

The recent showers and cooler weather have helped lower the irrigation water requirements on some of our crops. However, I don't believe our cotton crop has really benefited because of the lower temperatures we have been experienc-

Generally our cotton crop needs a lot of good warm days and nights in the next month to make a good crop.

Even though we had a late frost last fall, the cotton crop didn't seem to do much after about the 3rd week in September last year. As I remember we had a cool, wet spell of weather the 3rd week in September and from then on fall was in the air and our nights were real

I believe the weather situation this year should make a farmer think twice before he waters his cotton anymore this

As I have said in this column for the past couple of weeks, several years of research has proven that August 20 is the best and most profitable date to stop watering cotton in this
