This is a reprint of an item that is making the circuit of various business bulletins; if you have a friend who is a member of the Great Society, pass it on so he can read it. The title is "The Hogs of Horseshoe Bend."

CLASSES START MONDAY

Summer's Over For 1350 Friona School Children

Summer may not be over as far as the temperature is concerned, but as far as school children are concerned, it ends abruptly on Monday, when the 1965-66 school term begins. Students in grades six through

12 will register tomorrow. Those in grades six, seven and eight will register in the grade school auditorium. Grades nine through 12 will register at the new high school building.

A general faculty meeting has been called for this morning at 9 a. m. at the Grade School Cafeteria. Directly following that meeting at 10 a. m., teachers will meet with their respective principals.

At 3 p. m., today, bus drivers will meet in the cafeteria. Around 1350 students are expected this year, as compared to 1250 who reported during the first week last year.

Buses will make their first run of the year on Monday. The cafeteria will serve lunch beginning on that day. School lunches cost 30 cents for grade school and junior high school students, and 35 cents for high school students.

AT "PAK-ASAK"

Officers After Suspects In \$1800 Local Robbery

Law enforcement officers were searching for suspects this week after the Pak-A-Sak "7-11" grocery store was robbed late Sunday night of around \$1800 in cash.

A bandit armed with a pistol accosted owner Jack Roubinek as he was sacking up his weekend receipts and preparing to leave the store, making off with the money, all in bills.

Roubinek had returned to the store at about 11:10 p. m., taking over for Valton Howard, night employee. He locked the front door, he told officers, then went to his office in the back.

He was working over the safe when he caught a glimpse of a man's form standing over him in his office door.

"Give me the sack," the man demanded, pointing the pistol

practically in Roubinek's face, Roubinek complied. The bandit, who appeared to be a young Spanish-speaking individual, then left by way of the back door, warning Roubinek not to follow.

He first telephoned for police, then ran next door to the Humble service station, which was still open. "I've been robbed," he shouted to the attendant, Claude Dyer.

Roubinek said he did not see a getaway car, nor did he hear a car leave following the robbery.

Friona patrolman Travis Clements investigated the robbery. Texas Ranger W. E. (Razz) Renfro came to Friona on Monday and conducted an investigation.

IN AMARILLO HOSPITAL

George A. Jones Remains In Critical Condition

George A. Jones remained in critical condition at press time in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, following an accident last Friday in which Jones' pickup was struck by a west-bound freight train.

Jones, who lives 16 miles southeast of town, was hurt badly after his 1965 model pickup became stranded on the railroad crossing at South Main Street. He was first taken to Parmer County Community Hospital for treatment and then

was transferred to Amarillo by Claborn ambulance.

It was reported that Jones suffered compound fractures of both legs, a severe head injury and multiple body lacerations.

Witnesses said Jones was driving his 1965 model pickup south, pulling a trailer with a fertilizer tank when the warning crossbar came down between the pickup and the fertilizer rig. The pickup was stranded on the tracks.

Jones got out, the witness said, and apparently tried to

Are Victims At Lazbuddie

A Lazbuddie farmer died last Friday of an apparent heart attack shortly after his son was killed in a tractor accident at the family's farm, 18 miles southeast of Friona.

Duane Keith Carthel, 6, was crushed under a stalk shredder when he fell from a tractor driven by his 21-year-old brother, Malcolm. He was killed instantly.

En Route To Hospital The father, Edward M. Carthel, 57, died shortly after learning of his son's death. Authorities said Carthel died en route to Green Memorial Hospital, where he was being taken by a neighbor.

Justice of the Peace J. R. Thornton, Farwell, conducted an inquest at the scene and ruled accidental death.

Joint funeral services were at 3 p. m. Sunday in Lazbuddie Methodist Church with the Rev. Roy Havens, pastor, and the Rev. Don Davidson, Hereford, officiating. Burial was in Bailey County Memorial Park under direction of Singleton Funeral Home.

A farmer, Carthel had resided in the Lazbuddie Community for three years, moving there from Albuquerque. A native of Floyd County, he had formerly resided in Lazbuddie before moving to New Mexico.

Survivors include the wife; two sons, Malcolm and Eddie, both of the home; three daughters, Mrs. Leonard Duncan, Hale Center, and Mrs. Robert Joiner and Mrs. Joe Valdez, both of Albuquerque; three brothers, Jake and Veloy, both of Amarillo and John, Kansas City; 11 grandchildren.

The youth was born in Raton, N. M. He also is survived by his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. O. M. Jennings, Lazbuddie.

Amphitheatre Gives Prize To "Far-Off" Visitors

A new custom has sprung up at the Pioneer Amphitheatre during these first few weeks of production of Thundering Sounds of the West. From the first it was the custom of the master of ceremonies, (either William Agnus Moore or Gary Wyatt), to recognize visitors from great distances. This aroused so much interest that the cast decided to award a prize to the person traveling the greatest distance to the show.
After considering several possibilities, the setting and the production, the cast settled on the following prize: A small gilded triangle and stick. This

is particularly appropriate because it is the time honored way of calling ranch hands to meals, and it is the way the audience is called back into the theatre at intermission. It is also the way attention is sought whenever it is needed during the show. The triangle is made of specially steel and rings with a pleasant tone.

Since the custom started, the Golden Triangle has been won by people from New York, Oregon, Alaska, Dublin Ireland and Connecticut. Several days ago a very disappointed man, from Mexico City, came to the box office bemoaning the fact that he

happened to attend the same evening as the man from Alaska. So duplicate prizes were awarded as the distance was so great.

David Lawrence writes in the New York Herald Tribune: "As far back as the days of Adam Smith -- who two centuries ago wrote 'The Wealth of Nations -- government after government has come a cropper because faith in the monetary unit had dwindled and its purchasing power has been seriously diminished. Inflation usually has ensued as prices and wages have risen. If this affected everybody in a community at the same time, the transition would not be so painful. A bill has been introduced in the Senate designed to eliminate the confusion that comes with daylight saving time. But those choosing it would have to observe it from the fourth Sunday in April until the fourth Sunday in October. An author of the bill contends that scrambled time and clock confusion now constitute "... one of the greatest public inconveniences in the Nation."

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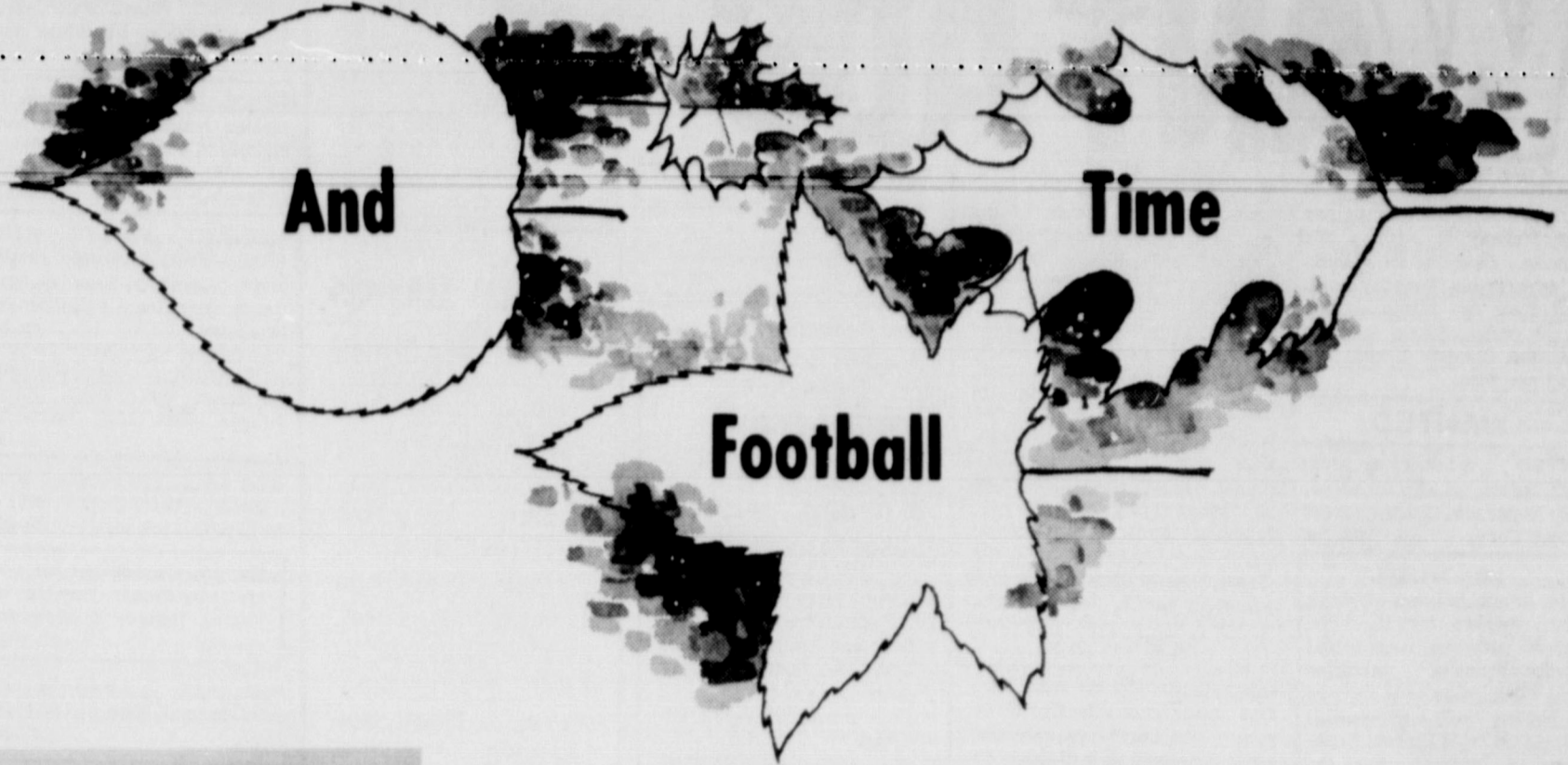

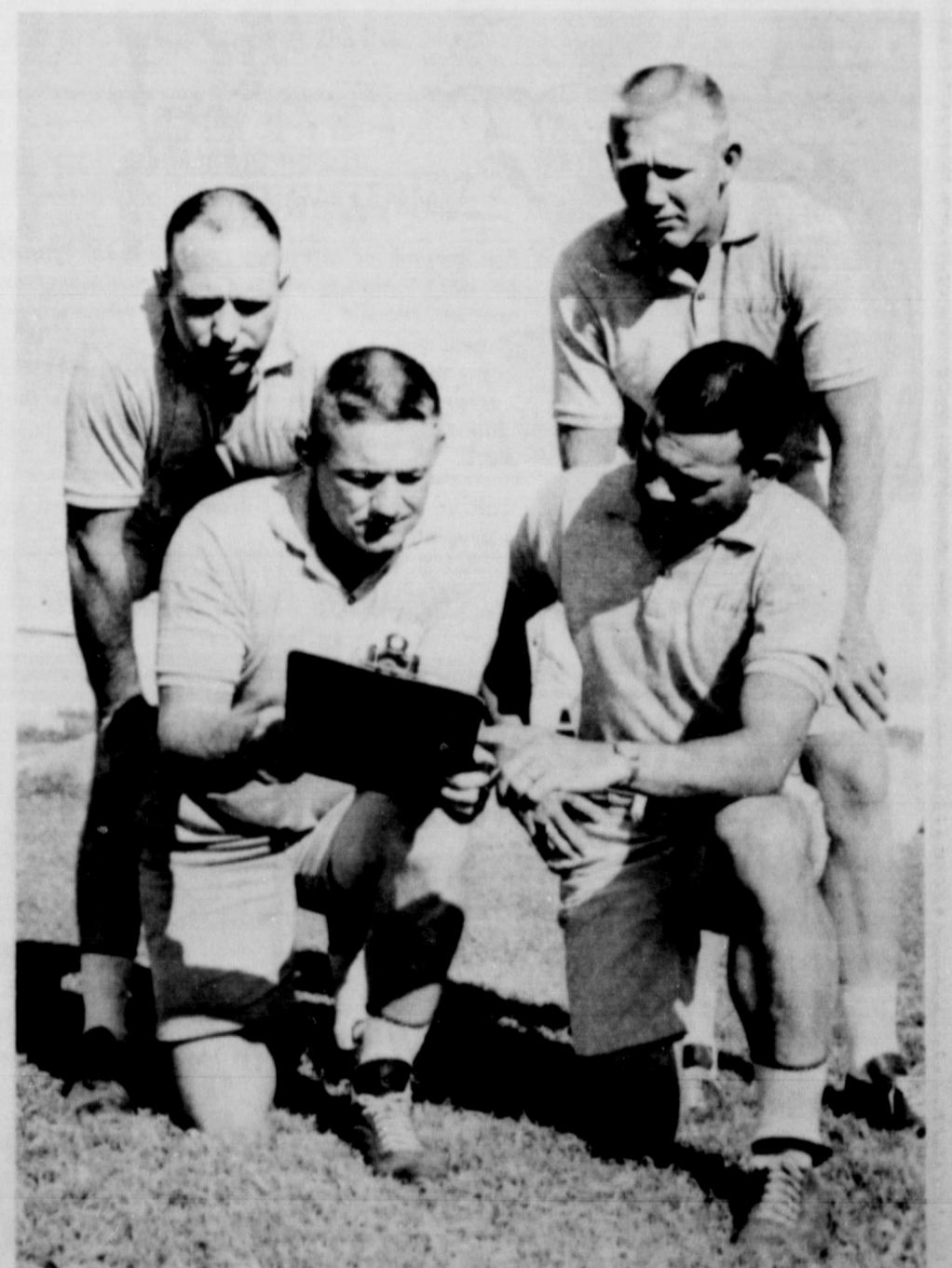

FALL FABRICS POINTERS

Already fall clothing purchases are being made while summer is still with us and vacation time is in full swing. There are many new fabrics now to choose from. No longer can the homemaker (even experts in this field) tell the content of materials by the "feel."

TAKE A LOOK AT TRICOT BONDED FABRICS

The "Fros" and "Cons" of tricot bonded fabrics are of concern to consumers. We hear echoes of manufacturers of this fabric as "no lining and easier construction."

Research may help you in making a decision. The majority of these fabrics are wool flannel or mohair, cotton and nylon looped knit bonded with acetate tricot. Points to consider are:

-Because of chemicals in the bonding, some stains cannot be removed.

-The Acetate tricot has much

poorer strength and abrasion resistance qualities than wool and will wear out much quicker.

-The tricot, being a knit, will give and allow the wool to stretch. A regular woven fabric, as a lining, will eliminate this and "give" and prevent sagging.

-Acetate is a heat-sensitive fiber and cannot be pressed at steam setting on the iron, which is used for wool.

-Acetate could not be washed without damage, therefore, it would be a poor choice to select it bonded to a washable fabric.

The bonded fabrics are easy to handle and would be especially good for an experienced person. Difficulty arises in getting a flat seam, crisp edge,

and pointed corners, so the design of the garment should not call for this. The same thing is true with stretch fabric.

Although we have many wonderful fabrics from which to choose, homemakers do find they have problems in care, as well as in construction. It would be interesting to know some of the experiences you have had. Write to the Extension office on 2nd floor of Courthouse or come by if you have questions or problems.

Low-Calorie Sour Cream (Makes 1 cup)

Use instead of sour cream and as a base for dips. (This will not hold up under heat the same as regular sour cream, but is delicious when served cold.)

*1 cup uncreamed cottage cheese
1/4 to 1/2 cup buttermilk (depending on thickness of cream to be desired)
1/4 teaspoon lemon juice
Salt to taste.

Combine above ingredients in electric blender. Blend until smooth. Add any seasonings desired. Refrigerate and serve. *If only creamed cottage cheese

is available, run water through cheese to remove cream. Drain. Use as uncreamed.

Sour Cream Salad Dressing No. 1

1 cup low-calorie sour cream
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons water
1 teaspoon onion juice
1/8 cup vinegar
2 tablespoons sugar or artificial sweetener
2 minced hard-cooked eggs
Mix sour cream, sugar, salt, onion juice and minced eggs. Add vinegar and water. Stir thoroughly and pour over salad.

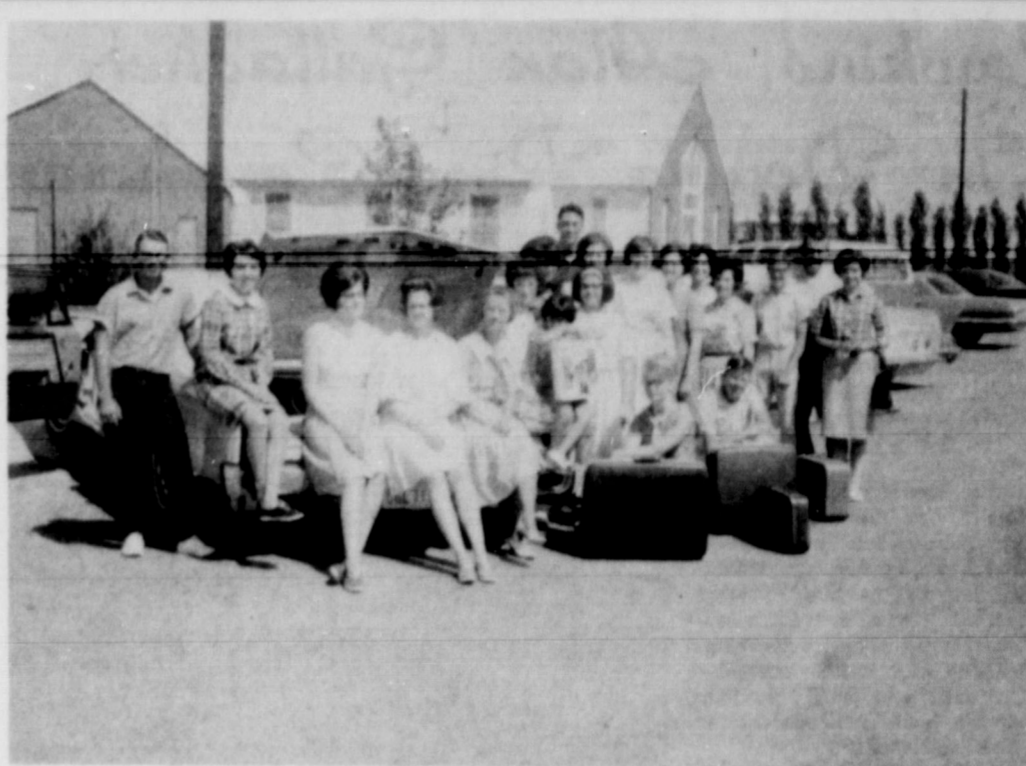
Sour Cream Salad Dressing No. 2

1/2 cup low-calorie sour cream
1 tablespoon tarragon vinegar
Pepper-Paprika
1 tablespoon chopped chives or onion
1/2 teaspoon salt
Mix and beat ingredients together with an egg beater or blender, heating until light.

To 2 cups low-calorie sour cream:

Add one of the following combinations.
Beat until blended. Refrigerate several hours to blend.

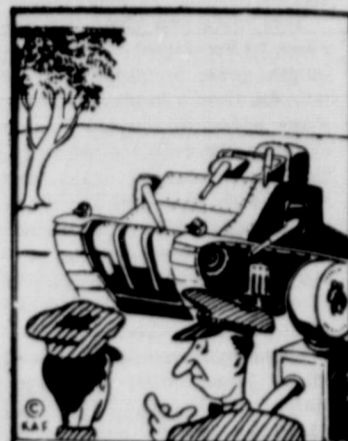

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Article VII, Section 17, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning; providing for allocation of funds therefor; authorizing the issuance of bonds or notes and the pledging of allotted funds for the payment of same; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 17 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven Cents (7c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article III, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the continuing payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Section 51, Article III, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund as provided in Section 51b, Article III, of the Constitution."

"Also, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Ten Cents (10c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning provided that none of the proceeds of this tax shall be used for auxiliary enterprises; and the governing board of each such institution of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institution as

hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bonds or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing board of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed four per cent (4%) per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise in not more than ten (10) years; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty Cents (30c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"The following state institutions then in existence shall be eligible to receive funds raised from said Ten Cent (10c) tax levied for the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, and for the succeeding ten-year period: Arlington State College at Arlington; Texas Technological College at Lubbock; North Texas State University at Denton; Lamar State College of Technology at Beaumont; Texas College of Arts and Industries at Kingsville; Texas Woman's University at Denton; Texas Southern University at Houston; Midwestern University at Wichita Falls; University of Houston at Houston; Pan American College at Edinburg; East Texas State College at Commerce; Sam Houston State Teachers College at Huntsville; Southwest Texas State College at San Marcos; West Texas State University at Canyon;

semester of the tenth year. All such designated institutions of higher learning shall not thereafter receive any general revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any General Revenue Funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this Amendment, and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose. This Amendment shall be self-enacting. It shall become operative or effective upon its adoption so as to supersede and repeal the former provisions of this Section; provided further, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing the obligation incurred by any outstanding notes or bonds heretofore issued by any state institution of higher learning under this Section prior to the adoption of this Amendment but such notes or bonds shall be paid, both as to principal and interest, from the fund as allocated to any such institution.

"(1) Ninety per cent (90%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to state institutions based on projected enrollment increases published by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System for fall 1965 to fall 1978.

"(2) Ten per cent (10%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966 shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on the number of additional square feet needed in educational and general facilities by such eligible state institution to meet the average square feet per full time equivalent student of all state senior institutions (currently numbering twenty-two).

"(3) All of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on determinations used in the June 1, 1966, allocations except that the allocations of fifty per cent (50%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on projected enrollment increases for fall 1972 to fall 1978, and fifty per cent (50%) of such funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on the need for additional square feet of educational and general facilities.

Not later than June first of the beginning year of each succeeding ten-year period the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall reallocate eighty-five per cent (85%) of the funds to be derived from said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax for said ten-year period and not later than June first of the sixth year of each succeeding ten-year period said Comptroller shall reallocate fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds to the eligible state institutions then in existence based on determinations for the said ten-year period that are similar to the determinations used in allocating funds during the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, except that enrollment projections for succeeding ten-year periods will be from the fall semester of the first year to the fall

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS BY AMENDING SECTION 17 THEREOF, PROVIDING A METHOD OF PAYMENT FOR THE ACQUIRING, CONSTRUCTING AND EQUIPPING BUILDINGS AND OTHER PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS AT CERTAIN STATE INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER LEARNING."

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS BY AMENDING SECTION 17 THEREOF, PROVIDING A METHOD OF PAYMENT FOR THE ACQUIRING, CONSTRUCTING AND EQUIPPING BUILDINGS AND OTHER PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS AT CERTAIN STATE INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER LEARNING."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

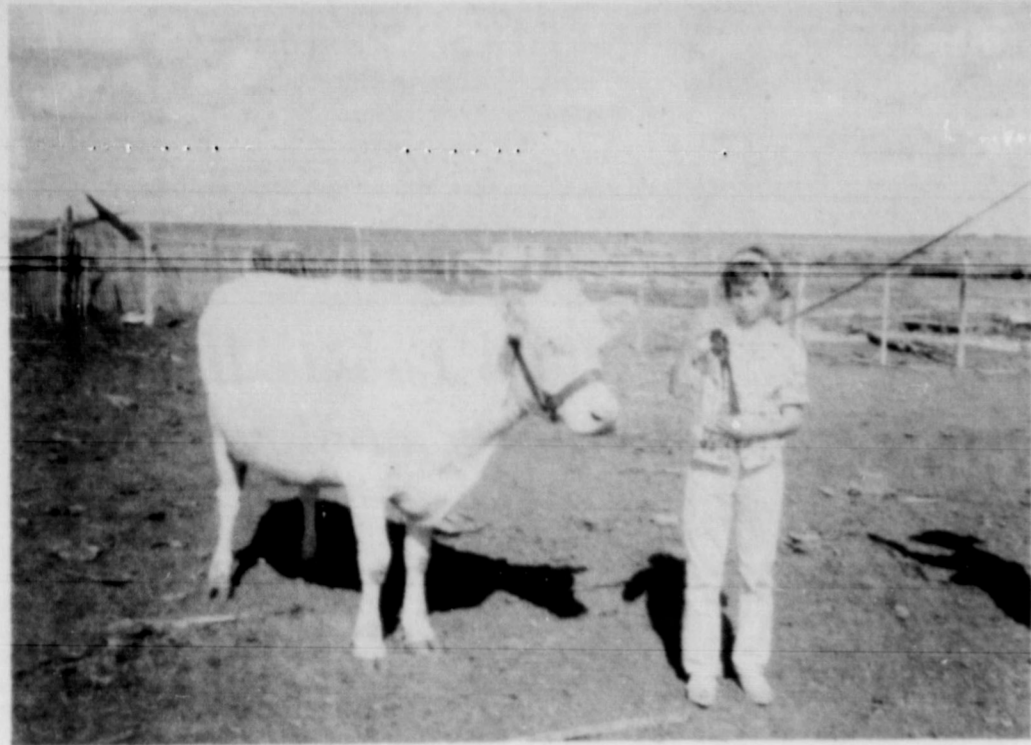

On The Farm In Parmer County

The recent showers and cooler weather have helped lower the irrigation water requirements on some of our crops. However, I don't believe our cotton crop has really benefited because of the lower temperatures we have been experiencing.

Generally our cotton crop needs a lot of good warm days and nights in the next month to make a good crop.

Even though we had a late frost last fall, the cotton crop didn't seem to do much after about the 3rd week in September last year. As I remember we had a cool, wet spell of weather the 3rd week in September and from then on fall was in the air and our nights were real cool.

I believe the weather situation this year should make a farmer think twice before he waters his cotton anymore this year.

As I have said in this column for the past couple of weeks, several years of research has proven that August 20 is the best and most profitable date to stop watering cotton in this area.

EXPERIMENT STATION FIELD DAY

The Annual Field Day at the Agricultural Experiment Station located 7-1/2 miles north of Lubbock will be held September 21 from 1:00 to 5:00 p. m. Mark this date on your calendar and plan to attend.

USED HERBICIDES?

Spray equipment must be clean to avoid crop injury and contamination to crops or damage to the equipment. A satisfactory cleaning solution for removing most herbicides from sprayers can be prepared by adding one gallon of household ammonia to 100 gallons of water. Wash the sprayer tank thoroughly, then start the pump and wash all parts; pump, hoses, boom and nozzles until completely clean. Rinse the entire system with clear water until all cleaning solution has been removed. Sprayers used for 2, 4-D and related compounds should be cleaned but it is recommended that they not be used for other pesticides.

CATTLE GRUBS

If you have purchased cattle from the Hill Country or Edwards Plateau regions of Texas, you should not treat them for grubs this year. The danger from treating cattle from these areas for grubs now is the fact that advanced stages of the grub may be present in the gutlet. Due to fast kill of the larvae and the release of toxins which cause inflammation and swelling of the gutlet, bloat results. Death can follow if the bloat is not relieved.

Cattle from other areas can still be treated for grub control and especially in feedlot cattle this can be very profitable.

TEST SOIL FOR WHEAT

August and September are good months to collect and have

tests made of soil samples for fall crops. A soil test is a good source of information on which to start planning a crop production program, and important to farmers who plan to apply fertilizer prior to or when fall crops are planted.

Collecting a representative sample, providing a complete history of past practices and indicating yield goals for crops to be planted next, are essential requirements for obtaining reliable soil testing information.

For small grains, it is especially important to indicate on the information sheet whether or not the crop will be grazed, harvested for grain or a combination of both.

The instructions for sampling should be studied and followed as closely as possible. Since both the farmer and the Soil Testing Laboratory are interested in prompt service, early samples will be a step in this direction.

Already 56 samples for wheat land have been processed for Parmer County. Containers and information sheets to accompany the samples are available in the County Agent's office in the Courthouse.

WHEAT VARIETIES

As wheat planting time approaches many farmers are thinking about what variety of wheat should they plant. The following varieties are recommended for this area: Tascosa, Bison, Kaw, Scout, Warrior, Improved Triumph and Caddo.

The varieties on the acceptable list are: Aztec, Gage, Comanche, Concho, Crockett, and Lancer.

Additional information on these and other varieties of small grains is available at the County Agents office.

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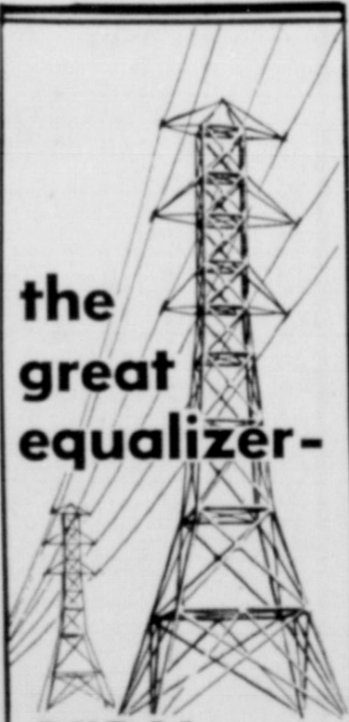
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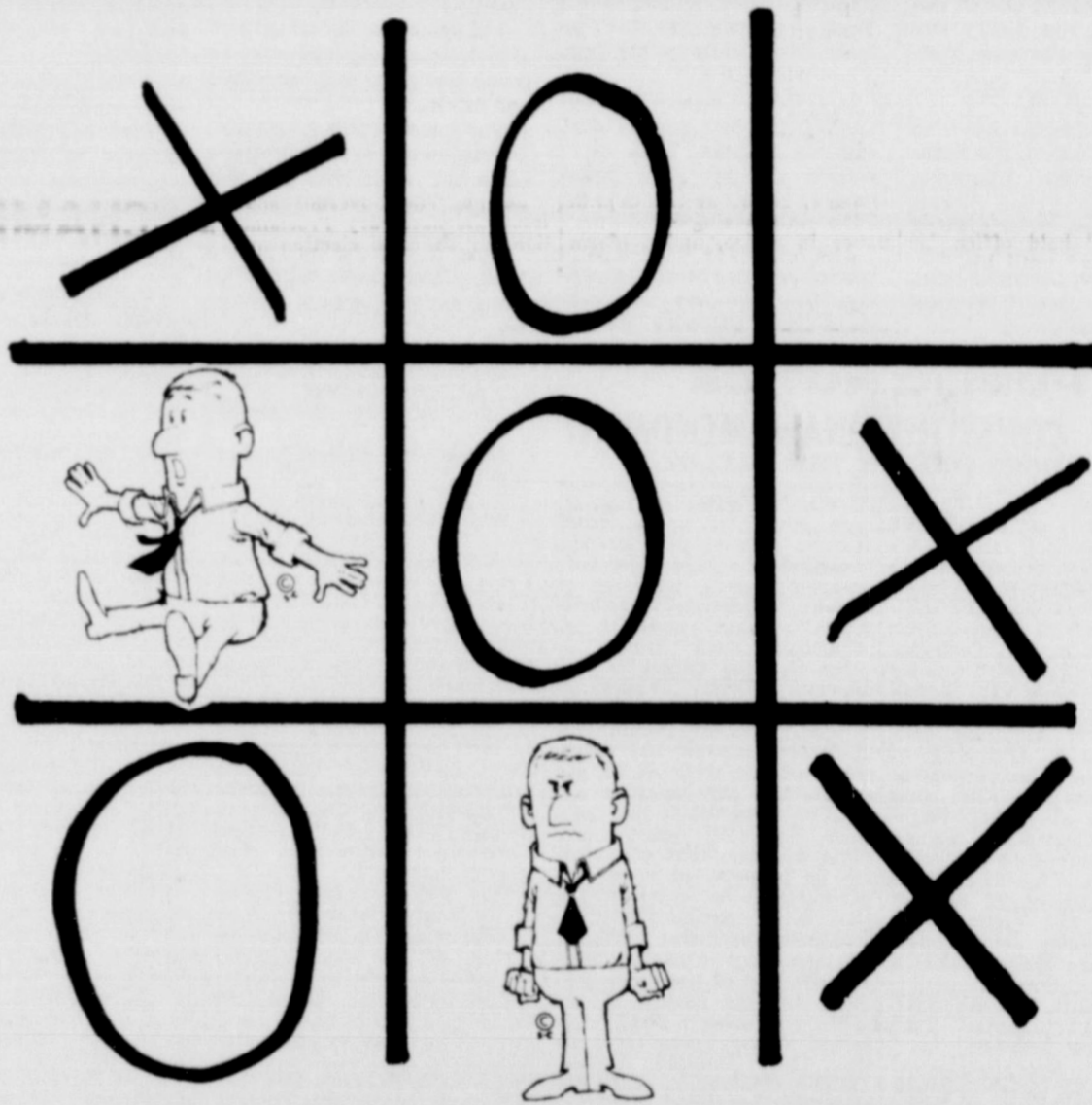

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing Amendments to Section 4, 22 and 23 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State, or certain statutory state officers; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this state at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Section 22, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the state in all

suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the state in which the state may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the state, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Section 23, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the state during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

Sec. 5. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be construed so as to extend the term of office of any officeholder previously elected to a two-year term.

Sec. 6. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

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Tips Given On Stocking Ponds By County Agent

Stock your pond with whatever kind or kinds of fish you like to catch, advises County Agent Joe VanZandt.

If you are a catfisherman only, there is no reason to stock other species; the same goes for bass or sunfish.

Many sources recommend stocking a forage fish along with large mouth bass. This practice is not necessary in Texas and is even detrimental

in some cases. The female bluegill, a forage fish, can spawn as many as four times a year in Texas, resulting in thousands of small bluegills that never reach edible size.

If a pond owner desires sunfish in his pond, the most suitable species is the redear. The redear spawns only once a year and thereby lengthens the time before overcrowding occurs.

The pond should always be stocked with fingerlings that are approximately the same size such as those obtained from the state of federal hatcheries.

Fingerlings should never be taken from a nearby stream or pond and adult fish should not be left in ponds to be stocked with fingerlings.
