director of the Friena Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, and has served on United Fund and hospital fund drives, and has been active at Friena Methodist Church.

In 1963, Spring was appointed to serve on the agriculture committee of the Independent Bankers Association, and still serves, attending meetings of the committee in various cities

across the nation. A charter member and past president of the Friena Lions Club, Spring has served as chairman of the Parmer County Savings Bond Sales for several years.

Mrs. Kendrick was cited for her many-sided interests, which include civic, school, church and club work. She is active in both Boy and Girl Scout work, is a member of the hospital auxiliary, and has been active in parent-teacher work.

"Deke" is president of the Modern Study Club, and is a member of the executive commission of King's Manor at Hereford. She teaches an adult class at Friena Methodist Church, and plays organ or piano for worship services.

Other projects Mrs. Kendrick has helped are the R. E. Miller Jr. student loan fund, the Friena Public Library, and United Fund.

Mrs. Bates, a teacher for 25 years, was cited for "her sympathetic understanding of human nature, her love for all children, a life of true dedication to the teaching profession, and her ability to lead and direct in a spirit of kindness and humility."

Mrs. Bates, who holds Bachelor of Science and Master of Education degrees from West Texas State University, has taught for 25 years. While both she and her husband were teaching in Sunray, they were chosen "family of the year" at one time.

She teaches a Bible Class at the Church of Christ, and is currently president of Friena's Classroom Teachers' Association. Mrs. Bates teaches a fifth grade class.

Bengé, who has worked for

Parmer County Pump Company since 1957, was chosen for his cheerfulness and courtesy to customers. He has established and developed a successful machine shop for his employer.

A family man with four daughters at home, Bengé attends First Baptist Church, where he is an active worker.

Manchee helped organize the team last year after the school had had no debate team for several years. He reports that interest is much greater this year, with more students participating. Also, as word gets around that Friena has a team, more schools are booking debates with the local team.

Previously this year, the team participated in the West Texas State University tournament at Canyon, as well as having practice rounds with Canyon and Muleshoe High School.

The group is preparing for the district Interscholastic League meet which will be held in the spring.

**Stores To Stay Open Late Today**

Stores in downtown Friena will remain open on Thursdays until 9 p.m. until Christmas. It was decided at a meeting of the Friena Association of Retail Merchants (FARM) last week.

According to a poll of the merchants present at the meeting, most expected to remain open until the late hour on Thursday, in addition to their usual late closing hour on Saturday each week.

Some 20 merchants attended the meeting, which was a luncheon affair, at the Friena Lanes Cafe last Thursday. The group voted to change its meeting time from the usual third Thursday of each month, and to hold a luncheon meeting instead of the "coffee and doughnuts" breakfast-type meeting which was begun last summer.

Also discussed by the group

was the possibility of having a community appearance of Santa Claus, and perhaps have Old Saint Nick visit in the individual stores on Thursdays and Saturdays. No definite plans were reached on this item.

Wayne Clausen of Hurst's Department Store, president of the organization, expressed his appreciation for the good attendance at the meeting, and invited those merchants missed

to attend the meeting the first week in January.

A reminder of that meeting will be sent, and a story will appear that day in the Friena Star.

Funeral services for Hayden Cason, who died at Parmer County Community Hospital Tuesday afternoon have been tentatively set for 3 p.m. Thursday at Friena Methodist Church.

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**Woman Dies In Hit-Run Crash**

A two-car collision four miles west of Friena left a Clarksville (Tex.) woman dead and her husband injured Tuesday night.

The Chevy II driven by Henry Edward Moore was struck from behind by a car driven by Tony Ray White, 20. Both cars were headed east on U. S. Highway 60.

The Moore vehicle was knocked from the road, it overturned into the ditch. Mrs. Moore was dead on arrival at Parmer County Community Hospital. Moore was treated and rushed to an Amarillo hospital where his condition was unknown at press time.

White, 20, of Lindsey, Okla., has been working at Friena County Club Gin. Investigating officers said he left the scene of the accident and proceeded into Friena. He was later arrested by Friena Police Chief Bill Morgan.

White was to face possible charges for leaving the accident, investigating officers said.

**IN STATE MEET**

**Ag Boys Out To Extend Contest Winning Streak**

For the fifth straight year and twelfth time since the 1949-50 school year, Friena High School will be represented at the state Future Farmers of America Leadership contests this weekend in Huntsville.

As a matter of fact, Friena will have two leadership teams in the state finals for the fourth straight year.

The chapter's senior farm skills and junior farm skills teams won the right to represent the area in the state contests by taking first place at the Area I contests last Saturday at Plainview. It was the fifth consecutive year for the senior team to win the area contest.

Members of the senior team are Travis Graves, Larry Johnson and Mike Smith. Howard Rhodes is alternate. Members of the junior team are Randy Ellis, Eddie Wood and John Baxter.

The two teams will be out to keep Friena High School's record going for winning state

leadership contest banners. In the past four years, FHS' vocational agriculture chapter has rung the bell with at least one state banner, and the chapter's teams have brought home 12 state banners in the past 15 years.

Last year, the junior farm skill team won first place, and the senior team places third. In 1962-63 the senior team won the first-place banner, and the juniors took second in their division. 1961-62 was the "banner year" for FHS, as both teams brought home 12 state banners in the past 15 years.

Previous first-place banners on the state level were won by the Friena Vo-Ag chapter in 1949-1950, 1950-1951 and 1956-57 when J. T. Gee, present elementary principal, was instructor. A third-place was won in 1952-53 and a second in 1953-54.

Going into the state leadership contests, Friena FFA's collection includes 41 banners won in area, state and competition in the Texas Tech contests. Of that number, 23 are first-place banners.

The opening round for Friena is an exact duplicate of the first round at the 1962 Happy meet, when the Squaws won 53-36, and Adrain topped the Chiefs, 41-33.

Chain As Sinker  
A piece of chain of several links makes a practically no-snag sinker for rock fishing. Use as many links as are needed for the correct weight.

In an article on the sports boom appearing in This Week magazine, Stanley Frank writes: "Actually, sports hold an intellectual and esthetic attraction for knowledgeable fans which was thoroughly appreciated by the ancient Greeks. As Alexander Elliot, an art critic, points out, 'The Greeks believed that athletes, more than other men, approached the perfection attributed to their gods...who were eternally young, swift, powerful and graceful.' The matchless statues sculptors erected to gods and Olympic champions were interchangeable...Sports were such an integral part of Greek culture that a truce was called every four years in the interminable inter-Greek wars to conduct the Olympics on schedule."

Six of every 10 teenage girls and 4 of every 10 teenage boys have poor diets, according to a national study, and the facts also apply to Texas, according to Extension Service foods and nutrition specialists at Texas A&M University. In an effort to improve diets of teenagers, the Extension specialists are working with county home demonstration agents and County Program Building Committees in many Texas areas where youth diets do not meet recommendations of the National Research Council.

To avoid being hit by stray shots while hunting, the Texas Safety Association advises hunters to keep out of the brush in heavily hunted country. A hilltop also can be especially dangerous. On high ground, stand in front of a tree or rock so that your silhouette won't invite another hunter's bullet.

Just the other day I watched a fisherman on the Guadalupe River in Central Texas wading along quietly, casting his bait into likely looking spots.

Offhand it appeared as if he was angling for bass. But lo and behold, instead, he was fishing for channel catfish.

His is a type of cat fishing often overlooked. It is a fascinating, skillful method of angling. In a way it is like fishing for bass. Only real difference is the bait. Use of natural bait instead of artificial!

Every river of any size in Texas holds channel catfish. A great majority of these are taken on trotlines and drop-lines. Many of these fish succumb to sporting methods. But the average fisherman looks on catfishing as sitting in one spot, fishing a bait on the bottom and waiting for a cat to wander along and pick it up.

When drift fishing for cats, you float a bait into likely looking spots and try to make the bait appear as lifelike as possible to an unsuspecting cat.

Proper weapon for this type of fishing is a spinning or spin-cast outfit. Rod used is limber enough to let even a pound-sized cat strut its stuff. Yet it's heavy enough, with ample backbone, to subdue even the five-pounders. This type of rig not only provides more sport, but allows the angler to hit more likely spots with his bait and to fish it more lifelike once he has the bait in the water. Small-diameter monofilament lines are all but invisible in the water and a bait can be fished without too much resistance and undue drag.

There are several ways to drift a bait to cats. Most common, perhaps, is with some sort of bobber, or cork as it is often called. A No. 1/0 hook goes on the line, a split-shot sinker is added about a foot above the hook and a bobber is snapped on at the appropriate depth.

This rig seems simple enough, but you'd be amazed at how many fishermen go at it wrong.

For one thing, they use hooks which are too large. Smaller hooks will result in more fish. Even a small hook will adequately handle a big cat on tackle that "gives."

A limber rod and a light-weight line will not allow the fish to get much leverage to break off. Another mistake is to use a bobber that is too big. Employ the smallest bobber possible. This way you'll need a small sinker, to carry the bait down and stabilize the bobber. The small weight allows the bait to fan around more and appear alive in the water.

A slip cork works best with a spinning outfit. This is the cork with the hole through it. It slips freely up and down the line.

Use a matchstick in the line where you want the cork to stop. When you cast, the bobber slips down against the hook, making casting easier and more accurate. But once in the water, sinker and hook slide down until the matchstick comes to rest against the cork.

There are many baits which will work in this kind of fishing. My favorite is ordinary earthworms. Only fault with worms is that small fish often bother them. When this happens, hellgrammites, grasshoppers or frozen shrimp are better.

Walk along a stream and fish places where cats hang out. Such spots are below riffles, along undercut banks or in the calm water behind a mid-stream rock where the current cuts around it. Allow the bobber to drift right through the spot. It will carry the bait along as if it were being washed naturally downstream.

Another way to fish is with no weight at all. This commonly is called "free fishing." No sinker is added. Bait is carried down only by the weight of the hook. When the current catches the bait, it sort of tumbles and flows along, like the real thing caught in moving water.

This system often works quite effectively right after a rain when the river is coming up. With a worm bait, it appears the high waters have washed the morsel out of earthen banks. Few catfish can resist a worm that comes tumbling along in the current.

Often, however, it is difficult to get a bait down this way. Particularly if the cats are feeding near the bottom.

If you want your bait to go deep, add a single split-shot sinker about a foot up the line. This rig tends to foul on underwater obstructions so it is best used along smooth places. It works effectively where current washes over a sandbar and into a deeper pool.

Cats lie in wait in the deeper water and when the bait comes washing through the riffles they move in and suck it down.

Idea in this fishing is to move a lot and hit many likely looking spots. When a cat is lurking in wait it usually will hit in a hurry if it is going to hit at all. Three or four passes through any one spot should be more than sufficient.

At least 20 Texas streams are known as Mustang Creek.

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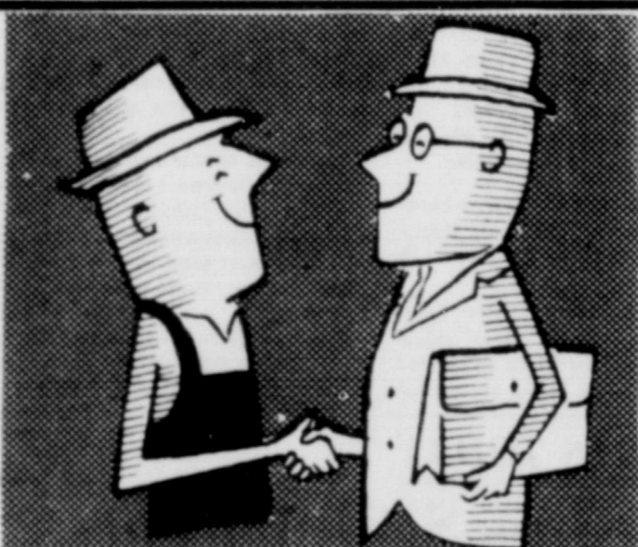
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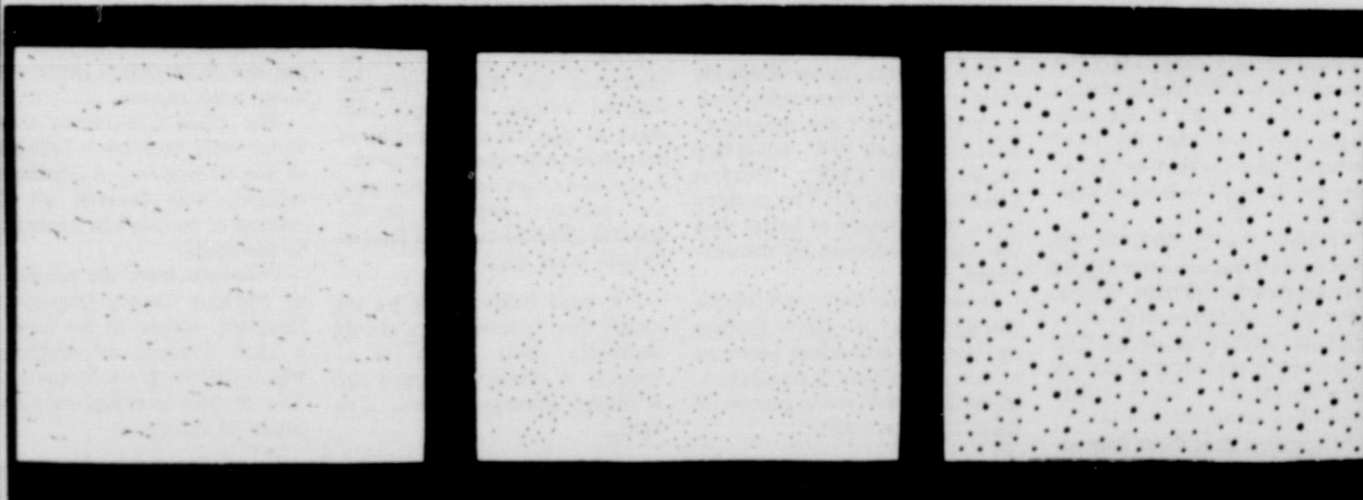

# Council Discusses Development

A discussion on the possibility of the City of Friona assisting to some extent with the cost of development of possible city additions took up most of the time at a routine meeting of the Friona City Council Monday.

No official action was taken, but councilmen voiced their opinion that serious study needed to be made on the matter.

Councilman Ed Hicks stated "We need to work out something so that developers will want to bring their subdivisions into the city. With Friona growing as it has, it won't be long before all lots inside the city limits will be developed."

The council discussed the possibility of helping provide suitable drainage for a new subdivision to the west of the city, owned by Bill Sheehan, should the property be brought

into the city. In other business, the group discussed the possibility of providing playground equipment for the City Park. This item was tabled for later discussion.

The monthly financial statement was approved. In his monthly summary of activities, City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland pointed out that there were ten changes of own-

ership in city property as reported by the county clerk's office during November.

Water department records showed that six new water meter services were made and one discontinued, to bring the total active services at the end of the month to 979.

A total of 9,472,200 gallons of water were pumped during November, a 32 per cent decrease in production from the previous month. This averaged 315,740 gallons per day.

Total rainfall for November amounted to 1.06 inches and fell on six different days. The first freeze (a 31 degree reading) was recorded November 16.

Fire department records indicated that only four fire calls were made during the month. Two were inside the city for a total estimated loss of \$78. The two outside the city were for an estimated loss of \$2,020.

Fire Chief Ralph Shirley, Assistant Chief Glenn Reeve, Jr. and Outland visited the city offices at Littlefield November 19.

There were 44 arrests during the month of November, according to the report from the police department. Thirty-five of these were traffic violators, three were traffic warrants, and three were for traffic investigations. One was driving while intoxicated and two for vagrancy.

Recovery was made of an automobile involved in theft, while two other thefts and three acts of vandalism were investigated. There were six accidents investigated with no injuries nor hospitalization reported.

Five new street lights were installed on Ashland Avenue,

according to street department records. Another was installed at Fourth and Jay, and two changeovers were made on the east side of the City Park.

## November Permits Push Figure Upward

Five building permits were issued by the City of Friona during the month of November, amounting to construction estimated to cost approximately \$62,800.

This figure brings the year's total to \$1,914,434 with the month of December yet to go.

November's figure was quite a "comedown" from the October total, which included the permit amounting to \$829,-

000 for the construction of the physical plant portion of the new Friona High School building.

Discounting the school figure, the \$62,800 for November would put the total construction in Friona for 1964 at \$1,085,434, still by far a new one-year record for the city.

Making up half of the November total was the permit for the new Lutheran Church building, estimated at \$31,000. Otherwise, there were two permits for new residential buildings for an estimated cost of \$24,500, and two of additions or alterations to existing residences amounting to \$7,300.

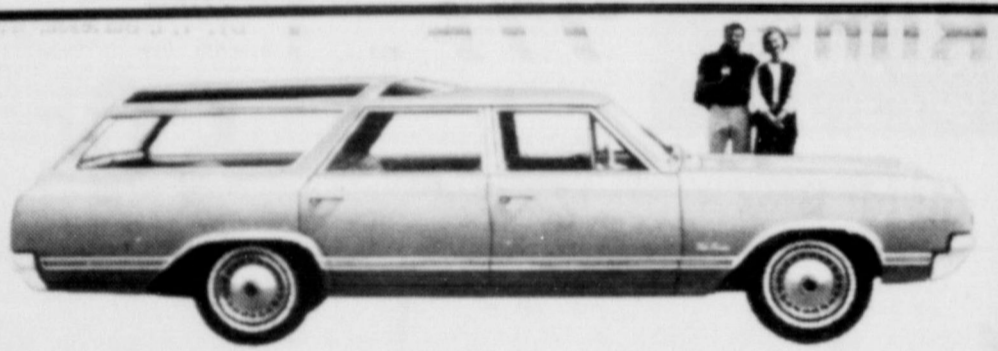
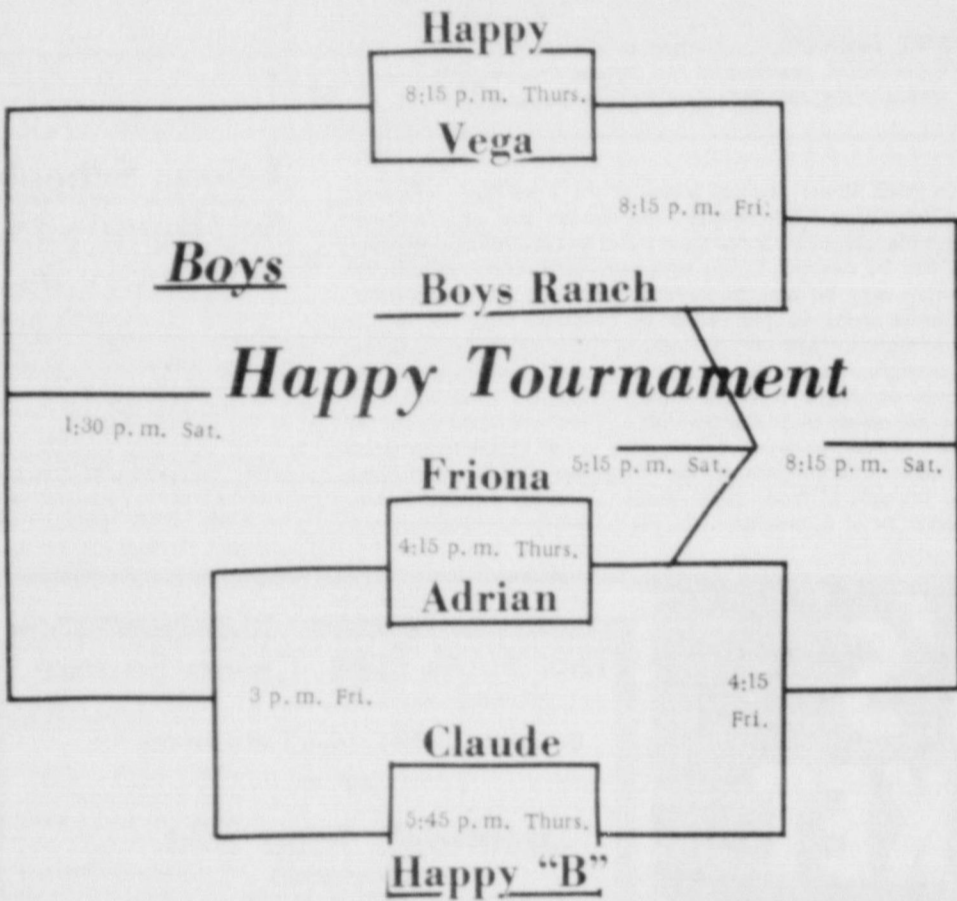

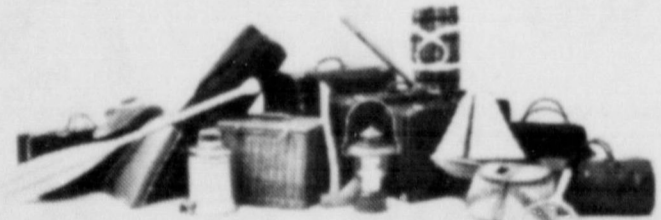

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LOSE TO RIVALS

Squaws Fall To Tulia; Take 3rd In Tourney

Friona High School's Squaws, after being "slipped up on" by their old rivals, the Tulia Hornettes, had to settle for third place (consolation championship) of the West Texas State University tournament last weekend.

The Squaws, who dropped their second game of the year in the tourney's first round to Tulia, 45-40, bounced back to trounce Claude, 59-16, but the third-place finish was their lowest in the tournament since 1961-62, when the team bowed to a stronger Claude team 49-48 in an overtime semi-final thriller.

At Home In Parmer County

PROPER CARE OF TURKEY-IMPORTANT

Every year around Thanksgiving and Christmas time, we have many reports of "intestinal flu", up-set stomach and cases of food poisoning. Many times it can be traced back to the improper care of turkey's before or after cooking and this is especially true of the broth or gravies or stuffed turkey's.

Chicken, turkey and meat broth are ideal cultures for growing bacteria (when left at room temperature) that cause food poisoning.

Keep gravies, broth, dressing and poultry refrigerated. Do not leave out at room temperature for only short periods.

Thawing Turkeys

Frozen Turkeys should be thawed in the refrigerator and not at room temperature. Approximate thawing time for: 4 to 12 lb. turkey--1 to 2 days 12 to 20 lb. turkey--2 to 3 days 20 to 24 lb. turkey--3 to 4 days

QUESTION OF THE WEEK: What is the difference in a "roasted" turkey and a "Baked Turkey"?

ANSWER: Roasting is done by means fry heat at 300 deg. or 325 deg. (slow oven temperature) in a shallow open pan on a rack. This gives the rich full roasted flavor. Skin of bird should not be punctured with a fork-as it serves as the covering to hold the juices in while roasting.

"Baked" turkey has a steamed flavor, and is cooked with the cover over the turkey.

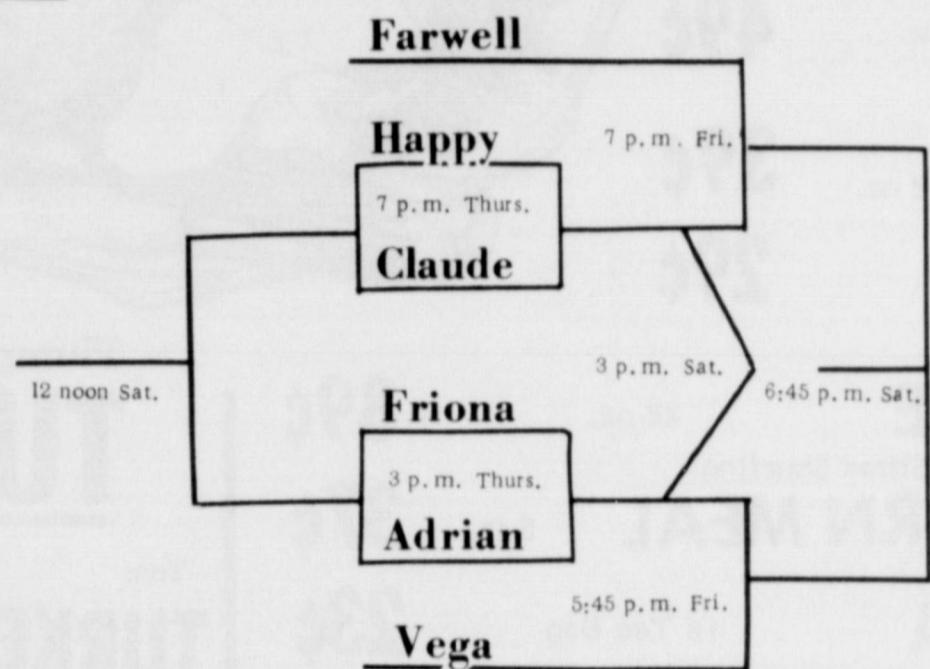

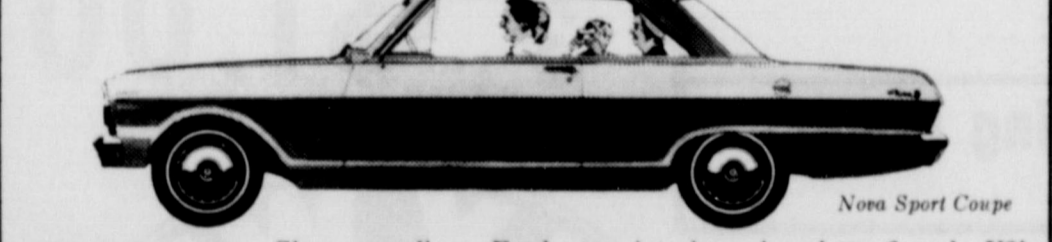

### On The Farm In Parmer County

By JOE VAN ZANDT  
County Agent

I believe everyone has had enough cold, wet weather the last three weeks. Here's hoping we can have some clear sailing the rest of the year and get this cotton out.

Excessive moisture in early morning stripped cotton can cost you money. This extra moisture may result in down grading by a full grade or a loss of about \$8.50 per bale for most cotton in this area.

Cotton in the field takes up moisture from the air. During early morning hours, cotton may have as much as 15 per cent or more moisture. This moisture leaves the open bolls as relative humidity drops later in the morning.

Parmer County farmers can begin looking for the 8 per cent moisture level when relative humidity reaches about 60 per cent at boll height. Air movement, stalk size and soil moisture will affect relative humidity level in the field.

A simple test for determining when cotton is ready for the stripper is to squeeze a handful of seed cotton and hold for a few seconds. If the cotton fluffs out when released, it is safe to start picking. If it doesn't fluff out, better wait a little longer.

#### FARMERS TAX GUIDES

The 1965 edition of the Farmers Tax Guides are now available. These guides contain the new rates and provisions of the income tax law that applies to farmers.

There are several new provisions of the law this year. In seeking to use the best management possible to increase net farm income after taxes are paid, farmers should get a new guide and do some quick figuring to see where they stand before this year closes out.

Copies of the Farmers Tax Guide are available at the County Agent's office and at the ASCS office in Farwell. The SCSS office in Friona also has copies available to the public. Any one that would like to receive a copy of the guide in the mail can let the county agent's office know and we will be glad to mail you a copy.

#### LICE ON LIVESTOCK

Farmers and ranchers in Parmer County should be on the lookout for the annual invasion of lice on their livestock. These pests appear in greatest numbers during fall and winter, and losses can be reduced materially if control measures are taken now.

Animals infested with parasites usually are restless, eat less, do not have good feed conversion and have a rough, coarse appearance.

Spray recommended for controlling lice on beef cattle include Clodrin, coumaphos (Co-Ral), methoxychlor, malathion, dioxathion (Delnav), lindane, Ruelene, carbaryl (Sevin), ronnel (Korlan) and toxaphene.

The blood-sucking lice occurring on swine can be controlled by such insecticides as coumaphos (Co-Ral), DDT, dioxathion (Delnav), malathion, lindane, ronnel (Korlan), methoxychlor and toxaphene.

Extension bulletin, MF-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry. This publication is "chuck-full" of information on insecticide formulations and how to use them in controlling flies, lice, mites, ticks, fleas and cattle grubs. It contains a dilution chart for mixing sprays and dips and outlines control programs for beef animals and nonlactating dairy cattle, dairy animals, sheep and goats, swine, horses and poultry. The bulletin also offers suggestions for controlling house and stable flies.

The above bulletin is a good guide for a sound control program and can be obtained at my office at no cost.

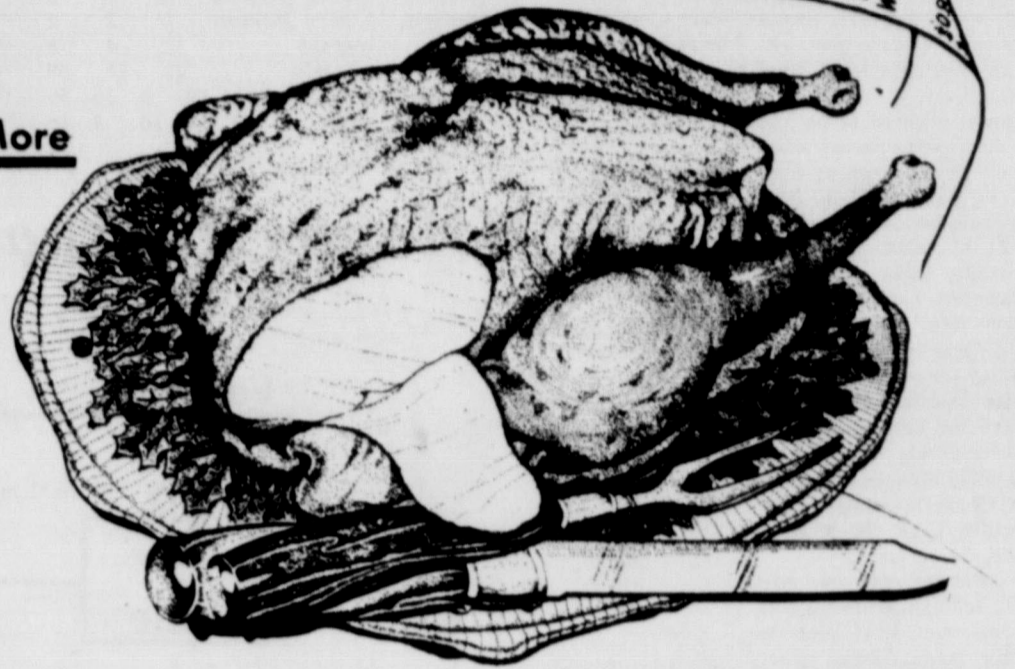
