The Friona High School Squaws opened their season at Farwell last night, beginning what is termed as "re-building year" by Coach Mel Williams.

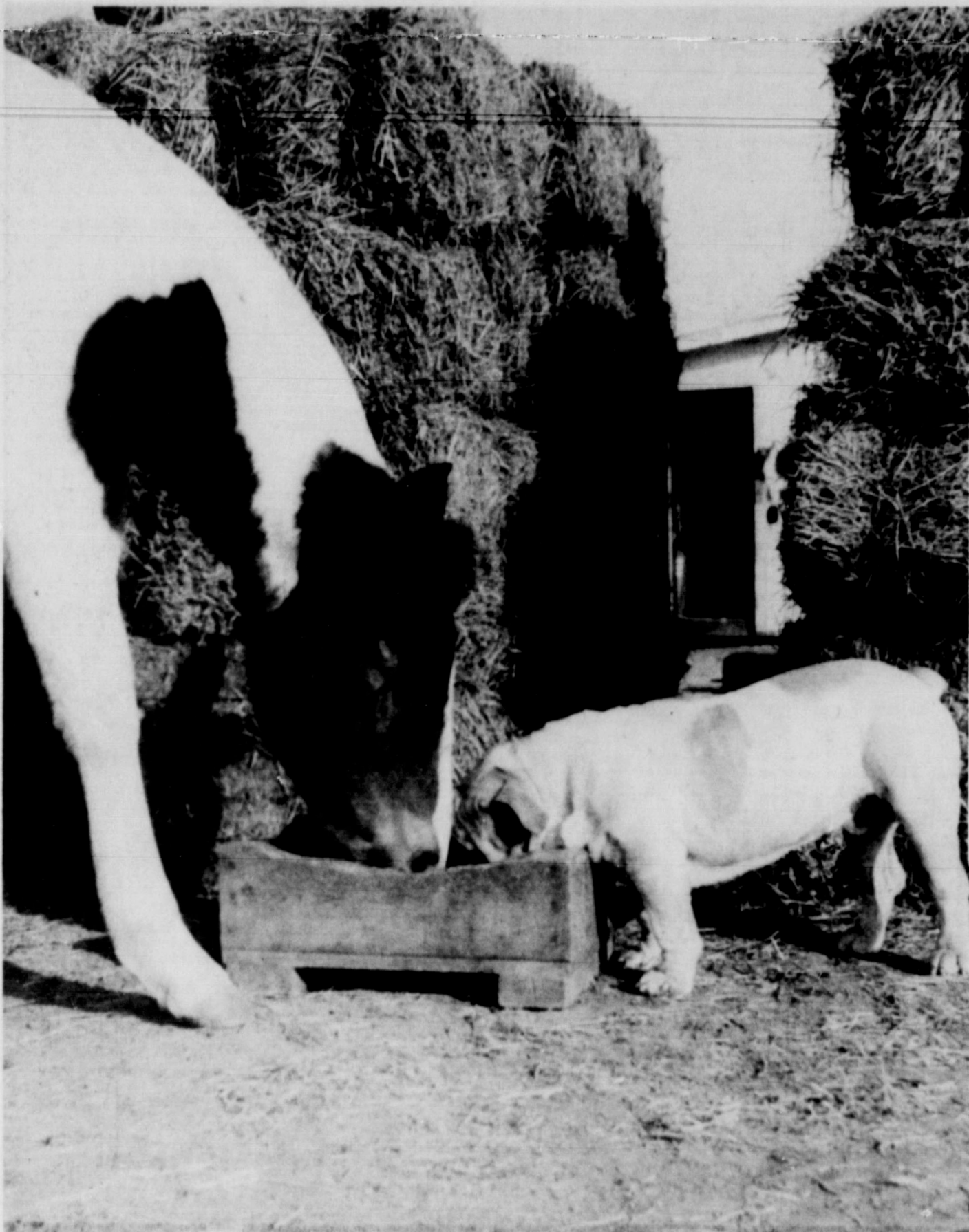

## White Hangs On To Capture Football Contest Grand Prize

Edward White, Jr., who set the pace during 10 of the contest's 12 weeks was certified this week as the grand prize winner in the Friona Star's annual football contest.

Although three games on last week's final contest entry page will not be played until this weekend, White has a sufficient lead over his nearest contenders, and all except one have picked the remaining three games identically to White's entry blank, nullifying any chance for further gain.

Meanwhile, the race for second and third grand prize tightened, and winners will not be known until after the three

remaining games on the contest slate are played this weekend.

Five contestants are in prime contention for one of the remaining prizes. They are Bob Finley, Mrs. C.H. Veazey, Mrs. Clarence Monroe, Eugene Bandy and Jerry London.

With the three games yet to be tabulated, White has a season total score of 159. Finley, Mrs. C.H. Veazey, Mrs. Monroe are standing at 157, but have picked the remaining games exactly as White.

London has a 156 score, and has picked one of the remaining games differently, thus allowing the possibility of a tie.

Bandy also has a 156, and has two of the games picked differently to the contestants at 157, and because of the nature of his choices, will either win second place outright or finish completely out of the money.

Mrs. Monroe gained the most ground of any of the top contestants during the final week, getting 13 of last week's 15 games to come all the way from a tie for 13th up to a tie for second, further illustrating the closeness of this year's contest.

Winning first places were the junior farm skills teams and radio broadcasting team. Taking a second was the senior farm skills team.

The first place by the junior farm skills group marked the fifth consecutive year for Friona to win that particular event. The school had also won the senior division five straight times, but placed second this year.

The "radio broadcasting" division is one in which the local school has not always had a winner, but it did this year.

Members of the junior farm skills group are James Schlenker, Scotty Wooley and Danny Carthel. Gary Shirley was alternate. Making up the radio broadcasting team are Mike Wooley, Tommy Jarecki and Bob Carrothers.

Those on the senior skills team were Joe Murphree, Jim Bob Jones, and Larry Graves, with James Gable as alternate.

The local Future Farmers of America has had a long history of success in the leadership contests, although advisors David McVey and Benny Pryor explained that for the second straight year they had not been able to put the time in on practicing that was usually done.

This was because of the mountain of work that has gone into getting things arranged at the new agriculture building.

Thus, the showing at the district contests was even better from that standpoint.

## AN EDITORIAL

# Has Thanksgiving Become A Time For Feasting Only?

(Editor's Note: The Star is indebted to Rev. Paul Mohr for the following guest editorial.)

A myriad of proclamations have followed the first proclamation in American history. We have proclamations for the observance of National Pickle Week, National Doughnut Week, as well as one for National Safety Week.

But the first proclamation was given by Governor Bradford of the Plymouth Colony in the autumn of 1621, proclaiming the first Thanksgiving. The colonists, grateful for their first harvest in the New World, invited friendly Indians, and together they worshipped and feasted.

This tradition has been observed through the years, as presidents have issued proclamations for national days of Thanksgiving, and Americans have gone to their churches to thank God for the continuing abundance of food in the New World, and have made the turkey a symbol of the good food to be had at family gatherings.

In the Year of our Lord, 1965, we continue the feasting part of Thanksgiving, as families gather around festive tables, there to enjoy "home cooked" meals at their best. It seems Thanksgiving would not be the same if that wonderful meal were not on the

table. But we have forgotten the foremost reason for observing Thanksgiving. We do not worship.

As we look back in recent history, we note that so many families were feasting that they did not have time to go to worship on Thanksgiving morning, and since no one was in the church building for worship, the church ceased having Thanksgiving worship services on Thanksgiving Day, and decided that more people would come and worship on the night preceding Thanksgiving.

After a time, fewer and fewer people came to that service. So the churches came up with another idea. Since the Pilgrims and Indians worshipped together, why not observe Thanksgiving with a community worship service. What an excellent idea!

This excellent idea is failing in Friona, for once again we find that fewer and fewer people come to observe Thanksgiving because of lack of interest. Should our generation be the ones who have made Thanksgiving a day of feasting only? Attend the Union Service at Calvary Baptist Church, and let's keep worship a part of the observance.

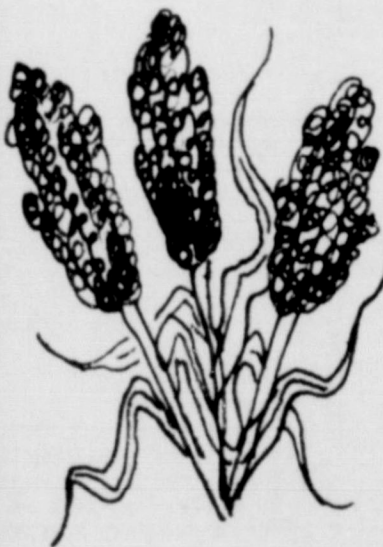

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## Pheasant Contest Set For County Hunters

The Parmer County Game Management Association in cooperation with local business sponsors is going to have a Pheasant Contest, December 1 thru 7. Winners of contest prizes will be determined by persons bringing in the Longest Pheasant Tail feather.

The association has separate contests set up in Bovina, Farwell and Friona. Prizes in each town's contest will be awarded to the top five individual with the longest tail feathers.

The 5 awards will be merchandise prizes donated by merchants in each town. The approximate value of the awards in each contest are: 1st place-\$25.00; 2nd place-\$20.00; 3rd place-\$15.00; 4th place-\$10.00; 5th place-\$5.00. In addition to these prizes, the overall winner or the person with the longest Pheasant tail feather in Parmer County will receive a plaque courtesy of the Game Management Association.

Providing the prize money for Friona's contest are Parmer County Implement, Friona Consumers, Production Credit Association, Herring Implement Co. and Taylor Barber Shop.

The chairman of each town's contest is Bud Crump in Bovina, Gilbert Kaltwasser in Farwell and Gary Brown Friona. These men helped set up the contest in each town and obtained a business house to be contest headquarters.

The pheasant season for Parmer County is December 1 through December 7, bag limit 2 cocks per day, possession limit is 4. For some of our young boys who may not have hunted pheasants before, the cocks are the colorful pheasants with red heads and long tail feathers.

The fall good supply of pheasants in Parmer is largely the results of 2260 pheasants that were bought and released in 1962 and 1963 by Game Association members. Nearly everyone questioned reports they have seen more pheasants this year than ever before. There seems to have been a good hatch this year with lots of young pheasants raised.

Some people questioned the benefit of a pheasant season when we are still trying to increase our pheasant population. Jack Patterson, President of the local Game Association, reports that around 55% to 70% of an average pheasant

hatch are cocks. Actually only one cock is needed for every eight hens. These facts point out that 7 out of every 8 cocks can be harvested and still leave plenty to reproduce. Actually pheasants are better off when there is the proper ratio of cocks to hens. When there are too many cocks they get to fighting and injure or kill each other.

Pheasants hunting is big business to some areas and Parmer County has the potential of becoming prime pheasant hunting country. This long tail feather contest is aimed to create new interest among farm operators.

The key to increased pheasant production in Parmer County is adequate cover during the winter. It is hoped that farmers will leave a little sorghum stubble standing on next year's lay-out ground. This is a good natural cover. The Game Association, at each contest headquarters, is also taking orders from persons who would plant some free shrubs to help provide wildlife cover. The Association is going to distribute 5,000 free shrubs about next April to anyone who signs up. The main shrub that will be distributed will be Multiflora Rose.

The Association is also requesting the assistance of all pheasant hunters to report how many birds everyone killed in the season. This information will help the Association make future plans for pheasants in the country. A list for this purpose will be kept at each contest headquarters.

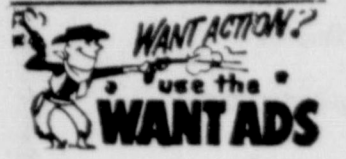

## Mabry Paces Team In District Statistics

Joe Mabry, senior halfback, paced the Friona Chiefs in rushing and scoring during district play, a compilation of district statistics revealed this week. Mabry, who shifted from fullback to halfback at the start of league action, gained 450 yards, an average of 90 per game, to 394 yards for Larry Johnson and 276 yards for Ray Braxton, the tackle-turned-fullback.

Mabry scored four touchdowns to also lead the team in that department. End Travis Graves was second with 20 points, all of these coming in the final two district games.

For the season, Johnson was the leading ground-gainer, with some 850 yards gained, to 720 for Mabry. Mabry was the leading scorer covering the entire season, with six touchdowns for 36 points. Graves was also second for the season with 26 points.

Although the Chiefs scored some close decisions in district play, the team had a wide lead in the statistical department, a compilation of team statistics showed.

The Chiefs had a wide lead in first downs, 83-49, and had a tremendous lead in yardage totals. For five district games, Friona averaged 323 yards per contest, to only 66 for their opponents.

The Chiefs had their biggest night against Floydada, with 328 yards rushing and 78 passing, both season highs. The least total yards gained in district play were 270 against Olton.

Abernathy gained the most yard: rushing (118) passing (169), and total (287), while Floydada had the least rushing yards (minus 12), Dimmitt had the least passing (11) and Floydada's net of 17 was the least.

Olton's 16 of 32 passes made it the passingest team Friona faced in district, while Dimmitt's one of seven was the least.

# Mustangs Live Up To High Ranking In State

The Denver City Mustangs won the coin toss prior to last Friday's bi-district playoff game, and that was an omen of things to come, as the Mustangs didn't lose anything all night.

The Mustangs, top-rated team in the state for class AA, showed why. They had a 7-0 lead before some of the fans

had settled into their seats, and then used two quick breaks for two more touchdowns to jump ahead, 21-0 in little more than half of the playing time of the first quarter.

Friona showed spunk, cutting the lead to 14 points, 21-7, with an early second-quarter touchdown, but the polished Mustangs retaliated for another score before halftime and put the game out of reach with two more TD's in the third quarter.

Denver City returned the opening kickoff to its 42-yard line. Quarterback David Mitchell made 13 yards on as keeper on the first play from scrimmage, and Mike Sharp fought his way 45 yards for the score, with just 51 seconds of playing time elapsed from the scoreboard clock. Danny Gibson, who kicked six for six extra points, booted to make it 7-0.

It appeared that the Chiefs might be driving for a tying touchdown, when lightning struck. Lonnie Ellis had connected with Joe Mabry for a 37-yard gain, and the Chiefs had the ball on Denver City's 24-yard line on fourth down. But Mitchell picked off Ellis' pass on his own 15-yard line, broke for the west sidelines, and raced 85 yards for another Denver City touchdown. The kick made it 14-0 with just 4:02 gone in the game.

Following the kickoff, Friona put the ball in play on its own 20, but once again were victims of a bad break. Larry Johnson was hit, fumbled, and Denver City recovered at the Chieftain 18. It took the District 4-AA kings just four plays to convert the miscue into seven points.

Jim Comer got his first of three touchdowns for the Mustangs, slamming seven yards for the counter, and Gibson's kick made it 21-0 with just 6:26 gone in the game, and many fans wondered at this point if they had come to a playoff game or a track meet.

The Chiefs weren't throwing in the towel, however. Once

again they were able to drive against the touted Ponies. Joe Mabry carried three straight times for a total of 17 yards and a first down at the Denver City 31. Here the drive sputtered, though, and a fourth down pass fell incomplete.

The Chiefs finally had the pleasure of holding the Mustangs on a drive, when from the Friona 35 the Chieftain defenders swarmed Mitchell for a five-yard loss on a passing attempt and Friona took over. Friona couldn't move, and was forced to punt. The Chiefs got a big break, though, when Mitchell fumbled the punt, and Mabry pounced on it at the Denver City 31.

On the first play, Ellis tossed a pass to Graves, who made a spectacular catch between two defenders at the one-yard line. Mabry then slanted over the goal line for Friona's first score, and Bob Sims' kick left the score 21-7 with 9:22 left in the half.

Friona forced Denver City's first and only punt following the kickoff, but the break was short-lived as a Lonnie Ellis pass was intercepted at the Friona 37. In five plays, the potent Mustangs had added to their lead. Comer got the counter from a yard out, with 4:17 left in the half, and it was 28-7.

A fourth-down shift got Friona a first down at their 45, and Tommy Shirley gained 12 yards in two carries to the Denver City 42. Shirley then romped to the Mustang 30 for a first down, but as Friona took to the air with no success the half ended moments later with the score at 28-7.

Friona received the kick to start the second half, but couldn't move and had to punt. Denver City then set sail on its "toughest" touchdown drive, a trip which took the visitors 10 plays to make, with Comer again getting the points from five yards out, and a 35-7 lead with 5:38 gone in the third quarter.

Friona again couldn't make a first down, and Gene Weatherly punted to the D.C. 41.

On the first play, Mitchell threw a perfect strike to end Harold Shannon, who had raced into the open, and he went all the way on a 59-yard scoring play. The kick made it 42-7 with 4:35 left in the quarter. Ray Braxton and Shirley gave Friona first downs, and the team drove to Denver City's 36, but again the Mustangs applied the defense at this point, to thwart the scoring attempt.

The visitors had an apparent touchdown called back at the start of the final period, as a clipping penalty set them back. Denver City then tried a field goal to up its point total, but it fell short.

The Mustangs' craving for points led to another touchdown being scored again Denver City, the first time this year a class AA team has scored twice against them.

Johnny Claborn intercepted a pass and returned it 27 yards to the Denver City 34. This time the Chiefs were able to drive. A big fourth down pass, from Ellis to Jesse Shirley, kept the drive alive at the 18.

Tom Shirley then rambled 16 yards to the two, and then got the other two to make the score 42-13 with 1:46 left in the game. Sims' kick was blocked.

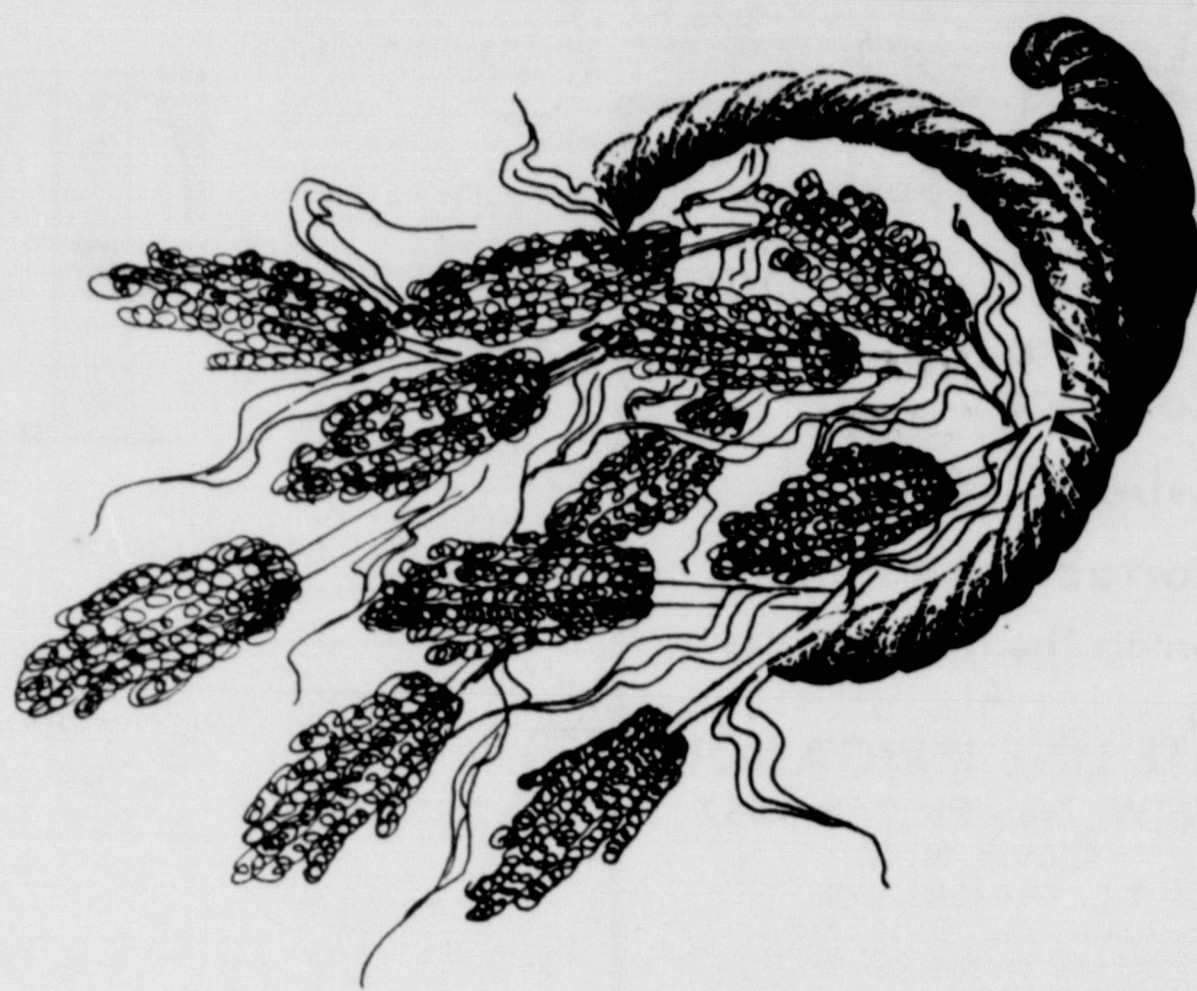
The Mustangs, not satisfied with a 29-point lead, were still going for points. However, Claborn intercepted another pass to give Friona possession of the ball for the last 1:30 of the game. Denver City, playoff veterans who won their sixth bi-district contest since 1958, led in first downs by five, 18-13, and in total yards, 355-208, proving that the final score wasn't necessarily a true indication of the game.

The contest was the first football meeting between the schools; although Denver City had downed the Chiefs in a basketball bi-district game last February 23, 81-66.
