

# Annual Horse Shows Scheduled By Jaycees

Friersons who watched the Miss Texas contest on television last Saturday night, if they were like ourselves, undoubtedly felt a bit "gypped" when the program was over.

Mainly, we hadn't gotten to see "our girl," Kay Burleson during the entire telecast, and if it had been pay television, we'd have felt like demanding our money back.

Of course, the way the Amarillo station "slid into" the program didn't help a bit. Those of you who watched will recall that a beer advertisement which ran longer than it should have caused a question among local viewers right off the bat.

Because, by the time the afore-mentioned commercial was over, the announcer at the Miss Texas pageant was just finishing the presentation of the ten finalists in the program -- we got to see just the last two or three.

Therefore, Friersons didn't know, until after each of the top 10 girls had performed their talent for the benefit of TV whether or not Kay was in the elite group.

Kay's parents, the T. I. Burlesons, report that Kay had a marvelous time at the pageant, and that she considers the contest an experience she will never forget.

It was quite a production, Mr. Burleson says, and the local group who supported Kay with their presence enjoyed every bit of it.

Since there were 66 contestants, the various portions of the pageant were divided up. For example, 22 girls did the talent portion of the contest one night, with another 22 appearing in bathing suits and the other 22 appearing in the evening gown division.

This was done on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights.

The Burlesons relate that the winner of the contest, Miss Nacogdoches, wasn't necessarily a "popular favorite," nor were they sure whether or not there was one. They pointed out that Miss Fort Worth, Miss Abilene and Miss Waco all were very popular, both with the girls and with the audience.

However, Mr. Burleson adds, there was so much beauty and talent in the contest that the judges couldn't have gone far wrong no matter who they chose.

It was by far the most outstanding pageant of its kind he had ever witnessed, Burleson said. "Usually you'll find a few real outstanding girls, and a bunch of mediocre ones. This wasn't the case there. They were all good," he said.

An interesting sidelight was revealed by the Burlesons. We hadn't heard or read about it otherwise. It seems the girl selected as "Miss Texas" had not even made the top 10 girls in the "Miss Irving" contest, but later won the "Miss Nacogdoches" honors, apparently being a student at one or the other cities.

Just goes to show you that it's all a matter of individual judges, so that "Our Kay" probably is just as good as the girl chosen to go to the Miss America contest.

At any rate, we're proud of Kay, and the honors she has won.

The Frierson Junior Chamber of Commerce is once again scheduling a "double header" of horse shows this weekend, with an Appaloosa horse show on Friday, and a quarter horse show on Saturday.

The shows will be held at the Jaycee Arena on the Clovis Highway. Each will begin with halter classes at 9 a. m. each day.

Frierson Jaycees are sponsoring the Appaloosa show for the

third year. Robert Zetzsche, chairman of the shows, says he expects at least as many Appaloosas this year as last, when 73 horses were entered. "We might approach the 100-mark," he said.

Zetzsche said that he had visited with several Appaloosa breeders in Eastern New Mexico this year, and expected many of them to be at Friday's show.

Meanwhile, Zetzsche said he looked for the quarter horse

show to draw "about the same number" of entries as it did last year, when 115 entries were paraded across the arena.

The quarter horse show, fifth annual affair, had its best year in 1963, when a total of 146 horses were entered, making the Frierson show the fourth largest in the state during the year.

Three years ago when the first Appaloosa show was attempted, the shows were held

a week apart. However, it was decided prior to last year's shows to hold them on successive days, figuring it might be handier for exhibitors who might have horses in both shows.

Both shows are sanctioned by state or national organizations. The Appaloosa show is under the auspices of the Texas Appaloosa Horse Club, and the quarter horse show is approved

by the American Quarter Horse Association.

Trophies will be awarded to winners in each class, both in performance and halter divisions. Also, trophies will be given to the grand champion stallions, mares and geldings. Rosettes will be presented to those placing second through sixth.

In the performance classes, entrance fees above office charges will be split 40 per cent

for first place, 30 per cent for second, 20 per cent for third and 10 per cent for fourth.

The performance division consists of such events as cutting, roping, western pleasure, reining, barrel racing and pole bending.

There have always been over 100 entries in the quarter horse show. The first year, 1961, there were 121 entries, followed by 119 in 1962, 146 in 1963 and 115 last year.

Entries are received each year from the four-state area of Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Colorado. Most entries come from the immediate West Texas-Eastern New Mexico area, primarily from Hereford, Muleshoe, Plainview, Lubbock, Amarillo, Dalhart, Clovis and Tucumcari, N. M.

The Jaycee-ettes plan to operate the concession stand both days, and will serve soft drinks and sandwiches.

The contest, which has drawn 27 girls from the West Texas area, will be held at the new Dimmitt High School Auditorium, beginning at 7:30 p. m.

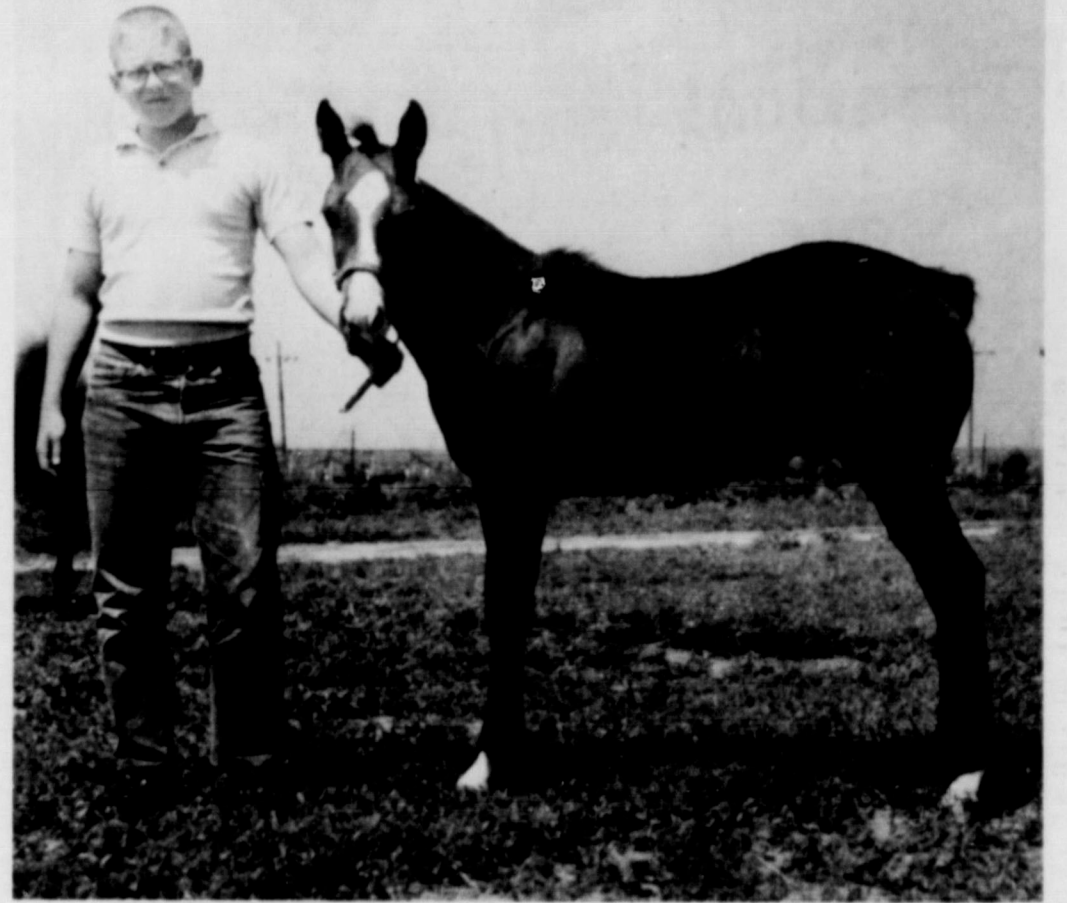
Sponsoring Sandy in the contest is the Frierson Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, which sponsored ex-Maize Queen Sheryl Long in the pageant last year.

Sandy is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Bill Beene of Frierson. She reigned over the 1964 Maize Days activities in Frierson after being chosen queen over 26

other entrants in the local contest. As queen, she presented prizes in the beard-growing contest, and appeared in Amarillo's Tri-State Fair parade.

Winner of the "Miss Grain Sorghum" contest will receive a \$500 scholarship to the college of her choice. Runnerup will get a \$200 scholarship, and second runnerup receives a \$100 scholarship.

This is the sixth annual "Miss Grain Sorghum" pageant. The contest has grown each year. Last year there were 18 entrants in the pageant. Entrants will be judged on beauty, personality, poise, figure and talent.

## Postal Employees To Take Part In Plan

Postmaster Wright Williams announced today that all Frierson Post Office employees will be asked to take part in the new Postal Efficiency Plan announced July 22, by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski. "The Postal Efficiency Plan includes comprehensive programs for improving postal service and reducing costs," Williams said.

"It is our way of helping President Johnson fulfill his pledge to provide effective and economical government services."

In Washington, Postmaster General John A. Gronouski termed the plan's twin objectives of economy and service betterment, "a matter of highest priority" and called for a total involvement of all employees through the Post Office suggestion program.

Semi-annual reports will be made to the President, Mr.

Gronouski said, and realized savings will be reverted to the Treasury or applied to improve postal service.

A local committee will be organized to fulfill the two purposes of the plan: 1. Reduce costs and 2. Improve services.

COACHES PREDICT

Chieftains Rated Fifth In Close District Race

The Friona Chieftains, who tied Floydada for the championship of District 3-AA while compiling an 8-2 season record last season, have been tabbed for no better than fifth place this season by a consensus poll of district coaches.

Of the district schools, Dimmitt has a new head man, with Brown L. Smith replacing J.D. Covington, who held the head coach's job for the Bobcats the past nine years.

There are varied opinions as to how the race will finish. The predicted district finish, tabulated by Friona's Coach Don Light for a report to the Texas High School Coaches Association this week, is as follows, with the number of voting points for each team listed:

1. Olton (23); 2. (tie) Lockney and Abernathy (22 each); 4. Floydada (21); 5. Friona (18) and 6. Dimmitt (14).

The Chieftains were rated first by one district coach, third by another; fourth by still another, and fifth by two different coaches. The coaches did not rate their own teams.

All of the district teams have good experience returning. The number of lettermen returning ranges from 11 at Abernathy to 25 at Lockney. All have at least four starters returning.

Friona has four offensive and four defensive starters coming back. The offensive starters are guard Bob Sims, center Bing Bingham, tackle Ray Braxton and end Jesse Shirley.

A thumbnail sketch of Friona's district opponents for the coming year, as reported to Coach Light, follows: Olton: 13 returning lettermen; four starters. 1964 record: 5-5. Most outstanding player: quarterback Joe Priest.

Lockney: 25 returning lettermen; seven starters. 1964 record: 4-5-1. Key player: quarterback Dale Galloway.

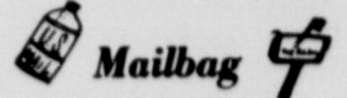

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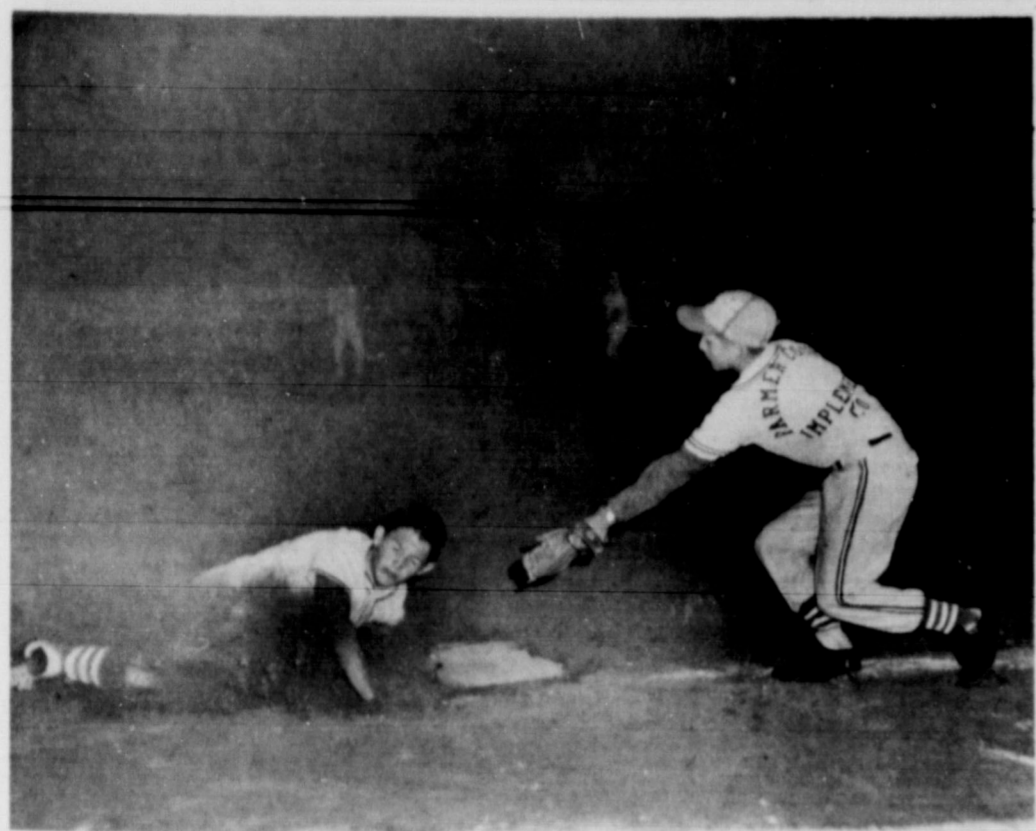

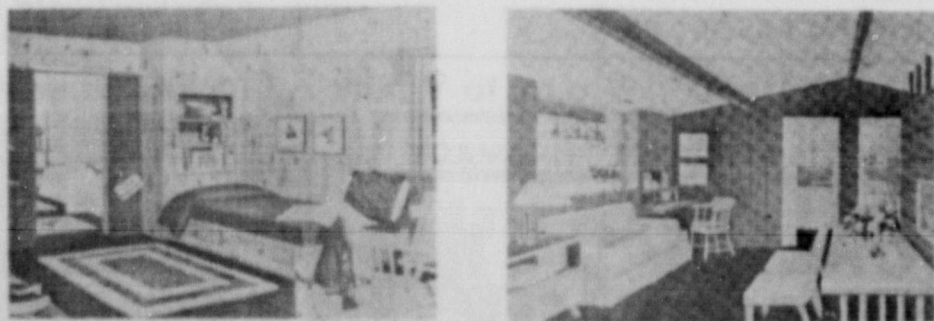

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Friona has heretofore ordered that portions of the streets, highways and avenues be improved by grading, installing concrete curb and gutter and paving with caliche base and triple asphalt surface together with incidentals and appurtenances, and arrangements therefore have been made and entered into by the City of Friona, Texas, with L. A. Purcell, Contractor, and, WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Friona has caused the City Engineer to prepare and file estimates of the cost of such improvements and estimates of the amounts per front foot to be assessed against abutting property and the owners thereof, and such estimates have been approved and examined:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS, BY WHICH IS MEANT THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY, sometimes referred to as the City Council:

Section 1. That the estimates prepared by the City Engineers, Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, Consulting Engineers, be and are hereby adopted.

Section 2. NOTICE TO THE OWNERS OF PROPERTY ABUTTING UPON THE HEREBELOW MENTIONED PORTIONS OF STREETS, HIGHWAYS AND AVENUES AND TO ALL OTHERS AFFECTED: The governing body of the City of Friona, Texas, has heretofore ordered that the following portions of streets, highways and avenues in and along the boundaries of the City of Friona, Texas, be improved by raising, grading and filling and installing concrete curbs and gutters and installation of sewers and drains where necessary on streets, highways and avenues hereinafter designated, and it is hereby found and determined that the amount per front foot in each unit proposed to be assessed for such improvements against the abutting property and the owners thereof on the portions of said streets, highways and avenues improved and the total costs of improvements on such portions of said streets, highways and avenues are the amounts set forth in the respective following paragraphs which cover the units therein designated, to wit:

Unit 1-65, 14th Street (Except Nelson Welch Property) from the East Property Line of Pierce Avenue to the West Property Line of Walnut Avenue; assessment per front foot for paving and curb and gutter, \$5.44; estimated total cost of improvements \$9,303.04.

Unit 2-65, 13th Street from the East Property Line of Virginia Avenue to the West Property Line of Maple Avenue; assessment per front foot for paving and curb and gutter, \$3.88; estimated total cost of improvements \$2,556.40.

Unit 3-65, 13th Street from

the East Property Line of Jackson Avenue to the West Property Line of Virginia Avenue; assessment per front foot for paving and curb and gutter, \$3.88; estimated total cost of improvements \$2,556.40.

The arrangements for the making and construction of such improvements with pavement of triple coarse asphalt surface treatment and a six (6") flexible base has been made and entered into by the City of Friona, Texas, and the rolls and statements showing the proposed amounts to be assessed against the abutting property and the owners thereof, have been filed with the City, and such rolls and statements showing other matters and things, have been approved and the City Council of the said City has fixed a time and place for hearing to the owners of property abutting upon said portions of streets, highways and avenues and to all others affected, at which hearing the amounts to be assessed against the respective parcels of abutting land and the owners thereof, for improvements in the units upon which the particular parcels of property abut, and the amount of benefits to the respective parcels of property by means of the improvements in the unit upon which the particular property abuts, the regularity of the proceedings with reference to such improvements, and other matters and things will be determined, and after such hearing, assessments will, by ordinance, be made and levied and such hearing will be had and held by and before the City Council of Friona, Texas in the City Hall of the City of Friona, Texas, on the 9th day of August, 1965, at 8 o'clock P. M. The rolls and statements showing the proposed amounts of such assessments are on file in the office of the City Secretary and open to inspection of any interested parties at any time and of all said matters and things, all such owners of

property, as well as any others in any wise affected or interested will take due notice.

By order of the City Council of the City of Friona, Texas, this 19th day of July, 1965.

No notice other than hereinbefore provided for shall be necessary but publication of such notice shall be due and sufficient notice to any and all other persons, firms, corporations, and other parties.

Section 3. 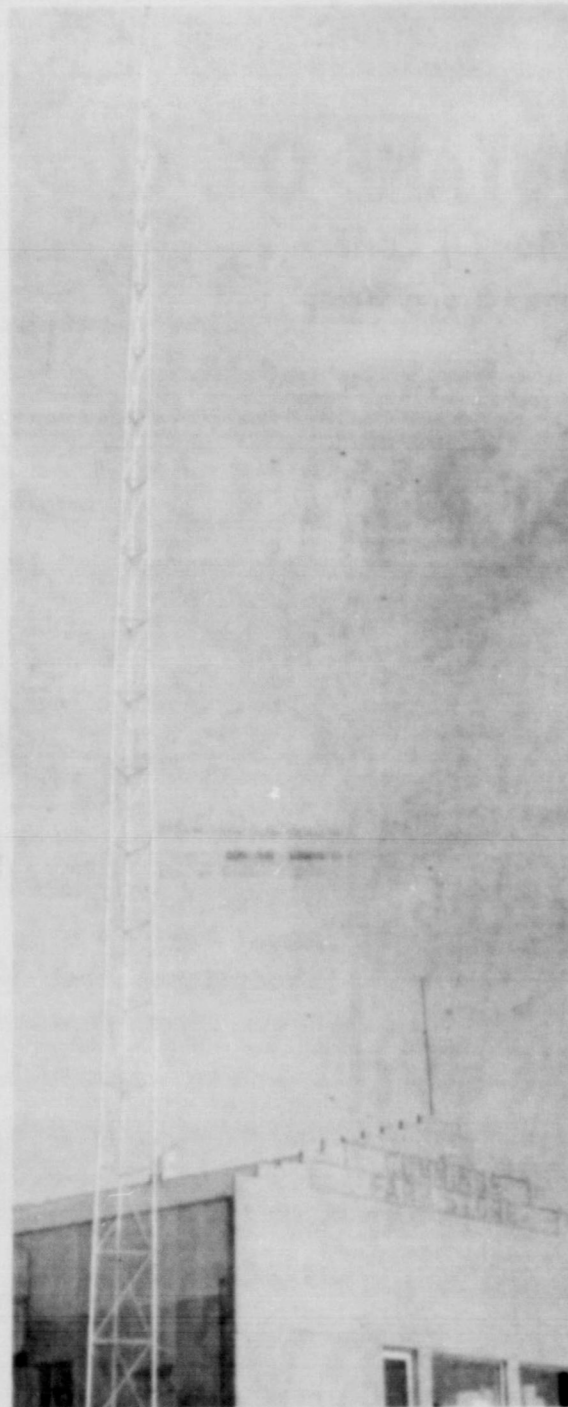

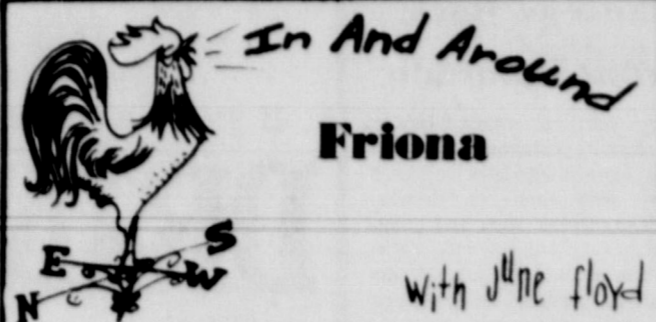

When is Friona going to get a first class restaurant with dining facilities for groups? I

have no fault to find with present eating establishments and certainly do not wish to cast any reflection on any of them. I feel sure our town and surrounding territory would support a cafeteria, restaurant, dining room or other facility large enough to accommodate family get-togethers, wedding rehearsal dinners or other group meetings where large groups are involved.

Several times in recent years I've heard rumors that such an establishment was being planned, but so far none of the plans have passed the rumor stage.

While in Stratford one day last week I visited with a retail merchant there and he asked, "Where are you from?" After I answered his question, he said, "We have a lot of fine people in our area from Friona."

I made the remark that we missed the Frionans who had moved to Sherman County. Then he said, "Your town has one of its very finest teachers when Baker Duggins moved away."

It seems that Baker and Margaret Duggins have been here so long that I think of them as natives and was somewhat surprised to run into someone who knew them somewhere else.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing Amendments to Section 4, 22 and 23 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; and certain statutory state officers; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

**RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 4, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this state at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Section 2. That Section 22, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the state in all

**A GROWING MENACE**

**CONSUMER BANKRUPTCIES** - has become a growing concern to credit grantors, the legal profession, legislators and social works.

A recent intensive study of some 482 consumer bankruptcies filed has brought out some facts worthy of our consideration, even the no simple cure has been found for the problem.

"Average," consumer bankrupt is 30 years of age and has completed second year of high school, has family of five, an income of \$4,650 a year and owes between \$3,200 and \$3,800 to 12 to 16 creditors.

Credit is easy, in fact too easy. The seller "plays up" this fact to induce buying. The unrealistic, impulsive, compulsive spender buys beyond his ability to pay many times piling up new debts to pay old.

According to the National Better Bureau, debt adjusters may be "adjusting," the situation without improving it. Exorbitant fees sometimes run as high as a 60% for "services" - and include no responsibility for paying off the client's debts.

Help to young people through adult education classes in the

area of economics and budgeting could help them face up to a realistic situation in managing their financial affairs.

Banks, Savings & Loans Association, Credit Unions or personnel office may have counselors, offering free help in solving financial tangles.

The County Extension office has information available for programs on Money Management. Also, bulletins free for the asking. Some of these are "Young Couples Make Money Work," another called "On Your Way to Family Financial Security" and "Why Go Broke."

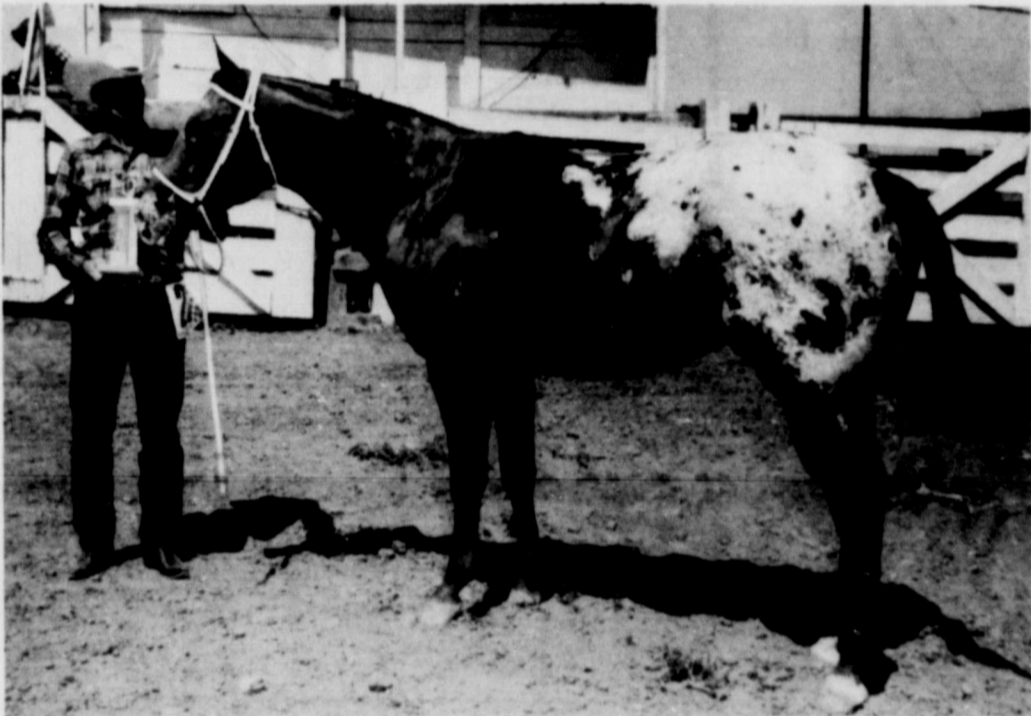

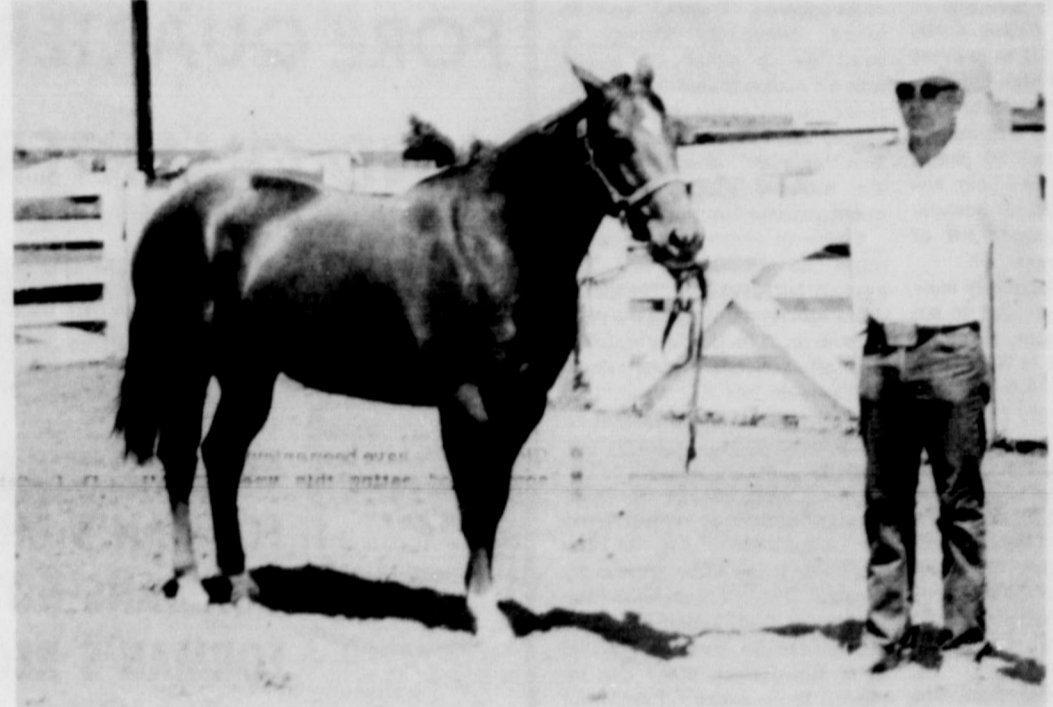

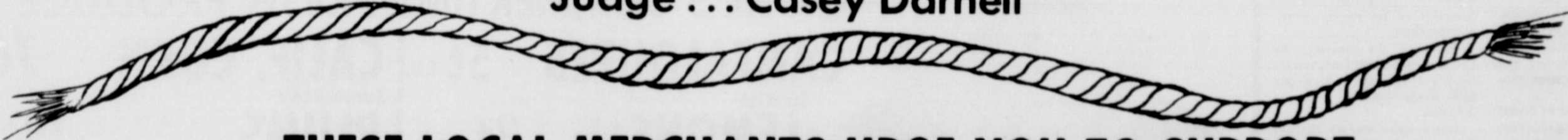

### On The Farm In Palmer County

By JOE VANZANDT  
County Agent

#### MIDGE ALERT

The midge season is here and we must all be on the alert for midge activity in grain sorghum fields, that are heading out. The adult midge is an orange-colored fly, about 1/12 inch long.

There are seven insecticides recommended for midge control. They are: Sevin, Toxaphene, Endrin, Parathion, Trithion and Ethion. A discussion of the amounts and restrictions for each insecticide are available at the County Agents office.

Best control has been received where two applications were made. The first should be made when approximately 90 per cent of the heads have completely emerged from the boot. The second application should be made 3 to 5 days after the first.

I want to caution all who use the insecticides to read the labels and follow the restrictions. Some insecticides can be applied only once a season.

**NITRATE POISONING**  
Nitrate poisoning has been experienced in West Texas on irrigated improved pastures. This was a rare occurrence but to help prevent any trouble in our area the following information is furnished.

Following the application of fertilizer materials to pasture grasses and forage sorghum several precautions should be observed to avoid possibilities of nitrate poisoning of livestock.

First, remove cattle from the area to be fertilized. Should spillage occur in filling a rig, pick up the material to prevent spots of unusually high concentration. Remove bags from the field since cattle will sometimes be attracted by them. After fertilizer has been applied and irrigation accomplished keep livestock off of the area for one week.

If forage is particularly succulent it is a good idea to not graze before 10 a.m. since nitrates accumulate in the plants at night and are not changed to the protein forms until sufficient light has been received.

Drought may cause nitrate accumulation under conditions where leaves wilt or roll during the day, but take up sufficient water during the night to regain turgor. Grazing of plants in drought stress should therefore proceed with caution.

Nitrate accumulation in plants may occur under certain conditions on soils that have been recently fertilized.

The possibility of nitrate toxicity should not discourage farmers from using nitrogen fertilizers at economically practical rates recommended by the Extension Service.

#### FORAGE TESTING

The Texas A&M University Forage Testing service has been in operation since March, 1964, and about 200 hay and silage samples have been processed.

The forage portion of a beef or dairy cattle feeding program is a significant part of the ration. It is now rapidly being recognized that there are vast differences in the nutritive value and quality of forages used in feeding programs in the state. A ration cannot be properly balanced when the nutritive value of the forage is unknown. If forage

is not properly utilized and supplemented according to its feeding value, profits and beef production will probably be lower.

The forage testing is available to anyone who desires to have dry forage or silage tested. In addition to the chemical forage analysis, a suggested feeding program based on the forage analyzed is offered.

The charge, based on actual costs, is \$6.00 for each hay sample and \$7.00 for each silage sample for determination of crude, protein and crude fiber and calculation of digestible protein, total digestible nutrients and net energy. Moisture in silage is also determined.

The charge is \$2.00 per sample of hay and \$3.00 per sample of silage for determination of protein only.

Forage sample mailing bags, instructions and all other forms are available at the County Agent's office.

**OUTDOOR FURNITURE**  
Outdoor wooden furniture can be made to last a virtual lifetime by the use of chemical preservatives.

Many home owners invest a lot of money in picnic furniture, children's swings, and other wooden items of outdoor living. For this reason, these accessories should be made to last as long as possible. Also, all wood, including redwood, in contact with the ground or concrete is subject to rot and can benefit by treatment.

One good preservative, for treating outdoor items by either dipping or painting, is pentachlorophenol, "Penta," as it is more commonly known, is available in either the ready mix or concentrated form from most lumber yards, paint supply store, and mail order houses. The "carrier" should be one of the mineral spirits or other clean volatile liquids.

Prior to treatment the wood must be absolutely dry. The easiest but least effective method is simply painting on the preservative. The liquid should be liberally brushed on and allowed to soak into the wood. Two or more applications should be made over a two to three day period.

If a metal bucket or other small container is available and the wood item can be disassembled, it can be treated by dipping. This is more effective treatment than brushing. Long pieces can be treated one end at a time. Each piece can be dipped from three to ten minutes with the longer period providing the best protection.

#### Board Sets Tax Rate

Friona School District's Board of Equalization met last Saturday at its regularly-appointed time.

Following the meeting, the Friona School Board met and set the school tax rate at \$1.50 per \$100 evaluation, the same as last year.

School taxes will not change, then, unless property value has been enhanced.

Friona coaches, Don Light, Bob Owen, Mel Williams and Truitt Read attended the annual Texas High School coaches clinic this week in Dallas.

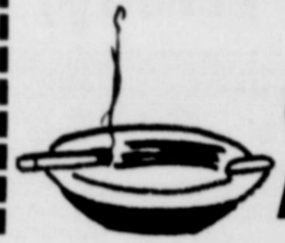
