Construction in Friona during 1965 was valued at an estimated \$598,800.00, according to a tabulation of building permits issued during the calendar year.

The total figure was down 149,040. still a record. somewhat from last year's alltime building record, but was still more than the totals of three recent years.

during 1965 stood at \$139,600 .-00. This also was down somewhat, as totals for the preceding three years were: \$215,-780.00 in 1962; \$231,950.00 in 1963 and \$278,000.00 in 1964 (not including the new school figures). However, the past year's non-residential building topped the total for 1961 (\$36,800.00) by a good margin.

At least one category for the past year topped itself from the preceding year. That was for additions and alterations. This total for 1965 stood at \$52,740.00 for 1964. There were 31 such permits issued during the 1965 calendar year, compared to 32 in 1964.

The majority of the non-residential building total was made up of a \$73,000.00 addition to the physical plant at the First Baptist Church. Another \$24, 000.00 permit was for the new Conoco station, and the \$23,000 new home for the Friona Star and Graphic Arts rounded out the major non-residential construction jubs.

Of the new homes, two were in the \$30,000-class. One was constructed at 1204 West Seventh by Taylor Construction Co., and another was built at 1208 West Seventh by Phillips and Son of Amarillo.

Other \$25,000 - plus homes were built at 1206 W. Seventh (\$27,500) by Taylor Construction Co.; at 1303 W. Seventh (\$27,000) by Taylor and at 1302 W. Seventh (R.L. Fleming & Son).





rain forests; and the plateau Nigeria, long-known as "the region of dry plains reaching toward the Sahara. Until its independence in 1960, Nigeria was Britian's largest colony. English is the official language, and most natives can at least speak some English.

Our home is in Lagos, a coastal city and the capital of Nigeria, Actually, we live on Ikoyi Island which is part of the Federal Territory of Lagos. There are many modern buildings here, including some "skyscrapers" of more than twenty stories. Out of a population of more than a third of a million, nearly forth per cent of the city's people live on Lagos Island, less than 2 square miles in area.

In Lagos, temperatures range from 75 to 95 degrees. The humidity is generally heavy. Technically, the rainy season lasts about 5 months in this part of Nigeria, but most of the rain comes in June, July, and August. Last July we had twenty inches of rain. Our "dry" season of seven to nine months is hotter, but not so humid as our rainy "winter".

Tropical foliage abounds; oleanders, hydrangeas, bougainvillea, flame trees, hibiscus, frangy-pangy, palm trees, coconut trees, and many others whose names I never encountered in West Texas. We have banana and papaya trees in our vard, Grapefruit, lemons, oranges, pineapple, cassava, mangoes, yams, green beans, okra, corn, tomatoes, onions, cauliflower, eggplant, rice, and peppers are grown in Nigeria. Cotton, cocoa, and groundnuts (peanuts) are among the chief crops.

EDITORIAL.

With our first issue of 1966, we're officially kicking off a concentrated effort, and hope before the year is out to be able to report some good news along this line.

Here are the facts of the matter: State Highway 214 south of Friona originally was constructed as a Farm to Market road. In time, the road was linked to the similar farm raod north of Muleshoe, and eventually received state highway designation.

Traffic on the raod has increased steadily in recent years, but the width of the road in the Parmer County segment is still the same as a Farm to Market road.

. . . . According to County Judge Loyde Brewer, who has discussed the matter with state highway department officials -the project has more than a glimmer of hope.

Officials asked Judge Brewer if he thought the City of Friona would cooperate in securing right-of-way for a possible railraod overpass. Judge Brewer is to meet with the council on Monday to report his conversations with highway officials.


> **Teams Start** Year Right
