Frozen Food Film at Grand Wednesday May 22, 1946

Although many good things are known about frozen foods, too few people know how easy it is to freeze foods and what excellent results can be had at home by following the recommended procedures.

In order to acquaint homemakers with some of the methods, the Home Service Department of the West Texas Utilities Co. offers the sound picture "Frozen Foods" at the Grand Theatre on Wednesday afternoon, May 22, at 3 o'clock. The picture, which is filmed in full color, shows preparation steps for freezing fruits and vegetables and the cooking of frozen foods. Also included are details of some methods of cutting and some types of packaging and wrapping for meats, fish and poultry.

The West Texas Utilities Co. is bringing this picture to McCamey as a public service which ties in with the national food preservation program. Because it preserves food values near their original state, freezing is regarded as a good method of food preservation. Meat is only one of the many foods that can be preserved in frozen lockers and modern home freezers. Many fruits and vegetables, including strawberries, peaches, pineapples, berries, peas, spinach, beans and corn, can be prepared for freezing with less work and in a shorter length of time than that required for canning.

Miss Eudora Hawkins and Miss Verna Westbrook of the Home Service Department of the West Texas Utilities Co. will be present to answer questions in regard to some of the ideas or methods for use in Texas and this immediate area.

This educational and instructive film runs 40 minutes and anyone who is interested in the preparation of food for freezing is cordially invited to attend without charge.

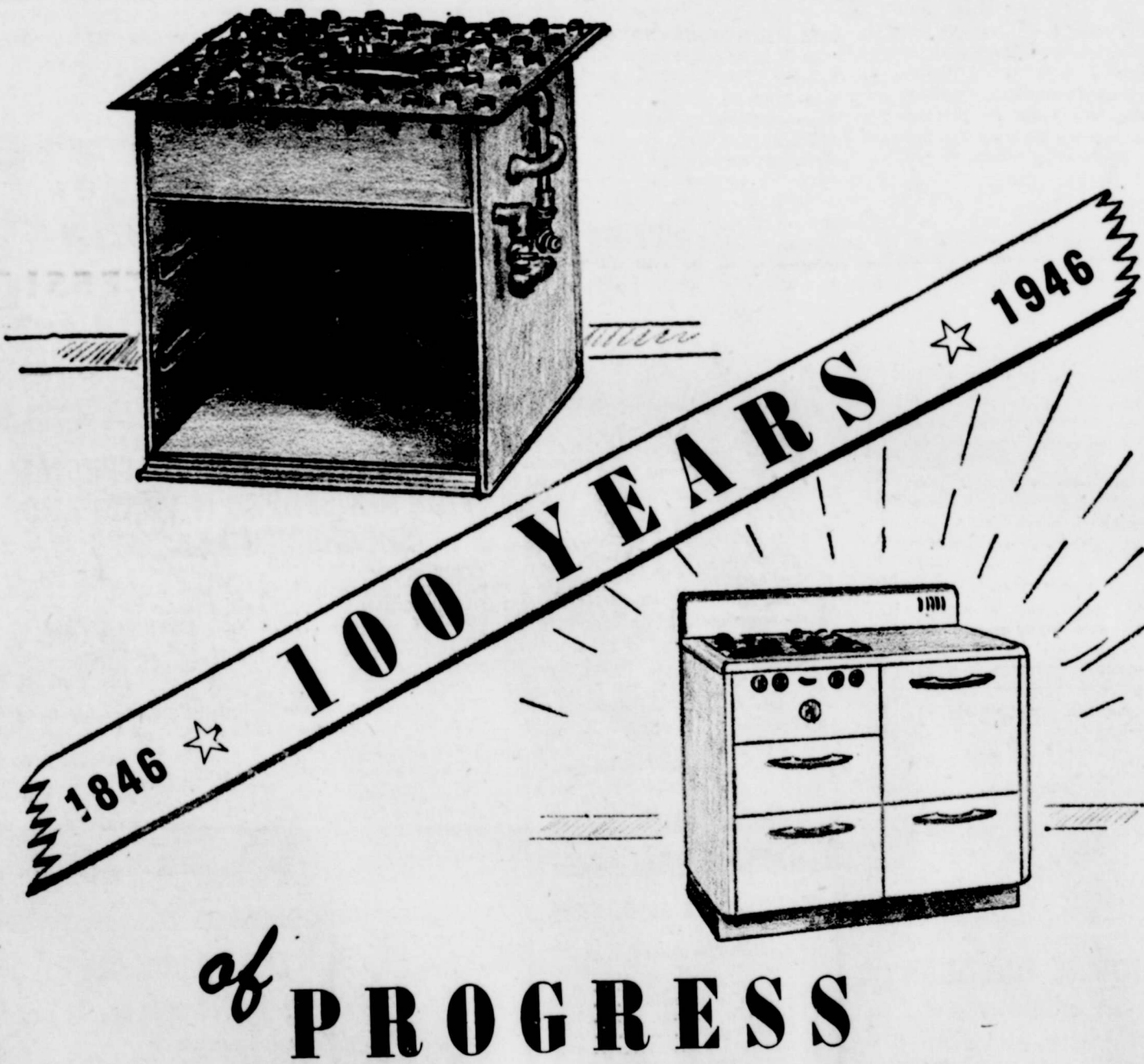

THE urgent job of getting telephone service to those waiting is going ahead. We are nearing a milestone: Soon everyone who needs only a telephone instrument itself to get service will have it. That shortage is about over.

In the first three months of this year we have installed 150,000 new telephones in the five states we serve. This is as many as we would have installed in six months of a normal year.

Although 170,000 new applicants for service during this time kept the waiting list long (223,000 in the Southwest as April began), we now are getting service faster to those waiting longest. A great many of the people waiting for service on V-J Day now have it.

Two big jobs remain:

1. As quickly as we can get it, we are wiring the precision, intricate machinery that handles your calls at the exchange. This takes time and skill. We must do years of work in the next few months.
2. In a great many places we also need outside cable and wire. We plan to have this in and ready when the new equipment in the telephone office is completed. Where we can, we are wiring homes in advance for telephones, ready to connect them the moment we are able.

Meanwhile, we are trying every way we know to stretch the service... and we are temporarily squeezing in everyone we can with party lines, hooking more telephones to already loaded switchboards and dial equipment, putting disconnected lines back into service faster. If for a while telephone service is not always as fast as you'd like it, it is because of this crowding.

We repeat: The telephone company is doing all it can to provide service for waiting customers. We're looking forward to the day we get in touch with you to arrange the details of installing your telephone.

TO THE MAYOR AND ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF McCAMEY:

Do the citizens of McCamey have a competent Police Department? The answer is no.

During the past several weeks a prominent citizen of our town was set upon and stabbed by an escaped maniac from the State Hospital for nervous diseases located at Big Spring, Texas. I regret to say the citizen in question has since died.

Why? Because of the lack of competent police protection.

The present Mayor (and I am referring to Mr. McKinney) in his campaign for Mayor in the spring election of 1945, one item among others he favored, and I am quoting his statements in several issues of the McCamey News prior to the election, was as follows:

He favored adequate police protection. I leave it to the citizens of McCamey whether he has made any attempt to fulfill this promise.

For some unknown reason, the city officials of McCamey are endeavoring to pass the issue of police protection to the county officials, why I do not know.

The time has arrived when McCamey can no longer expect to employ an officer with other duties to perform to look after the policing of the town.

This is not a one-man job, neither can the city officials expect to afford the citizens of McCamey police protection for nothing.

It is time the citizens of McCamey demanded a competent police department, that will function, one that will offer protection to all citizens of McCamey, one that will make it safe for your wife or daughter to walk our streets in safety, and not have to be embarrassed and insulted, and be compelled to take refuge in some private business establishment, owing to the lack of police protection.

Let us forget, the citizens of McCamey are assessed a tax rate of (\$2.40) Two Dollars and Forty Cents a hundred on assessed property valuation, the biggest rate of any town in the immediate vicinity.

What is being done with our tax money we have no way of knowing. After several years residence in McCamey, I have yet to see a financial statement, as to the amount of revenue received by the city administration, or the amount of expenditures.

However, it is my humble opinion that a certain amount of our tax money should be used toward employing a competent police force in McCamey.

Think this matter over, citizens of McCamey, and I think you will agree it is time for actions, and not political promises.

also available. Old-timers take their meals up at the Texas Cowboy Reunion Association Chuck

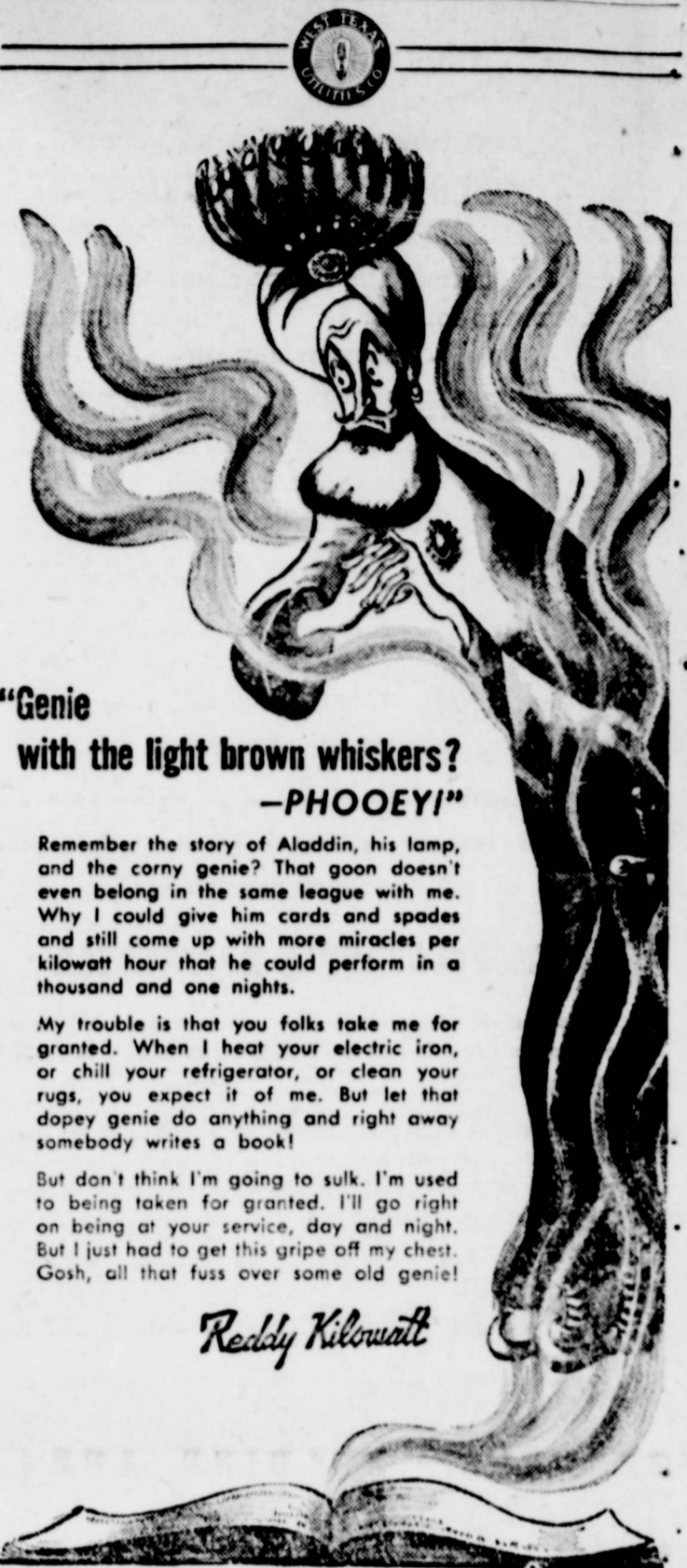

THE RETURN OF DEAD FROM OVERSEAS

The Quartermaster General's Office recently sent this letter to your Veterans' County Service Officer. We quote:

The War Department, in the near future, anticipates authority will be granted to return at Government expense, the remains of those who died overseas to a final resting place as selected by the next of kin.

When the necessary legislation authorizing this Repatriation Program receives Congressional approval and other required arrangements have been made, a poll letter, with a return form and pamphlet attached, will be sent to the next of kin of each deceased serviceman whose remains lie overseas and for whom verified burial information has been received.

Since the problem itself, and the planning and arrangements therefor, are world-wide in scope, the date when the poll letter can be mailed and the date when the answers will be received and can be acted upon is necessarily uncertain. It should be realized, however, that the next of kin will be notified without action on their part as soon as the necessary preliminaries have been completed. You may rest assured that this office fully realizes your desires in this matter and will do everything in its power to fulfill them at the earliest date possible.

The above letter will clear up the questions I have had on this subject.

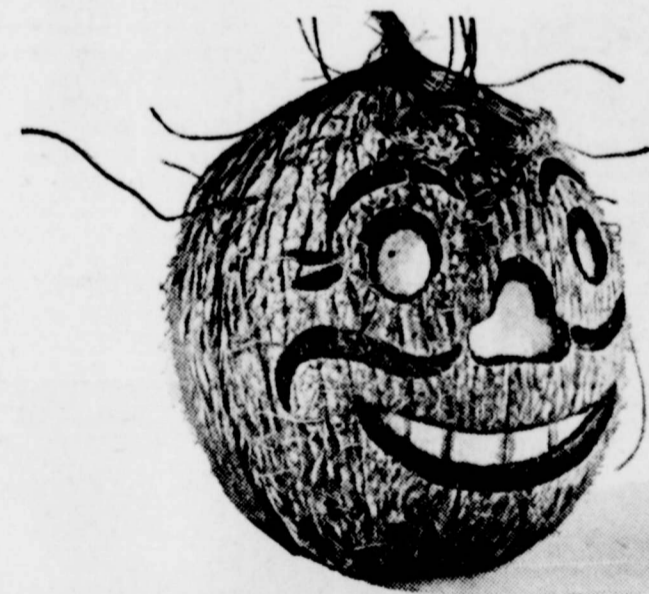

Health Officer Cites Danger of Measles

AUSTIN, Tex., May 16.—With the incidence of measles more than 60 per cent higher than the seven year meridian, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a statement concerning the use of gamma globulin for protecting very young or frail children from an attack of this perennial childhood disease and its often serious complications.

"If you have a child less than five years old who has been exposed to measles, your family doctor may recommend giving him gamma globulin," Dr. Cox advised. "Through city, county or state health departments, doctors can obtain gamma globulin free to be used as they think advisable. Infants and children, whose health makes it inadvisable to them to suffer an attack of measles, may postpone the disease if gamma globulin is administered within eight days from the time of exposure."

The State Health Officer emphasized that gamma globulin cannot give a child permanent protection against measles and added that the protection is ordinarily of about three weeks duration. However, there is no limit to the number of times it can be used, and a baby who is protected by it now can be protected by it again in June or July. Gamma globulin can go on shielding him against measles until he is old enough and strong enough to stand an attack without serious consequences.

During an outbreak of measles, Dr. Cox said that it is well to keep children under five years of age, and more especially frail children, from all other youngsters who might serve as sources of infection.

Statistics show that nine-tenths of all measles deaths occur in children under five years of age.
