



Mid-Year Building Stands At \$378,490 For Friona

Most of us were probably shocked, if not downright disappointed recently by the announcement that the State Board of Insurance had voted to increase automobile liability insurance beginning August 1.

However, an examination of a fact sheet prepared last week by the Texas Association of Insurance Agents helps to ease the pain somewhat, even if it doesn't give a refund to the over-taxed pocketbook.

The state insurance association points out that even with the indicated rate increase, Texas rates will still be among the lowest in the nation. There will still be 35 states with higher average premiums for automobile liability.

This is true, the report points out, in spite of the fact that Texas ranks sixth in the nation in number of licensed drivers; fifth in population; third in number of private passenger automobiles registered and first in total miles of highways.

The association further points out that the Texas rating laws provide a system whereby an average set of rates are established based on the loss experience of all insurance companies writing business in Texas. Texas rates are based on Texas experience only--not that of other states.

Prior to the announced rate increase, Texas had ranked 44th among the 50 states, but the TAI report stated that of the 15 states which rank below Texas since the rate increase, some may have higher rates than Texas again in the near future, if their pending rate filings are put into effect.

Further, Texas is divided into 26 different rating territories for the purpose of reporting and analyzing the experience of each of the various types of automobile coverages.

There are also four different age groups for collision coverage, and 12 different price groups, and 11 different types of collision coverages--producing something more than 16,500 separate rates for collision coverage alone.

Rates paid by Friona area drivers are somewhat cheaper than those paid by drivers in areas such as Fort Worth, Dallas or Houston, because the accident factor isn't as great.

The rate index as proposed for Texas is \$52.55. This compares to the highest listed rate by the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters of \$105.80 in Missouri and \$104.56 for New York.

Actually, Massachusetts has the highest rate in the nation, but since they do not have a state board fixing insurance rates, their figures are not available.

States which are below Texas in the ranking are such states as New Mexico, Georgia, Colorado, Kansas, Montana, Wyoming, Oklahoma and the Dakotas.

So, like we said, this won't save you any money on your automobile insurance premiums after August 1, but perhaps it will take a little of the "sting" out of the raise, knowing that your Texas insurance is a pretty good buy, when compared to that available in at least 35 other states.

A total of 33 building permits had been issued by the City of Friona through June 30, for construction valued at an estimated \$378,490.

The building figure for the first six months of 1965 is somewhat off the pace of last year's all-time record total, but is ahead of the pace at the halfway point of other recent years' figures.

At the same date in 1964, permits had been issued for construction estimated at \$573,734. This is \$195,244 more than the 1965 figure, an average of some \$33,000 in construction per month.

However, the building totals for the first six months of 1965 were \$63,490 more than the totals for the first half of 1963, which ended up as a record year at that time, and were \$73,614 more than the totals for the first half of 1962, which likewise zoomed to an all-time mark at the end of that year.

The year 1964 was an unusually good building year, notwithstanding the \$1.25 million school building project which was begun. Even without the school totals, the city's building for the year wound up over the million-dollar mark for the first time, at \$1,149,040.

One category where the 1965 figures lead those for last year at this date is commercial construction. Six permits have been issued for either new commercial buildings or additions to present buildings, for construction estimated to cost \$66,600. This is an increase of \$18,100 over that particular division of the 1964 totals.

It is even more heartening since builders have thought for some time that commercial building has not kept pace with residential construction in Friona.

Included in the commercial total are a new Conoco service station costing an estimated \$24,000 and a new Texaco wholesale warehouse valued at an estimated \$23,000.

As usual, over half of the construction total for the first six months was for new homes. There were 10 permits issued for new homes, valued at \$196,500. For the first half of 1964,

there were 18 permits for new homes valued at \$432,200.

Several permits have been issued for additions or alterations to existing property. This total is \$109,300, which compares to just \$36,034 at this point a year ago. Helping to hike this category is the \$70,000 addition to the First Baptist Church, being built by Taylor Construction Company.

The building total for the

first half of 1965 is the highest for any first six month period since records have been kept by the City of Friona, with the exception of last year's total.

After falling to a low point of \$420,350 for the full year in 1961, Friona building has been on a "boom," and set all-time records three consecutive years, 1962 through 1964. Totals for those years were \$725,624 for 1962, \$873,475 for

1963 and \$1,149,040 for 1964 without the school, and \$1,978,040 including that project.

HALF THE TIME

Year's Rainfall Tops Entire 1964 Receipts

The 1.03 inches of rain recorded the night of Friday, July 2 in Friona ran the city's 1965

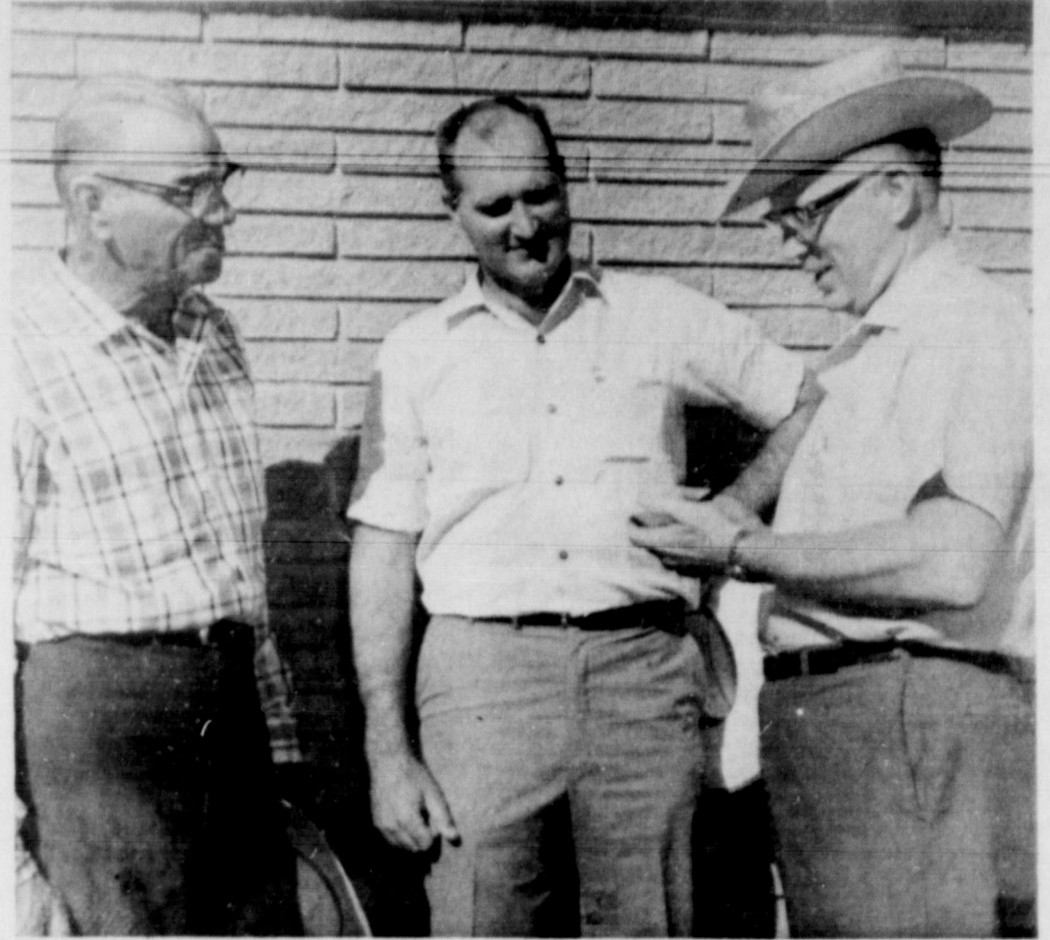
rainfall to more than that received all during 1964, in just one-half as many calendar days. Last Friday's total ran Friona's 1965 rainfall total to 10.94 inches, compared to 10.84 inches all during 1964.

Through June 30, the total stood at 9.91 for the year, almost twice that received through June 30 of 1964, 5.30 inches.

June is getting the reputation of being the "wet month" in Friona. So far this year it has been the wettest, with over half of the year's moisture falling through June 30 coming during the month. The month's total this year was 5.47 inches.

The month just past was the wettest month since June of 1963, when a whopping 7.07 inches were recorded. This year's moisture during the month probably did as much if not more good to farmland, as practically all of it in the immediate area fell in slow, soaking rains. In June of 1963, three or four times the rain came in hard driving amounts, and almost three inches (2.90) fell

MORE INFORMATION SOUGHT

Three Locations Probed For Multi-Purpose Dam

The site of a proposed multiple-purpose structure (dam) for Running Water Draw has been narrowed to three locations, it was brought out in a joint meeting of the county's steering committee for the project with the county commissioner's court.

Next step in the project, which is now beginning to face a deadline for action, is to secure engineering reports on two of the three possible locations.

The three most acceptable places that a multiple-purpose structure might be located are, according to Soil Conservation Service specialists, on the B. R. Greeson estate, three miles west of State Highway 214, on the Sue Stevens property about a quarter of a mile west of the highway, and on the J. B. Williams place some four and one-half miles east of the road.

The Williams locations has already been surveyed, but permission has not been granted the SCS as yet to do survey work on the other two possible sites.

It was the opinion of the committee and the commissioners last week that before a project with the magnitude of the current one is undertaken, complete information should be made available so that the SCS might have an opportunity to recommend the best site.

Virgil Cunningham of Amarillo, area conservationist for the SCS, who attended the meeting, stated that basically the three locations "on paper" could be rated one-two-three from east to west, the main factor being the amount of water which would be available.

In other words, the possible location at the J. B. Williams place, being farthest east, would have potentially the most water available, the Sue Stevens place would have the second greatest amount, and the Greeson "location" would have the least.

"In fact, there is some doubt that the federal government would approve a cost-share arrangement on the program if the Greeson site were selected," Cunningham told the group. He indicated that, at least on paper, the other two locations would come closer to fitting the bill.

However, the committee asked for complete engineering data on the three possible locations, so that all pertinent information would be available. Meanwhile, the survey committee has virtually completed its work on the project, and is

traversing the draw from west to east in its "finishing up" process. It was stated that a decision needed to be made on the issue before the group completed its investigation, so that it may be included in the overall project.

Definite locations have been announced by the SCS for three flood-prevention structures along the draw. These will be on the Jack Dunn place a mile west of U. S. Highway 60 between Bovina and Farwell; on the Jack McCracken place about three miles northwest of Bovina on Catfish Draw, and

Students Give Impressions Of Boys; Girls State

(Editor's note: Following are accounts written by Priona's representatives to Girls and Boys State conventions)

The Panhandle Bus, the one which I rode, left Amarillo on Tuesday June 15 at 9:00 p. m. In route to Austin, Girls State was held at the Texas School for the Blind in Austin. We arrived at the school about 10:00 a. m. Wednesday and this was the start of ten exciting days of living in a mythical state. The Panhandle bus was the first bus to arrive and since the program did not start until 6:00 that evening, the Panhandle girls were very well acquainted with the schedule before things got under way.

After dinner Wednesday, we had flag lowering which we had every evening and then we had our first assembly. In this assembly, we had an introduction of the staff and counselors. The main ones we met were Miss Frances Goff who was our director, Mrs. Joe Matthews, President of the American Legion Auxiliary, Mr. Lewis Emerich, Commander of the American Legion and Miss Brenda Cook, Governor of Bluebonnet Girls State in 1964. Governor Cook was our speaker this evening and she was a very good speaker. We enjoyed her very much.

In our first assembly, it was explained to us that this Girls State was our own mythical state and we represented the adult citizens of the state. We were assigned to our cities, to the Nationalist or Federalist

party, and to either the House of Representatives or the Senate. We named our cities and counties, elected newspaper reporters and mail carriers in each of the eight cities, and paid a whole penny for a poll tax receipt.

Our assembly Thursday morning was our first study on government. We started out with City Government which was given by Mr. Trueman O'Quinn, Mr. O'Quinn was a former Austin City Attorney, so he was very well qualified for presenting this study. After we had this good review on city government, we returned to our cities to choose the form of city government we liked the best and file for city offices. This same day we elected precinct chairmen, county precinct chairmen from the four counties, and elected state party officials. When we had finally done all of this, it was time to vote for our city officials which was lots of fun and it took lots of time.

The second assembly Thursday was an introduction of city and party officials, followed by a Legislative Process review given by Miss Goff. After this review, we went directly into our first House and Senate meetings. In our state, we had 350 Representatives and 50 Senators. The main thing we learned in the first House meeting was the correct parliamentary procedure. I had never realized that parliamentary procedure could be so complicated because I had never really been introduced to it.

Friday, Saturday, and Sunday we were so busy that it seemed

like we skipped three days, Friday we studied County Government which was presented by Mr. Herman Jones, District Judge of Travis County. Later in the day Miss Goff gave a study on State Government.

The House and Senate convened twice on Friday and it became more interesting. The House and Senate introduced bills and resolutions so things really started popping all at once. It was explained to us that the bills introduced would be presented to the Texas legislator for them to consider in their next session. Before these bills could be presented to the legislator, they had to pass through both the House and the Senate at Bluebonnet Girls State. We also introduced resolutions but they were just directed to the events at Girls State. We had at least two House and Senate meetings daily and by the end of the session the 1965 citizens had passed more bills and resolutions than the citizens of the last three years had passed.

Saturday and Sunday were very exciting days because they were the election days, Saturday morning Mr. R. T. (Sonny) Davis, Assistant Attorney General, spoke to us about State Government and the Attorney General's Youth Conference. Saturday afternoon was campaign time and later in the evening we had our Primary Election. After we finished voting, we had an assembly to give the counselors time to count the ballots. It seemed to take them forever, but the votes were finally counted and turned into Miss Goff. Miss Goff read off the names for each party and of course there were many run-offs, so back to the polls we went for our second time to vote. We voted, found out the final election returns for the Primary election, and finally went to bed at 1:00 a. m.

Bright and early Sunday morning, we got up and went to church services and returned back to the school to start campaigning for the General Election which was to be Sunday evening. Again this evening, we reported to the County Seat to vote again, but this was to be the last time. When the returns were finally given to Miss Goff, we were almost ready to report to the reformatory. The excitement of the returns was nearly too much for all of us, but our spirit was really high. The election was finally over after a long and hard campaign, but we seemed to make it in fine shape.

Monday was a big day for us and the state of Texas because

this was the day that 400 girls took over the Capitol. At 10:00 a. m., the House and Senate Convened for the first meeting at the Capitol. We enjoyed this session because we had comfortable chairs and best of all Air-Conditioning. At 11:30, we reported to the Capitol Rotunda to sing our songs for a record, inaugurate the Bluebonnet Girls State officials, and listen to Attorney General Waggoner Carr give an address to the new officials. After all the proceedings, we had lunch on the East Capitol Grounds. We reported back to the House and Senate Chambers after a good lunch for another even more exciting session. Unfortunately for us, after this session our day at the Capitol was over and we had to return to the school.

Tuesday and Wednesday were the two days when our offices functioned. We had our regular House and Senate meetings, and our guests speakers. Tuesday our main event was the evening assembly where we gave a big welcome to Miss Marilyn Van Debur, 1958 Miss America, Miss Van Debur gave a very good talk on "Goals and Dreams". We had other good speakers on Wednesday, but I shall not take time to mention them.

Thursday morning the House and Senate had a joint session which proved to be very entertaining and interesting. Since this was the last time for the House and Senate to convene, the citizens were on their own so the counselors could see how much we learned. After the assembly was over, the girls riding the Panhandle Bus loaded the bus and left the Texas School for the Blind at 11:00 a. m. We finally arrived after a very long and tiring trip on the bus. The time

of our arrival in Amarillo was 8:30 p. m. which was two hours ahead of time.

I must say that I really had a wonderful time and I wish every girl at the age of sixteen or seventeen could attend Girls State. After attending Girls State and being a citizen, I feel that it is a very worthwhile program.

Boys State was not only a privilege but a challenge to every citizen. On Wednesday night, the keynote speaker was Dr. H. Roe Bartle of Kansas City, Missouri, who is one of the top ten speakers in the nation. He surely lived up to his reputation if one can judge by the thunderous ovations. No one will soon forget the momentous thoughts and ideas that he engraved on each individual's mind.

Friday, all citizens of Boys State visited the State Capitol, and members of Boys State House and Senate held their sessions there. That night the Governor's Inaugural Ball was held. Girls from all the high schools in Austin were invited.

On The Farm In Parmer County

By JOE VANZANDT

APHIDS ON SORGHUM

We have noticed a lot of corn leaf aphids in Grain Sorghum over the county lately. However, this is nothing to get alarmed about. Control of these aphids in most cases is impractical. A recent research progress report that was carried out last year pointed out why control of the aphids is impractical. In this report, aphid infestations ranged from 64 to 374 individuals per plant but did not influence yields. Significant aphid reduction for the life of the plant did not increase grain yields.

The aphid young and adults suck the plant juices. The insect is commonly found deep in the whorl of the middle leaf. However, aphids apparently do not cause damage or reduce grain sorghum yields.

COTTON IRRIGATION

Don't start irrigating cotton too soon! Our cotton has sufficient soil moisture in the ground to last until the first white blooms appear. Watering cotton prior to this time can lead to troubles.

1. If watered too early (before white blooms appear) cotton tends to keep growing in a vegetative manner and doesn't start fruiting early.

2. Early irrigation can lower soil temperatures in the root zone of cotton plants. This encourages blights, wilts and seedling disease. Above all, irrigation shouldn't be practiced when fields of young cotton are disease-ridden, as this tends to compound the problem.

3. Watering too early can also keep roots from penetrating deep in the soil. Especially in the tighter soils area, this can create hazards. If roots haven't penetrated deep in the soil, the normally hot, dry weather of August will cause plants to become moisture-stressed. An inadequate root system means farmers won't be able to irrigate their cotton fields often enough at this time to keep plants adequately supplied with water.

Highest water requirement of cotton plants occurs at peak bloom stage. At this stage, cotton will use .25 to .4 inches per day. This compares to less than .1 inch per day for cotton plants from emergence to squaring stages. From white bloom to peak blooming stage, cotton plants will utilize .1 to .25 acre-inches water daily.

Several years research at South Plains Research and Extension Center, Lubbock, has shown a six-inch preplant irrigation plus two four-inch postplants gives maximum yields with top net returns in normal growing seasons. A good rain at the proper time can eliminate one of the post-plant irrigations.

PASTURE FERTILIZATION

If you have improved pasture grasses, you may need to topdress that grass now.

Most of these irrigated pastures work best when a rotational grazing plan is used. Each time after you graze or cut down the grass you need to topdress with nitrogen.

A rule of thumb is to apply 30 lbs. of nitrogen after each grazing period or about every month to cultivated pasture grasses or hybrid sudans. This would be the rule to follow if you had not already put in a big supply of nitrogen earlier in the year. If you had put down from 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen earlier than you should topdress now.

These are merely guides and to be more exact a soil test would be very helpful, especially on your available phosphorous. Due to variations in soils and phosphorous residues in our soils, a soil test is the best way to determine the actual requirements.

Wheat Harvest Almost Over; Yields Are Good

The 1965 wheat harvest is virtually complete, with elevator officials in the Friona area estimating the harvest 90 to 95 per cent complete as of Tuesday.

Most of the wheat which remained unharvested was that which had received rainfall in recent weeks which made it impossible to get into the fields.

The yield on the 1965 crop is rated as "good." Wheat made mostly between 40 and 65 bushels per acre. The fields which made less than 40 bushels

were those which received hail damage or was dryland.

Dryland wheat made 10 to 15 bushels per acre, which is also better than for the past couple of years.

One Friona elevator official stated that the wheat was good; the test weight has been good, and other factors are in line.

If weather remained sunny and warm, the last remaining unharvested wheat was expected to be brought in by the end of the week.
