## Jaycees Receive Special Recognition At Dallas Convention

The McCamey "Jaycees" received special recognition at a state convention last Friday, July 19, which was held in the Danish Room of the Adolphus Hotel in Dallas. "Pappy" Rogers, Kenneth Babcock and Merel Edleman flew there Friday morning to attend the meeting as representatives from McCamey. The object was the inauguration of the new state officers for 1946-1947.

The principal speaker was Mr. Grant Morris, who was the first president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce in the State of Texas, founded in 1928. Today, McCamey, which is No. 113, is the youngest "Jaycee" in Texas.

The McCamey "Jaycees" received special recognition from Grant Morris and Tommy Mangram, newly elected State president. Mr. Mangram will be here in the near future for the presentation of the McCamey "Jaycee" charter.

At the convention, the Youth Activity Program, which the McCamey "Jaycees" have been working for, was decided to get a special writeup in the National "Jaycee" magazine.

## Post Office Dept Solicits Proposals For New Quarters

Proposals are being solicited to be received in the office of Post-Office Inspector L. G. Bragden at Fort Worth, Texas, up to and including Aug. 8, to furnish quarters suitable for post office purposes here, under a lease subject to the provisions of the standard form of lease used by the Post-Office Department, at a stated price per annum, including fuel, light, power, water, toilet facilities, plumbing, heating and lighting fixtures, for a term of five years from Jan. 24, 1947.

Floor space of about 1800 square feet is desired. Important considerations are a reasonably good location, good daylight, accessibility to rear or side entrance for mails. Proposals about fuel, light, power and water will also be considered.

Diagram of rooms offered, showing inside dimensions, offsets, doors, windows, etc., and any adjoining ground for light areas, drive ways, or parking areas, must be submitted with the proposal. Proponents may also submit photographs of their property and its surroundings if they so desire.

General building requirements, and formal proposal, together with information concerning the provisions of the lease, may be obtained from the Postmaster, Mr. R. S. Guyton, or the inspector whose name and address are indicated above.

The Post Office Department reserves the right to reject any all proposals, to negotiate further with proponents for better terms, or to endeavor either before or after the closing date to indicate to secure offers suitable properties, in addition to those submitted in response to the advertisement.

Proponents may be required to show whether the property offered is mortgaged and to furnish a concurrent agreement by the mortgagee.

## Federal Approval Received for Improvement Of Highway Running Due South of McCamey

## Reimers Returns From Firemen's School Held At A. &amp; M. College

Malcolm Reimers, local fire chief, returned Saturday morning, July 20, from attending the 17th Annual School for Firemen which was conducted at A&M College at Bryan, Texas, under the auspices of the State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Association of Texas.

Fire Chief Reimers attended the Fire Marshal's Section while he was in this school. The program, in part, for this section was as follows: a very fine and instructive program conducted by Mr. G. M. Kintz, U. S. Bureau of Mines, Dallas, on general hazards; Mr. P. E. Keegan of the Shell Oil Co. of Houston presented a program on Industrial Plant Fire Control and Extinguishment of Industrial Fires which included a detailed and demonstration on controlling fires occurring in oil tank farms, and refineries; Mr. S. C. McIntosh of the Railroad Commission of Austin on Liquefied Petroleum Gases.

W. G. Burns, Fire Marshal of Dallas, was in charge of this section and was assisted by P. W. Clooney, Fire Marshal of Houston. Reimers reported that he enjoyed attending this school except that the weather was too hot.

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## Rankinites Return From Visit In Calif.

The 15-mile gap of unpaved highway due south of McCamey has been approved by the Public Roads Administration as being eligible for improvement with federal-aid funds matched with funds on the part of the state highway department, according to a letter received by Congressman R. E. Thomason from Thos. H. MacDonald, Washington, commissioner of public roads.

Mr. MacDonald declared that the highway was recently included in the approved federal-aid secondary highway system for Texas.

It is explained that under the federal highway legislation all federal-aid projects must be initiated and carried out by or under the supervision of the state highway department subject to the approval of the Public Roads Administration.

Improvement of this highway, long urged by James Carll, publisher of the News, will bring McCamey in closer contact with the rich Iraan-Sheffield trade area.

## A. C. Underwood Killed In Oil Field Mishap

A. C. (Woody) Underwood, 60, was killed about 8 p. m. Wednesday when he was struck by a falling pin from a crown block as he worked on the floor of a drilling ten miles northwest of Bakersfield in Pecos County.

Mr. Underwood, who moved to McCamey from Snyder last April, was employed by the Duffey Drilling Company of McCamey.

He resided for many years in Coleman where he was married to Mrs. Jewell Lewis March 8, 1941. He was born July 8, 1886, in Doddridge County, W. Va.

The body was shipped by the Harris-Luckett Funeral Home of McCamey to Salem, W. Va., where funeral services and interment will be held.

Survivors include the widow and one son, Harry, of Painsville, Ohio.

## Interest Runs High; Heavy Poll Expected

Once again the voters can go to the polls on Saturday, July 27, for their first peacetime voting in six years, exercising their duties of citizenship and the freedom of this democracy in the Primary Election to be held on that day. The coming election has aroused much interest throughout the state as it has taken precedence over other news, and will be brought to a climax over the week-end.

Possibly the highlight of all the political campaigns was the speech of Tom Connally, Senior United States Senator, Tuesday night, July 23, who in a broadcast gave his first and only campaign speech in six years in the form of a report to the people of Texas.

Public attention is called to the gubernatorial race in the form of the three most talked about candidates, Homer P. Rainey, John Lee Smith, and Grover Sellers. A total of 12 candidates still remain in the race for the highest office in the State of Texas.

The political campaigning in Upton County has been no less interesting than the state officials' race. Practically all of the candidates are opposed by one or more opponents. Interest has been centered particularly on the County Judge's race for which there are four candidates to be considered.

L. E. Windham has been appointed County Chairman of the Primary Election in Upton County, with the following serving on the Democratic Committee: Rufe Winters, G. C. Pauley, and the four Precinct Chairmen, Precinct 1, L. P. Johnson, Precinct 2, Tom Workman, Precinct 3, Arthur Schnaubert, and Precinct 4, Wallace Littlejohn.

Mr. Windham has appointed the following election judges for the various precincts: Precinct 1, Boyd Cox, Judge; John Christie, Assistant Judge; Precinct 2, Mrs. Nix, Judge, Mrs. S. H. Boyd, Assistant Judge; Precinct 3, Box 3, Rufe Windham, Judge, Mrs. Buck Kelton, Assistant Judge; Precinct 4, Box 4, Mrs. Leonard Shafer, Judge, Mrs. H. M. Tipton, Assistant Judge; Precinct 4, Box 5, R. N. Taliaferro, Judge, Harry Fullenwider and Jim Herrington, Assistant Judges; Precinct 4, Box 6, S. R. Erly, Judge, Mrs. Geo. Gray and Miss Cleo Spalding, Assistant Judges.

The location of the various polls are as follows: Precinct 1, Lodge Hall at Rankin; Precinct 2, Court House at Rankin; Precinct 3, Box 3, McElroy "Y" Ranch; Precinct 4, Box 4, Mexican School House; Precinct 4, Box 5, Rodman's Supply; and Precinct 4, Box 6, McCamey High School.

The polls will be open at 8 o'clock Saturday morning and will close at 7 that night.

Worked for just legislation in behalf of Federal employees.

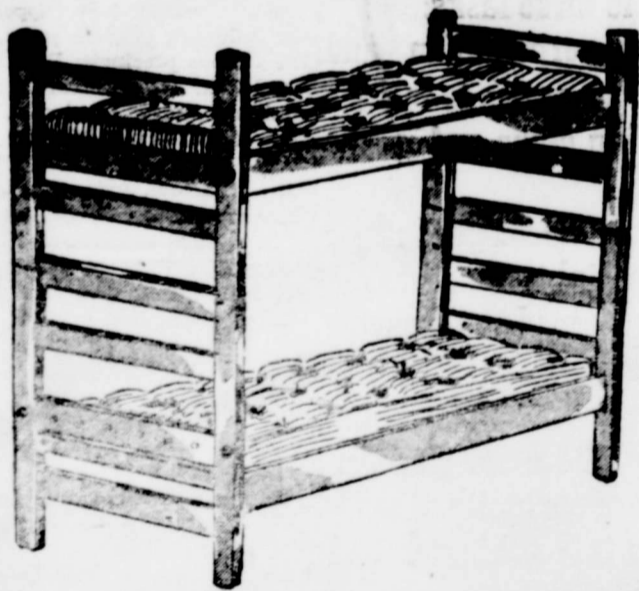
For needed public buildings and highways.

Alpine citizens are planning an unusual bit of entertainment for director and members of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association there Saturday, Sept. 28.

This session will be the first ever held west of Ft. Stockton and directors and members of the TS&GRA and the Highland Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association in that area are anxious to entertain in royal style.

On Friday evening, Sept. 27, a reception is to be held in the Holland Hotel and following at 9 o'clock will be a dance in the gymnasium at Sul Ross State College.

The business meeting is to be held at 9 o'clock Saturday morning and this program is now in the process of arrangement.

At 1 o'clock a barbecue is to be served at Kokernot Lodge and at 8 in the evening there will be a football game between Sul Ross Lobos and ACC Wildcats. Sul Ross is resuming football following a layoff during the war.

Sightseeing tours in the Davis Mountains will be arranged for Sunday if any of the visitors would like to remain over on Sunday.

Chief habitat of the proud Angora goat, which for centuries has furnished fibers for fine apparel, upholstery and interior decoration fabrics, and for rich gleaman rugs, is Texas, says "Mohair, Distinguished Fiber of Unlimited Uses," a booklet released by the American Wool Council, New York.

Few people, the council says, realize the importance of the Mohair industry in the U. S. and this booklet is designed to supply factual information about the history of mohair, its production and important part it plays in our lives.

Mohair owes its great growth in this country to the fact that America is a nation on wheels. The mohair industry expanded almost in direct ratio with the giant production of automobiles and now faces an equally successful future in the air.

Equally important is its contribution to the modern American home. It goes into rugs, drapes and upholstery.

How mohair adds to the intrinsic value of fabrics is revealed in the discussion of its unique properties. "Because of its superior reaction to dyes, it improves color, giving sharp, clear hues in solids or in patterns. Its unique luster adds brilliance. Its strong smooth fibers are dust repellent and abrasion resistant. Classified as "wool" according to the Wool Products Labeling Act, it has many of the fine qualities of wool—warmth, resilience and wear."

Profusely illustrated with sketches and photographs and a map showing the percentage of production in the seven leading states, the booklet is printed in two colors.

"Mohair, Distinguished Fiber of Unlimited Uses," is one of the new series of educational and promotional publications planned by the council for a selected list of merchandise managers, buyers and training directors in 5,000 retail stores; and for 3,000 educators in merchandising, distributive education and home economics.

Texas wool and mohair producers participating in the activities of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association as members, contribute each year to the fund which finances the American Wool Council.

The council's executive committee is to hold its summer meeting in Salt Lake City on Sunday, Aug. 18, and several Texans plan to attend this session as well as the executive committee meeting of the National Wool Growers and following day and also the National Ram Sale at North Salt Lake the next two days.

Installation of light housekeeping cabins in the Big Bend National Park was announced by the National Park Service Saturday. They were put in by National Park Concessions, Inc., a non-profit organization which operates accommodations for visitors in other units of the park system.

The cabins are located near temporary park headquarters in

the Basin area, in the heart of the Chisos Mountains. More cabins, plus restaurant facilities are to be installed in the Basin soon.

In addition to these, a few cabins and a bath house are in operation at Hot Springs on the southeastern boundary and a trading post operates five miles south of Persimmon Gap in the northern part of the park.

The National Park Service said, "Big Bend National Park is a vast mountain and desert wilderness in the great bend of the Rio Grande, an ideal vacation spot for persons who like to rough it. Camping is permitted in the park but only in designated areas, hence campers should apply at park headquarters for information regarding such areas."

Ten thousand dollars would be the prize in a matched horse race that is proposed by a Presidio County ranchman who believes that his mare would be the faster animal in a contest that would be a part of the Highland Rodeo and Colt Show in Marfa Sept. 12-15. A Texas horse is wanted as the rival of the local man's favorite.

The owner of the mare has specified that equal weight should be carried by the animals and that the course should be 250 yards. The racing committee is to attempt to arrange the desired race.

"Wonder Lad," owned by Jim Derrick, Carlsbad N. M., and "Jap," a horse owned by Clay Espy of Fort Davis, have been matched, according to the racing committee—Frank Jones, Marfa; Billy Crews, Marfa; Dell Renfro and Mannie Fowlkes, Presidio County ranchmen. This is the first year that horse racing and a colt show have been a part of the annual fall sports event.

Billy Crews has said that an electric starting gate is available for the starting of the horses that are matched. Extensive work is to be done on the race track in order that it may be in such shape that the owners of horses will be encouraged to match their steeds.

Colt Show arrangements are being made by Tyrrel Smith, Hayes Mitchell, and J. S. Livingston, all well known Highland ranchmen who are almost as well known for their interest in horses as for their interest in Hereford cattle.

Sellers Bros., Del Rio, are to supply rodeo stock for the event and are to be in charge of the arena. Prizes totaling \$2,320.00 have been authorized in the following events:

Bareback Bronc Riding—\$320; Bull Riding, \$400; Calf Roping, \$400; Steer Wrestling, \$400; and Team-Tying, \$400.

An announcement this week by L. L. Warner, chamber of commerce secretary, was to the effect that the organization is making special arrangements for the housing of Rodeo and Colt Show visitors if hotel and rooming house facilities are taxed to capacity.

the trip, planned to start in Dallas, picking up additional cars and boosters at the Texas towns enroute.

An overnight stop at some town in the Big Bend area will be followed the next day by the drive on to Chihuahua City.

The American group will be entertained by the legislature of the Mexican State of Chihuahua, and will discuss plans for the construction and paving of the new route. Plans are underway also in the Mexican Republic for closing the gaps in the route from El Paso and Chihuahua on to Mexico City, and when this is done, the Presidio-Chihuahua link would connect the Trans-Pecos area of Texas into Mexico City.

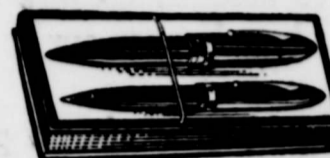

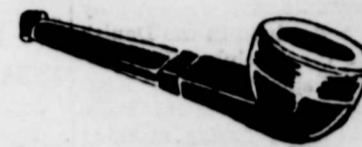

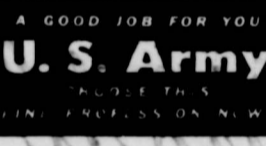

### Questions, Answers Of Interest To All Ex-Service Men

Q. Last year I attended school under the G. I. Bill and received subsistence payments of \$75 per month for me and my family. The amended Servicemen's Readjustment Act, passed in 1945, increased the amount to \$90 a month. Am I entitled to retroactive payments for the increase?

A. No. Payment of increased subsistence allowances for veterans with dependents went into effect Jan. 1, 1946. It provides specifically that the increased amount is payable as of the first day of the first calendar month immediately following enactment of the amended legislation. Date of the enactment was Dec. 28, 1945.

Q. I am 23 years old and would like to know what my premium will be on a 20-payment NSLI policy?

A. The monthly premium on such policies at your age is \$2.05 a month per \$1,000.

Q. How long do I have before I have to convert my term insurance to a permanent form?

A. You can keep your term insurance for eight years from the time it was taken out, if it was taken out before Jan. 1, 1946, or five years if it was taken out on or after that date.

Q. I have let my NSLI term policy lapse since my discharge. I have been out of the army more than six months. Can my policy be reinstated?

A. To reinstate your NSLI term policy, irrespective of the date of lapse, you are required to pay only two monthly premiums and submit a signed statement that you are in as good health as at the time of the lapse. You have until Jan. 1, 1947, to do this under the regulations.

Q. Is it permissible for a veteran to reduce the amount of his insurance policy?

A. Yes. The amount continued must be in multiples of \$500, but not less than \$1,000.

Q. Are there any restrictions for NSLI policy holders?

A. The insurance is free from restrictions as to residence, travel, occupation or military or naval service.

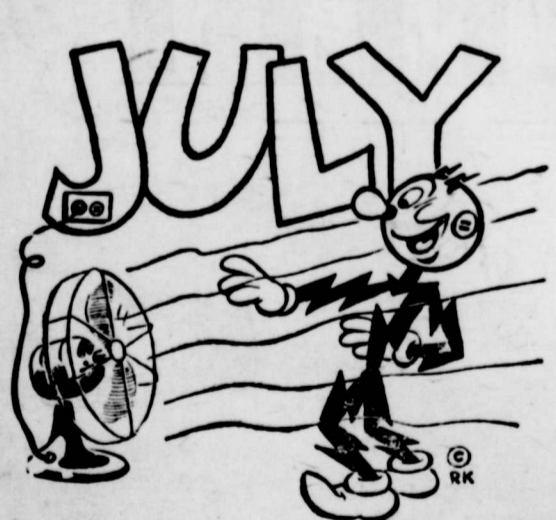

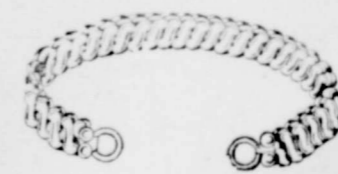

**H. J. R. No. 10**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**  
 proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of such Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or district aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

"(b). Each county shall have

the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof\*) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas, and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas," and,

"Against the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the

State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**  
 proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicles registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County and the percentage allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words: "FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior

to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D., 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE;" and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so

much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

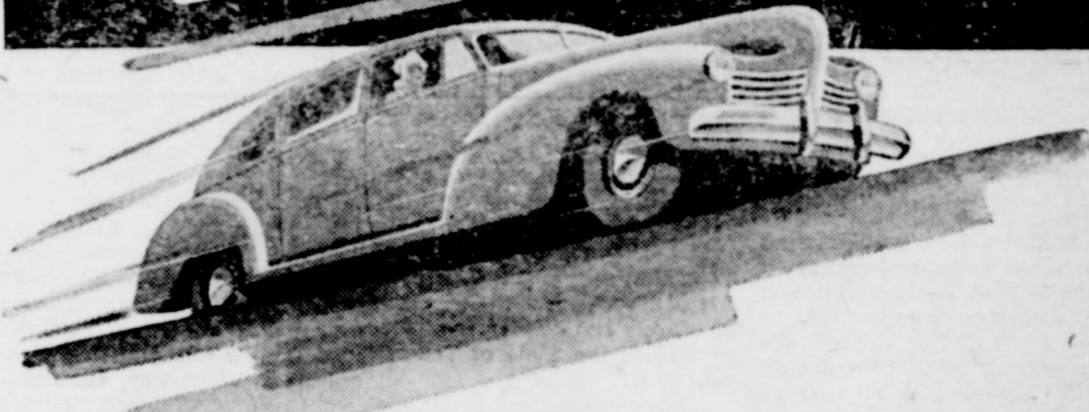

## Humble Crane Wildcat Gets Sulphur Water

Humble No. 1-B G. H. Cowden and others, SE Crane County wildcat, Saturday prepared to plug back to 8,700 feet, inside 7-inch casing cemented at 8,707 feet, after recovering 9,100 feet of sulphur water on a 3-hour drillstem test from 10,102 to 10,192 feet, the total depth.

The water reportedly came from the Ellenburger, in which it was said no signs of oil and gas were encountered.

The 7-inch casing was understood to have been cemented near the bottom of the Devonian and it was believed it would be perforated to test shows with which No. 1-B Cowden and others were credited on a drillstem test. The Devonian top was given unofficially as 7,674 feet, 5,114 feet below sea level. This was correlated by some 221 feet higher to Atlantic No. 1-A-31-U, opener of the Block 31 (Devonian and Ellenburger) field, 7 3/4 miles to the NW.

No. 1-B Cowden is in the C SW SW 14-CCSD&RGNG, 3 3/4 miles west of the Upton County line and about 5 1/2 miles SSW of the McElroy field.

In E C Upton County, Plymouth No. 1 D. L. Alford was bailing to clean out at 9,450 feet. It was recovering some drilling mud with a slight scum of oil or distillate and some light shows of gas. In the event the wildcat can be cleaned out to the total depth, 10,334 feet, in lime, and is found in good condition, it will be deepened. Location is 467 feet N and W of the center of block 50 1-2-Y-P. B. Scott.

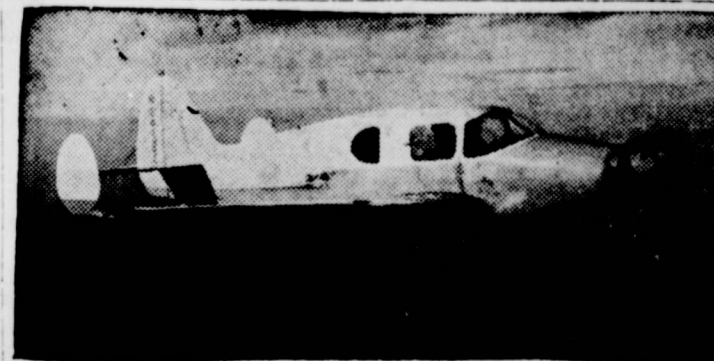

**Upton County Gardens Prove Soil Productive**

McCamey soil is productive if treated with the proper fertilizer and given lots of water, as is shown by the Upton County gardens. Mums rate first among the flowers with tomatoes leading in the garden vegetables as the easiest products to grow in this part of the country. This was the general opinion given by individual interviews with members of the Upton County Garden Club. This will be the first in a series of articles on Upton County gardens and past experiences with them.

"Our project for this summer is to improve the floral growths and shrubs of the county park," said Mrs. G. W. Ramer, chairman of the project committee. Her lovely backyard, enclosed by willows and cedar trees, is centered by a fish pond with lilies surrounding it. Mrs. Ramer is specializing in growing mums this summer. She treats her soil with coppers and bone meal as a fertilizer, with peat moss as a mulch.

Mrs. William Harris, reporter for the club, has rightly named her "Eventually" meaning that with the proper care, the produce will eventually grow into something to be proud of. Mrs. Harris is busy with generally improving the yard with "mums," zinnias, gladiolas, new grass, and fruit trees to furnish a cool shade. She lists tomatoes as her pride and finds that barnyard fertilizer and rotted leaves are necessary for better growth.

Mrs. Oliver Jacobsen gives what little time she has to improving her lawn. The soil around her home is rocky, and she makes her grass greener and thicker by adding sand and dirt.

Mrs. F. E. Carter, who grows roses; Mrs. L. C. Partin, who prides her mums bed; and Mrs. Hattie Hinde centering her attention on trees and pot plants, agree that McCamey soil will grow almost anything with the proper amount of water, though the addition of fertilizer will improve the size of the product.

Mrs. A. B. Holley and Mrs. G. W. Irvine spend much of their time on their yards. Mrs. Irvine's green yard is dotted symmetrically with circular flower beds of mums and dahlias while Mrs. Holley is interested chiefly in the growth of dahlias. She says this flower is easy to grow if planted in the fall, and given enough water. Bonemeal should be added.

"Radishes will always grow," says Mrs. C. E. Harris of her garden specialty. Mrs. Harris had no luck with any flowers other than "mums," but she adds good dirt and lots of water to her garden soil. No commercial fertilizer.

Mrs. Margaret Littlejohn has a prize yard bordered with shrubs and dotted with various species of flowers. Her pride lies in her dahlias and she was noted for a rare yellow dahlia before the last rain beat it down. Mrs. Littlejohn says that McCamey soil will grow anything with a little barnyard fertilizer added if it is watered every other day.

represents his first and greatest love." District Judge A. R. Stout of Waxahachie wrote: "He is possessed of one of the most level, common-sense heads and clear and brilliant minds that it has ever been my good fortune to know . . . I believe he would make a great judge on the Court of Criminal Appeals."

Under the leadership of Jim Evetts, District Attorney at Belton, Texas, a "Baker for Judge Club" has been organized in Mills, Bell and Lampasas counties. Similar organizations have been completed in Galveston, Harris, Jefferson, Bexar, El Paso, Tarrant and Dallas counties and others will be formed this week.
