## Top News Stories For Friona, 1965 Reviewed

A variety of subjects made the news in Friona during 1965, a survey of the Friona Star's file showed this week. Some of the top news happenings are listed in the following rundown.

January 14's issue of the Star announced that Soil Conservation Service engineers had arrived in Friona to begin planning on the series of dams for Running Water Draw. An announcement also was received that approval for Federal funds for the planning had been approved.

A two-inch snowfall, yielding the year's best moisture up to that time, made headlines on January 21. George S. Looper was uninjured when the pickup he was driving was demolished at the South Main

Crossing when hit by a Santa Fe freight.

Burglaries made the news on February 4, when four Friona area firms reported break-ins. They were Parmer County Implement Co., Red Barn Chemicals and two Hub Fertilizer locations.

On February 11, the news included a four to six-inch snowfall which benefited farmers. Also, suspected burglars fired at patrolman Gary Darragh and touched off a wild late-night chase.

The Friona Junior Chamber of Commerce announced plans for their community center in the February 18 issue. A census revealed that there were 1325 students in the Friona area, a substantial increase

over the previous census.

The Friona Chieftains won a district basketball championship for the first time in 20 years, posting a 22-5 season record. The Chiefs fell to Denver City, 81-66 in their bi-district match.

Kay Burleson won the "Miss Lubbock" title to bring the city much publication during the year. This achievement was reported in the March 4 Friona Star.

The Friona High School Squaws, with Coach Melvin Williams taking over from the retired Baker Duggins, swept the district, bi-district and regional championship for the third straight year, and fought their way into the state tournament finals. They brought home

the runner-up trophy, as two players, Tito Jennings and Glenda McLellan, made the all-state team.

After much discussion, Ordinance 357, a change in the city's development policy in favor of developers was passed by the Friona city council.

All classroom teachers were recommended for new contracts for the 1965 - 66 term by the school board in a March meeting.

Friona High School and Junior high school students received 10 "first division" ratings in late March at the University Interscholastic League contests.

The April 1 issue of the Star announced that the contract for Friona High School's football

stadium, last unit of the new high school complex, was awarded to Vibra-Whirl at an estimated cost of \$53,000.

The Star had a little fun on that date with an "April Fool" front page, with a full-page of imaginary stories.

On April 8, Friona beauties continued to mark the news, as Iva Ben Parr made the top ten in the "Miss Austin" beauty pageant. The city officially annexed the 24-acre plot containing Friona High School.

Sheryl Long kept the "winning streak" going on April 15 by winning the title of district Lion's Club queen at the annual convention at Dalhart.

The May 6 issue announced that Glen Mings, local golfer, made the first hole-in-one

on the four-year old Friona Country Club course.

Fifty-two acres were annexed to the city at a May meeting of the Friona City council, including 28 acres of Nelson Welch's property, and 24 acres belonging to Bill Sheehan, termed Western Addition.

Dr. Robert Alexander became the fifth doctor on the staff of Parmer County Community Hospital, according to a June 3 issue of the Star. Open house for the hospital's new wing was held on Sunday, June 6.

Friona's "Old Red" School building oldest building on the school campus, started coming down in early June, to make way for new classrooms for the elementary school.

The June 24 issue announced Bill Sheehan, Friona attorney for 15 years, was leaving his practice to accept a position in Dumas.

The 1,000th water meter for the City of Friona was installed on July 1, as a plateau was reached in that connection.

Parmer County commissioners, acting on the recommendation by the watershed committee, chose the location four and one-half miles east of State Highway 214 for the "multiple purpose" dam on Running Water Draw, ending what developed into a "foot-dragging" stage in the project.

George A. Jones was critically injured August 20 when his pickup was struck by a freight

train at Santa Fe's South Main crossing. Pak-A-Sak grocery was hit in an \$1800 robbery on August 22.

Travis Clements was named Chief of Police in Friona with the resignation of Bill Morgan on September 2.

A change in the operations of Plains Publishers was announced, with the local publishing concern going to a "camera ready" type of printing operation, rather than employing complete composition facilities as it had since 1957.

J.W. (Uncle John) White, pioneer publisher and founder of the Friona Star, died September 9, after a short illness. The Friona pioneer, who held several civic and community positions

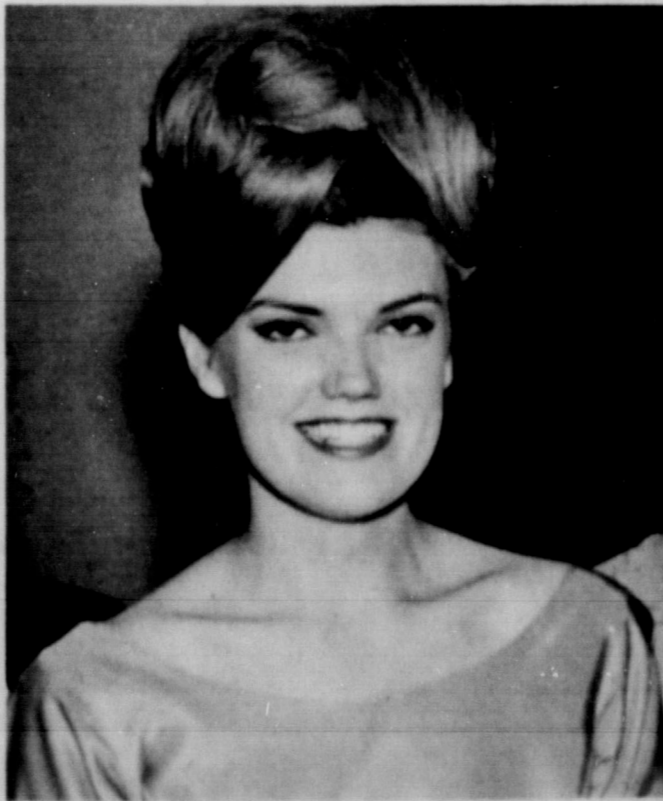

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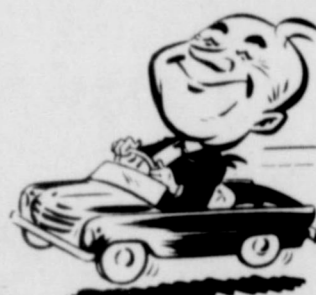

## Provisions Of 1966 Feed Grain Announced

The provisions of the 1966 Feed Grain Program have been announced by the Department of Agriculture and are basically as follows:

1. In order to be eligible for program benefits, a participant must sign up in the program, divert at least 20% of his feed grain base to a conserving use, not plant more than this feed grain base on other farms in which he has

an interest and plant no more than his permitted acres on the participating farm.

2. A person desiring to participate in this program may divert as little as 20% of his feed grain base and may divert as much as 50% of his feed from the 1965 program in that no diversion payment is earned on the first 20% of acreage diverted on a participating farm.

4. Interested persons can

compute the payment rates for their farms as follows: To arrive at the price support rate for the farm in grain sorghum - multiply the farm normal yield by 57¢ (this is within one cent of correct - could be 56¢ in Parmer County). To arrive at the diversion rate for the farm - multiply the normal yield by 29.68¢.

5. Let us take an average farm in Parmer County and see where it will be upon participating in the 1966 Feed Grain Program. In order to simplify the arithmetic we have computed the diversion rate at 57¢ per bushel and the price support rate at 30¢ per bushel (this is easier than using the 29.68¢ and, for "example" purposes is close enough.) Assume this about this example farm:

Grain Sorghum Base is 240 acres. Projected yield is 92 bushels per acre. Price Support rate 30¢ X 92 bushels - \$27.60 per acre. Diversion rate is 57¢ X 92 bushels - \$52.44 per acre.

6. Example A. - Farm participates by making 20% diversion. Farm diverts 48 acres (20% of the 240) earns payment of -----\$00.00. Farm Plants

192 acres (80% of the 240) and earns price support payment on 120 acres (50% of the 240) 120 X 47¢ = \$56.40. Total Payment of \$3312.00.

Example B. - Farm participates by making 40% diversion. Farm diverts 96 acres and is paid a diversion payment on 48 acres. Also receives price support payment on 120 acres on the 144 acres planted. In this example (B) payments for the farm would be:  
Diversion Payment 48 X \$52.44 ----- \$ 2517.12  
Price Support Payment 120 X \$27.60 ----- 3312.00

Total Payment earned ----- \$7087.68

In all cases the loan rate for 1966 crop Grain Sorghum will be 13¢ (or there abouts) less per hundred weight than it was in 1965. We believe that the 1966 Parmer County loan rate for Grain Sorghum will be \$1.50 per hundred weight. It is to be remembered that the loan rate in 1965 was (in Parmer County) \$1.63 per cwt. Therefore, it could very well be that the price a farmer receives for his grain in 1966 may be 10¢ or more less per cwt. than in 1965. This would depend on the market. It is to be noted (in the above example) that the total price support payments earned on the farm is the same regardless of the extent of participation. Projected yields have been established for each farm in Parmer County for 1966. Forms for notifying producers of these yields will be available sometime in January. Persons desiring to know what the projected yield is for their farm may do so by contacting the ASCS in Farwell.

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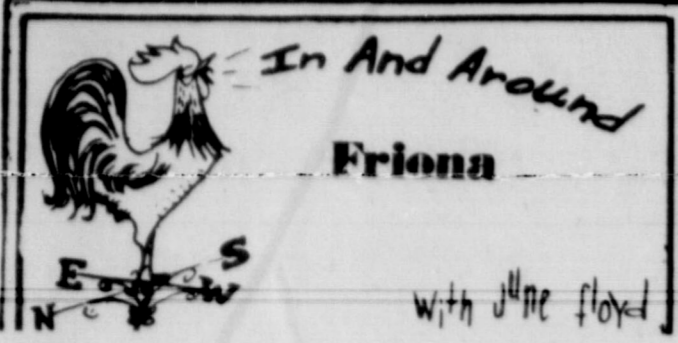
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# Visits, Family Gatherings Highlight Season

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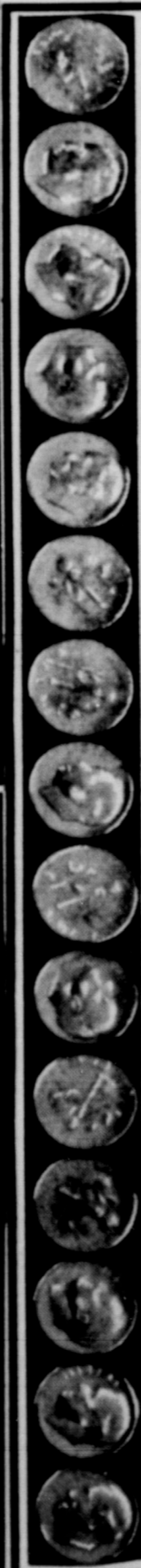

## Historical Marker Is Slated Near Hereford

An Official Texas Historical Marker commemorating the MacKenzie Trail has been approved for Deaf Smith County, according to information received from John M. Sheperd of Odessa, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

Mrs. Henss Sears of Hereford, chairman of Deaf Smith County Historical Survey Committee, succeeding Mrs. Elmer Peterson, stated the marker is soon to be shipped from the foundry manufacturing the official marker and will be erected by the Texas Highway Department on the East side of Highway 385 at the intersection of U.S. Highway 60, 4.2 miles southeast of Hereford.

Made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect, the marker measures 18 by 28 inches and recounts . . . . .

### MACKENZIE TRAIL

Along this lonely, arid trail, Gen. Ronald S. MacKenzie led his troops scouting forays in the 1870's. Known for Bravery and skill as a Civil War Officer, he was sent to Texas and quickly adjusted to dangers and problems of frontier fighting. He fought against Comanches at Blanco and Tule Canyons. On Sept. 28, 1874, in Palo Duro Canyon, he led his men in one of the last major Indian battles in Texas where he slew more than 1,000 horses to cripple Indian action; thus he helped bring peace to the Texas Panhandle, making it safe for settlers.

The Texas State Historical Survey Committee through its program known as "RAMPS" (recording, appreciation, marking, preservation and survey) works cooperatively with county officials through county historical survey committees to officially mark sites, including old trails, Texas Ranger deeds, river crossings, early railroads, birthplaces or early homes of outstanding Texas leaders and many other categories depicting the history of our state.

The MacKenzie Trail marker will appear in the next edition of the Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in the area, provide highpoints on historical tours and acquaint citizens of Deaf

Smith and surrounding areas with highlights of their own unique historical past.

Dedication of this historical marker will be announced at a later date, Mrs. Sears stated.

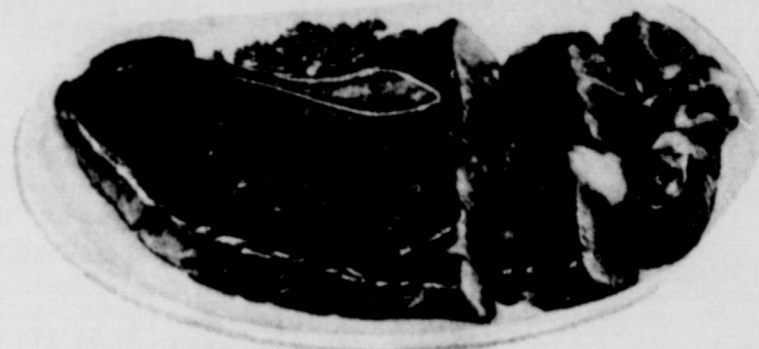

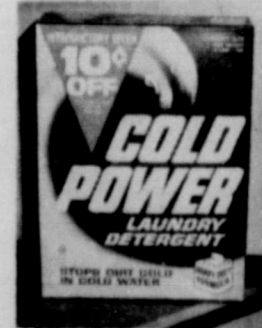
