The above picture was taken in the fall of 1921. It was a display window in Erle Bone's Ladies Ready-to-wear, located in Richmond, Indiana. It was Bone's first business venture after returning from active duty with Uncle Sam's victorious Army in World War I. The ladies togs shown in the window were worn by a model in a style show and won first place. The dress is of black velvet, ankle length, with side gathered drape, half length sleeves and trimmed in metal beads. The price—\$250.00. The fur was a Stone Martin (a Russian animal). Price—\$75.00. The hat, MADE BY GAGE, came down over the wearer's face somewhat like the G. I. Helmet of World War II. Price—\$45.00. The pouch purse was made to match the metal beads on the dress. Price—\$15.00.

The picture was the first taken by a veteran by the name of Roy Hirschburg who had also just returned from service in World War I. He still has the original bill Mr. Bone paid him for it. The photograph was given to the Bones by Mr. Hirschburg while they were visiting in Indiana recently. It has been used several times in modern advertising to show the modern contrast in styles.

### Dave Pool's Snow Wins Brady Derby

MASON, July 4.—Snow, the aging dapple blue from McCamey, turned back a strong bid here Thursday from a game little Brady mare to win the Mason Derby by a long nose for the second consecutive year.

The Brady mare, C. Pennel's Helen Jo, put on an unexpected drive in the stretch to overhaul the free-running dapple and only a little of the extra something a jockey can always expect from a horse in the clutch carried Merlin Lemons of Brady home on Snow, the winner.

The four-horse event, climaxing Mason's most successful three-day race meeting, was a crowd-pleaser from the clang of the starter gate that sent the four horses plunging down the track on the one and one-sixteenth mile run.

Snow and Helen Jo broke even at the gate and Dave Pool's dapple ran into the lead by a neck at the first turn. Snow gradually increased his lead and ran it nearly a length while little Carl Ewing of Coleman, riding Helen Jo, let the mare flow easily along the track and bided his time. On the last turn he asked the mare, who only yesterday ran a seven-eighths mile race and won by a length, to take the blue horse.

The nervous Helen Jo responded with a sprint that began about half way on the turn and became gradually stronger as they went into the straight-of-way and she slowly came abreast of the McCamey horse.

For a moment it looked like the game little mare hadn't expended her total effort yesterday and again today, and once it appeared her drive had put her a nose ahead of the dapple blue.

But Lemons got that extra out of Pool's pony with the finish line less than 12 yards away, and the big dapple thundered over by a long nose to win his second derby with time of one minute, 54 seconds.

Red Gay, the Sonora horse owned by J. Barker, who was second in the derby last year, was not up to the pull this year, and

finished a far third, while Rover, owned by Fay Ricks of San Antonio, brought up the rear. The two never contested either Snow or Helen Jo.

More than 5,000 persons, many of them from San Angelo and San Saba, and other far points as well as neighboring towns, filled every seat in the grandstand and packed the railing to watch the seven races. The grandstand was filled long before the races started, and at one time cars were lined up nearly a mile at the ticket gate.

### Devonian Pay In Block No. 31 Is Moved North

Rating 291.12 barrels of 44.1 gravity oil for natural completion from 8,620 to plugged back depth of 8,966 feet, Atlantic No. 1-R-31-U has extended Devonian production in the Block 31 (Devonian and Ellenburger) field in Crane County one-half mile north-northwest from Atlantic No. 1-L-31-U.

The well is the twelfth to be completed and the fifth from the Devonian only and is in the C NE 28-31-U. It drilled to 9,000 feet. The official gauge was thru a 3-8-inch tubing choke. Gas-oil ratio was 1,284-1.

Atlantic No. 1-U-31-U, half a mile W-SW of No. 1-R-31-U, was swabbing after treating the Devonian from 8,735-9,000 ft. with 5,000 gallons of acid.

Ballard & Cody No. 2-U, outpost to the McElroy field, showed 1,100 feet of oil in drilling to 3,074 feet, was shot with 300 quarts of nitroglycerin from 3,011-74 and was cleaning out. It is 1,520 from the south, 2,310 ft. from the east line of sec. 48-30-U.
