

Santa Claus To Come To Friona Saturday

He has been head coach at Friona High School just three seasons, but already Coach Don Light bids to become the winningest coach in FHS history.

In three seasons, Coach Light's teams have won 22 games (while losing nine), to tie former coach Raymond Cook for the "winningest" honors. One more win for Coach Light will move him ahead of Cook, who is presently the high school principal at FHS.

In addition, Light's teams have tied for one district championship, and won another outright. That makes Don the only coach in Friona High School history to have coached two district football championship teams.

Upon rechecking the records, we also find that Coach Light has led Friona teams to three straight winning seasons, and if this isn't the first time in the school's football history, it certainly is the first time in the past 35 years.

The reason we hesitate to say it's the first ever for three straight winning seasons is because we don't have the figures for 1929, nor for 1926 and before.

Cook had two consecutive 7-2 years, but they were preceded by a team with a 1-7 mark and followed by one with a 2-7 record. Colle Huffman, presently coach at White Deer, had two 6-3-1 years at FHS in 1957 and 1958. However, his first team in 1956 had a 3-17 mark, and then Coach Earl Smith's eleven compiled a 4-6 record in 1959.

The Friona Chieftains had won just one of their previous 31 games when Coach Light took over the team. However, his record through 31 games is 22-9.

At Stinnett, he had a five-year record of 38-16-3, a winning percentage of 69.3, but Coach Light has so reversed the losing trend at Friona that his three-year mark here (22-9) figures out to 71.0 per cent wins, better than his Stinnett average.

And in eight years, the successful high school coach has a 60-25-3 record, 69.9 per cent wins, and his teams have figured in four district championships.

Looking ahead to next season for just a moment, we find that the Chieftains will be competing in an eight-team district under the new interscholastic League alignment.

The team will thus play seven district games, and be limited to only three non-district affairs. The same five teams met the past two seasons will remain in Friona's district, joined by Hale Center and Memphis, who moved up from Class A.

We swear that every time the interscholastic League reshuffles the district alignments, they put the names of new schools in a hat and draw them out, with little regard to geographical location when they are placed in a new district.

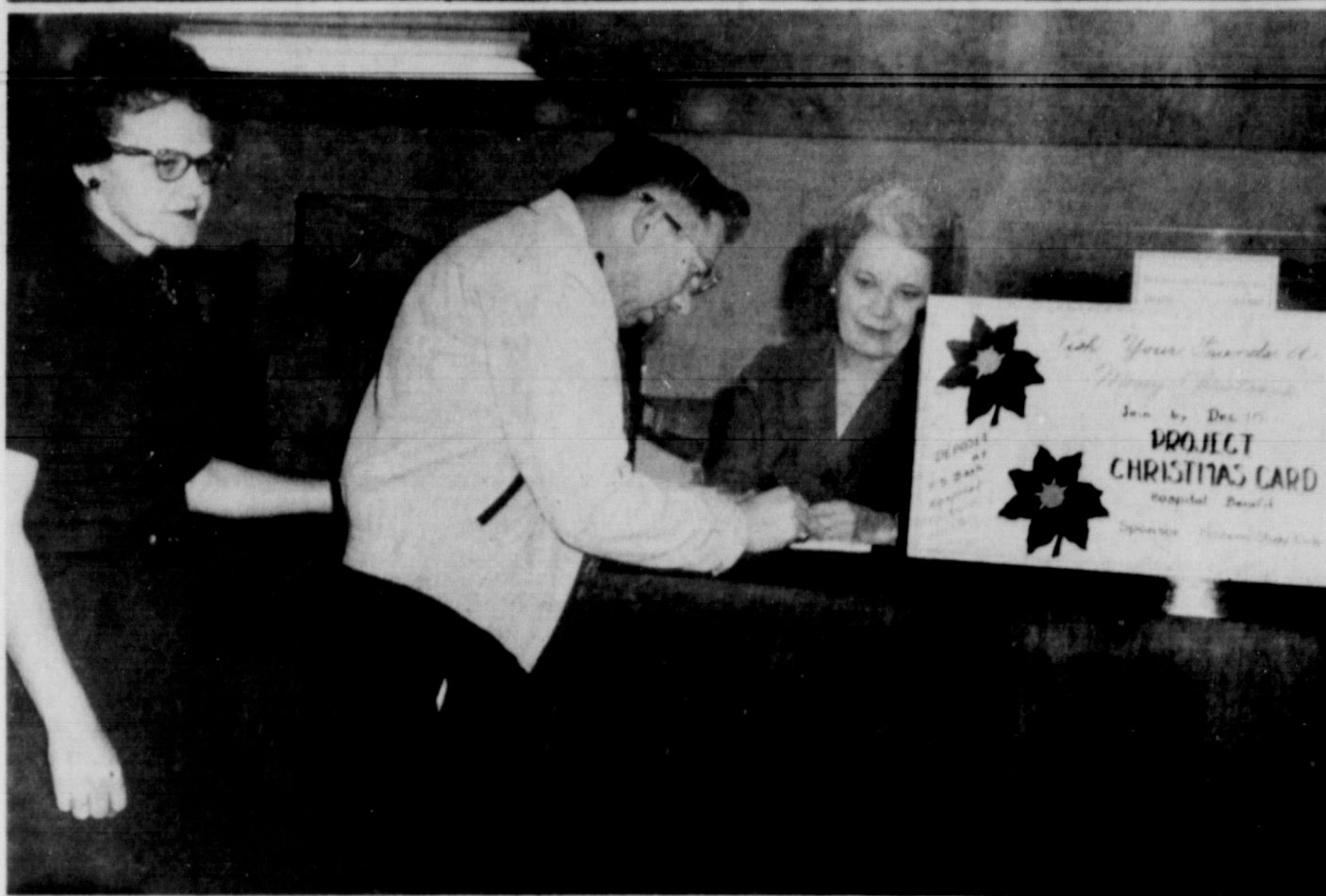
At least, that's the way it seems to us in regard to Memphis. It is 150 miles to Memphis, making for a 300-mile round trip for athletic events. This won't be so bad for football, but it will be home-and-home trips for basketball for at least two years, and not only for Friona, but other teams in the district.

But if Friona thinks it has it bad, it might consider the plight of Muleshoe, which was placed in District 1 - AAA two years ago. Fans have a 230-mile trip when Muleshoe and Perryton are playing.

The UIL originally had Littlefield lined up to join Muleshoe in the far-flung district for the next two years, but that school filed a protest, and was left in the southern district. So, there is Littlefield, 30 miles from one-time rival Muleshoe, and not even in the same district, while the Mules must travel 230 miles to play Perryton.

So you see we at Friona really don't have much of a problem at all.

Farmers May Purchase More Cotton Allotments

Friona area farmers can buy or lease cotton allotments from farmers in other counties, as a result of the referendum November 23.

Parmer County farmers, by their vote, vetoed the prospects of selling or leasing any county cotton allotments outside the county. However, farmers may transfer allotments within the county, as well as secure allotments from outside the county.

Farmers who have allotments they wish to sell or lease, or who would like to secure allotments from farmers in other parts of the state should list their needs with the Parmer County ASCS office in Farwell. In addition, those wishing to

secure additional allotments may contact W.L. (Preach) Edelman in Friona, as he has made contacts in other parts of the state, and has arranged for the purpose of cotton allotments.

The allotments will be handled on a basis of buying and selling cotton, according to the yield record of farms involved. Edelman points out, for instance, if a farmer has a normal yield of 600 pounds per acre, he will need to secure this much "cotton" from down-state farmers to be eligible to plant it next year.

Only farms with 1965 allotments are eligible to buy additional allotments, Edelman

pointed out. The newly acquired acreage will become a part of the farm's permanent cotton history.

Transfers will need to be made by December 31, so farmers are urged to make their wishes known as soon as possible.

A meeting will be held Monday night at 8 p.m. at the grade

school cafeteria to discuss the transfer of allotments. Interested farmers are urged to attend and find out more about the program.

Also, Edelman will discuss the cotton micronaire test, and how it may be used to improve area cotton-both in quality and price.

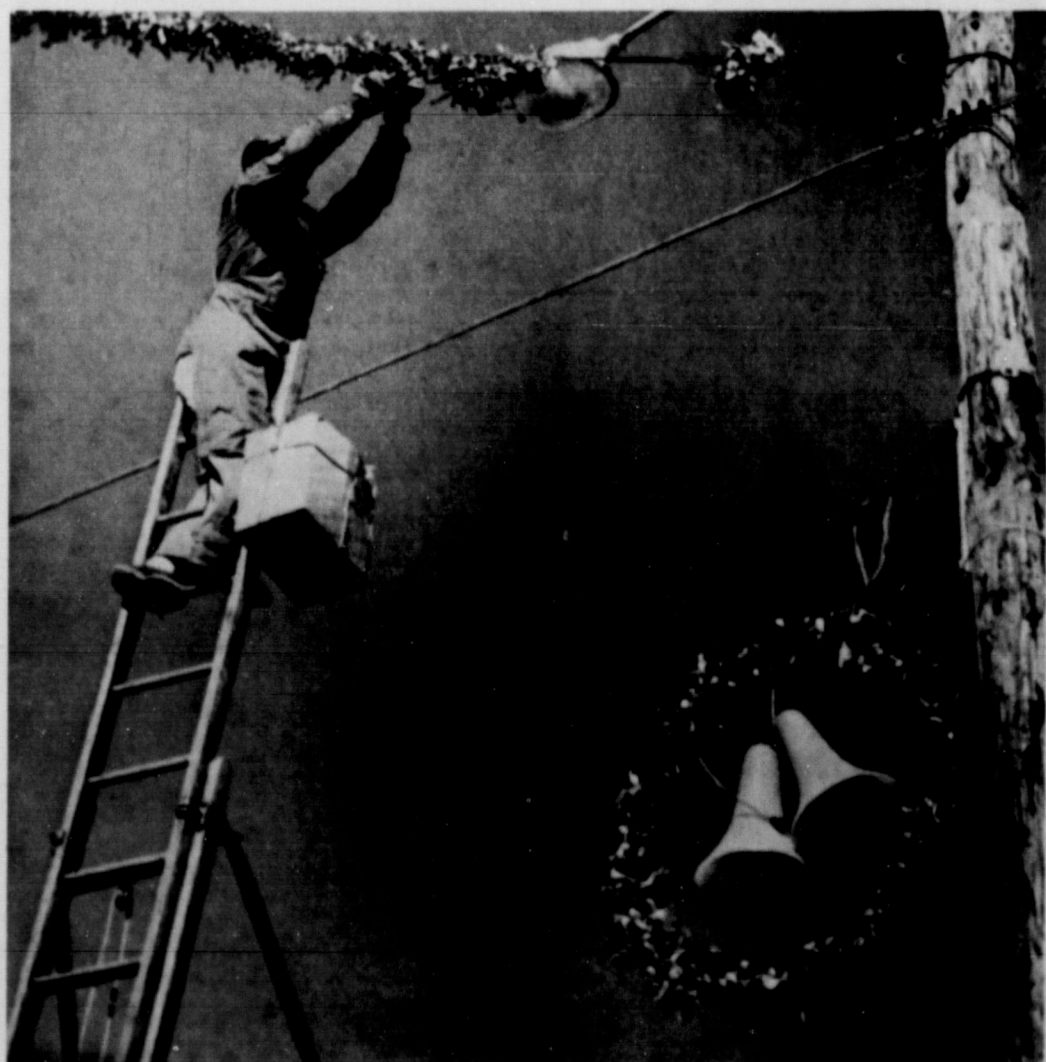

Merchants Kick Off Christmas Promotion

Santa Claus will arrive in Friona at 1:30 p.m. Saturday afternoon, and will herald the kickoff of the Christmas "customer appreciation" program by Friona merchants.

Santa will come to town, probably on a bright, shiny fire truck, and will set up shop in the City Park square, where he will visit with the youngsters; find out their Christmas wants, and pass out candy favors.

Meantime, Friona merchants will be in the midst of their monthly "Dollar Days," which actually begins on Friday, December 3. Mothers who bring their children to see Old Saint Nick should take advantage of the situation and see what bargains they can find in Friona stores to satisfy their Christmas gift-buying list.

At the same time, many Friona stores are kicking off their "customer appreciation" pro-

motion, and will begin issuing tickets on purchases beginning Friday, which will go into the first of a series of three drawings beginning Saturday, December 11.

Merchants participating in the program plan to give one ticket with each \$1 in merchandise purchased. All tickets given between now and December 11 will go toward the drawing on that day, in which three lucky shoppers will receive several gifts from downtown merchants.

There will be a first prize consisting of a group of prizes a second prize, and a third prize in each of the three drawings, so that there will be nine winners in all. Merchants are donating merchandise from their individual stores.

Some establishments, such as Friona State Bank, are donating gift certificates good for purchases at any Friona store, although they will not be giving tickets.

It will be necessary for shoppers to be present at the drawings in order to win a prize. However, there will be no ticket stubs. Blanks will be filled in at the time purchases are made, and deposited with the merchants at that time.

Each drawing will be separate, and all tickets will be discarded after each of the first two drawings, so that the second and third drawing will comprise only tickets deposited with merchants during the preceding week.

The "customer appreciation" promotion is under the sponsorship of the Friona Association of Retail Merchants, in conjunction with the Friona Chamber of Commerce, which is also sponsoring the appearance of Santa Claus.

Owners names and telephone numbers will accompany their brand.

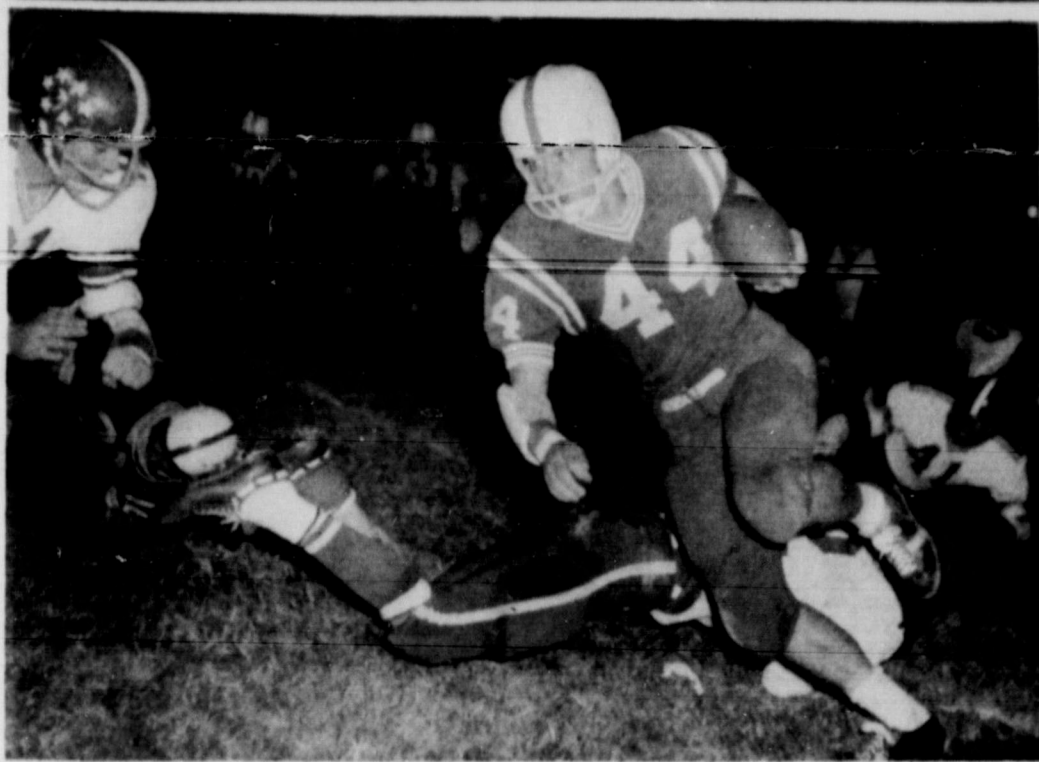
Merchants To Meet Today

"But we have no such 'reliable' source for the basis of predicting when the sun will shine (and clear cold weather is imminent) -- just intuition," he adds.

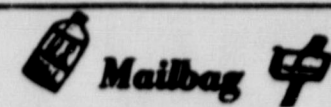

Postmaster Gives Tips For Christmas Mail

"Last Christmas the postoffice handled more mail than ever before, yet the operation was the most efficient in history," Postmaster Williams said today.

Nationally about 99 per cent of the Christmas mail reached its destination before Christmas Eve.

"ZIP Code use and the co-operation of the public in mail-

ing early were the main reasons for our success. With the same or better cooperation this year, we expect to handle an even greater volume of mail with less effort than during the 1964 Christmas rush."

Williams had advice which would help mailers prepare for the upcoming mailing season.

A. Up date last year's address list and include ZIP Codes.

B. Prepare a gift list as soon as possible. Shop early to take advantage of full stocks. Be sure to have on hand enough shipping materials, boxes, tape wrapping paper, etc.

C. Use first class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded if the recipient has moved or that undeliverable cards will be returned if a return address is on the envelope.

The postmaster emphasized again this year that poorly wrapped and loosely packed cartons are the major cause of parcel post damage. He urged that cartons be packed tightly by using stuffing material to fill up the empty space around the merchandise. He also asked that all mailers make an effort to address their letters, cards and packages as clearly as possible and that they make every attempt to mail often, not waiting the last minute to deposit all their gifts and greetings.

Initial Payments Are Made To Beet Farmers

Payments totaling \$15,650,000 have been made by Holly Sugar Corporation to sugar beet growers served by Holly at 9 of its 11 beet sugar plants, Dennis O'Rourke, Holly president, announced.

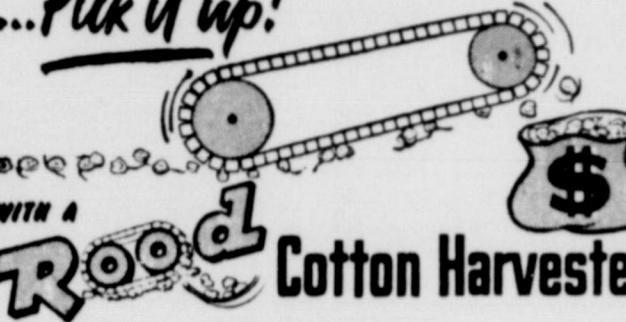
The initial payment checks went out to over 2,000 growers supplying beets to Holly at Sidney and Hardin, Montana; Worland and Torrington, Wyoming; Delta, Colorado; Hereford and Hamilton City, Alvarado and Tracy, California. The \$15,650,000 includes initial payments of \$8,737,000 for delivery of beets through November 4 in Montana, Wyoming and Colorado, as well as \$6,913,000 paid in Texas and Northern California for deliveries through October 31.

The initial payments represent only a part of the total returns the growers will receive for the 1965 crop. Under terms of the contracts used by Holly and other companies in the beet sugar industry, growers receive an initial payment soon after delivering their beets to the processor. Usually, a supplemental payment follows some months later, and a final payment is made following the close of the marketing year. Payments to growers are based on the net return from sales of sugar.

Farwell Girls' Win First In 20 Games

Farwell fans can even look back on a "banner year" in 1953-54, when the Steerettes beat the Squaws twice, 40-39 and 37-29.

The 1956 loss to Farwell came in Baker Duggins' first year as coach of the Squaws, but it turned out to be the last time he ever lost to the Farwell girls, posting an eight-year 18-2 record against his county neighbors.

Mel Williams took over

coaching duties in 1964-65, and was off to a good start with two straight wins against Farwell as he had the Squaws in the state finals for the second straight year. However, in their opening game of 1965-66, the Squaws met an aroused bunch of Steerettes, who were out to break an old losing streak. And they did.

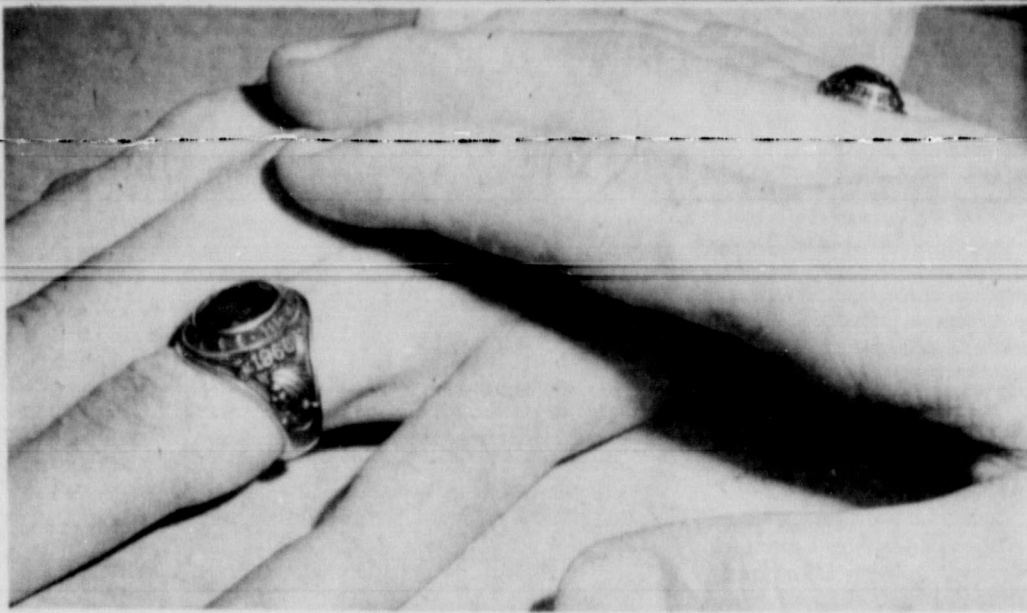

IN THREE GAMES

New Gym "Dedicated" As Farwell Defeated

Friona basketball teams made their debut in the new Friona High School gymnasium Tuesday night, and it was a successful one. In all, three games were played Tuesday, and so far the record for the new gym is spotless at 3-0.

The Friona Chieftains, who had one of the best seasons ever for boys basketball last year, got off on the right foot with an exciting 47-45 win over the rival Farwell Steers, and the Squaws gained some revenge for a loss suffered a week earlier at Farwell.

Friona also won the "B" girls game, 26-22.

The Chiefs looked real good in spots, especially for their first game, and opened their season the right way, against a Steer team which had already played three games.

The Squaws, who were surprised by a 46-42 win by the Farwell girls last Tuesday night, were a different team this week taking an almost ridiculously easy 61-23 win over the Steerettes.

Friona's girls, who had a personal 20-game winning streak over Farwell snapped at Farwell the previous week, jumped out to a 12-0 lead, had the visitors down 27-3 after one quarter, and from there on out, Coach Mel Williams was able to give his bench some action. The boys' game was different. "I had hoped to let everyone play, in an effort to give them a chance to prove themselves. However, just when we thought we had a comfortable lead - bam. Then we had to stay with our experienced kids," said Chieftain Coach James Anglin.

It was a fairly close game most of the way, with Friona having a 3-0 lead early and Farwell reversing things for a three - point lead before the quarter was over, 10-7. The Steers didn't score during the first five minutes, then poured several baskets through the hoop to take the lead.

The lead see - sawed during the second quarter, with baskets by Travis Graves and Bob Jordan in the final 30 seconds giving the home team a 25-22 half-time lead.

Friona again took advantage of slow - starting Farwell to build up a 13 - point lead midway through the third quarter, at 36-23 and 38-25. Farwell began its rally to cut the lead to seven points, 40-33 after three quarters.

Friona's deliberate pattern offense slowed things down in the final quarter, and Farwell used some steals to finally tie the count at 45-all with 2:07 to play in the game, paced by the hot - shooting Larry Gregory. Travis Graves made a layup with 1:17 left for the eventual margin, although Farwell missed two chances for a tie in the last 15 seconds on free shot opportunities.

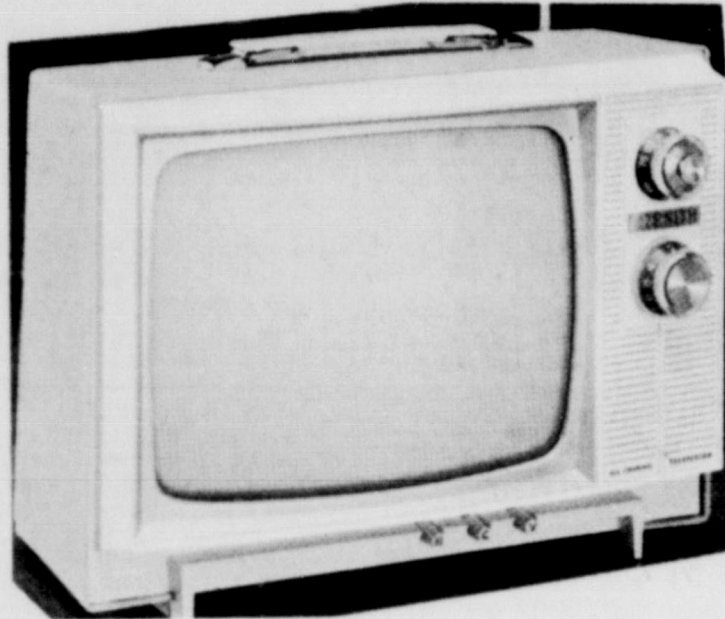
