


One of the oldest saws says that great oaks from little acorns grow-a statement which is irrefutably true. By the same token, great industries also grow from strange and modest beginnings.

Emergency Drive For Polio Fund To Be Held In Upton

Confidence that the entire! community would give wholehearted support of the Polio Epidemic Emergency Drive was expressed today by Mr. J. T. Wade, chairman of the Upton County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The Drive, announced Thursday by Basil O'Conner, National Foundation President, is being held as a last resort because "inno other way can the National Foundation continue to aid increased numbers of Polio patients without slowing up scientific research and professional education," he said.

It is the first emergency drive in the history of the fight against polio in the United States.

"All of us are deeply touched by the pathetic plight of those affected with this cruel disease," Mr. Wade said. "In our own midst we have seen polio strike, claiming 11 of the children and adults in our own county. We have been alert to the signs of danger, secure in the protection of March of Dimes funds, guaranteeing that no one would be deprived of the best medical care available for lack of money.

"But today that security is shaken, by a financial crisis. The high cost of polio throughout the nation has depleted the epidemic aid resources of the National Foundation. But it hasn't exhausted the sympathy and generosity of the American people. the bills for his medical treatment and care. We'll get the moneywalk again."




