Fields was a brilliant quarterback, and we had hoped he would be able to lead the Steers to a fine season.


Don't Be BLUE Just Because You Boo-Booed

Brewer was the only contestant among the 174 who turned in blanks to correctly pick 16 of the 18 games listed. The number of entries was up 45 per cent over the 120 who entered the first week last year, and up 100 per cent over 1963's opening week.

City Approves \$233,315 Budget

The Friona City Council approved a \$233,315 annual budget for the fiscal year 1965-66 at its regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

In other business, the council adopted a social security program for its employees, appointed a board of equilization, set the tax rate and approved the contract for the auditing of the city's books.

The new budget compares with a figure of \$205,786 last year. Among the items budgeted for the coming year are expenses for a new water well. and additional trash removal

Nine stoppages were corrected during the month, and five new sewer taps made to bring the total active taps to 940 as of the end of August.

Only one fire call was reported during the month of August. That was to the L.D. Rolane farm August 6. Estimated damage was \$800 to a pick-up truck.

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

The food will not be ordered ahead of time so everyone is welcome to come join the trail ride and there will be plenty to eat for everyone.



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
