Since most veterans involved in such a contract are making monthly payments equal to the maximum, they cannot now on their current income, and have been forced to relinquish their contract. The veteran is thus forfeiting a part of his real estate loan guaranteed up to a maximum of \$4,000 by he government. The veteran would lose, moreover, the benefit of the 4% interest payment nade the first year by the VA on the guaranteed portion of the loan. Veterans should be wary when they sign construction contracts, and they should also consider the advantages of being placed on the waiting list of a contractor for a completed home, rather than entering into an "open end" contract, whereby the home in the process of construction is likely to be interrupted.

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
