**SCS Official Points Out 'Conditions' For Dams**

A reminder from the Texas State Library reminded us to remind you to tell your county commissioner if you are enjoying the bookmobile service, and would like to have it continued after next year.

Under the free trial arrangement, Parmer County citizens will continue to receive the bookmobile service on a "trial" basis through December of next year.

After that time, it will be up to the county commissioners to appropriate funds to pay for the service. If the residents of the Friona area wish the service to continue, they should ask their commissioner to appropriate the necessary funds.

It seems like a long time off more than a year -- before the free trial period will end. However, budgets are made up ahead of time, and commissioners like to know the wishes of their constituents well ahead of budget time, so that they can be mapping out the budget.

Readers in our area were fortunate to have the commissioners act when they did early last year. The bookmobile "trial period" usually runs two years, but by acting at the time they did, commissioners secured the "trial" for 33 months, or very close to three years.

We feel that the state's bookmobile program is very good for people who live in areas like our own. The bookmobile has served to supplement Friona's Public Library, operated by Modern Study Club.

Besides making its periodic stops, the bookmobile has delivered many books which have been given to the local library on a "permanent loan" basis -- thus giving the fledgling library a better stock of books during its formative period.

So we are going on record as recommending wholeheartedly that the commissioners plan to keep the bookmobile service going for Parmer County.

If you feel the same way, it wouldn't hurt to call your commissioner right now, and let him know that you like the service.

In the Friona area, your commissioner is Tom Lewellen. George Crain is commissioner in the Lazbuddie area. It's Charlie Jefferson in the Bovina precinct, and Guy Cox for the Farwell area.

A move is underway by the Parmer County Historical Society to compile and publish a history of the county. They are urging everyone to contribute to the publication.

If you have a favorite true story about the early days of the county -- or could just relate facts about your family's history in the county -- you should plan to be a contributor to the publication.

Details will be forthcoming as to who to give or send the information to when you have it ready.

Coach Don Light was able to see two of his more famous pupils in action last Saturday at Lubbock when Texas Tech edged Texas A&M, 20-16 in the Southwest Conference thriller.

The "pupils" are Tech's All-American halfback Donnie Anderson, and the Aggies' glue-fingered end, Dude McLean. And neither of Light's former standouts from Stinnett proved a disappointment.

Anderson scored twice, the "storybook" touchdown which won the game for Tech, and McLean was a thorn in the Raiders' side all night with his brilliant pass-catching.

The two players had been teammates at Stinnett, when the Raiders were among the class A powerhouse teams in the state.

**Merchants To Meet Today**

The regular meeting of the Friona Association of Retail Merchants will be held at 1 p.m. today at the Friona Lanes cafe.

The agenda will include the discussion of possible holiday promotions. All retail merchants are urged to make plans to attend the meeting.

Dick Rocky was named supervisor and A.L. Black was elected chairman of Zone 2 of the Parmer County Soil Conservation District in an election Monday night.

There are five zones in the local Soil Conservation District. Rocky will serve a five-year term. Joe VanZandt was elected secretary for the zone.

Prior to the election, SCS Work Unit Conservationist, Eddy Willmon of Friona, gave a speech outlining the Soil Conservation District's role in the development of a multiple-purpose structure on Running Water Draw.

Willmon pointed out that before the flood-prevention project will be approved by the

federal government 75 per cent of the farmland which comes within the watershed must be adequately protected from erosion.

"This will be a big job, and will require the help of all farmers within the district. However, it is not an impossible job, and the individual owners should have very little trouble in satisfying the requirement," he said.

Willmon pointed out that most farmers with land within the watershed already were Soil Conservation District cooperators. However, on many of the farms, the area which is to be considered is a very small percentage of the owner's farm.

The SCS official also stated that in the event that it should be needed, additional supervision would be available from the SCS.

Willmon pointed out that in addition to flood control, the Running Water Draw Watershed Project will be a great recharge asset.

Parmer County is scheduled to receive four dams along the draw within its borders -- the most of any county in the project. Three of the locations will be for flood control and irrigation use, and one -- the South Hub location, -- is proposed for recreational use as well.

The SCS's board of supervisors is now helping to develop a work plan for the project which will be acceptable to the people of the district and to the Department of Agriculture.

The work plan for Running Water Draw in Parmer County includes four sites. They are

Bovina Site, with 12,128 acres of drainage; Catfish Draw with 18,138 acres of drainage; Lower Hub, with 35,488 acres and Lazbuddie, with 14,086 acres of drainage.

"We are in a unique position, being on the upper portion of the project," Willmon told the group Monday. "We are setting the pace for the rest of the project. No one below us can do any constructing before us, but we conceivably could proceed before they were ready downstream," he said.

Willmon stated that it would require approximately four years after the project is approved by Congress for any construction to be completed.

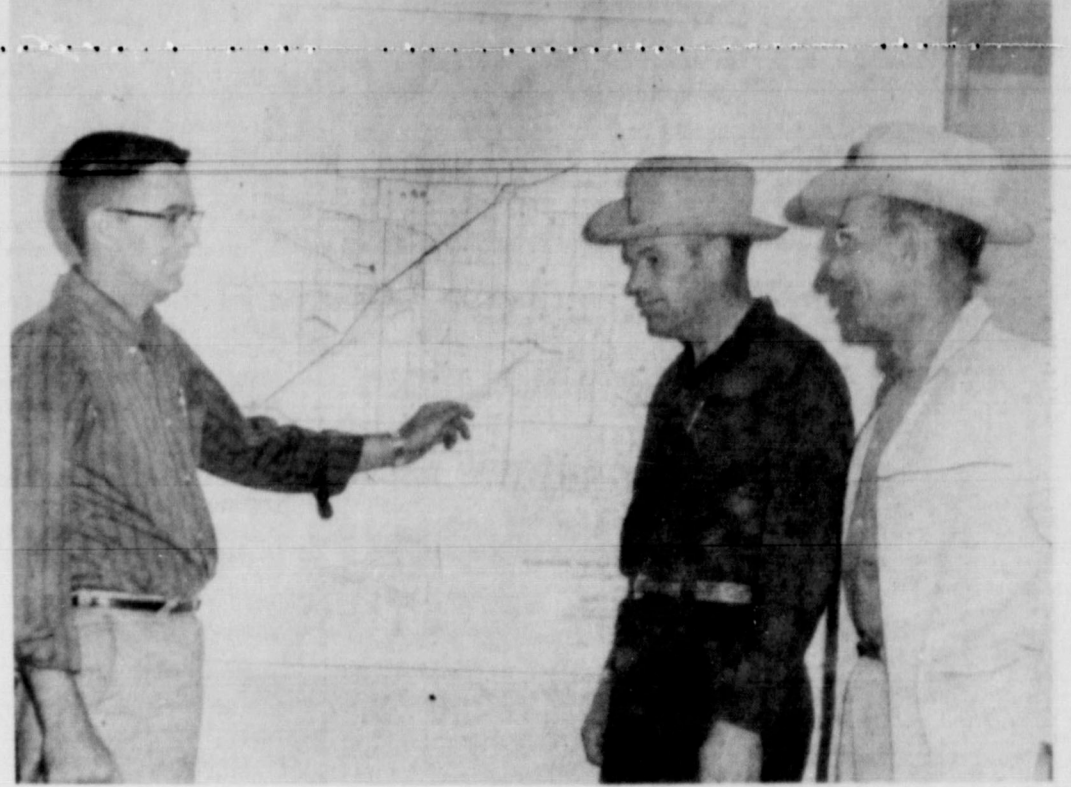

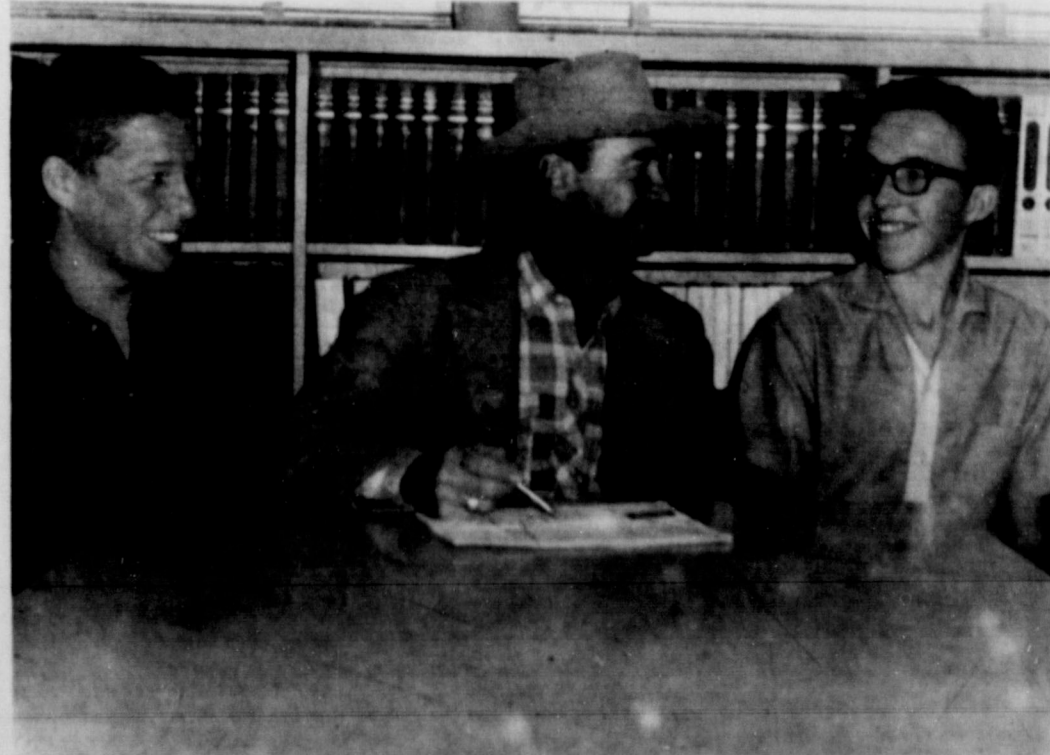

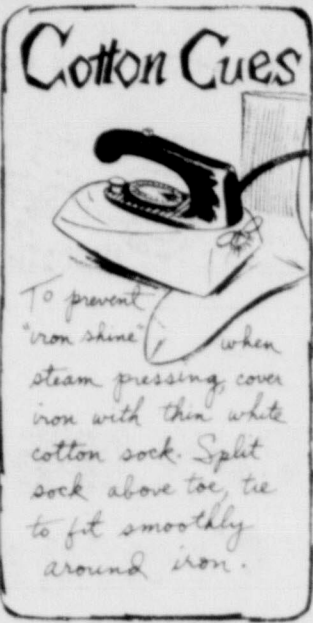

1/2 cup applesauce  
2 center-cut ham slices, cut 1/2 inch thick  
Whole cloves, if desired  
1/4 cup RealLemon bottled lemon juice  
1/2 cup brown sugar  
2 tablespoons pan drippings

Combine sweet potatoes, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/4 cup bottled lemon juice, applesauce and cinnamon. Spoon on top of one ham slice. Place second slice over sweet potato mixture. Stud edge of ham slices with cloves, if desired. Bake in a slow oven (325°F.) 45 minutes. Combine 1/4 cup bottled lemon juice, 1/2 cup brown sugar and drippings. Spoon over ham slice and continue baking 15 minutes. To serve, carve down through both ham slices and filling, slicing it as you would a loaf of bread. 6 servings.

pected to play against Hale Center.

Bing Bingham, hobbled by a bruised arm most of the year, is expected to be ready to start this week. Scott Cummings will join Ray Braxton at tackle this week. Otherwise, the starters will be about the same with Bob Sims and Billy Perkins at guard and Travis Graves and Jesse Shirley at end.

The backfield will remain the same as last week.

According to scouting reports, Hale Center will be just as tough, if not tougher than the team which battled Friona's district co-champions on almost even terms here last year before losing, 24-7.

The owls have two fast half-backs, plus good size in the line. They have a 212 - pound tackle, a 198-pound tackle, a 185-pound guard and a 165-pound ends. In the backfield, there are a 180-pound full-back and a 175-pound half-back. So, once again, Friona will have no great size advantage.

Attesting to the Owls' speed in the backfield is the fact that last year's star, halfback J.D. Davis, has been injured, and has only seen spot action so far this year.

Hale Center moved the ball well against Olton, Coach Don Light pointed out, but couldn't cash in for touchdowns; and meanwhile gave away some easy touchdowns to the Mustangs.

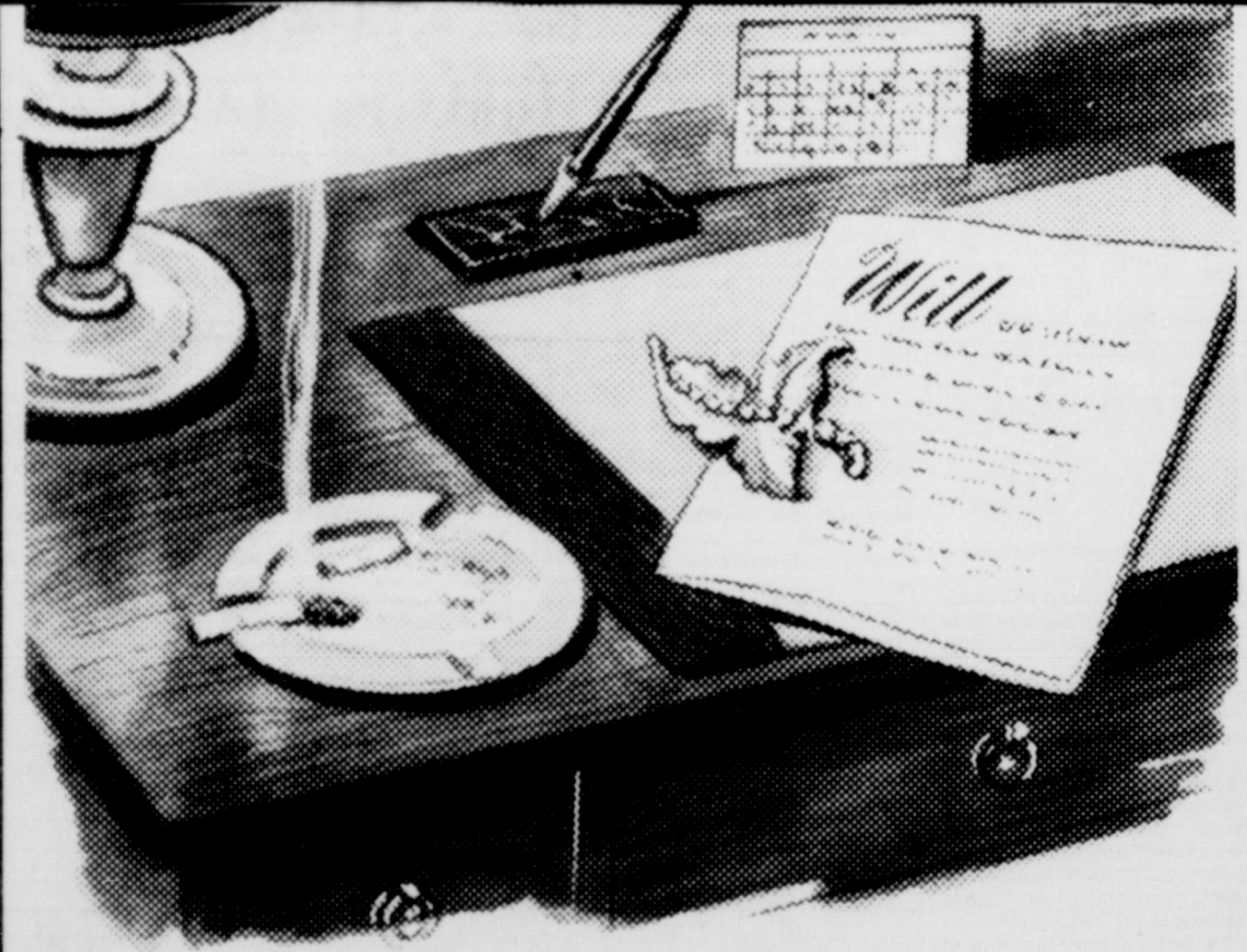

## West Texas State Meets Winless Trinity Saturday

West Texas State faces winless Trinity University this Saturday in Buffalo Bowl. The coaching staff is guarding against a letdown which has spelled doom to so many football teams already this fall. The Tigers have a fine quarterback in Les Oble and a top receiver in Truman Franks. This pair should make it interesting for the Unfriendly Society, if not

downright troublesome. Game-time is 7:30 p.m. The Buffs recorded their third consecutive win last Saturday night with an effective combination of offense and defense. Arizona State was the victim by a score of 22-14. The defensive unit had carried the Buffs through shutouts of Ohio University (7-0) and Bowling Green (34-0) while the

offense was adequate, but not sensational. However, last Saturday the Buffs moved the ball 379 yards by running and passing, the highest total in the past 20 games.

Meanwhile, back at the defensive unit, a disastrous second period in which West Texas State was assessed 106 yards in penalties resulted in a pair of touchdowns and a 14-13 lead for Arizona State at half.

Joe Kerbel's Unfriendly Society, the defensive unit, rose to the occasion in the second half and held the Sun Devils to a minus three yards rushing and stopped a desperation Arizona State drive in the closing moments when sophomore safety Steve Haterius intercepted his second pass of the season.

The Buffalo defense has allowed only 170 yards rushing in three games, an average of 56.7 per contest. It has taken the opposition 118 carries to net the 170 yards, a per carry average of merely 1.44 yards. The three opponents have completed only 42.3 per cent of their pass attempts and have had five aerials picked off by the alert Buffalo secondary.

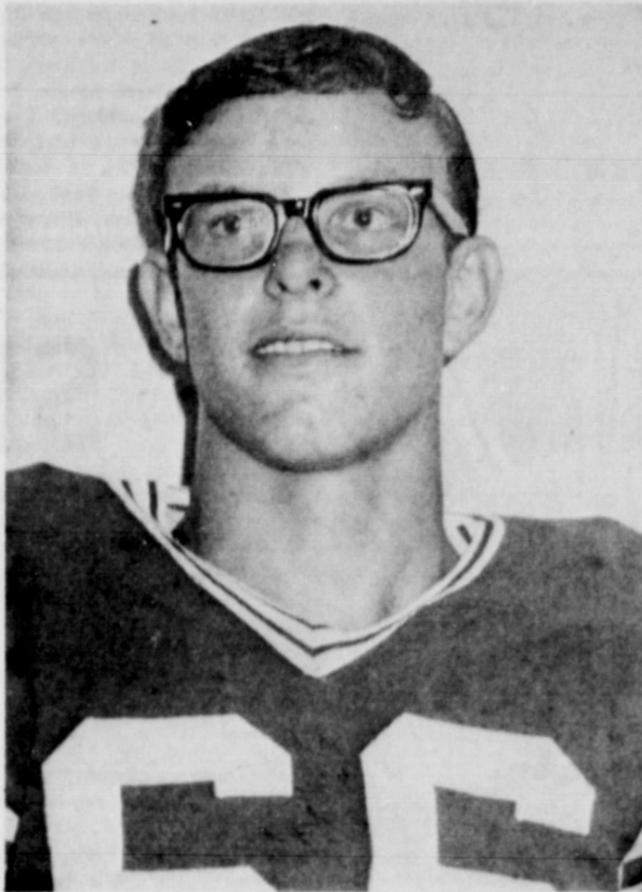

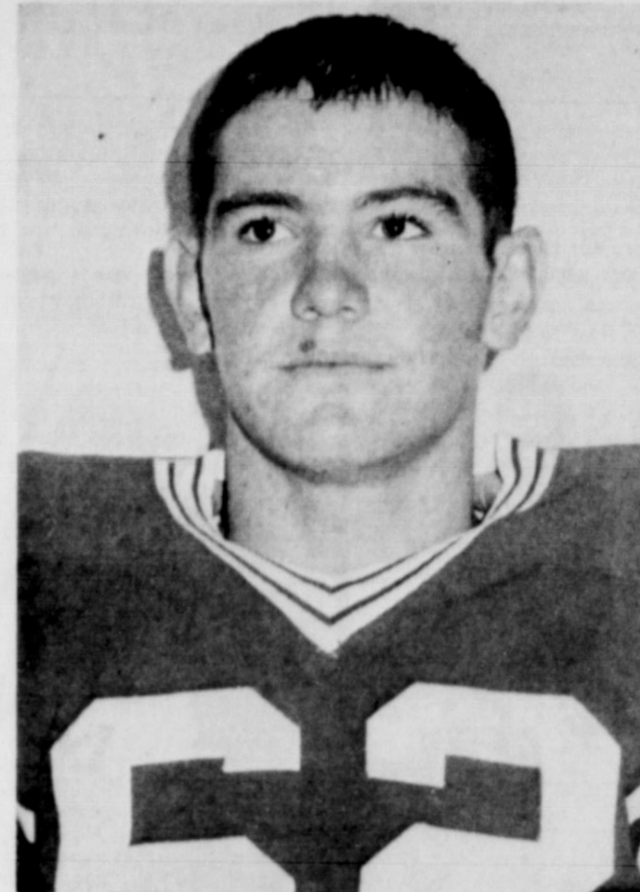

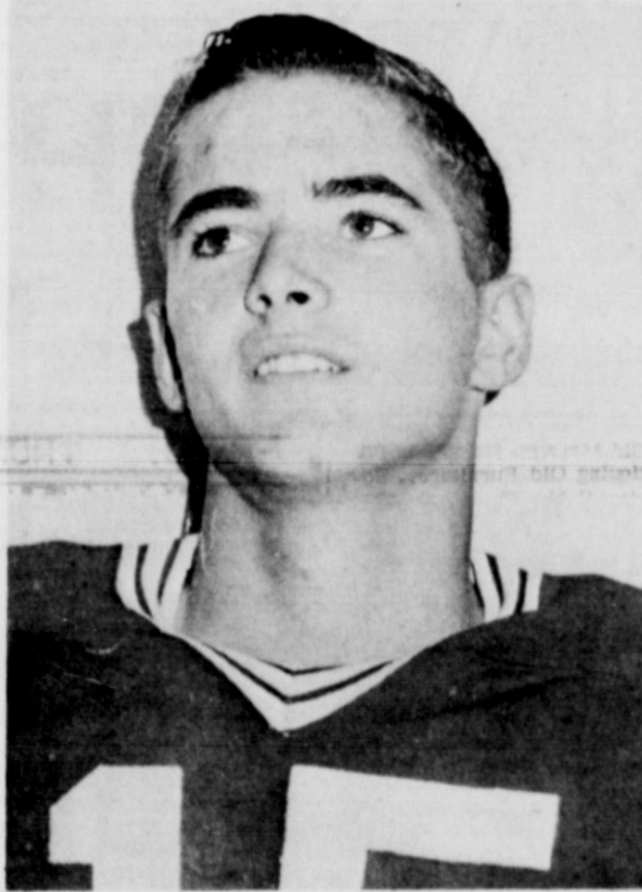

# Unbeaten Mules Top Chiefs, 21-0

Last Friday night was "gift night" in Friona. It wasn't billed that way, but that just happened to be the way it turned out. The Friona Chieftains were in a charitable mood, giving the visiting Muleshoe Mules four fine opportunities to score. The Chiefs found that the Mules were great opportunists, and the results was a 21-0 win for Muleshoe in Friona's homecoming game.

The game started out to be a defensive battle, with neither team being able to muster a drive. Muleshoe finally picked up the games initial first down, but couldn't continue the drive, and was forced to punt.

The punt was fielded at the five yard line by Johnny Claiborn, who was tackled immediately. The Chiefs made just nine yards in three plays, so were forced to punt from deep in their own territory.

The Mule defense rushed in to block Ray Braxton's kick, and

Muleshoe took over at the Friona 11-yard line. Just three plays later, the Mules had cashed in on the first of a series of breaks. Halfback Joe Adams ran across for the score, kicked the point and it was 7-0 Muleshoe with 50 seconds left in the quarter.

Friona put the ball in play, and on the first offensive play the ball was fumbled and Muleshoe recovered. This time the Mules didn't push it across for six points, but on fourth down Adams teed up a 20-yard field goal shot which split the uprights, giving Muleshoe a 10-0 lead.

Friona had its longest sustained drive of the night at this point, going from its own 38 to the Muleshoe nine, aided by the running of Tim Herring plus some penalties against the Mules. However, the drive bogged down and Muleshoe took over the ball at its own 14-yard line.

Later in the first half Friona

drove to the Muleshoe six, but a fourth down play went askew, and that was as close to scoring as the Chiefs were to come.

Friona's misfortunes continued in the second half. After taking the second half kickoff, Friona couldn't move, and started to punt. Braxton got a high snap, and had to "eat" the ball at the Friona 32.

Five plays by Muleshoe found the Mules with the ball on the Friona 16 on fourth down, and this prompted Adams to kick a 22-yard field goal to push the lead to 13-0, Muleshoe.

The rest of the quarter the ball switched back and forth between the teams, as Friona was never able to make a single first down in the third period.

On the first play of the final quarter, Lonnie Ellis was fading into his end zone for a pass when a Muleshoe defender trapped him behind the goal line for two more Mule points to up the lead to 15-0.

Late in the game, Muleshoe pushed the Chieftains' backs against the wall once again, when they punted out of bounds at the Friona 10. Three plays gained seven yards, so it was time to punt again.

But for the third time during the game, an attempted Friona punt went haywire, and another bad snap caused Braxton to be tackled on his own 15-yard line.

On the first play, Muleshoe quarterback John Thompson tossed to end Dean Seiber for 15 yards and a TD. Given an opportunity to score points by every possible means, the Mules tried a two-point conversion, but it failed, as a pass was intercepted by Friona.

It was a night of frustration for Friona, playing its second home game of the year before a capacity Homecoming crowd.

The win was the fifth straight for the Mules over Friona and gave them a 12-7-1 lead in the series. Friona last beat Muleshoe in 1958, to tie the series up at 7-7-1 at that time.

Coach J.T. King's Red Raiders pulled out a miraculous 20-16 victory over Texas A&M before 43,000 fans here last week. Tech trailed 16-13 with 1:18 remaining when Tom Wilson threw seven yards to Jerry Shipley, who flipped a lateral to Donny Anderson. The All-

American sped 42 yards into the A&M end zone.

TCU fell before defending champion Arkansas 28-0 at Little Rock. Coach Abe Martin's Frogs also have lost to Nebraska but hold a decision over Florida State, conqueror of Baylor last week. Tech has beaten Kansas and lost to Texas. Plenty of reserved seats were available as the week opened.

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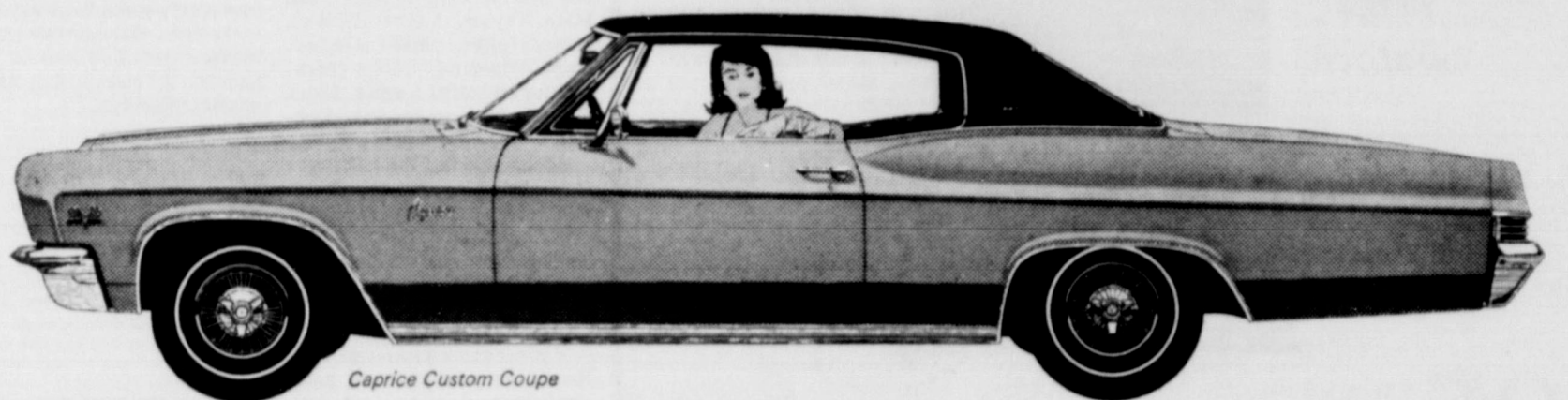

**GRAIN PRODUCTION**

If present estimates are realized, the nation's feed grain production -- corn, oats, barley and sorghum grain -- for 1965 will set a new record. Extension Economist John G. McHaney at Texas A&M University, said the production of about 157 million tons will be due entirely to higher per acre yields, up 15 per cent from last year and 8 per cent above the 1963 record. The acreage planted is 4 million less than last year and 32 million below the acres planted in 1959 and 1960, just before the feed grain program

became effective. Gaines wheat from the Pacific Northwest has been highly publicized and growers frequently ask if it will perform in Texas in a similar manner as in the Northwest. If you have ever visited the Northwest, you will understand that conditions are very different from Texas. Temperatures during the fruiting period are much cooler and moisture more dependable.

We do not feel that Gaines has any place in Texas wheat production for the following reasons. First, the grain is white and not suitable for production of bakery flour. Texas wheat has gained a good reputation for quality in recent years. If white wheat is mixed with it, much wheat will be discounted when sold as mixed wheat. Second, it has not yielded our best adapted varieties under any conditions, even under irrigation. Third, it is very late in maturity, very susceptible to all rusts and frequently low in test weight. A commercial field in the northern High Plains in 1965 tested only 47 pounds per bushel.

**EQUIPMENT UPKEEP**

Equipment operator's manuals, a pencil and a notebook can make you money on farm equipment.

By following directions in the operator's manual for a piece of equipment, all preventive maintenance services can be performed to insure the longest possible service.

When a piece of equipment makes its last trip out of the field for the season, list in a notebook all the items needing repairs before the next season. It's easy to forget some of the repairs that need to be done if they are not put down on paper.

Time to make repairs is in the winter. During this off-season time is available for shop service and parts delivery.

Repair parts and the labor to replace them can be just a small cost if a breakdown comes at the wrong time. Down time in a rush season is more expensive than repair parts put in during the slack season, so remember to make notes of needed repairs when you finish harvest.

**FOOD & NUTRITION NOTE**

"Nutritional Delinquent" - are you one? We hear a lot about delinquents these days but the kind we hear very little about may be found right in your home. Because large bags of groceries are bought and carried into the home, certainly does not assure "good nutrition." A nutritional delinquent is one who, because of likes or dislikes, fad diets, or the hurried way of modern living doesn't eat the right foods in the right quantities at the right time.

Undernourishment is rare in the United States these days. With so much prosperity, Americans are labeled "over-nourished" but in reality too many of us are malnourished. Children don't like vegetables, teenagers gorge on "empty calories" at snack bars, Dad is a meat and potato eater, Mom gorges on sweets and rich foods and too many adults breakfast on coffee, cigarettes and a roll.

Eating daily from the main four food groups can assure good nutrition, according to the National Research Council. The four groups that are essential for good diets are: milk group (includes all milk products); meat group; vegetable and fruit group and bread and cereal group.

If one's health is apparently good now, even without adequate nutrients, it could be improved by adding those needed nutrients. A thought to remember is this, "Eat Not only to add years to your life but eat to add some life to those years."

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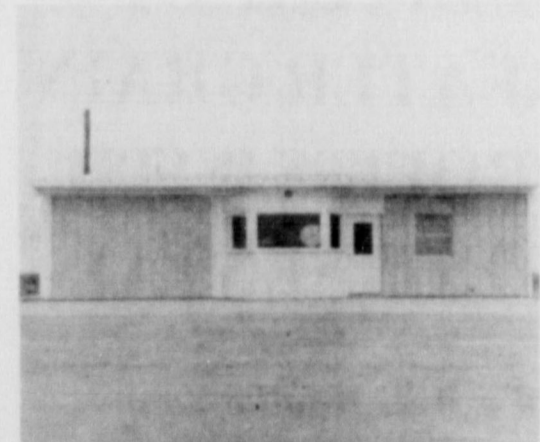
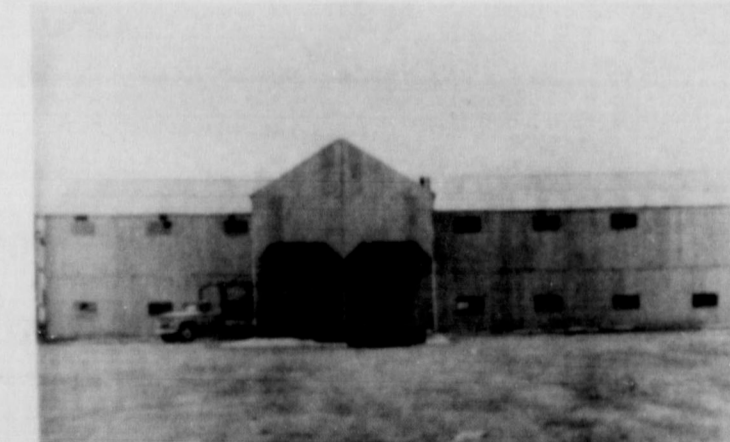

## WHY FALL-FERTILIZE PASTURES, HAYLANDS?

by T. R. Cox, Chief Agronomist Cyanamid Agricultural Research Center

In the final analysis, there is only one answer to this question—"because it pays." Today's cost-conscious farmer knows that home-grown forages are a low-cost source of the energy or fuel required to keep beef and dairy animals operating. He also knows that well-fertilized forage supplies in proper balance a bonus of protein, vitamins and minerals in the ration.

Early fall application — RIGHT NOW — will revive run-down pastures and provide grazing into early winter. Extra nitrogen top dressed on early-seeded small grains will also provide fall and early winter grazing. There is no surer, more economical way to avoid the fall slump in milk or meat production.

Productive pastures and hay crops remove large amounts of plant food from the soil. This plant food must be replaced regularly to maintain high yields. A three-ton yield of grass hay, for example, removes an average of 95 pounds nitrogen, 36 pounds P<sub>2</sub>O<sub>5</sub>, and 120 pounds K<sub>2</sub>O. Researchers at Pennsylvania State University have estimated that one well-fed cow at the end of the grazing season will have removed the equivalent of 150 pounds nitrogen, 36 pounds P<sub>2</sub>O<sub>5</sub>, and 120 pounds K<sub>2</sub>O.

Pastures made up largely of grasses — stands with less than 20 to 50 percent legumes in the mixture — should be top dressed with 60 to 75 pounds nitrogen per acre. To make this nitrogen pay off, lime, phosphate, and potash must be maintained at high levels. Requirements are easily determined by periodic soil tests. All forage stands, legumes and grasses alike, withstand freeze-

ing damage when they go into winter with adequate P and K. Early fall application of phosphate and potash is best. Late fall or early winter top dressing with ammonium-type nitrogen — as contained in urea, ammonium sulphate, ammonium nitrate and anhydrous or aqua ammonia — has proved very efficient except on light, sandy soils where leaching may occur. Ammonium forms are usually superior to all-nitrate forms. College agronomists agree that late fall top dressing after soils have cooled below 50°F. is generally equal to spring application in promoting early growth for grazing or silage and hay crops. In our own tests in 34 locations, American Cyanamid Company scientists, Princeton, N.J. have noted that the later nitrogen was applied in the fall, the closer yields next season approached those of spring-applied nitrogen. On the average, differences were insignificant between late fall and spring-applied nitrogen. Fall is the ideal time to top dress pastures and haylands, because you avoid the chance of completely missing a spring application because of wet soils. Firm soils in the fall mean no damage from compaction with heavy equipment. Other advantages associated with fall application are price discounts, savings on labor, and less waiting time for pick up or custom spreading of the fertilizer. What's most important, you are not neglecting to use ample fertilizer — the first essential to increased production efficiency — greater milk flow — increased beef gains — and lower cost of meat and milk.
