The general sentiment at present is in favor of such a measure under which school districts must hire teachers for a specific number of years, the number increasing with the second and third contracts under which the leacher serves.

A mandatory, cumulative sickeave law is also scheduled for consideration.

The convention will hear reports on the recommendations of the Gilmer-Aikin committee. It was created by the last legislature, ordered to study the needs of the Texas schools and make recommendations to the next legislature, which meets in January.

Legislative matters and various reports will be placed before the general convention, the associations 350-member house of delegates and the executive committee.







Thi indicates the 410,000 consumer will need at least 307,000,000 gal lons in 1948, compared with 280, 000,000 last year. Some estimate put this year's demand as high as 400,000,000 gallons.
