1300 Students Expected To Enroll For School

From all reports, Friona's "Krazy Daze" promotion sale was well-received, and as evidenced by the merchants' participation, was a sale enjoyed by the individual merchants.

Several stores had all of their employees in special dress for the occasion, and they were something to see. Judges who picked the top "crews" stated that they had a tough time choosing the winners.

It was gratifying to see the number of merchants taking part in the promotion as there were. For the first of its kind, the "Krazy Daze" went over pretty good, we would say.

Most important thing about the promotion, from a business standpoint, was the dollar volume turned in by Friona Stores. Many shoppers were in town, and most retail merchants reported the best Friday they had experienced in a long time.

We can certainly sympathize with school superintendents this time of year. Prior to this week, both Friona and Lubbock schools needed three teachers to complete the respective teaching staffs, with just a week to go before the opening of school.

This isn't due to bad planning on the part of either superintendent involved, but came about by that yearly bug-a-boo for school administrators: late resignations.

Some teachers, it seems, who don't particularly want to return to their old jobs the next school term, will turn in their contracts signed, as though their intentions were to return. Then they go out and seek a better deal. If they find it, then they will resign their position, sometimes leaving the school administrator in a bind. If they don't find a better job, then they have their signed contract to fall back on.

We admit that teachers, by and large, are underpaid. The state average salary for classroom teachers for 1963-64 was \$5,390 per year. The national average was \$5,963. Starting salaries in each instance is much lower.

Still, we do not feel that this gives teachers license to use their jobs as "pawns." Many evidently feel that a couple of weeks notice is sufficient. However, when an administrator comes up with a specialized job opening with a shortage of good personnel to fill an opening even if such personnel was available, he's behind the eight ball.

Here's something that sounded a lot like ourself, and we thought we'd pass it along to our readers:

"When the other fellow takes a long time to do something he's too slow."

"But when I take a long time to do something, I'm thorough."

"When the other fellow doesn't do it, he's lazy;"

"But when I don't do it I'm too busy."

"When the other fellow goes ahead and does something without being told, he's overstepping his bounds;"

"But when I go ahead and do something without being told, that's initiative."

"When the other fellow states his side of a question strongly, he's bullheaded."

"But when I state my side of a question strongly, I'm being firm."

"When the other fellow overlooks a few of the rules of etiquette, he's rude."

"But when I skip a few rules, I'm original."

"When the other fellow does something that pleases the boss, he's polishing brass."

"But when I do something that pleases the boss, that's co-operation."

"When the other fellow gets ahead, he sure had the lucky breaks."

"But when I manage to get ahead, Man! Hard work did that."

Sound familiar?

Letters were mailed August 25 to parents of first grade students giving them special instructions. First graders will be dismissed at 12 noon daily the first week of school.

will conduct the demonstration.

"Farmers will be able to watch the single and double-row beet harvesters in action, and then examine the machines," stated Newman Jarrell, Jr. of Farmer County Implement Company.

The demonstrations will be held from 9 a. m. to 12 noon and from 2-5 p. m.

"Farmers can come out any time during the day and see the harvesting machinery running," Jarrell said. "This will be an opportunity to see the machinery running on our own beets," he added.

Directing music for the series of services will be Dale Coody, who is minister of music and education for the Trinity Baptist Church of Lawton, Okla.

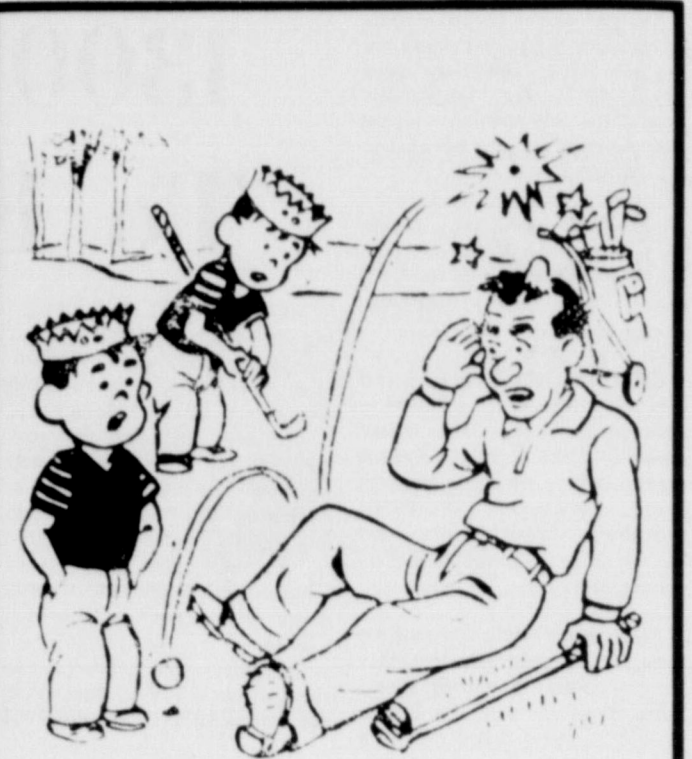
Tierney is a Scottish-born former businessman, school administrator and pastor, who has preached in more than 380 churches in 37 states. He has held several city-wide campaigns.

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MILITARY RITES

Services Held For Capt. Kenneth Bainum

Funeral services for Captain Kenneth W. Bainum, who was killed August 18 when a jetplane he was piloting crashed and burned on takeoff at Glasgow, Montana, were conducted from Friona Methodist Church at 2 p.m. Monday with full military rites.

Kenneth Waide Bainum was born March 25, 1930 at Clovis, New Mexico. He grew up in Friona and attended school here. He was a 1949 graduate of Friona High School and attended Tarleton State College at Stephenville two years before transferring to East Texas State College.

He graduated from East Texas in 1953 with a bachelor of science degree and received a commission in the Air Force Reserve. He was called to active duty with the Air Force in September that same year.

After pre-flight training at Parks AFB, California, he went to Marana AB, Arizona and then to Williams AFB, Arizona for pilot training and received his wings in the fall of 1954.

Bainum was then sent to Craig AFB, Alabama for training as an instructor pilot and returned to Williams AFB, Arizona for instructor pilot duty.

During his tour of duty at Williams AFB, Lt. Bainum was married to Ethel Dyer, a son, Anthony Waide, was born to the couple September 4, 1958.

After serving as an instructor at Williams AFB, Laughlin AFB, Texas, Craig AFB, Alabama and Randolph AFB, Texas, Captain Bainum was sent to Stead AFB, Nevada for aircrew survival training prior to his assignment to Perrin AFB, Texas for training as an Air Defense Command Interceptor Pilot.

This training was completed at Tyndall AFB, Florida in November 1963. While at Tyndall, Captain Bainum qualified in the F101B All-Weather Interceptor and was then assigned to the 13th Fighter Interceptor Squadron at Glasgow Air Force Base, Montana, where he served as a flight commander.

At the time of his death, he had over 3500 hours flying time, 2700 of which were in jet aircraft. He was a senior pilot and had been awarded a regular commission in the Air Force.

Awards received by Captain Bainum were: National Defense Service Medal, Air Force



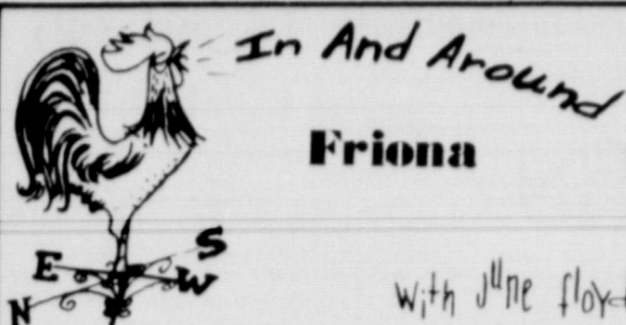

Longevity Service Award with one oak leaf cluster and Armed Forces Reserve Medal.

He was a member of Friona Methodist Church.

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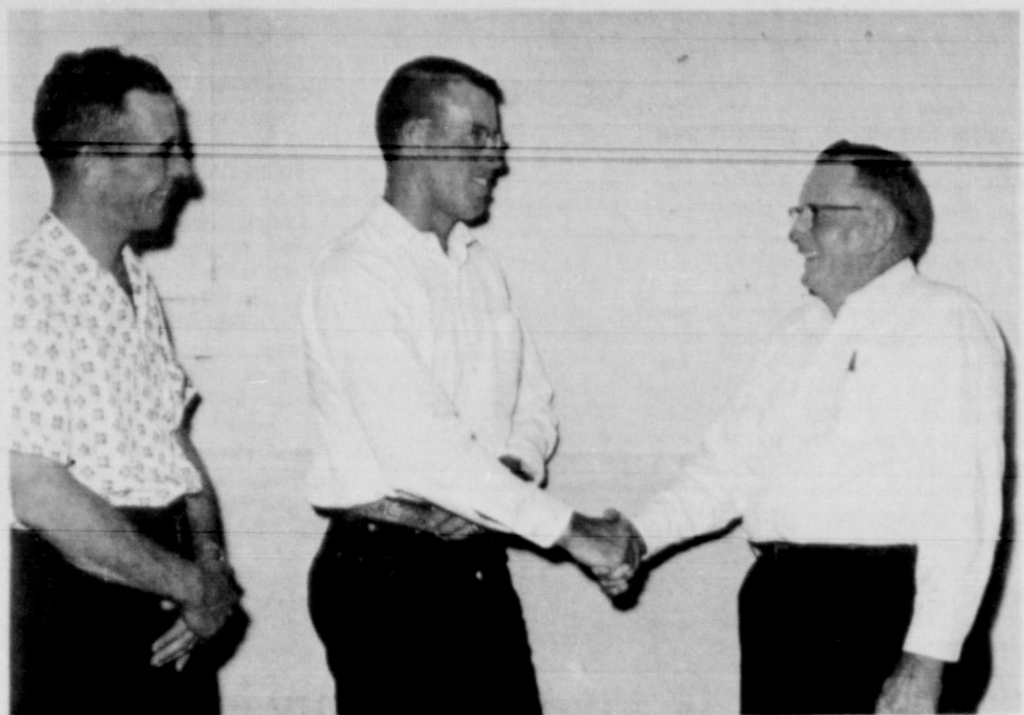

On The Farm In Panmer County

INSECT SITUATION

Our insect situation has generally been favorable this year. However, we must not let our guard down at the last. Everyone is encouraged to make frequent checks on cotton and late grain sorghum fields.

In cotton we need to be on the lookout for bollworms and lygus bugs as they could do serious damage if their numbers build up in a field.

Our late grain sorghum is still susceptible to midge infestation. In the Panhandle area, midge activity continues to be very light.

The South Plains area has noted an increase in midge lately. However, general midge infestations are not now present, but spotted local infestations are present in some blooming sorghum.

Farmer County producers with blooming grain sorghum should check for the presence of midge. If anyone finds midge, please notify the county agent's office.

NITRATE POISONING

Recently some nitrate toxicity was experienced in West Texas on Bermuda grass. This was a rare occurrence but to help prevent any trouble in our area the following information is furnished.

Following the application of fertilizer materials to pasture

grasses and forage sorghums several precautions should be observed to avoid possibilities of nitrate poisoning of livestock.

First, remove cattle from the area to be fertilized. Should spillage occur in filling a rig, pick up the material to prevent spots of unusually high concentration. Remove bags from the field since cattle will sometimes be attracted by them.

After fertilizer has been applied and irrigation accomplished keep livestock off of the area for one week.

If forage is particularly succulent it is a good idea to not graze before 10 a.m. since nitrates accumulate in the plants at night and are not changed to the protein forms until sufficient light has been received.

Drought may cause nitrate accumulation under conditions where leaves wilt or roll during the day, but take up sufficient water during the night to regain turgor. Grazing of plants in drought stress should therefore proceed with caution.

Nitrate accumulation in plants may occur under certain conditions on soils that have not been recently fertilized.

The possibility of nitrate toxicity should not discourage farmers from using nitrogen fertilizers at economically practical rates recommended by the Extension Service.

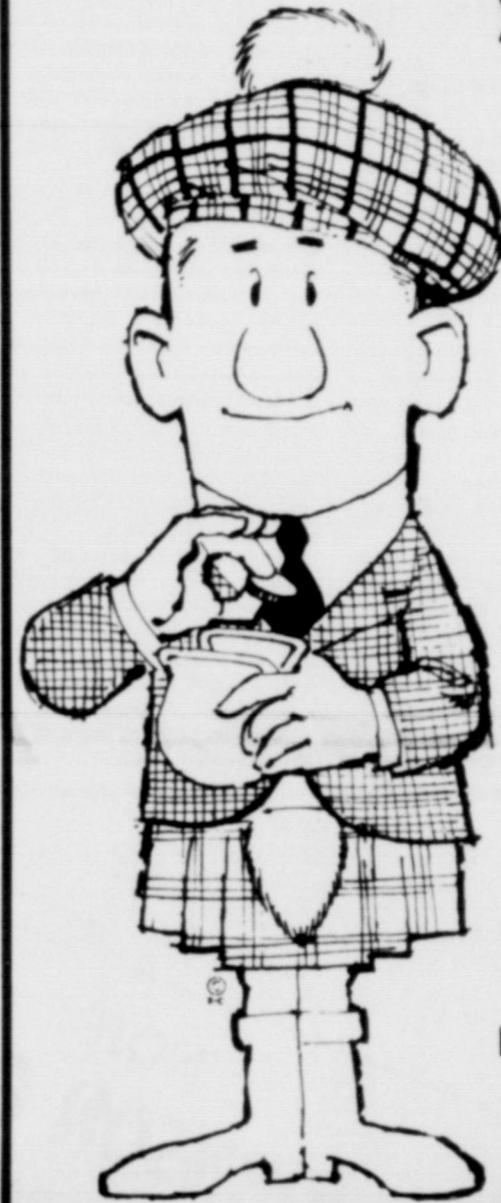

Canadian Dam Officials To Discuss Recreation

Congressman Walter Rogers of Pampa has arranged for National Park Service officials and directors of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority to meet today in Amarillo to discuss recreation development at Sanford Reservoir.

The Senate last week passed a bill Congressman Rogers introduced to authorize an expenditure of up to \$1,100,000 for planning and developing public recreation facilities in connection with the Canadian River Project. The House of Representatives passed the bill Nov. 18, 1963.

To begin at 10 a.m. Thursday in the office of Leon W. Hill, director of the Bureau of Reclamation's Region 5, the meeting also will be attended by three National Park Service officials and four members of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority board, including George Finger of Borger, CRMWA president, and three members of the CRMWA Recreation Committee, former Amarillo Mayor A. F. Madison, committee chairman, and Fred Thompson of Pampa and Ray Dickey of Lubbock.

National Park Service officials attending will be Chester Brown of Washington, the director of National Parks System Studies; Daniel E. Beard of Santa Fe, Southwest Region director of the National Park Service; and John Mosley of Santa Fe, planner in the Southwest Region Office.

"With construction of the dam, reservoir, and pipeline

progressing so rapidly, I felt that it was vital that the proper steps be taken this year to insure that adequate recreation facilities be provided at Sanford Reservoir," Congressman Rogers said.

"The planning session Thursday in Amarillo will bring together the key people involved in making sound plans for recreation development," he said.

The Canadian River Project has a larger repayment contract than any other Bureau of Reclamation project. It will repay, with interest, approximately 94 per cent of its cost over a 50-year period.

The dam near Sanford is expected to be "closed" this winter and the flow of the river will begin to be impounded in the reservoir. It will be some months before other work, primarily on pipelines and operating facilities, is completed. The project is scheduled for
