McCamey's Big Three-Day Race Meet Starts Today, June 7

George B. McCamey Annual Celebration Set for June 14-15 Thirty-Eight Horses Entered On First Days Program

Bathing Revue and Street Dance Highlight Program

Final preparations are under way this week for the first post-war George B. McCamey Annual Celebration to be held June 14 and 15.

At this writing, 18 merchants have entered local talent to compete for the title of "Miss McCamey" on the first night bathing revue, to be held Friday, June 14. In addition to these, several more pledged entrants have not been filed, and the total entries are expected to reach as high as 25 contestants.

Out-of-town entrants, who will compete with the local winner for the title of "Venus of the

Pecos," are expected to reach at least 12. Exact tabulations on these entries will not be available till later this week, according to Bill Moore, Chairman of the Bathing Revue.

Meanwhile, Milton Bryant, Chairman of the Boxing, is rounding up his part of the show with matches slated among local boys and out-of-town talent. Highlight of this part of the program is to be a match between Arlo Royce, San Angelo, former National Golden Gloves champ, and an opponent from this area. Attempts are being made to match this former champ with Dexter Jay, Midland welterweight.

STREET DANCE SET

All negotiations have been made for holding of a street dance on both nights of the gala events, and there will be bingo stands, raffle stands, hot dog and soda water stands to help crowds spend an enjoyable evening.

Another highlight of the two-day event will be a softball game between the McCamey All-Stars and the Odessa All-Stars. The game is scheduled for Friday afternoon at the local softball diamond.

The parade, featuring the Bathing Beauty contestants, with adorned floats, is being planned. Along with this, the High School Band is to lead the parade, with color bearers to be mounted. It will be the most colorful spectacle of the two days of festivity.

Bishop Costen J. Harrell, resident bishop of the Birmingham Area of the Methodist Church and former pastor of West End Church in Nashville, Tenn., will be the speaker over an independent network of 38 stations on The Methodist Hour Sunday morning, June 9.

He will use as his sermon subject, "The Question Supreme." Bishop Harrell is the author of a number of best seller books in the religious field, prominent among these titles are "The Bible—Its Origin and Growth," "Walking With God in the School of Prayer," "Prophecy of Israel" and "The Radiant Heart."

He was elected to the episcopacy of the Methodist Church by the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference on June 22, 1941, and since that time has been serving as bishop of the Alabama, the North Alabama and the Cuba Conference of his church.

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Regional Round-Up

With the "mysterious sickness" variously diagnosed as infantile paralysis and sleeping sickness making its appearance in more and more Texas cities, Monahans city officials have launched an intensive clean-up campaign starting Monday and to run thru next week.

"We don't plan to make a whirlwind clean up here for one week and then let things ride along in any old fashion," Mayor Duffey said. "This is to be a continuous campaign and the cooperation of every man and woman and child in Monahans is asked in order to prevent a repetition of what San Antonio, Corpus Christi and other cities are going through."

All residents are asked to clean up their yards and alleys adjacent to their homes or places of business. Get rid of trash, cans, bottles and junk of all kinds that might be a suitable breeding place for flies, mosquitoes, rats or mice. Keep all garbage in covered containers.

Ten or more trucks will be provided next Friday to make a thorough pick-up of all accumulated garbage and trash.

Restaurants and other eating places are asked to pay particular attention to sanitation and personal hygiene.

Parents are cautioned to be especially watchful of children not to permit over exertion or visiting where there is sickness.

The Texas State Teachers Association has just completed a survey among city and county school superintendents to determine the condition of the teacher personnel in Texas. Replies were received of 945 superintendents, representing 36,057 teaching positions or about 80 per cent of the total in Texas. Since the opening of school in September, 3,633 teachers have resigned their positions which represents about 10 per cent of the total. Of the teachers included in the survey, 5,546 were listed with sub-standard qualifications which represents approximately 15 per cent of the total.

Local districts are exerting every effort possible to keep teachers in the classrooms but many superintendents report that it appears impossible to fill all of their positions this coming year because of the low salaries paid and the number of resignations which are anticipated at the close of the current school year. Practically all of the cities in Texas report resignations averaging 13 per cent. Many local school districts are voting to increase their tax rate or will increase property valuations in order to secure more revenue for the teachers' salaries. One hundred and ten independent school districts have voted a tax increase above the rates they levied a year ago and 134 report that they plan to hold elections for tax rate increases soon. In 40 counties, one of more common school districts have increased their tax rates and 10 of the counties report that they plan to hold elections for this purpose soon.

It is estimated that 8,500 Texas teachers entered the armed forces and industry from September, 1941, through 1945. However, only 1,277 have returned to teaching.

In looking over the results of the survey, Elizabeth Koch of San Antonio, president of the Texas State Teachers Association, said: "If we are to keep a staff of well-trained teachers in the public schools, we must materially increase salaries. There is no other solution to the problem. The continued exodus of our teachers from the classrooms presents an alarming condition. We must give our attention to this problem immediately with the hope that local communities and the next session of the legislature will provide increased support for the public schools."

All of the right-of-way for the first 24 miles of State Highway 226, south of Marathon has been obtained and the deeds filed for record, it was announced this week by G. J. Kempen, resident engineer.

It is expected that a contract will be let for paving this section of the Big Bend National Park road next month, it was stated.

Survey work on the remaining 16 miles to the Park entrance at Persimmon Gap, 40 miles south of Marathon, is approximately 75 per cent complete, Mr. Kempen said.

A paved road from Marathon

to the park by next year is probable, it was stated.

The right-of-way was secured by the Brewster County Commissioners Court.

Surveys are also under way for roads to be built within the park area.

With almost all living space reserved by prospective summer school students and with daily applications coming to the business office, Sul Ross summer school promises to be the largest in a number of years.

Several new courses and a number of new teachers will meet the summer students. Among the new courses will be a workshop in Health and Child Development, conducted by Dr. J. B. Speer, who assumes the office of Director of Public Service and Associate Professor of Education June 1; and a course in the Administration of Elementary Education, conducted by a visiting professor, will be offered by the Education department in the first term. A course in English Literature will be offered each term by Dr. E. C. Coleman, head of the English department. The department of Health and Physical Education will institute a group of play-projects in a new recreational program of play-nights and intramural contests.

Since many G. I.'s are entering college, not having finished high school, a new course in general mathematics will be offered by Professor J. C. Coleman for their benefit. Some elementary education majors may be interested in this course also, by way of review.

In addition to Dr. Speer, the following new faculty members will be teaching this summer: Miss Reeves in Art, and another visiting professor in Home Economics; also, Dr. Georgia Gantt Winn, a lieutenant in the WAEVs, and Lt. Com. Selmer C. Robinson, USNR, will be back for duty for both terms of the summer school.

A change in policy of the school on student teaching requires that the practice teacher must open the entire 12 weeks in the practice school, and elementary education teachers are being urged to defer their practice teaching until the Junior or Senior year.

Although indications were that the polio epidemic in San Antonio and Corpus Christi has subsided for the moment, efforts were still being made this week by members of the cleanup committee to see that breeding places for flies and mosquitoes are eliminated and all trash is picked up.

A power sprayer, using a strong solution of DDT, spent Monday and Tuesday spraying fly-infested areas, stock pens in town, septic tanks and outdoor privies. City and country trucks hauled off numerous loads of trash and refuse.

Coach Mack Alexander reported that the swimming pool would be opened within the next two weeks, but only after it had been painted, repaired and thoroughly cleared. The chlorine content of the water used will be kept at a safe level.

Dr. J. F. Howell, city and county health officer, asks that all citizens realize that one good cleaning a year isn't enough to prevent an epidemic from breaking out, but that the cooperation and help of all is needed all the time. Dr. Howell said that one of the most helpful things that can be done is for all persons owning livestock being kept in the city limits is to move it out.

Wool appraisers at the Sonora Wool and Mohair Co. last Friday totaled 304,528 pounds, and brought a total amount of \$132,692.46 to the producers, according to George D. Chalk, warehouseman.

Appraisers were G. W. Shields, C. A. McDonald, chief area appraiser, and Beall Barbee.

The 12-months appraised totaled 133,971 pounds, and averaged 44.65 cents net to the grower. Total of the 8-months was 170,557 pounds, with an average net to the grower of 42.60 cents.

Security State Bank won over Mentone, 9 to 8, in a contest played Tuesday night. Blanton and Bush did the pitching and Duncan the catching for the bankers while Morales pitched and Lewis caught for the visitors.

Good crowds attended the games Monday and Tuesday nights despite adverse weather conditions. Indications are that some excellent games are in store for Pecosites during the coming summer.

Importance of ridding the city of flies and mosquitoes was stressed by Mayor E. G. Stafford this week when he asked members of the Lions Club to support the city's efforts along that line.

The mayor, reading about the polio and sleeping sickness epidemics in other Texas towns, last week issued a proclamation making this week "clean-up week" in Pecos. During the week, Mayor Stafford told members of the Lions Club in session Wednesday noon, a great deal of sanitation work has been done here. "Let's keep it up," he urged.

The health and welfare committee of the Lions, headed by Mahlon Nobles, has waged a campaign to get the residents of this city to clean up all unsanitary places. One feature of the campaign was to distribute placards and circulars over the city, urging the people to clean up their places.

Installation of the Robert Locke Post No. 6969, VFW, at Grandfalls was completed on May 7, with George Steadman of Monahans in charge of installation services, Tom Dennis acting Post Commander, and Judge Fred Snodden acting as senior vice commander.

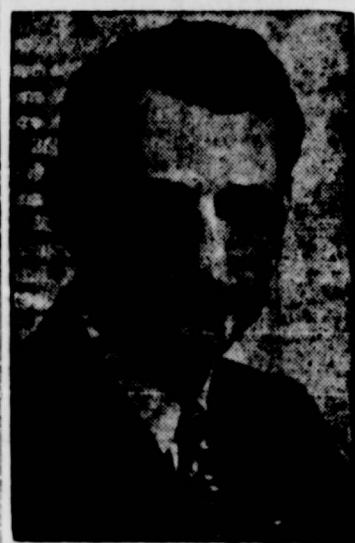

Kerrville Now Has Extension Service Planning Program

AUSTIN, Tex.—Communities have personalities just as individuals do—they may be friendly, wholesome and progressive, or slow, retarded and unsightly to the eye. Miss Jeanie Pinckney, sponsor of in-service training of group workers for the Extension Division of the University of Texas, has as her special job showing groups how they can make their communities attractive and interesting.

Miss Pinckney has been counseling groups in Kerrville for several months and she can chalk off a half dozen other towns, and literally hundreds of individuals whom she has guided in community planning.

An acceptable and responsive way of living during the summer months is the goal of a program Kerrville is to have this summer, Miss Pinckney said. Schools, churches, encampments, business and professional groups have planned a unified community program which will include both individuals and families.

"A playground program is evolving out of the desire to make the program progressively sound and to guide each individual in getting something very satisfying out of his experiences," she said. "Craft and other classes are built almost wholly around leaders who are stimulating an interest among many citizens in the different groups and areas of the community. While there is a place for each child and adult, the program also provides a place for the entire family to enjoy their leisure together if they choose."

"It is very interesting to stimulate the groups to have goals in their planning and to show originality; it's more interesting to see them get into action, and still more interesting to help them get around some of the obstacles they did not anticipate," Miss Pinckney said. "But the most fascinating thing of all is to see the individual in the group accept his or her role and carry it to completion."

THE G. I. BILL HOUSING

The Senate on April 10 passed the bill, H. R. 4761, by a vote of 63 to 13. This is the Veterans Emergency Housing Bill to speed the construction of 2,700,000 homes for veterans in the next two years. This measure was passed by the House on March 7, and it now goes to conference where the Senate and House must agree on a compromise version. The chief point of difference is the Senate provision for \$600,000,000 in subsidies to encourage output of scarce building materials. The House refused to permit these premium payments, and both branches went against price ceilings for existing dwellings. Ceilings on new houses were provided by the House and Senate alike. The President signed the bill and it became effective May 14, 1946.

The bill also provides: A Government-guaranteed market for pre-fabricated houses and new-type construction materials.

Expands Government authority to insure home mortgages by \$1,000,000.

Gives veterans "first preference" in renting or buying homes built during the next two years. Empowers Wyatt to direct OPA to make upward revisions in ceiling prices on building materials; establish a priorities system to channel critical materials into the veterans housing, and to regulate—or, if necessary—export of lumber and other building materials abroad.

Some Timely Advice Given Out For The Summer Vacationists

AUSTIN, Tex.—Some timely advice to vacationists concerning the proper precautions to be used in water sports during summer months was released from the State Health Department recently by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

It was pointed out that in view of prevailing travel difficulties, vacation pleasures are apt to be limited to excursions and picnics at nearby lakes, rivers and ponds of unfamiliar depths and currents, and without the usual life guard supervision associated with bathing beaches and commercial swimming pools.

"Swimming and water sports are beneficial to good health provided one's physical condition justifies this type of exercise," Dr. Cox asserted; "nevertheless, they possess dangerous possibilities if the rules of safety, thru carelessness or thoughtlessness, are disregarded."

The State Health Officer outlined the following simple rules for bathing and swimming in safety:

When swimming, be alert and careful of unknown depths and currents; at least one hour should elapse after a meal before entering the water; upon the first indication of fatigue, come ashore and call it a day; if you become chilled, leave the water immediately; do not enter the water when overheated; learn to float. This is most important. Never attempt to rock a boat in a spirit of fun; never swim in water that may be polluted. Swimming close to or even a few miles below sewage outlets is inviting the possibility of acquiring disease.

"Excursions, picnics, swimming parties contribute much to a healthy, happy, normal life, which is always desirable," Dr. Cox said. "It is by no means advisable to eliminate these excursions from our summer program, but it is important that they prove beneficial and not disastrous."

Mr. Elliott was born and reared in the 88th District of West Texas, which comprises these 13 counties. His parents were pioneers in the cattle business and later in the oil business. His father was the late Geo. D. Elliott, who was well known and highly respected in this region.

He was born 40 years ago in Midland, Texas. His wife is the daughter of a West Texas pioneer, Sam McKinney, who was the first mayor of Odessa and at present is County Treasurer.

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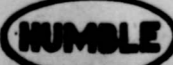

I was subsequently transferred to the Pacific and participated in the Okinawa campaign.
