

#### ON THE JOB CEILINGS

House Resolution 488 was introduced by Chairman Nourse Rogers on Jan. 28, 1947, for the purpose of removing the ceilings set by the Veterans Administration and slipped through during the closing days of the 79th congress and approved by the President on Aug. 8, 1946, after that congress had adjourned.

As a result of this action thousands of veterans had to discontinue their education and training under the G. I. Bill The ceiling limit was placed at \$175 for single men who were entitled to \$65 a month subsistence allowance, and \$200 uer month for married men entitled to \$90 per month for subsistence allowance.

Everyone knows with the increased cost of living it is impossible for married men to live on any such income; and by comparison, it is interesting to note that even the page boys in the House and Senate under 17 years of age receive approximately \$225 per month.




