LIGHT VOTE INDICATED IN PRIMARIES THIS WEEK

Airport Aid To Be Lost If Not Applied For Within 60 Days

(The following letter was received by Judge G. H. Fisher from the Department of Commerce):
County Judge, Upton County
McCamey, Texas
Subject: Proposed Federal Air Project, McCamey Airport.
Dear Sir:

The Federal Airport Program for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 1948, was announced to the public on that date and locations receiving allocations were notified by the Regional Administrator by letters dated July 2, 1948.

Although we have not received a request for Federal Aid from either the City of McCamey of Upton County, this office has been aware of the fact that certain airport improvements are needed in order to permit Trans-Texas Airlines to land at McCamey. For this reason, we included you in our request for funds for the 1949 Program and are holding in reserve an amount which represents our estimate of the cost of the necessary work.

These funds will be held in abeyance for the next 30 to 60 days for use by either Upton County or the City of McCamey in the event that they decide to request Federal aid in the development of their airport. If a request for Federal aid is not received by that time, it is probable that it will be necessary to reallocate the money elsewhere to some project which is in a position to go ahead.

For your use in the event that you decide to apply for project, six copies of Form ACA-1623 are enclosed. Also enclosed is a copy of the Rules and Regulations for Administering the Federal Airport Act. Immediately upon receipt of this Request, we will arrange for one of our engineers to contact you for the purpose of assisting in planning a project and explaining in detail the requirements of the Federal Airport Aid.

(Editor's Note: The amount of Federal Aid for the above mentioned project totals \$30,000; however, this sum will be granted only on the conditions that \$40,000 will be contributed locally).

Three Injured In 'Hit and Run' Accident

An accident occurred on the Crane Highway just north of McCamey near the city limits Tuesday night about midnight.

Two young men and a girl were walking south along the highway, in the gravel space beside the pavement, when an automobile struck them. One of the young men received a broken leg and other cuts and bruises. Both the others were only slightly injured. The car failed to stop to render aid.

Jacobsen-Moore ambulance was called and carried Bill Rawson, worst injured boy, to the Cooper Hospital for first aid treatment, then he was rushed to Shannon Hospital, San Angelo, for further attention. The other boy, named Hunt, and a girl, a Miss Phillips, received first aid at the site of the accident.

Officers report the occupants of the "Hit and Run" car were located later and placed in jail. The car was owned by J. H. Kingston, who was asleep in the back seat. The driver was Ben Henry Stroddman, both recently from Big Lake. The driver stated he did not see the pedestrians; and that the accident was unavoidable, however, both are still held, awaiting the action of the Grand Jury.

Chemical Expansion Program Of Phillips Petroleum Company

Chemical activities of Phillips Petroleum Co. have been expanded thru the formation of a wholly-owned subsidiary, the Phillips Chemical Co., it was announced today. The new chemical company was organized for the purpose of conducting Phillips Petroleum Co.'s chemical and synthetic rubber operations as well as its furnace-type carbon black operations now handled by another wholly-owned subsidiary, Philtex Chemical Co. Key officers of Phillips Chemical Co. are Frank Phillips, chairman; K. S. Adams, president; Ross W. Thomas, executive vice president; Paul Endacott, Don Emory, G. G. Oberfell and R. C. Jopling, vice presidents. G. W. McCullough has been appointed vice president and general manager.

As a nucleus of the new program, Phillips Chemical Co. has leased on a long-term basis the Cactus Ordnance Works at Etter in the Texas Panhandle and will also build a new ammonium nitrate plant at Etter. Cactus Ordnance is one of the largest ammonia plants in the world and will be used by the company to produce ammonia for nitrogenous fertilizers. It is expected that present plant capacity will be doubled from approximately 70,000 tons to more than 140,000 tons. Under the lease agreement the United States Government may purchase products from this plant for its foreign relief export fertilizer program until June 30, 1952. The company plans to divert the production of these facilities to the relief of our domestic fertilizer shortage as rapidly as the Government's foreign program is reduced.

The company's plans for the future also include the acquisition of a large site on the ship channel near Houston, Texas, where a plant will be built for the manufacture of ammonium sulfate, another important type of fertilizer. This site is of sufficient size to permit the addition of the several other chemical plants which are planned.

For a number of years Phillips has been active in the development of chemicals based on hydrocarbon raw materials. The Cactus plant uses natural gas as raw material and is located in one of the largest gas fields in the world.

Supplying food for the increasing population of the world places tremendous emphasis on the need for more intensive farming. The accelerated food production of past years has robbed our domestic farm lands of fertility. To maintain the supply of food, the productivity of soils must be restored by replenishing the vital elements thru an increasing use of fertilizers. The formation of the new Phillips Chemical Co. will accelerate the availability of such fertilizers, and will inject a healthy competitive force in the far-reaching chemical field.

Upton County candidates combed the county the past week for votes, but many quarters are still predicting a light vote in the primaries to be held Saturday. This forecast is being made on the basis of only one county-wide election, while four other county officials are being returned to office without opposition. Mrs. Elizabeth Rains, County Treasurer; Ralph Daugherty, County Clerk; H. E. Eckols, County Sheriff; and G. H. Fisher, County Judge, are the county officials without opposition.

MENEFEE-LANGDON
The only county-wide race is the County Attorney's post. John Menefee is seeking re-election and is opposed by Charles Langdon. Both candidates have made active campaigns and have created interest among the voters of the county.

MOORE-CONGER
Persons residing in Prec. No. 4 of the county will have one other additional race on which to cast a ballot. Joe Conger is seeking re-election to the County Commissioner's position, and is opposed by W. W. 'Bill' Moore. Both of these candidates have carried their campaigns over the entire precinct and have added much incentive to the voters to go to the polls on Saturday.

REIMERS-BYNUM
In Prec. No. 3, voters will have an opportunity to cast a vote on the Constables' race. Malcolm Reimers is asking for a return to office and is opposed by Clyde Bynum. With both candidates making the circles, this race will bring out some of the voters in the precinct.

Four voting boxes will be maintained in McCamey for the Saturday elections. Persons residing south of the railroad and east of Burleson Avenue will vote in Box No. 6 at the McCamey High School. Those residing (Continued on page 2)

ing north of the railroad and east of the Crane road as far north as King's Mountain will vote at Box No. 5 to be located at Rodman Supply.
For voters living west of Burleson Avenue to the Upton County line, Box No. 4 is located at the Mexican School House located in the west side of Mc-

Camey. The north line of Box No. 4 is north of Spudder Flat between McCamey and Crane.

Persons residing in the northern part of the county in Precinct No. 3 will vote at the McElroy Ranch Headquarters east of Crane.

This is about the extent of the local election for this year's primary, but by taking a glance at the State and District races more interest is noticed.

DISTRICT RACES

In the chase of the 88th District Representative post, a three man race has brought candidates to the front in the public interest. George Elliott, incumbent from Odessa, is not a candidate for

re-election. J. T. Rutherford, a pre-law student who is scheduled to enter the Texas University Law School next fall, of Odessa; Emory "Pat" Corbett, a University of Texas law student from Midland, and Buck Jackson, the sheriff of Pecos, are the men in the race. Rutherford, Corbett and Jackson have all three visited in McCamey during the past week in an effort to pick up the votes from the people.

Another important race which has created much interest over the entire western part of Texas is the chase for the 16th District Congressional seat. Ken Regan, independent Midland oil operator, is seeking re-election and is being opposed by youthful Woodrow Bean of El Paso. Nearly all West Texas remembers the race of these two men last summer when they tangled in a five-man race to fill the vacancy created when Rep. R. E. Thomason of El Paso resigned the post to accept a Federal District Judge position. Regan was the winner in that race by a close 300 vote margin.

SENATORIAL RACE, 29th DIST.

In the race for State Senator

from the 29th Senatorial District are four men, each striving to get the most votes. Charles B. Moore of Val Verde County is a Del Rio resident, and a Representative; Henry A. Coffield is from Marfa, Presidio County, and is the city's mayor; Hill D. Hudson of Pecos, Reeves County, is an ex-District Attorney and Maurice T. Bobbitt, an El Paso lawyer are the men in this race.



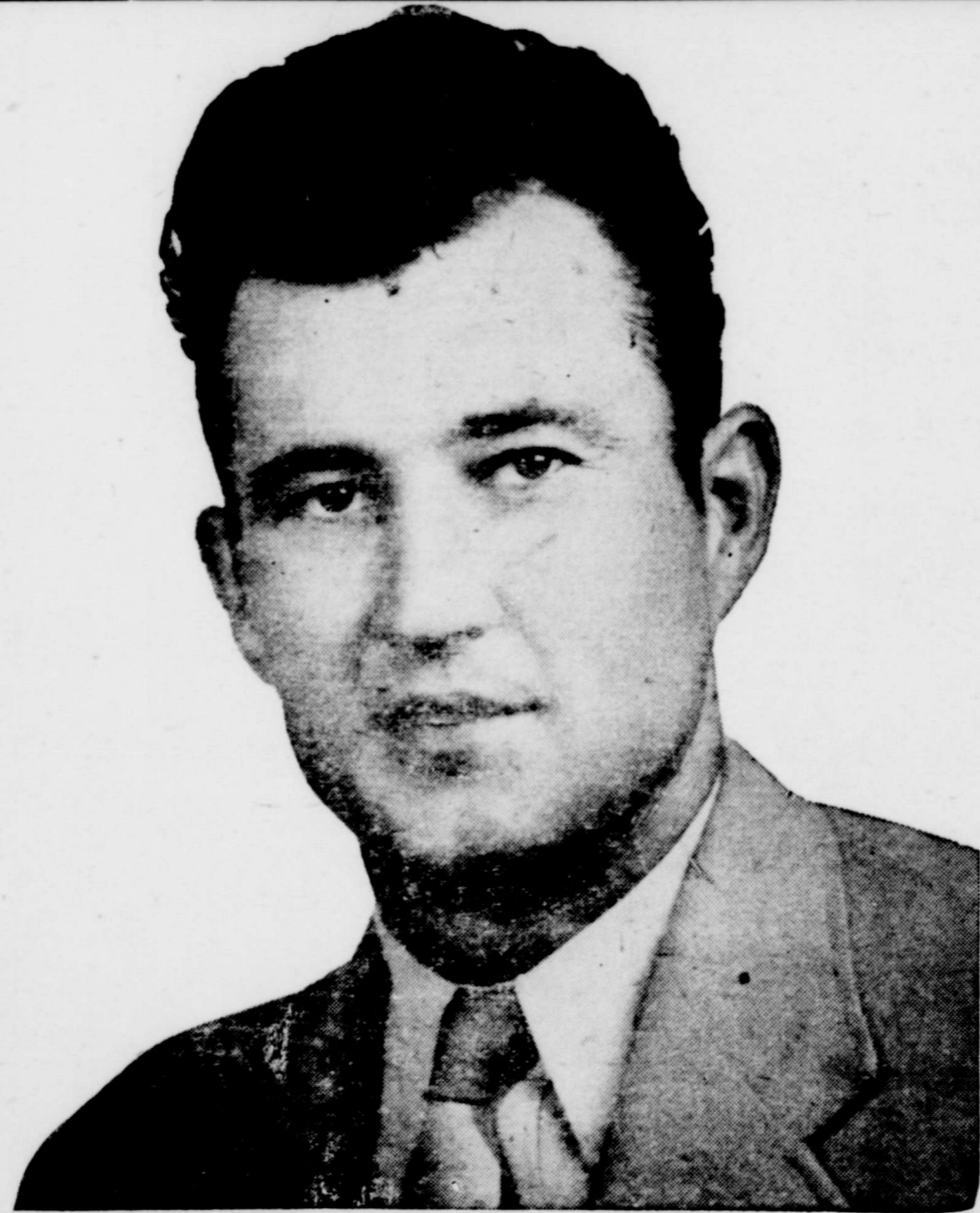
