ment which stated: "January 1, 1943 . . . Upton County was overdrawn \$3,349.65 and its bonded indebtedness was

This statement failed to point out that our largest nonresident tax-payer had not paid taxes during 1941 and 1942, while awaiting an adjustment of valuation for tax purposes.

This adjustment was made in February of 1943, approximately one month after the present court took office, with the single non-resident company paying approximately \$78,450 in taxes for the two years.

The financial condition of the county immediately became sound through no effort on the part of the present court, even before the 1943 taxes were received.

Now, the downward adjustment in valuation for taxable purposes did not return the total valuation to its old level of \$11,176,327.00, but placed it at \$14,278,000.00, thus increasing the County's total income from taxes \$36,170.57 per year.

Our County records show that taxes levied at the old valuation of \$11,176,327 totaled \$99,470.43, while taxes levied in 1943, when the valuation for County tax purposes stood at \$14,278,000, totaled \$135,641.00.

Again, this improvement in the financial condition of the County was due to no effort on the part of the present court.

The March 29 advertisement stated that the tax rate has been lowered each year since 1942. The figures follow:

> 1945 1946

The advertisement does not point out that the 1941 tax rate was 60c. Neither does it point out that the old court, of which my father was a member, was requested by the present County Judge to raise the 1942 rate to 95c in order that the present court might have sufficient operating funds. The old court then voluntarily raised the rate from 60c to 95c, the level

The advertisement states: "This amount does not include an amount placed in escrow covering warrants which protested by Upton County. All outstanding warrants which were protested have been paid in full."

The advertisement failed to state that the money was borrowed from the Mercantile National Bank of Dallas by the old court, of which my father was a member, in order to avoid reverting to a former practice of issuing scrip with consequences which the present County Judge's "old timers" well remember. The advertisement fails to state that the money was borrowed only in order to tide the County over until an adjustment could be made with the non-resident tax-payer referred to in previous paragraphs. The advertisement failed to state that the Mercantile National Bank thoroughly investigated Upton County's financial condition before making the loan and found it sound enough to advance as much as \$100,000 if required. As is well known, it was never necessary to borrow the full amount.

The advertisement also fails to state that, following the effort of the present court to prevent payment of the loan three courts, including the State Supreme Court, upheld the validity of the loan and ordered that it be paid with interest and resulting costs, which interest and cost amounted to

The advertisement failed to state that this case could at one time have been settled as approximately cost, thus saving Upton County tax-payers approximately \$10,343.30.

In fact, it is recorded in the Commissioners' Court minutes of December 8, 1943, that a motion was made and carried to pay the Mercantile National Bank of Dallas the sum then due (\$64,401.64 plus interest). Commissioners Yates and Yocham voted aye, Commissioner McCollum not voting. There is no record of County Judge Edwards or Commissioner Currie having cast a vote for or against. It is presumed, however, that they were not present.

However, they were present at the January 4, 1944, meeting of the court, at which time a motion was made and carried instructing the First State Bank of Rankin to refuse payment of any check . . . outstanding in favor of "said Mercantile National Bank of Dallas." Commissioners McCollum and Currie and the County Judge voted aye, while Commissioners Yocham and Yates voted No. This reversal cost tax-payers \$10,343.30.

The advertisement does not state the nature of this bonded indebtedness, all of which was essential to the residents of the County. A statement of original indebtedness for County bonds and time warrants follows:

#### WE CAN'T BRAG

Editor's Note: The following is one of three editorials written by Bo Byers. University of Texas student. They won for him the annual Clarence E. Gilmore safety contest. Byers formerly worked on newspapers at Tyler and Marshall.

They say Texans like to brag, especially about the bigness Texas and the big things done in the state.

But Texas can't brag when talk gets around to traffic safety Texas has some big statistical figures on traffic casualties but the trouble is that the big figures are on the wrong side of the ledger.

Highway accidents, which account for approximately half of the Texas traffic casualties, are on the increase over 1945 by 34 per cent, reports N. W. Woerner, chief of the Statistical Division of the Department of Public Safety

Those figures mean that, if the percentage remains the same more than 2,000 persons will die in highway wrecks in Texas this

We cursed the Germans and the Japs when they killed thousands of American men, and we brought an end to the killing by smashing a five-county area including Pe-Germany and Japan. But we see daily news accounts of people killed in auto accidents, and our anger is not stirred. Death on the highway has become so commonplace that we accept it as an inevitable consequence of the Modern Age.

A decision of far-reaching sigdificance to owners of leases and mineral classified land was handd down recently by the Texa Supreme Court in an appeal of e Pecos County suit of John

Oates vs. Tryon Lewis, et al. The court ruled that a contract providing a perpetual interest in mineral classified land wa invalid because such a contrac ay apply only to the term of a specific mineral lease, and because, further, it would be contrary to public policy.

Mineral classified land can be eased for oil or other mineral development by the surface owner as agent for the state, and the owner receives one-half the income from such leases as the agent of the state. The court de cision clarified the question of whether an interest in royalty under such sections might be reserved by special contract.



IDAHO FALLS, Ida.—Newspaper advertising in the major market centers of the U.S. sells Idaho's and Maine's potatoes.







#### Senator Allan Shivers in Race For Lieutenant-Governor of Texas




