STUDYING THE BIBLE

WITH CHARLES E. WHITT CHURCH OF CHRIST CRANE, TEXAS **BOX 252**

In talking with one of our readers the other day, I was given this problem: "Suppose a person on the verge of becoming a disciple of Christ sits down and figures he will not be able to pay the price demanded and therefore decides not to even make the start?" It is true that many have made the start only to fall away at a later date. In the parable of the sower Jesus gives the reasons why some disciples never finish the race they start. Jesus explains there that the word of God, the seed, is sown into four kinds of hearts. The devil takes the word out of the hearts of some lest they believe and be saved. The word falls into other hearts, they keep the word and remain saved (Luke 8:15). In Luke 8:13 however Jesus says that "They on the rock are they, which, when they hear, receive the word with joy; and these have no root, which for a while believe, and in time of temptation fall away." The reason for their fall is simply because they are not deeply rooted and grounded in the truth, which is the word. If the word had found proper lodgment in their hearts, they would have been able to withstand the temptations of life (Matthew says persecutions and tribulations). Jesus was tempted in like manner as you and I,and yet without sin. In Matthew 4 the devil tempts Jesus by the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes and the pride of life. He was able to resist the temptation each time by quoting a passage of scripture. If we know the Bible as we should, we too can quote a passage of scripture each time the devil tempts us and put him to flight. In Luke 8:14 Jesus lists another group that fall away: "And that which fell among thorns are they, which, when they have heard, go forth, and are choked with cares and riches and pleasures of this life, and bring no fruit to perfection." This group also fall away because they have failed to grow in the grace and knowledge of the Lord. When a man quits eating, he begins to lose weight and strength and finally dies. When a child of God fails to read his Bible so as to receive spiritual strength, his spiritual strength slowly begins to leave him, he becomes so weak that he is overcome by the devil and finally dies a spiritual death. In I Peter 1:5 the Apostle tells us that we are kept by the power of God through faith. The power of God is the Gospel (Romans 1:16). If the word dwells in our hearts and our lives are guided by it, we will not fall away; the word will keep us. As long as we follow the word, we cannot sin and therefore cannot fall. Jesus does not demand the impossible; we can pay the cost of discipleship.




