McCamey's First Post-War Celebration Starts Today, June 14 \$1,000 Race

Fair Grounds Saturday

Officials of the Upton County Fair Association announced on Thursday that a matched race for a purse of \$1,000 will be run at the Fair Grounds Saturday afternoon between Wongera, owned by Jack Schisler of Monahans, and Bounding Main, owned by D. Breeding, president of the Upton County Fair Association.

Four purse races will be run on Saturday and four on Sunday, June 15-16, according to officials. Distances are 330 yards, 3-8 mile, 1-2 mile, and 5-8 mile.

Sgt. Deward Cook Home on Leave

Technical Sergeant Deward Cook of the Marine Corps, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Cook of . McCamey, and a veteran of World War II, arrived in Mc-Camey Friday, June 7. He is on leave from Washington, D. C., for a period of 21 days. He plans to spend the entire period with his family here in McCamey.

Sgt. Cook entered service on Feb. 26, 1941, at San Diego, Calif., where he completed his basic training in the Marine Corps. Soon after completion of the latter training, he sailed from Norfolk, Va., passed through the Panama Canal into the Pacific and after a hazardous crossing, landed in New Zealand, where he joined the task force that later made the initial landing on Guadalcanal, Solomon Islands.

After the Guadalcanal operation, Sgt. Cook was sent back to Australia for a period of rest and reorganization. Later he took an active part in the landings on Cape Glouster, New Britain,
